**Full Time Equivalent Positions** 






#### HAWKS ARE UP!

- Total HEADCOUNT enrollment of 1,441 students.
  - This is an increase of 91 students, up from 1,350 students in fall
     2019, representing a 6.7% GROWTH in headcount.
  - This is the highest increase in the NDUS system.
- The FULL-TIME EQUIVALENCY of credit hours taken INCREASED 4.9%, from 1,093.45 to 1,147.13.
- The number of students choosing to live ON-CAMPUS INCREASED 9.3% over last year, from 214 to 234. Selke Hall was reopened to meet the demand for additional housing.
- HIGHEST HEAD-COUNT ENROLLMENT since 2014.

Fall Enrollment (FTE)









## **DICKINSON SPORTS COMPLEX**


- Dickinson State University land

## **THEODORE ROOSEVELT DIGITAL LIBRARY**

- Typical presidential library
  - Museum/Physical Space (Medora)
  - Archive/Documents (Dickinson State)
- TR Center is gathering TR's papers "virtually" – equivalent of a presidential library archive
- Documents (film, audio, letters, diaries, scrapbooks, speeches, essays, photographs)of presidents before 1930 are scattered in libraries, archives, and private collections
- Innovative approach to digitization

## **PULVER HALL**


- Work on the Pulver Hall project continues to go well and remains on schedule.
- 5th and 6th floors: Residential space for TRHLP scholars and other DSU students
- 4th floor: Additional office space and living for visiting scholars
- 3rd floor: Multi-media studio and classrooms for instruction
- 2nd floor: TR Center staff offices
- 1st floor: TR Center museum and resource center for the public and scholars to enjoy







### **TOTAL REVENUE (excluding capital)** *Fiscal Year 2018*





## FUNDING REQUESTS 2021-23 Biennium

- DICKINSON SPORTS COMPLEX: \$1 MILLION
  - Construction of new softball stadium and soccer fields in conjunction with Dickinson Public Schools, City of Dickinson, and Dickinson Parks and Recreation
  - Total Project Cost Estimate of \$7 million
- THEODORE ROOSEVELT CENTER/DIGITIZATION: \$1.5 MILLION
  - **Operation of TRC and continued digitization of TR documents**
- PULVER HALL RENOVATION PROJECT: \$2 MILLION
  - Purchase of furnishing and exhibits for Pulver Hall. Building renovation project scheduled for completion June 2021
- CTE CENTER (WITH LOCAL PUBLIC SCHOOLS): \$15 MILLION MATCH
  - Dual Mission for DSU: Workforce training in western ND
  - Investment by Dickinson Public Schools
  - Partnerships with other western ND schools
