NARRATIVE:

House Bill No. 1252 is an update of existing law, Chapter 37-17.1 through Chapter 37-17.22, which was originally passed by the 1973 legislature. No real fiscal impact on the state (special and general) funds and for the cities and counties is anticipated as a result of HB 1252 being passed by the 49th Legislative Assembly.

The cost of extending the Governor's disaster/emergency proximations should be less than our expenditures in the past. Under current law, the Division of Disaster Emergency Services and the Office of the Governor had to send renewal notices to all counties/cities affected, plus the news media. The proposed changes will amend this requirement out of the law; thereby saving both the Governor's Office and the Division of Disaster Emergency Services a few hundred dollars per year.

It is not difficult to prove that the state and its counties and cities have received more federal funds than we have spent (by at least tenfold) in having a program to mitigate, prepare for, respond to, and recover from, serious disasters and emergencies.

In fact, most of the past state and local expenditures for emergency preparedness have reduced the cost of day-to-day business of our governments.

In summary, the minor amendments proposed in HB 1252 will not have a negative impact on the expenditures of state and local governments in the future.
