### FIRST ENGROSSMENT with Senate Amendments ENGROSSED HOUSE BILL NO. 1003

1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the North Dakota 2 university system; to provide an appropriation to the Bank of North Dakota; to create and enact 3 a new section to chapter 6-09, three new sections to chapter 15-10, section 15-10-48.2, and 4 section 15-18.2-06.1 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to an economic diversification 5 research fund, matching grants for agricultural research and extension, a report on higher 6 education trends, disclosure of financial condition, and a minimum amount payable; to amend 7 and reenact sections 15-10-38.1, 15-10-38.2, 15-10-38.3, subdivision c of subsection 1 of 8 section 15-10-48, subdivision c of subsection 1 of section 15-10-49, subsection 2 of section 9 15-10-49, sections 15-10-57 and 15-10-63, subdivision k of subsection 1 of section 15-18.2-02, 10 subsection 1 of section 15-18.2-05, section 15-54.1-02, subsection 1 of section 15-62.4-03, 11 subdivision c of subsection 2 of section 54-07-12, and section 54-44.1-11 of the North Dakota 12 Century Code, relating to the skilled workforce student loan repayment program, the skilled 13 workforce scholarship program, matching grants for the advancement of academics, the 14 workforce development council, higher education capital projects, state aid for institutions of 15 higher education, the university system capital building fund, student financial assistance 16 grants, the digitization of documents relating to Theodore Roosevelt, and the cancellation of 17 unexpended appropriations; to repeal sections 15-10-48.1 and 15-10-58 of the North Dakota 18 Century Code, relating to matching grants for legal education, the definition of the advancement 19 of academics, and the workforce education advisory council; to provide for a transfer; to provide 20 for a legislative management study; to provide for a report; to provide an exemption; to provide 21 legislative intent; and to declare an emergency.

#### 22 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds
 as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state

The 2023-25 one-time funding amounts are not a part of the entity's base budget for the 2025-27 biennium. The state board of higher education shall report to the appropriations committees of the sixty-ninth legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025.

14 SECTION 3. ADDITIONAL FEDERAL, PRIVATE, AND OTHER FUNDS -

15 **APPROPRIATION - EXEMPTION.** All funds, in addition to those appropriated in section 1 of 16 this Act, from federal, private, and other sources for competitive grants or other funds that the 17 legislative assembly has not indicated the intent to reject, including tuition revenue, received by 18 the state board of higher education and the institutions and entities under the control of the 19 state board of higher education, are appropriated to the board and those institutions and 20 entities, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025. All additional funds 21 received under the North Dakota-Minnesota reciprocity agreement during the biennium 22 beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025, are appropriated to the state board of higher 23 education for reimbursement to institutions under the control of the board. Notwithstanding 24 section 48-01.2-25, an institution receiving funds for capital projects in excess of the amounts 25 appropriated in sections 1 and 4 of this Act may spend those funds for the capital project. 26 SECTION 4. USE OF EXTRAORDINARY REPAIRS FUNDING - MATCHING FUNDS. The 27 capital assets line items in subdivisions 2 through 12 of section 1 of this Act include funding 28 from the general fund for institution extraordinary repairs. An institution, excluding the university 29 of North Dakota and North Dakota state university, shall provide one dollar of matching funds 30 from operations or other sources for each one dollar of extraordinary repairs funding used for a 31 project. The university of North Dakota and North Dakota state university shall provide two

- 1 dollars of matching funds from operations or other sources for each one dollar of extraordinary
- 2 repairs funding used for a project.

## 15 SECTION 6. TRANSFER - NORTH DAKOTA UNIVERSITY SYSTEM OFFICE - NORTH

16 **DAKOTA STATE UNIVERSITY.** Of the funding appropriated in subdivision 1 of section 1 of

17 chapter 31 of the 2021 Session Laws for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending

18 June 30, 2023, that is continued pursuant to section 54-44.1-11, and any funds in the severance

19 agreements line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, the state board of higher education

shall transfer \$367,000 to the operations line item in subdivision 6 of section 1 of this Act by

21 August 1, 2023. The North Dakota university system office may not assess institutions under

22 the control of the state board of higher education to recover the cost of this transfer.

# 23 SECTION 7. TRANSFER - BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA PROFITS - STATE BOARD OF

24 HIGHER EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIPS. The industrial commission shall transfer to the North

25 Dakota university system office a total of \$1,500,000 from the current earnings and

- 26 accumulated undivided profits of the Bank of North Dakota during the biennium beginning
- 27 July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025, as requested by the commissioner of higher education.
- 28 The estimated income line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 includes \$1,500,000 for the North
- 29 Dakota university system office for dual-credit tuition scholarships.

# 30 SECTION 8. TRANSFER - BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA PROFITS - SKILLED

31 WORKFORCE STUDENT LOAN REPAYMENT PROGRAM FUND. The industrial commission

1 shall transfer the sum of \$3,400,000 from the current earnings and accumulated undivided 2 profits of the Bank of North Dakota to the skilled workforce student loan repayment program 3 fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025. 4 SECTION 9. TRANSFER - BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA PROFITS - SKILLED 5 WORKFORCE SCHOLARSHIP FUND. The industrial commission shall transfer the sum of 6 \$3,400,000 from the current earnings and accumulated undivided profits of the Bank of North 7 Dakota to the skilled workforce scholarship fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, 8 and ending June 30, 2025. 9 SECTION 10. APPROPRIATION - BANK OF NORTH DAKOTA - TRANSFER -10 STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS FUND - ECONOMIC DIVERSIFICATION 11 **RESEARCH FUND.** The office of management and budget shall transfer \$10,000,000 from the 12 strategic investment and improvements fund to the economic diversification research fund, the 13 sum of which is appropriated to the Bank of North Dakota for the purpose of providing grants to 14 institutions under the control of the state board of higher eduction, for the biennium beginning 15 July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2025, as requested by the commissioner of higher education. 16 SECTION 11. TRANSFER - STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS FUND -17 **UNIVERSITY SYSTEM CAPITAL BUILDING FUND.** The office of management and budget 18 shall transfer \$29,000,000 from the strategic investment and improvements fund to the 19 university system capital building fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, and ending 20 June 30, 2025, as requested by the commissioner of higher education. CAMPUS CAPITAL PROJECTS - PROJECT REQUESTS - LEGISLATIVE 21 INTENT. 22 An institution must have possession of local matching funds allocated to a project prior 1. 23 to expending any funding from the strategic investment and improvements fund for the

- 24 project.
