LEGISLATIVE COMPENSATION COMMISSION

Tuesday, July 25, 2006

Mr. Charles Axtman, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Legislative Council staff reviewed North Dakota Century Code (NDCC) Sections 54-03-19.1 and 54-03-19.2. Section 54-03-19.1 provides that the Legislative Compensation Commission shall:

- Consist of five members appointed by the Governor with no more than three members representing the same political party.
- Develop recommendations for a long-term policy on legislative compensation, expense allowance, and insurance benefits.
- Recommend appropriate levels of legislative compensation, expense allowance, and insurance benefits.

North Dakota Century Code Section 54-03-19.2 provides that the Legislative Compensation

Commission must meet at least once each biennium to determine levels of legislative compensation, expense allowance, and insurance benefits which permit citizens to hold legislative office without undue financial sacrifice or disadvantage. The commission may consult with the leadership of the Legislative Assembly and review compensation, expense allowance, and insurance benefits for legislative service in other states and in other areas. The commission is to report its findings and recommendations regarding legislative compensation to the Legislative Assembly, and the commission may file with the Legislative Council a bill incorporating its recommendations.

The Legislative Council staff presented a memorandum entitled [Legislative Compensation and Expense Reimbursement - Background Memorandum](#) regarding the history of the Legislative Compensation Commission and legislative compensation and expense reimbursement rates in North Dakota. The following schedule summarizes increases in legislative compensation and expense reimbursement rates from 1889 to 2005:

¹Section 54-03-20 was amended in 1959 to provide that the \$1,200 payment was reimbursement for expenses incurred during the interim and during the session.

²Section 54-03-20 was amended in 1965 to provide that the \$1,200 payment was reimbursement for expenses incurred during the session only and to provide for payments of \$35 per month during each legislator's term of office for uncompensated expenses.

³Bismarck legislators received \$90 per day during session as compensation and did not receive any amount for daily expense reimbursement.

⁴Section 54-03-20 was amended to provide that legislators receive reimbursement for lodging or mileage at the rates provided for state employees, to a maximum of \$600 per month.
⁵House Bill No. 1243 (1985) amended Section 54-03-20 to provide that the monthly amount paid to legislators during the interim was compensation, not reimbursement for expenses.
⁶The 2005 Legislative Assembly increased the maximum lodging expense reimbursement allowed during legislative sessions from \$650 to \$900 per month, effective January 1, 2005, and increased legislators' monthly compensation from \$250 to \$350, effective July 1, 2005.
⁷In addition to the compensation for each day attending interim meetings, legislators are entitled to receive up to \$25 per day for expense reimbursement for meals.

The Legislative Council staff said the 2005 Legislative Assembly increased legislators' monthly compensation from \$250 to \$350, effective July 1, 2005, and increased the maximum lodging expense reimbursement allowed during legislative sessions

from \$650 to \$900 per month, effective January 1, 2005.

The following schedule, also included in the background memorandum, summarizes the current compensation and expense reimbursement rates provided to members of the Legislative Assembly:

In response to a question from Commissioner Mahoney, the Legislative Council staff said legislators are entitled to receive up to \$25 per day for expense reimbursement for meals in addition to the

compensation for each day attending interim meetings. The Legislative Council staff said the expense reimbursement for meals was increased by

the 2005 Legislative Assembly from \$20 to \$25 per day.

In response to a question from Commissioner Kinnoin, the Legislative Council staff said legislators are not required to submit receipts to receive the \$25 per day expense reimbursement for meals.

The Legislative Council staff presented a memorandum entitled [Legislative Compensation](#)

The Legislative Council staff presented a memorandum entitled *Legislative Compensation and Reimbursement Survey Results*. The Legislative Council staff conducted a survey of members of the Legislative Assembly regarding legislative

compensation and reimbursement issues. The following is a summary of the legislative compensation and reimbursement issues the members of the Legislative Assembly were asked to respond to and the responses of 54 members.

In response to a question from Commissioner Mahoney, the legislative budget analyst and auditor said the suggestions relating to reimbursement for

high-speed wireless Internet access and replacement of legislators' computers are not responsibilities of the Legislative Compensation Commission.

The Legislative Council staff presented a memorandum entitled *Legislative Compensation Levels in Other States*. The information presented includes legislative compensation, expense reimbursement, and other benefits provided to legislators in each of the 50 states as prepared by the National Conference of State Legislatures.

COMMISSION DISCUSSION AND STAFF DIRECTIVES

In response to a question from Commissioner Wanzek, Chairman Axtman said 129 of the 141 legislators have elected to receive health insurance benefits from the state.

Chairman Axtman said the 2005 Legislative Assembly increased:

- Legislators' monthly compensation from \$250 to \$350, effective July 1, 2005.
- The maximum lodging expense reimbursement allowed during legislative sessions from \$650 to \$900 per month, effective January 1, 2005.
- The state mileage reimbursement rate from 31 cents to 37.5 cents per mile.

Chairman Axtman said the current compensation for regular, special, or organizational sessions is \$125 per calendar day. He said the compensation was last increased in 2001 from \$111 to \$125 per day. He said a 3 percent increase would be an increase of \$4 per day, a 4 percent increase would be an increase of \$5 per day, and a 5 percent increase would be an increase of \$6 per day.

In response to a question from Commissioner Wanzek, the legislative budget analyst and auditor said the estimated cost of a \$5 or \$10 increase in the compensation for regular, special, or organizational sessions is approximately \$88,000 or \$176,000, respectively.

Commissioner Wanzek said it is difficult to consider increases in the legislative compensation levels because he is running for the Senate.

Chairman Axtman said the commission needs to consider the members of the Legislative Assembly and not just perceptions among voters.

Commissioner Mahoney said it is also difficult for him to consider increases in legislative compensation because he is also running for the Senate. He said legislative compensation needs to be a level that allows all individuals to run for the positions. He said the health insurance benefit provided by the state is a large benefit to members of the Legislative Assembly. He said a modest increase of 4 percent for compensation for regular, special, or organizational sessions would not be out of line.

It was moved by Commissioner Kinnoin, seconded by Commissioner Christopherson, and carried on a roll call vote that the Legislative Compensation Commission recommend a 4 percent, or \$5 per day, increase in compensation for regular, special, or organizational sessions, from \$125 to \$130 per day. Commissioners Axtman,

Christopherson, Kinnoin, Mahoney, and Wanzek voted "aye." No negative votes were cast.

Chairman Axtman said the current state mileage expense reimbursement for regular, special, or organizational sessions and interim meetings is 37.5 cents per mile. He said the rate was last increased in 2005 from 31 cents to 37.5 cents per mile.

In response to questions from Commissioner Wanzek, the legislative budget analyst and auditor said any change in the state mileage reimbursement would affect state agencies; however, state employees are encouraged to use the Department of Transportation Fleet Services vehicles rather than receive reimbursement for using their own vehicles. He said the estimated biennial impact for the legislative branch of increasing the state mileage reimbursement rate by 7 cents, from 37.5 cents to 44.5 cents per mile, is approximately \$116,600.

In response to a question from Commissioner Axtman, the legislative budget analyst and auditor said the estimated biennial impact for the legislative branch of increasing the state mileage reimbursement rate by 5 cents, from 37.5 cents to 42.5 cents per mile, is approximately \$83,000.

In response to questions from Commissioner Wanzek, the legislative budget analyst and auditor said the Governor's executive budget could include a recommendation for an increase in the state mileage reimbursement rate. He said the Constitution of North Dakota provides that legislators must be reimbursed at the same rate for meals, lodging, and mileage as other state employees.

In response to a question from Commissioner Kinnoin, the legislative budget analyst and auditor said the legislative branch has used technology on occasion to hold interim meetings; however, most members of interim committees prefer to meet face to face.

It was moved by Commissioner Mahoney, seconded by Commissioner Christopherson, and carried on a roll call vote that the Legislative Compensation Commission recommend a 5-cent increase in the state mileage reimbursement rate, from 37.5 cents to 42.5 cents per mile. Commissioners Axtman, Christopherson, Kinnoin, Mahoney, and Wanzek voted "aye." No negative votes were cast.

The commission discussed other legislative compensation and reimbursement levels, including compensation during term of office, compensation for interim meetings, additional compensation for committee chairmen and majority and minority leaders, and lodging expense reimbursement and recommended no changes for those areas of compensation and expense reimbursement.

Chairman Axtman requested the staff of the Legislative Council prepare a report and bill drafts incorporating the commission's recommendations and submit the report and the recommended bill drafts to the 2007 Legislative Assembly.

The meeting was adjourned sine die at 11:04 a.m.
