ENGROSSED HOUSE BILL NO. 1003

Introduced by

Appropriations Committee

(At the request of the Governor)

1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the North Dakota
2 university system; to provide for a legislative council study; to create and enact a new chapter
3 to title 15 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the adoption of the midwestern regional
4 higher education compact; and to declare an emergency.

5 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:**

6 **SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION.** The funds provided in this section, or so much of the
7 funds as may be necessary, are hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in
8 the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal
9 funds or other income, to the North Dakota university system and to the various institutions of
10 higher learning under the supervision of the North Dakota university system for the purpose of
11 defraying their expenses, for the biennium beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2001,
12 as follows:

14 **SECTION 2. APPROPRIATION TRANSFER.** The higher education contingency and
15 capital improvements emergency fund, board initiatives, and disabled student services in
16 subdivision 2 of section 1 must be used for the benefit of the institutions and entities in
17 subdivisions 2 through 15 of section 1 as determined by the state board of higher education.
18 The board shall notify the office of management and budget of the allocation of general fund
19 authority from the higher education contingency and capital improvements emergency fund,
20 board initiatives, and disabled student services to the various entities and institutions and which
21 line items in the various institutions and entities must be adjusted.

22 **SECTION 3. ADDITIONAL INCOME - APPROPRIATION.** Operating fund income
23 received in excess of the estimated income line item appropriated to the entities in section 1 of
24 this Act which is deposited in their respective operating funds in the state treasury up to the
25 following amounts is hereby appropriated and may be spent subject to state board of higher
26 education approval:

12 Any additional excess estimated income is hereby appropriated and may be spent only upon
13 authorization of the emergency commission. Any funds received by the board of higher
14 education and the entities of the North Dakota university system pursuant to federal acts,
15 private grants, and other sources not deposited in the operating funds in the state treasury are
16 hereby appropriated for the period beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2001.

17 **SECTION 4. TRANSFER AUTHORITY.** The state board of higher education is
18 authorized to approve the transfer of funds between line items for each entity included in
19 section 1 of this Act and shall notify the office of management and budget of each transfer.

20 **SECTION 5. EXEMPTION.** The scholars program, university system contingency fund,
21 student financial assistance grants, professional student exchange program, native American
22 scholarships, and operating expenses contained in subdivision 2 of section 1 of chapter 32 of
23 the 1997 Session Laws are not subject to the provisions of section 54-44.1-11 and any
24 unexpended funds from these appropriations are available during the biennium beginning
25 July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2001.

26 **SECTION 6. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - FULL-TIME EQUIVALENTS.** The state board
27 of higher education is authorized to adjust or increase full-time equivalent positions as needed,
28 subject to the availability of funds. The university system shall report any adjustments to the
29 office of management and budget prior to the submission of the 2001-03 budget request.

30 **SECTION 7. UNEXPENDED GENERAL FUND APPROPRIATIONS - EXCESS**
31 **INCOME.** Unexpended general fund dollars appropriated to and excess income received by

1 entities listed in section 1 of chapter 32 of the 1997 Session Laws are not subject to the
2 provisions of section 54-44.1-11 and any unexpended funds from these appropriations or
3 revenues are available during the biennium beginning July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2001,
4 and may be expended, as directed by the state board of higher education, for capital repairs
5 and improvements, equipment, and other one-time expenditures.

6 **SECTION 8. PROJECT AUTHORIZATIONS - LOCAL RESPONSIBILITY.** The capital
7 improvements at Bismarck state college and UND-Lake Region require a minimum local match
8 as follows:

9 Bismarck state college - music addition	\$200,000
10 UND-Lake Region - auditorium renovation	\$495,000

11 Bismarck state college may, after receiving approval from the budget section, obtain
12 and utilize any available funds, in addition to the minimum local match of \$200,000, received
13 from federal, public, private, or other sources which are hereby appropriated to Bismarck state
14 college to assist in the music addition and related renovations at Bismarck state college.

15 UND-Lake Region may, after receiving approval from the budget section, obtain and
16 utilize any available funds, in addition to the minimum local match of \$495,000, received from
17 federal, public, private, or other sources which are hereby appropriated to UND-Lake Region to
18 assist in the auditorium renovation at UND-Lake Region.

19 **SECTION 9. BOND ISSUANCE - PURPOSES.** The state board of higher education, in
20 accordance with chapter 15-55, may issue and sell self-liquidating, tax-exempt bonds in an
21 amount not exceeding \$4,750,000 for the purpose of financing capital projects at institutions
22 under the control of the board, including an amount not exceeding \$250,000 for student union
23 improvements at Bismarck state college and \$4,500,000 for a health and wellness center at
24 North Dakota state university. Bonds issued under the provisions of this Act may not become a
25 general obligation of the state of North Dakota.

26 **SECTION 10. USE OF PROCEEDS - APPROPRIATION.** The proceeds resulting from
27 the sale of bonds authorized under section 9, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, in
28 the amount of \$250,000 for the student union improvements at Bismarck state college and
29 \$4,500,000 for a health and wellness center at North Dakota state university and other
30 available funds from other sources are hereby appropriated for these projects. Any

1 unexpended balance from the sale of bonds must be placed in a sinking fund for the retirement
2 of the authorized bonds.

3 **SECTION 11. LOCAL FUNDS APPROPRIATED.** Any local funds beyond the local
4 funds appropriated in Section 1 of this Act are hereby appropriated for the biennium beginning
5 July 1, 1999, and ending June 30, 2001, and may be spent subject to approval of the state
6 board of higher education and reported to the budget section of the legislative council.

7 **SECTION 12. SERVICE, ACCESS, GROWTH, AND EMPOWERMENT.** Prior to
8 purchasing goods or contracting for services for the service, access, growth, and empowerment
9 project, the state board of higher education must receive permission from either the legislative
10 assembly or the budget section of the legislative council. Information provided must include a
11 business plan project.

12 **SECTION 13. NDSU/NDSCS SKILLS TRAINING CENTER.** The general fund moneys
13 provided by the 1999 legislative assembly for the skills training center may only be used for
14 renovations to the skills training center. Any general fund moneys provided for the skills
15 training center for the 1999-2001 biennium are intended to be the final direct general fund
16 support provided by the legislative assembly, and no direct general fund support may be
17 provided for the operations of or renovations or additions to the skills training center after the
18 1999-2001 biennium.

19 **SECTION 14. PROGRAM COORDINATION AND ACCREDITATION.** The legislative
20 assembly urges the state board of higher education to carefully review requests by state
21 institutions of higher education applying for accreditation of programs that have already been
22 accredited at other state institutions. The board should consider student access and quality
23 issues as well as costs when reviewing such requests. Whenever such a request is made or
24 accreditation is granted, the board is encouraged to direct the campuses offering similar
25 programs to cooperate in jointly offering the similar programs by using the staffs and resources
26 of the other campuses. Also, the legislative assembly expresses its strong support for the
27 board to continue implementing policies and procedures to ensure coordination and
28 cooperation between campuses where similar programs are offered.

29 **SECTION 15. TECHNOLOGY POOL.** The technology pool amount in subdivision 1 of
30 section 1 must be used for the benefit of the institutions and entities in subdivisions 2 through
31 15 of section 1 as determined by the board of higher education. Technology funding

1 allocations are to be made based on historic funding, the higher education computer network
2 strategic plan, base funding for higher education computer network computer center
3 operations, and base funding for interactive video network and on-line Dakota information
4 network operations.

5 **SECTION 16. SALARY POOL.** The salary pool amount in subdivision 1 of section 1
6 must be used for the benefit of the institutions and entities in subdivisions 2 through 15 of
7 section 1 as determined by the board of higher education. When making allocations from the
8 salary appropriation pool in subdivision 1 of section 1, the state board of higher education shall
9 allocate a minimum of ninety-five percent of the 1997-99 salary and wage appropriation to the
10 institutions and entities in subdivisions 2 through 15 of section 1. The board is encouraged to
11 allocate the funds to achieve the reinvestment of funds included in the 1999-2001 biennium
12 entity budget requests. The board may, at its discretion, allocate funds to address equity
13 funding issues and additional salary increases beyond legislative appropriations although it is
14 recognized by the legislative assembly that significant additional funds or reallocations between
15 campuses are necessary to fully address the equity funding and salary increase issues.

16 **SECTION 17. ALLOCATION OF RESTORATION LINE.** The restoration line in
17 subdivision 1 of section 1 must be used for the benefit of the institutions and entities in
18 subdivisions 2 through 15 of section 1 as determined by the board of higher education. When
19 making allocations from the restoration line in subdivision 1 of section 1, the board of higher
20 education is strongly encouraged to consider allocating the funds to address equity funding
21 issues and special academic program needs of the entities under its control.

22 **SECTION 18. LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL INTERIM STUDY OF HIGHER EDUCATION**
23 **FUNDING.** The legislative council shall consider studying higher education funding during the
24 1999-2000 interim. If conducted, the study should solicit input from the governor, board of
25 higher education, executive branch, university system campuses, and representatives of
26 business and industry. The study should address the expectations of the North Dakota
27 university system in meeting the state's needs in the twenty-first century, the funding
28 methodology needed to meet these expectations and needs, and an accountability system and
29 reporting methodology for the university system. The legislative council shall report its findings
30 and recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the
31 recommendations, to the fifty-seventh legislative assembly.

- 1 legislative assemblies of the compacting states in accordance with the terms of
2 this compact.
- 3 2. The commission consists of the following five resident members from each state:
4 the governor or the governor's designee who serves during the tenure of office of
5 the governor; two legislators, one from each house, except for Nebraska, which
6 may appoint two legislators from its legislative assembly, who serve two-year
7 terms and are appointed by the appropriate appointing authority in each house of
8 the legislative assembly; and two other at large members, at least one of whom is
9 to be selected from the field of higher education. The at large members are to be
10 appointed as provided by the laws of the appointing state. One of the two at large
11 members initially appointed in each state serves a two-year term. The other, and
12 any regularly appointed successor to either at large member, serves a four-year
13 term. All vacancies are to be filled in accordance with the laws of the appointing
14 states. Any commissioner appointed to fill a vacancy serves until the end of the
15 incomplete term.
- 16 3. The commission shall select annually, from among its members, a chairman, a
17 vice chairman, and a treasurer.
- 18 4. The commission shall appoint an executive director who serves at its pleasure and
19 who is secretary to the commission. The treasurer, the executive director, and
20 other personnel as the commission determines must be bonded in the amounts
21 required by the commission.
- 22 5. The commission shall meet at least once each calendar year. The chairman may
23 call additional meetings and upon the request of a majority of the commission
24 members of three or more compacting states, shall call additional meetings. The
25 commission shall give public notice of all meetings. All meetings must be open to
26 the public.
- 27 6. Each compacting state represented at any meeting of the commission is entitled to
28 one vote. A majority of the compacting states constitute a quorum for the
29 transaction of business, unless a larger quorum is required by the bylaws of the
30 commission.

31 Article III. Powers and Duties of the Commission

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- 1 1. The commission shall adopt bylaws governing its management and operations.
- 2 2. Notwithstanding the laws of any compacting state, the commission shall provide
- 3 for the personnel policies and programs of the compact in its bylaws.
- 4 3. The commission shall submit a budget to the governor and legislative assembly of
- 5 each compacting state at the time and for the period required by each state. The
- 6 budget must contain recommendations regarding the amount to be appropriated
- 7 by each compacting state.
- 8 4. The commission shall report annually to the legislative assemblies and governors
- 9 of the compacting states, to the midwestern governors' conference, and to the
- 10 midwestern legislative conference of the council of state governments regarding
- 11 the activities of the commission during the preceding year. The reports must
- 12 include any recommendations that have been adopted by the commission.
- 13 5. The commission may borrow, accept, or contract for the services of personnel from
- 14 any state or from the United States, or from any subdivision or agency thereof,
- 15 from any interstate agency, or from any person.
- 16 6. The commission may accept for any of its purposes and functions under the
- 17 compact donations and grants of money, equipment, supplies, materials, and
- 18 services, conditional or otherwise, from any state or the United States or from any
- 19 subdivision or agency thereof, from an interstate agency, or from any person, and
- 20 may receive, use, and dispose of the same.
- 21 7. The commission may enter agreements with any other interstate education
- 22 organization or agency, with institutions of higher education located in nonmember
- 23 states, and with any of the various states to provide adequate programs and
- 24 services in higher education for the citizens of the respective compacting states.
- 25 After negotiations with interested institutions and interstate organizations or
- 26 agencies, the commission shall determine the cost of providing the programs and
- 27 services in higher education for use in these agreements.
- 28 8. The commission may establish and maintain offices in one or more of the
- 29 compacting states.
- 30 9. The commission may establish committees and hire staff as necessary to carry out
- 31 its functions.

1 10. The commission may provide for actual and necessary expenses for the
2 attendance of its members at official meetings of the commission or of its
3 designated committees.

4 Article IV. Activities of the Commission

5 1. The commission shall collect data on the long-range effects of the compact on
6 higher education. By the end of the fourth year from the effective date of the
7 compact and every two years thereafter, the commission shall review its
8 accomplishments and make recommendations to the governors and legislative
9 assemblies of the compacting states regarding continuance of the compact.

10 2. The commission shall study higher education issues that are of particular concern
11 to the midwestern region. The commission also shall study the need for higher
12 education programs and services in the compacting states and the resources for
13 meeting those needs. The commission shall prepare reports, on its research, for
14 presentation to the governors and legislative assemblies of the compacting states,
15 as well as to other interested parties. In conducting the studies, the commission
16 may confer with any national or regional planning body. The commission may
17 draft and recommend to the governors and legislative assemblies of the various
18 compacting states suggested legislation addressing issues in higher education.

19 3. The commission shall study the need for the provision of adequate programs and
20 services in higher education, such as undergraduate, graduate, or professional
21 student exchanges in the region. If a need for exchange in a field is apparent, the
22 commission may enter agreements with any institution of higher education and
23 with any compacting state to provide programs and services in higher education
24 for the citizens of the respective compacting states. After negotiating with
25 interested institutions and the compacting states, the commission shall determine
26 the cost of providing the programs and services in higher education for use in its
27 agreements. The contracting states shall contribute funds not otherwise provided,
28 as determined by the commission, to carry out the agreements. The commission
29 may also serve as the administrative and fiscal agent in carrying out agreements
30 for higher education programs and services.

1 Article VII. Withdrawal, Default, and Termination

- 2 1. A compacting state may withdraw from the compact by enacting a statute
3 repealing the compact, but the withdrawal may not become effective until two
4 years after the enactment of such statute. A withdrawing state is liable for any
5 obligation that it incurred on account of its party status, up to the effective date of
6 withdrawal, except that if the withdrawing state has specifically undertaken or
7 committed itself to any performance of an obligation extending beyond the
8 effective date of withdrawal, it remains liable to the extent of the obligation.
- 9 2. If a compacting state at any time defaults in the performance of its obligations,
10 assumed or imposed, in accordance with this compact, all rights, privileges, and
11 benefits conferred by this compact or by agreements made under the compact are
12 suspended from the effective date of the default, as fixed by the commission. The
13 commission shall stipulate the conditions and maximum time for compliance under
14 which the defaulting state may resume its regular status. Unless the default is
15 remedied under the stipulations and within the time period set by the commission,
16 the compact may be terminated with respect to the defaulting state by affirmative
17 vote of a majority of the other member states. A defaulting state may be reinstated
18 by performing all acts and obligations required by the commission.

19 Article VIII. Severability and Construction

20 The provisions of this compact are severable, and if any phrase, clause, sentence, or
21 provision of this compact is declared to be contrary to the constitution of any compacting state
22 or of the United States or its applicability to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
23 validity of the remainder of the compact and its applicability to any person or circumstance may
24 not be affected. If the compact is found to be contrary to the constitution of any compacting
25 state, the compact remains in full force and effect as to the remaining states and in full force
26 and effect as to the state affected as to all severable matters. The provisions of the compact
27 must be liberally construed to effectuate the purpose of the compact.

28 **Midwestern higher education commission - Terms - Vacancies.**

- 29 1. The members of the midwestern higher education commission representing this
30 state are:
- 31 a. The governor or the governor's designee.

- 1 b. One member of the senate and one member of the house of representatives,
2 appointed by the chairman of the legislative council.
- 3 c. Two at large members, one of whom must be knowledgeable about the field
4 of higher education, appointed by the governor.
- 5 2. The term of each legislative appointee is two years. One initial at large member
6 must be appointed for a term of two years and the other for a term of four years.
7 Thereafter, the term of each at large member is four years.
- 8 3. If a member vacates the position to which the member was appointed, the position
9 must be filled for the remainder of the unexpired term in the same manner as that
10 position was filled initially.

11 **SECTION 23. LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL STUDY - TRIBAL COLLEGES.** The
12 legislative council shall consider studying the tribally controlled colleges in this state and the
13 United Tribes technical college, including a review of funding sources and the number of Indian
14 and non-Indian students attending each college, for the purpose of determining the desirability
15 and feasibility of a grant program to assist the colleges in providing education to students who
16 are less than one-quarter Indian. The legislative council shall report its findings and
17 recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to
18 the fifty-seventh legislative assembly.

19 **SECTION 24. EMERGENCY.** The capital improvements line items contained in
20 subdivisions 2 through 14 of section 1 of this Act are declared to be emergency measures, and
21 those funds are available immediately upon filing of this Act with the secretary of state.
22 Sections 9 and 10 of this Act are declared to be emergency measures.
