### FIRST ENGROSSMENT

#### **ENGROSSED HOUSE BILL NO. 1003**

1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the North Dakota 2 university system; to provide an appropriation to the Bank of North Dakota; to create and enact 3 five a new section to chapter 6-09, four new sections to chapter 15-10, section 15-10-48.2, and 4 section 15-18.2-06.1 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to an economic diversification 5 research fund, matching grants for agricultural research and extension, the Bismarck state 6 college polytechnic center, a report on higher education trends, funding of severance-7 agreements, academic program approval, disclosure of financial condition, and a minimum 8 amount payable; to amend and reenact sections 15-10-38.1, 15-10-38.2, 15-10-38.3, 9 subdivision c of subsection 1 of section 15-10-48, subdivision c of subsection 1 of section 10 15-10-49, subsection 2 of section 15-10-49, sections 15-10-57 and 15-10-63, subdivision k of 11 subsection 1 of section 15-18.2-02, subsection 1 of section 15-18.2-05, section 15-54.1-02, 12 subsection 1 of section 15-62.4-03, subdivision c of subsection 2 of section 54-07-12, and 13 section 54-44.1-11 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the skilled workforce student 14 loan repayment program, the skilled workforce scholarship program, matching grants for the 15 advancement of academics, the workforce development council, higher education capital 16 projects, state aid for institutions of higher education, the university system capital building fund, 17 student financial assistance grants, the digitization of documents relating to Theodore 18 Roosevelt, and the cancellation of unexpended appropriations; to repeal sections 15-10-48.1-19 15-10-53, and 15-10-58 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to matching grants for legal 20 education, the definition of the advancement of academics, and the workforce education 21 advisory council; to provide for a transfer; to provide for a pilot program legislative management 22 study; to provide loan authorization for the Mayville state university old main project; to provide 23 for a report; to provide an exemption; to provide legislative intent; and to declare an emergency.

#### 24 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

1	SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds
2	as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state
3	treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and
4	other income, to the state board of higher education and to the entities and institutions under
5	the supervision of the board for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the state board of
6	higher education and the entities and institutions under the control of the board, for the
7	biennium beginning July 1, 2023 period beginning with the effective date of this Act, and ending
8	June 30, 2025, as follows:
