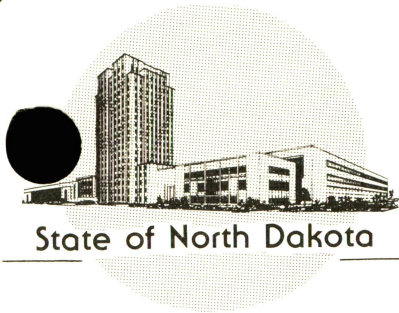

House Bill 1367 - Smoking Areas

The fiscal impact of HB1367 will vary greatly from building to building.

The primary concern is with the language that states: The ventilating system must exhaust directly to the outside without recirculating within non-smoking areas.

In most existing buildings the best option for exhausting directly outside would be a roof vent or being able to tie into an existing exhaust system, that would be exhausting directly outside. The cost for an existing area containing 225 square feet and providing an exhaust system to the outside would be between \$1,500 to \$3,000. The \$1,500 dollar price would provide new ventilating equipment and tie into an existing exhaust system that would ventilate through the roof. The cost will double if we have to make a new penetration to the outside, in order to exhaust the smoking room. These costs would then be multiplied by the number of designated areas that may be set up within the various governmental buildings located within the state of North Dakota.
