1 A BILL for an Act to protect the right of a parent to direct the upbringing of a child.

2 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- 3 **SECTION 1. Definitions.** As used in this Act, unless the context otherwise requires: 4 1. "Child" means a minor. 2. 5 "Direct the upbringing of a child" includes a parent's: 6 Directing or providing for the education of the child; a. 7 b. Making a health or mental health care decision for the child; Disciplining the child, including noncriminal corporal discipline; 8 C. 9 d. Directing or providing for the religious teaching of the child; and 10 Withholding consent to any medical service or treatment except when the e. 11 care or treatment is necessary: 12 To prevent or remedy serious harm to the child; or (1) 13 (2) To prevent the withholding of medically indicated treatment from a child 14 with a life-threatening condition. 15 3. "Parent" means the mother or father of a child and who may be a natural parent,
 - adoptive parent, or legal guardian.

 SECTION 2. Prohibition on interfering with or usurping rights of a parent. Neither the state nor any political subdivision of the state or any official or employee of the state or any
- 19 political subdivision may interfere with or usurp the right of a parent to direct the upbringing of a
- 20 child of the parent.

- 21 **SECTION 3. Claims.** A parent may assert a claim for a violation of this Act in an action 22 in a district court.
- 23 **SECTION 4. Exclusions.** This Act does not apply to:

- Domestic relations cases concerning the apportionment of parental rights between
 parents in custody disputes or any other litigation between parents.
 - An action to terminate parental rights with respect to a child who has been determined to be abandoned, criminally abused or neglected, or to an adoption proceeding with respect to the child.
- SECTION 5. Attorney's fees. When the parent prevails in an action or proceeding
 under this Act, the state shall pay the parent's reasonable attorney's fees, costs, and expenses.
