1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new subdivision to subsection 1 of section 27-20.2-21  
2 and section 27-20.4-05.1 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to inspection of court files  
3 and records, and delinquency referrals to juvenile court; and to amend and reenact sections  
4 14-10-06, 27-20.1-04, and 27-20.1-07, subsection 1 of section 27-20.1-09, section 27-20.2-01,  
5 subsection 1 of section 27-20.2-03, section 27-20.2-05, subsection 3 of section 27-20.2-09,  
6 section 27-20.2-12, subsection 5 of section 27-20.2-15, sections 27-20.3-01, 27-20.3-03,  
7 27-20.3-04, and 27-20.3-05, subsections 1 and 3 of section 27-20.3-06, subsection 3 of section  
8 27-20.3-08, section 27-20.3-09, subsection 1 of section 27-20.3-10, subsection 1 of section  
9 27-20.3-15, subsection 4 of section 27-20.3-16, subsection 5 of section 27-20.3-19, sections  
10 27-20.3-21, 27-20.3-26, 27-20.4-01, 27-20.4-03, 27-20.4-04, 27-20.4-05, 27-20.4-06,  
11 27-20.4-08, 27-20.4-09, and 27-20.4-10, subsection 5 of section 27-20.4-11, sections  
12 27-20.4-14, 27-20.4-17, 27-20.4-18, and 27-20.4-25, subsection 1 of section 27-20.4-26, and  
13 section 27-20.4-27 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to juvenile court procedures.

14 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:**

15 **SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.** Section 14-10-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is  
16 amended and reenacted as follows:

17 **14-10-06. Unlawful to encourage or contribute to the deprivation or delinquency of**  
18 **minor or the conditions of a child in need of protection - Penalty.**

- 19 1. Any individual who by any act willfully encourages, causes, or contributes to the  
20 delinquency of a minor or ~~deprivation of any minor~~ the condition of a child in need of  
21 protection as defined in section 27-20.2-01 is guilty of a class A misdemeanor.  
22 2. Any individual who by any act willfully encourages, causes, or contributes to the  
23 ~~deprivation~~ conditions of a child in need of protection of a child less than sixteen years  
24 of age by causing that child to engage in sexual conduct as defined under section

1           12.1-27.2-01, in any play, motion picture, photograph, dance, or other visual  
2           representation is guilty of a class C felony.

3           3. If an individual is convicted of this section for encouraging, causing, or contributing to  
4           the consumption or possession of alcoholic beverages by a minor, the court shall  
5           consider the following in mitigation:

6           a. After consuming the alcohol, the underage individual was in need of medical  
7           assistance as a result of consuming alcohol; and

8           b. Within twelve hours after the underage individual consumed the alcohol, the  
9           defendant contacted law enforcement or emergency medical personnel to report  
10          that the underage individual was in need of medical assistance as a result of  
11          consuming alcohol.

12          **SECTION 2. AMENDMENT.** Section 27-20.1-04 of the North Dakota Century Code is  
13          amended and reenacted as follows:

14          **27-20.1-04. Venue.**

15          Except as otherwise provided by this section, a proceeding under this chapter must be  
16          commenced in the county in which the child resides. If ~~deprivation~~ a child in need of protection is  
17          alleged, the proceeding may be brought in the county in which the child is present when it is  
18          commenced, the county in which the child has resided for the majority of the thirty days ~~prior~~  
19          ~~to~~ before the date of the alleged ~~deprivation~~ child in need of protection, or the county where the  
20          alleged ~~deprivation~~ has conditions of the child in need of protection have occurred. The court  
21          shall determine the appropriate venue ~~for a deprivation~~ when the conditions of a child in need of  
22          protection action is based on the best interest of the child.

23          **SECTION 3. AMENDMENT.** Section 27-20.1-07 of the North Dakota Century Code is  
24          amended and reenacted as follows:

25          **27-20.1-07. Procedure upon filing of petition.**

26          1. A supporting affidavit establishing the basis for the guardianship under subdivision n of  
27          subsection 2 of section 27-20.1-06, and that the guardianship is in the best interest of  
28          the child, must be filed with the petition. Where ~~deprivation~~ a child in need of protection  
29          is alleged under paragraph 4 of subdivision n of subsection 2 of section 27-20.1-06,  
30          the petition must contain sufficient statements to establish ~~deprivation~~ a child in need of

1           protection unless the child has resided in the home of the proposed guardian for at  
2           least one year before the filing date of the petition.

3           2. A petition under this chapter must be reviewed by the court to determine whether the  
4           contents of the petition comply with section 27-20.1-06.

5           3. If a petition alleges deprivationa child in need of protection, the petition will be  
6           reviewed by the court to determine whether there has been a sufficient showing of  
7           deprivationa child in need of protection.

8           4. If the petitioner has made an insufficient showing of deprivationa child in need of  
9           protection, the court, without oral argument or an evidentiary hearing shall issue an  
10          order denying the petition. If the petitioner has made a sufficient showing of  
11          deprivationa child in need of protection justifying a guardianship, the court shall set a  
12          date for an evidentiary hearing.

13          **SECTION 4. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 1 of section 27-20.1-09 of the North Dakota  
14          Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

15          1. If, at any time in the proceeding, the court determines the interests of the child are or  
16          may be inadequately represented and the child is of sufficient age and competency to  
17          assist counsel, the court may appoint an attorney to represent the child.

18          **SECTION 5. AMENDMENT.** Section 27-20.2-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is  
19          amended and reenacted as follows:

20          **27-20.2-01. Definitions.**

21          As used in this chapter, unless the context requires otherwise:

22          1. "Abandon" means:

23           a. As to a parent of a child not in the custody of that parent, failure by the  
24           noncustodial parent significantly without justifiable cause:

25           (1) To communicate with the child; or

26           (2) To provide for the care and support of the child as required by law; or

27           b. As to a parent of a child in that parent's custody:

28           (1) To leave the child for an indefinite period without making firm and agreed  
29           plans, with the child's immediate caregiver, for the parent's resumption of  
30           physical custody;

1                   (2) Following the child's birth or treatment at a hospital, to fail to arrange for the  
2                   child's discharge within ten days after the child no longer requires hospital  
3                   care; or

4                   (3) Willfully fail to furnish food, shelter, clothing, or medical attention reasonably  
5                   sufficient to meet the child's needs.

6           2. "Abandoned infant" means a child who has been abandoned before reaching the age  
7           of one year.

8           3. "Certified shelter care" means a nonsecure permanent dwelling operated by an  
9           agency certified by the department of health and human services, where employees  
10           offer safe shelter, food, and a structured routine, and which is available twenty-four  
11           hours a day to a resident in need of emergency placement, not to exceed seven days,  
12           unless otherwise approved by the department.

13           4. "Child" means an individual who is:

14           a. Under the age of eighteen years and is not married; or

15           b. Under the age of twenty years with respect to a delinquent act committed while  
16           under the age of eighteen years and not married.

17           4.5. "Child in need of protection" means a child who:

18           a. Is without proper parental care or control, subsistence, education as required by  
19           law, or other care or control necessary for the child's physical, mental, or  
20           emotional health, or morals, and the need for services or protection is not due  
21           primarily to the lack of financial means of the child's parents, guardian, or other  
22           custodian;

23           b. Has been placed for care or adoption in violation of law;

24           c. Has been abandoned by the child's parents, guardian, or other custodian;

25           d. Is without proper parental care, control, or education as required by law, or other  
26           care and control necessary for the child's well-being because of the physical,  
27           mental, emotional, or other illness or disability of the child's parent or parents,  
28           and that such lack of care is not due to a willful act of commission or act of  
29           omission by the child's parents, and care is requested by a parent;

30           e. Is in need of treatment and whose parents, guardian, or other custodian have  
31           refused to participate in treatment as ordered by the juvenile court;

- 1 f. Was subject to prenatal exposure to chronic or severe use of alcohol or any  
2 controlled substance as defined in chapter 19-03.1 in a manner not lawfully  
3 prescribed by a practitioner;
- 4 g. Is present in an environment subjecting the child to exposure to a controlled  
5 substance, chemical substance, or drug paraphernalia as prohibited by section  
6 19-03.1-22.2; or
- 7 h. Is a victim of human trafficking as defined in title 12.1.
- 8 ~~5-6.~~ "Child in need of services" means a child who in any of the foregoing instances is in  
9 need of treatment or rehabilitation:
- 10 a. Is habitually and without justification truant from school subject to compulsory  
11 school attendance and is absent from school without an authorized excuse more  
12 than three days during a school year;
- 13 b. Is habitually disobedient of the reasonable and lawful commands of the child's  
14 parent, guardian, or other custodian, including running away, and is ungovernable  
15 or who is willfully in a situation dangerous or injurious to the health, safety, or  
16 morals of the child or others;
- 17 c. Has committed an offense applicable only to a child, except for an offense  
18 committed by a minor fourteen years of age or older under subsection 2 of  
19 section 12.1-31-03 or an equivalent local ordinance or resolution; or
- 20 d. Is under the age of fourteen years and has purchased, possessed, smoked, or  
21 used tobacco, a tobacco-related product, an electronic smoking device, or an  
22 alternative nicotine product in violation of subsection 2 of section 12.1-31-03. As  
23 used in this subdivision, "electronic smoking device" and "alternative nicotine  
24 product" have the same meaning as in section 12.1-31-03; and
- 25 e. In any of the foregoing instances is in need of treatment or rehabilitation.
- 26 ~~6-7.~~ "Custodian" means a person, other than a parent or legal guardian, which stands in  
27 loco parentis to the child and a person that has been given legal custody of the child  
28 by order of a court.
- 29 ~~7-8.~~ "Delinquent act" means an act designated a crime under the law, including local  
30 ordinances or resolutions of this state, or of another state if the act occurred in that  
31 state, or under federal law.

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- 1     ~~8-9.~~ "Delinquent child" means a child who has committed a delinquent act and is in need of  
2           treatment or rehabilitation or is a child subject to proceedings arising under the  
3           interstate compact on juveniles.
- 4     ~~9-10.~~ "Director" means the director of juvenile court or the director's designee.
- 5     ~~10-11.~~ "Diversion" means an intervention strategy that redirects a child away from formal  
6           processing in the juvenile justice system, while still holding the child accountable for  
7           that child's actions.
- 8     ~~11-12.~~ "Facility" means buildings, structures, or systems, including those for essential  
9           administration and support, which are used to provide residential treatment for  
10          children.
- 11    ~~12-13.~~ "Host county" means the county within the human service zone in which the human  
12          service zone administrative office is located and in which the human service zone  
13          team members are employed.
- 14    ~~13-14.~~ "Human service zone" means a county or consolidated group of counties  
15          administering human services within a designated area in accordance with an  
16          agreement or plan approved by the department of health and human services.
- 17    ~~14-15.~~ "Juvenile court" means the district court of this state.
- 18    ~~15-16.~~ "Juvenile drug court" means a program established by the supreme court which is a  
19          post-petition or post-adjudication program aimed at intervening in substance use  
20          disorders through intense supervision and participation in recovery services.
- 21    ~~16-17.~~ "Proceeding" means any hearing conducted before a juvenile court or a referral for  
22          service.
- 23    ~~17-18.~~ "Qualified residential treatment program" means a licensed or approved residence  
24          providing an out-of-home treatment placement for children, including a  
25          trauma-informed model.
- 26    ~~18-19.~~ "Relative" or "kinship relative" means:
- 27          a. The child's grandparent, great-grandparent, sibling, half-sibling, aunt, great-aunt,  
28             uncle, great-uncle, nephew, niece, or first cousin;
- 29          b. An individual with a relationship to the child, derived through a current or former  
30             spouse of the child's parent, similar to a relationship described in subdivision a;

1 c. An individual recognized in the child's community as having a relationship with  
2 the child similar to a relationship described in subdivision a; or

3 d. The child's stepparent.

4 ~~19-20.~~ "Restorative justice" means a system of justice which focuses on the rehabilitation of  
5 offenders through reconciliation with victims and the community at large.

6 ~~20-21.~~ "Shelter care" means temporary care ~~of a child in physically unrestricted~~  
7 facilities during which a child needs a safe bed outside the home, in a shelter care site  
8 or certified shelter care site managed by an agency or licensed foster care facility.

9 ~~21-22.~~ "The court" means the district courts as designated by the North Dakota supreme  
10 court which includes juvenile court as a subset of district court.

11 ~~22-23.~~ "Willfully" has the meaning provided in section 12.1-02-02.

12 **SECTION 6. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 1 of section 27-20.2-03 of the North Dakota  
13 Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

14 1. The juvenile court has exclusive original jurisdiction of the following proceedings,  
15 which are governed by this chapter:

16 a. Proceedings in which a child is alleged to be delinquent, ~~a child in need of~~  
17 ~~services~~, or a child in need of ~~services~~ or protection under this chapter or  
18 ~~chapter~~ chapters 27-20.3 and 27-20.4;

19 b. Proceedings for the termination of parental rights except if a part of an adoption  
20 proceeding ~~under chapter 27-20.3;~~

21 c. Proceedings arising under section 27-20.3-16;

22 d. Civil forfeiture proceedings arising under chapter 19-03.1 or section 29-31.1-04  
23 for which a child is alleged to have possessed forfeitable property. The juvenile  
24 court shall conduct the proceedings in accordance with the procedures provided  
25 for under sections 19-03.1-36 through 19-03.1-37; and

26 e. Proceedings for the guardianship of a child under chapter 27-20.1, except the  
27 testamentary appointment of a guardian for a minor governed by chapter  
28 30.1-27.

29 **SECTION 7. AMENDMENT.** Section 27-20.2-05 of the North Dakota Century Code is  
30 amended and reenacted as follows:

1       **27-20.2-05. Powers and duties of the director of juvenile court.**

2       1. For the purpose of carrying out the objectives and purposes of this chapter and  
3       subject to the limitations of this chapter or imposed by the court, a director shall:

4       a. Make investigations, reports, and recommendations to the juvenile court.

5       b. Receive and examine referrals and charges of delinquency, ~~a child in need of~~  
6       ~~services~~, or a child in need of protection for the purpose of considering the  
7       commencement of proceedings under this chapter.

8       c. Make a determination upon intake of referrals regarding the appropriate manner  
9       to handle delinquent conduct, ~~or a child in need of services~~ or a child in need of  
10      protection by use of nonjudicial adjustments or formal court processes.

11      d. Supervise and assist a child placed on probation for delinquency ~~or a child in~~  
12      ~~need of services~~, or both.

13      e. Make appropriate referrals to other private or public agencies of the community if  
14      assistance of the agencies appears to be needed or desirable.

15      f. Issue a temporary custody order concerning a child who is referred to the  
16      director's supervision or care as a delinquent or a child in need of ~~services or~~  
17      protection. Except as provided by this chapter, a director does not have the  
18      powers of a law enforcement officer.

19      g. Take acknowledgments of instruments for the purpose of this chapter.

20      h. Make such temporary order not to exceed ninety-six hours for the custody and  
21      control of a child alleged to be in need of ~~services or~~ protection as may be  
22      deemed appropriate. The order must be reduced to writing within twenty-four  
23      hours, excluding holidays and weekends.

24      i. Perform all other functions designated by this chapter or under section 27-05-30  
25      or by order of the court pursuant to such law, including, if qualified, the order of a  
26      referee.

27      j. Issue an order to a law enforcement authority to transport a child to and from a  
28      specified location.

29      k. Receive and examine requests for review of a child's placement at a qualified  
30      residential treatment program under the federal Family First Prevention Services  
31      Act [Pub. L. 115-123; 132 Stat. 64; 42 U.S.C. 675].



1           I.    Receive and examine petitions to establish, modify, or terminate a guardianship  
2                   of a minor under chapter 27-20.1.

3           2.    Any of the foregoing functions may be performed in another state if authorized by the  
4                   court of this state and permitted by the laws of the other state.

5           **SECTION 8. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 3 of section 27-20.2-09 of the North Dakota  
6 Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

7           3.    The giving of information and advice and any conditions imposed for the conduct and  
8                   control of the child may not extend beyond six months from the day commenced  
9                   unless extended by the court for an additional period not to exceed six months and  
10                  does not authorize the detention of the child if not otherwise permitted by this chapter.  
11                  ~~If the child admits to driving or being in actual physical control of a vehicle in violation~~  
12                  ~~of section 39-08-01 or an equivalent ordinance, the child may be required to pay a fine~~  
13                  ~~as a condition imposed under this section.~~For a driving-related offense, the conditions  
14                  may include a restriction on the child's driving privileges as authorized under section  
15                  27-20.4-19.

16           **SECTION 9. AMENDMENT.** Section 27-20.2-12 of the North Dakota Century Code is  
17 amended and reenacted as follows:

18           **27-20.2-12. Right to counsel.**

19           1.    Except as provided in section 27-20.1-09, a child alleged to be within the jurisdiction of  
20                   the court in an action arising under chapters 27-20.1, 27-20.2, 27-20.3, and 27-20.4  
21                   has the right to be represented by counsel in all proceedings in which a petition has  
22                   been filed. Counsel for the child must be appointed, regardless of income, unless  
23                   counsel is retained for the juvenile, in any proceeding in which the juvenile is alleged  
24                   to be:

25           a.    Delinquent; or

26           b.    ~~A child in need of services; or~~

27           e.    A child in need of protection if the child is of sufficient age and competency to  
28                   assist counsel.

29           2.    A child may waive the right to counsel in a juvenile delinquency proceeding if the child,  
30                   who is fourteen years of age or older and the court has determined the waiver is  
31                   knowing, voluntary, and intelligent. The waiver must be made on the record. If a child

1 waives counsel for a hearing, the child must be informed of the right to revoke the  
2 waiver and request counsel at all subsequent hearings.

3 3. The court ~~shall~~may require payment for reimbursement of counsel appointed pursuant  
4 to this section from a person that has legal care, custody, or control of the child. The  
5 court must include ~~this~~a finding regarding reimbursement in the findings of fact and  
6 order for disposition.

7 4. A child's parent, legal guardian, or custodian is entitled to counsel upon the filing of an  
8 application for counsel and a determination of indigency. If a party appears without  
9 counsel, the court shall determine whether the party knows the party may be  
10 represented by counsel and that the party is entitled to counsel at public expense if  
11 indigent. The court may continue the proceeding to enable a party to obtain counsel. A  
12 child's parent, legal guardian, or custodian determined to be indigent is entitled to  
13 counsel:

- 14 a. At a detention hearing;  
15 b. At the dispositional stage of a juvenile delinquency matter;  
16 c. At all proceedings in a child in need of ~~services~~ or protection; or  
17 d. In a permanency or review of an order entered in any of the proceedings under  
18 subdivision a, b, or c.

19 5. The child may elect to be represented by counsel for a nonjudicial adjustment.

20 **SECTION 10. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 5 of section 27-20.2-15 of the North Dakota  
21 Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

22 5. In considering whether to involuntarily place an Indian child in foster care or to  
23 terminate the parental rights of the parent of an Indian child, the court shall require that  
24 a qualified expert witness must be qualified to testify regarding whether the child's  
25 continued custody by the parent or Indian custodian is likely to result in serious  
26 emotional or physical damage or harm to the child and should be qualified to testify as  
27 to the prevailing social and cultural standards of the Indian child's tribe. If the parties  
28 stipulate in writing and the court is satisfied the stipulation is made knowingly,  
29 intelligently, and voluntarily, the court may accept a declaration or affidavit from a  
30 qualified expert witness in lieu of testimony. An individual may be designated by the  
31 Indian child's tribe as being qualified to testify to the prevailing social and cultural

1 standards of the Indian child's tribe. The court or any party may request the assistance  
2 of the Indian child's tribe or the bureau of Indian affairs office serving the Indian child's  
3 tribe in locating individuals qualified to serve as expert witnesses. The social worker  
4 regularly assigned to the Indian child may not serve as a qualified expert witness in  
5 child-custody proceedings concerning the child. The qualified expert witness should be  
6 someone familiar with the particular child and have contact with the parents to observe  
7 interaction between the parents, child, and extended family members. The child  
8 welfare agency and courts should facilitate access to the family and records to  
9 facilitate accurate testimony.

10 **SECTION 11.** A new subdivision to subsection 1 of section 27-20.2-21 of the North Dakota  
11 Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

12 The staff of a juvenile detention center or the staff of a juvenile intake and  
13 assessment center designated by the court to assist in performing and scoring  
14 the detention screening tool.

15 **SECTION 12. AMENDMENT.** Section 27-20.3-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is  
16 amended and reenacted as follows:

17 **27-20.3-01. Definitions.**

18 As used in this chapter:

19 1. "Abandon" means:

20 a. As to a parent of a child not in the custody of that parent, failure by the  
21 noncustodial parent significantly without justifiable cause:

22 (1) To communicate with the child; or

23 (2) To provide for the care and support of the child as required by law; or

24 b. As to a parent of a child in that parent's custody:

25 (1) To leave the child for an indefinite period without making firm and agreed  
26 plans, with the child's immediate caregiver, for the parent's resumption of  
27 physical custody;

28 (2) Following the child's birth or treatment at a hospital, to fail to arrange for the  
29 child's discharge within ten days after the child no longer requires hospital  
30 care; or

- 1                   (3) Willfully to fail to furnish food, shelter, clothing, or medical attention  
2                   reasonably sufficient to meet the child's needs.
- 3       2. "Abandoned infant" means a child who has been abandoned before reaching the age  
4       of one year.
- 5       3. "Aggravated circumstances" means circumstances in which a parent:
- 6       a. Abandons, tortures, chronically abuses, or sexually abuses a child;
- 7       b. Fails to make substantial, meaningful efforts to secure treatment for the parent's  
8       addiction, mental illness, behavior disorder, or any combination of those  
9       conditions for one year;
- 10      c. Engages in conduct prohibited under sections 12.1-20-01 through 12.1-20-08 or  
11      chapter 12.1-27.2, in which a child is the victim or intended victim;
- 12      d. Engages in conduct that constitutes one of the following crimes, or of an offense  
13      under the laws of another jurisdiction which requires proof of substantially similar  
14      elements:
- 15          (1) A violation of section 12.1-16-01, 12.1-16-02, 12.1-16-03, or 14-09-22 in  
16          which the victim is another child of the parent;
- 17          (2) Aiding, abetting, attempting, conspiring, or soliciting a violation of section  
18          12.1-16-01, 12.1-16-02, or 12.1-16-03 in which the victim is a child of the  
19          parent; or
- 20          (3) A violation of section 12.1-17-02 in which the victim is a child of the parent  
21          and has suffered serious bodily injury;
- 22      e. Engages or attempts to engage in conduct, prohibited under sections 12.1-17-01  
23      through 12.1-17-04, in which a child is the victim or intended victim;
- 24      f. In the case of a child age nine or older, has been incarcerated under a sentence  
25      for which the latest release date is after the child's age of majority;
- 26      g. Subjects the child to prenatal exposure to chronic or severe use of alcohol or any  
27      controlled substance as defined in chapter 19-03.1 in a manner not lawfully  
28      prescribed by a practitioner; or
- 29      h. Allows the child to be present in an environment subjecting the child to exposure  
30      to a controlled substance, chemical substance, or drug paraphernalia as  
31      prohibited by section 19-03.1-22.2.

- 1           4. ~~"Attendant care" means a nonsecure holdover site for children in need of services who~~  
2           ~~are in the custody of law enforcement and need constant short-term supervision on a~~  
3           ~~preadjudicatory basis.~~
- 4           5. "Certified shelter care" means a nonsecure permanent dwelling operated by an  
5           agency certified by the department of health and human services, where employees  
6           offer safe shelter, food, and a structured routine, and which is available twenty-four  
7           hours a day to a resident in need of emergency placement, not to exceed seven days,  
8           unless otherwise approved by the department.
- 9           5. "Child in need of protection" means a child who:
- 10           a. Is without proper parental care or control, subsistence, education as required by  
11           law, or other care or control necessary for the child's physical, mental, or  
12           emotional health, or morals, and the need for services or protection is not due  
13           primarily to the lack of financial means of the child's parents, guardian, or other  
14           custodian;
- 15           b. Has been placed for care or adoption in violation of law;

- 17           d. Is without proper parental care, control, or education as required by law, or other  
18           care and control necessary for the child's well-being because of the physical,  
19           mental, emotional, or other illness or disability of the child's parent or parents,  
20           and that such lack of care is not due to a willful act of commission or act of  
21           omission by the child's parents, and care is requested by a parent;
- 22           e. Is in need of treatment and whose parents, guardian, or other custodian have  
23           refused to participate in treatment as ordered by the juvenile court;
- 24           f. Was subject to prenatal exposure to chronic or severe use of alcohol or any  
25           controlled substance as defined in chapter 19-03.1 in a manner not lawfully  
26           prescribed by a practitioner;
- 27           g. Is present in an environment subjecting the child to exposure to a controlled  
28           substance, chemical substance, or drug paraphernalia as prohibited by section  
29           19-03.1-22.2; or
- 30           h. Is a victim of human trafficking as defined in title 12.1.
- 31           6. "Child in need of services" means a child who:

- 1           a.    Is habitually and without justification truant from school subject to compulsory  
2           school attendance and is absent from school without an authorized excuse more  
3           than three days during a school year;
- 4           b.    Is habitually disobedient of the reasonable and lawful commands of the child's  
5           parent, guardian, or other custodian, including running away, and is ungovernable  
6           or who is willfully in a situation dangerous or injurious to the health, safety, or  
7           morals of the child or others;
- 8           c.    Has committed an offense applicable only to a child, except for an offense  
9           committed by a minor fourteen years of age or older under subsection 2 of  
10          section 12.1-31-03 or an equivalent local ordinance or resolution; or
- 11          d.    Is under the age of fourteen years and has purchased, possessed, smoked, or  
12          used tobacco, a tobacco-related product, an electronic smoking device, or an  
13          alternative nicotine product in violation of subsection 2 of section 12.1-31-03. As  
14          used in this subdivision, "electronic smoking device" and "alternative nicotine  
15          product" have the same meaning as in section 12.1-31-03; and
- 16          e.    In any of the foregoing instances is in need of treatment or rehabilitation.
- 17          7.    "Custodian" means a person, other than a parent or legal guardian, which stands in  
18          loco parentis to the child and a person to which legal custody of the child has been  
19          given by order of a court.
- 20          8.    "Diversion" means an intervention strategy that redirects a child away from formal  
21          processing in the juvenile justice system, while still holding the child accountable for  
22          that child's actions.
- 23          9.    "Fit and willing relative or other appropriate individual" means a relative or other  
24          individual who has been determined, after consideration of an assessment that  
25          includes a criminal history record investigation under chapter 50-11.3, to be a qualified  
26          individual under chapters 27-20.1 and 30.1-27, and who consents in writing to act as a  
27          legal guardian.
- 28          10.   "Home" as used in the phrase "to return home" means the abode of the child's parent  
29          with whom the child formerly resided.

- 1        11. "Human service zone" means a county or consolidated group of counties  
2            administering human services within a designated area in accordance with an  
3            agreement or plan approved by the department of health and human services.
- 4        12. "Permanency hearing" means a hearing, conducted with respect to a child who is in  
5            foster care, to determine the permanency plan for the child which includes the  
6            following:
- 7            a. Whether and, if applicable, when the child will be returned to the parent.
- 8            b. Whether and, if applicable, when the child will be placed for adoption and the  
9            state will file a petition for termination of parental rights.
- 10          c. Whether and, if applicable, when a fit and willing relative or other appropriate  
11          individual will be appointed as a legal guardian.
- 12          d. Whether and, if applicable, to place siblings in the same foster care, relative,  
13          guardianship, or adoptive placement, unless it is determined that the joint  
14          placement would be contrary to the safety or well-being of any of the siblings.
- 15          e. Whether and, if applicable, in the case of siblings removed from the home of the  
16          siblings who are not jointly placed, to provide for frequent visitation or other  
17          ongoing interaction between the siblings, unless it is determined to be contrary to  
18          the safety or well-being of any of the siblings.
- 19          f. In cases in which a compelling reason has been shown that it would not be in the  
20          child's best interests to return home, to have parental rights terminated, to be  
21          placed for adoption, to be placed with a fit and willing relative, or to be placed  
22          with a legal guardian, whether and, if applicable, when the child, aged sixteen or  
23          older, will be placed in another planned permanent living arrangement. The court  
24          shall:
- 25            (1) Ask the child whether the child has a desired permanency outcome of  
26            another planned permanent living arrangement;
- 27            (2) Make a judicial determination explaining why another planned permanent  
28            living arrangement is the best permanency plan for the child; and
- 29            (3) Identify the compelling reasons it continues not to be in the best interest of  
30            the child to return home, be placed for adoption, be placed with a legal  
31            guardian, or be placed with a fit and willing relative.

5           considered. If the child is currently in an out-of-state placement, the court shall  
6           determine whether the placement continues to be appropriate and in the child's  
7           best interests.
- 8           h. In the case of a child who has attained age fourteen, the services needed to  
9           assist the child to make the transition to successful adulthood.
- 10        13. "Qualified residential treatment programs" mean residential child care facilities that  
11        provide a higher level of care which must use a trauma-informed treatment model and  
12        employ registered or licensed nursing staff and other licensed clinical staff to meet the  
13        treatment needs of children in out-of-home placement.
- 14        14. "Referral" means a written report submitted to ~~the director of juvenile court or the~~  
15        director of the human service zone concerning ~~behavior without an arrest or taking into~~  
16        ~~custody having occurred and the child remains in the parental home to be notified of~~  
17        ~~any action taken by the director or human service zone~~ a child in need of services as  
18        authorized in this chapter.
- 19        15. "Relative" or "kinship relative" means:
- 20           a. The child's grandparent, great-grandparent, sibling, half-sibling, aunt, great-aunt,  
21           uncle, great-uncle, nephew, niece, or first cousin;
- 22           b. An individual with a relationship to the child, derived through a current or former  
23           spouse of the child's parent, similar to a relationship described in subdivision a;
- 24           c. An individual recognized in the child's community as having a relationship with  
25           the child similar to a relationship described in subdivision a; or
- 26           d. The child's stepparent.
- 27        16. "Shelter care" means temporary care ~~of a child in physically unrestricted~~  
28        ~~facilities~~ during which a child needs a safe bed outside of the home, in a shelter care  
29        site or a certified shelter care site managed by an agency or licensed foster care  
30        facility.

31       control of a child alleged to be in need of ~~services or~~ protection as may be

- 6 agreement or plan approved by the department.
- 7 2. A petition for termination of parental rights must be prepared, filed, and served upon
- 8 the parties by the state's attorney. A petition may also be prepared by any other
- 9 person that is not the court, including a law enforcement officer, who has knowledge of
- 10 the facts alleged or is informed and believes that they are true. A petition prepared by
- 11 any person other than a state's attorney may not be filed unless the director or the
- 12 court has determined the filing of the petition is in the best interest of the public and

- 28               (3) The date a child is placed in foster care voluntarily and with the consent of

- 4 zone or the division of juvenile services; or

- 8 c. The child is placed in a parental home by the court or a legal custodian other
- 9 than the division of juvenile services and the legal custodian lacks authority to
- 10 remove the child without further order of the court; or
- 11 d. The child is placed in a parental home by the division of juvenile services.
- 12 7. For purposes of subsection 3, a child is not in foster care on any night during which
- 13 the child is:
- 14 a. On a trial home visit;
- 15 b. Receiving services at the youth correctional center pursuant to an adjudication of
- 16 delinquency; or
- 17 c. Absent without leave from the place in which the child was receiving foster care.

24 unless otherwise approved by the department.

27 b. Under the age of twenty years with respect to a delinquent act committed while  
28 under the age of eighteen years and not married.

2            loco parentis to the child and a person that has been given legal custody of the child

5            ordinances or resolutions of this state, or of another state if the act occurred in that  
6            state, or under federal law.
- 7     ~~8-9.~~ "Delinquent child" means a child who has committed a delinquent act and is in need of  
8            treatment or rehabilitation or is a child subject to proceedings arising under the  
9            interstate compact on juveniles.
- 10    ~~9-10.~~ "Detention" means a physically secure facility with locked doors. The term does not  
11           include shelter care, attendant care, or home confinement.
- 12    ~~40-11.~~ "Director" means the director of juvenile court services.
- 13    ~~41-12.~~ "Dispositional stage" means any proceeding after adjudication for a delinquent  
14           offense.
- 15    ~~42-13.~~ "Diversion" means an intervention strategy made by a person with authority which  
16           directs the child away from formal court processing to a specifically designed program  
17           or activity to hold the child accountable for the actions of the child and prevents further  
18           involvement in the formal legal system.
- 19    ~~43-14.~~ "Division" means the division of juvenile services.
- 20    ~~44-15.~~ "Evidence-based" means a program or practice that has had multiple randomized  
21           control studies demonstrating the program or practice is effective for a specific  
22           population, has been researched, and has been rated as effective by a standardized  
23           program evaluation tool.
- 24    ~~45-16.~~ "Facility" means buildings, structures, or systems, including those for essential  
25           administration and support, which are used to provide residential treatment for  
26           children.
- 27    ~~46-17.~~ "Fit and willing relative or other appropriate individual" means a relative or other  
28           individual who has been determined, after consideration of an assessment that  
29           includes a criminal history record investigation under chapter 50-11.3, to be a qualified  
30           individual under chapters 27-20.1 and 30.1-27, and who consents in writing to act as a  
31           legal guardian.

9 guardian, or custodian for supervision.

14 immediate and consistent feedback that supports appropriate behavior and follow  
15 through with probation conditions.

17 designee to resolve a low-level delinquent referral and is an alternative to the filing of a  
18 petition for formal court processing.
- 19 ~~23-24.~~ "Intensive supervision probation program" means a community-based alternative that  
20 provides a higher degree of supervision and use of graduated incentives and  
21 sanctions over a child, post-adjudication, to ensure public safety and applies to  
22 children who are at high risk to reoffend.
- 23 ~~24-25.~~ "Juvenile court" means the district court of this state.
- 24 ~~25-26.~~ "Juvenile drug court" means a program established by the supreme court which is a  
25 post-petition or post-adjudication program aimed at intervening in substance use  
26 disorders through intense supervision and participation in recovery services.
- 27 ~~26-27.~~ "Pick up and hold order" means an order of the court to take a child into custody  
28 based upon an allegation of delinquency or failure to appear for court, or a  
29 determination the child poses a risk to public safety while under court-ordered  
30 supervision.

1 ~~27-28.~~ "Predisposition assessment" means an investigation, assessment, and written report  
2 to the court based on the results of risk and need screening and assessment tools  
3 regarding a disposition for a delinquent child.

4 ~~28-29.~~ "Proceeding" means any hearing or informal adjustment conducted before a court.

5 ~~29-30.~~ "Qualified residential treatment program" means a licensed or approved residence  
6 providing an out-of-home treatment placement for children including a trauma-  
7 informed model.

8 ~~30-31.~~ "Referral" means a written report of alleged delinquent behavior of a child which is  
9 received by the director of juvenile court.

10 ~~31-32.~~ "Relative" or "kinship relative" means:

- 11 a. The child's grandparent, great-grandparent, sibling, half-sibling, aunt, great-aunt,  
12 uncle, great-uncle, nephew, niece, or first cousin;
- 13 b. An individual with a relationship to the child, derived through a current or former  
14 spouse of the child's parent, similar to a relationship described in subdivision a;
- 15 c. An individual recognized in the child's community as having a relationship with

  - 15 d. Supervise and assist a child placed on probation for delinquency.
  - 16 e. Make appropriate referrals to other private or public agencies of the community if  
17 their assistance appears to be needed or desirable.
  - 18 f. Issue a temporary custody order concerning a child who is referred to the  
19 director's supervision or care as a delinquent child. Except as provided by this  
20 chapter, a director does not have the powers of a law enforcement officer.
  - 21 g. Take acknowledgments of instruments for the purpose of this chapter.
  - 22 h. Perform all other functions designated by this chapter, under section 27-05-30, or  
23 by order of the court, including, if qualified, those of a referee.
  - 24 i. Issue an order to a law enforcement authority to transport a child to and from a  
25 specified location.
  - 26 j. Receive and examine requests for review of a child's placement at a qualified  
27 residential treatment program under the Family First Prevention Services Act  
28 [Pub. L. 115-123; 132 Stat. 64; 42 U.S.C. 675].
- 29 2. Any of the foregoing functions may be performed in another state if authorized by the  
30 court of this state and permitted by the laws of the other state.



1       **SECTION 29. AMENDMENT.** Section 27-20.4-05 of the North Dakota Century Code is

3       **27-20.4-05. Taking into custody.**

- 4       1. A child may be taken into custody:
- 5           a. Pursuant to a pick up and hold order or other order of the court under this

20       court by a law enforcement officer who has reasonable grounds and knowledge of the  
21       facts alleged and believes such facts are true.
- 22       2. If a child is taken into custody on the alleged delinquent act, the law enforcement  
23       officer shall send the referral to the juvenile court within twenty-four hours after the  
24       time in which the minor is taken into custody under section 27-20.4-05.

26       be referred to the juvenile court unless school interventions have been unsuccessful  
27       and documentation is included with the referral indicating which interventions or

30           following misdemeanor offenses:
- 31           (1) Drug-related offenses under title 19;

- 2           (3) Sex offenses under chapters 12.1-20, 12.1-27.1, 12.1-27.2, and 12.1-29;

- 4           (4) Any offense involving a firearm, weapon, or dangerous weapon as defined
- 5                 in section 62.1-01-01.
- 6         b. A law enforcement officer may:
- 7           (1) Investigate possible delinquent offenses and conduct occurring at a school,
- 8                 including conducting probable cause searches;
- 9           (2) Consult with school staff about the conduct of a child enrolled in a school;
- 10          (3) Refer a child to the juvenile court for a delinquent offense occurring on
- 11                 school grounds or on school property as allowed by this section;
- 12          (4) Transport a child enrolled in a school to a location permitted by law;
- 13          (5) Take temporary custody of a child in accordance with section 27-20.4-05 or
- 14                 protective custody of a child in accordance with section 27-20.3-06; and
- 15          (6) Protect the safety of students and the school community.

16         **SECTION 31. AMENDMENT.** Section 27-20.4-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is  
17 amended and reenacted as follows:

18         **27-20.4-06. Detention - Nonsecure care of child.**

- 19         1. A child taken into custody may not be detained or placed in nonsecure care before the  
20             hearing on the petition unless the child's detention or nonsecure care is required to  
21             protect the person or property of others or of the child or because the child may  
22             abscond or be removed from the jurisdiction of the court or because the child has no  
23             parent, guardian, or custodian or other person able to provide supervision and care for  
24             the child and return the child to the court if required, or an order for the child's  
25             detention or nonsecure care has been made by the court pursuant to this chapter.

27             screening tool to assure the appropriate use of detention and whether the child is a

30             enforcement, court records, and division records must include data on detention

1 screening scores and, if the score does not authorize detention, the explanation for the

3 3. The court may place a juvenile in detention ~~before adjudication~~ only if the court finds  
4 releasing the child would pose an ~~unreasonable~~ risk to public safety and that all less  
5 restrictive alternatives have been considered.

6 4. A juvenile may be placed in a secure detention facility if one or more of the following  
7 conditions are met:

8 a. The child is alleged to have committed an offense that if committed by an adult  
9 would constitute a felony against person, felony weapon, or felony drug  
10 distribution;

11 b. The child has a record of failure to appear in court or there is probable cause to  
12 believe that the child will flee the jurisdiction of the court;

13 c. The child has violated the terms of detention release on home confinement or  
14 electronic monitoring;

15 d. There is oral or written verification that the child is an alleged delinquent child  
16 sought for an offense in another jurisdiction or that the child left a juvenile  
17 detention facility without authorization;

18 e. The child is an out-of-state runaway subject to the rules of the interstate  
19 commission on juveniles;

20 f. The child meets criteria for secure detention on the detention screening tool; or

21 g. The child meets criteria for an override on the detention screening tool.

22 5. A child may not be placed in detention ~~by law enforcement or juvenile court, including~~  
23 ~~drug court solely~~:

24 a. Due to a lack of supervision alternatives, service options, or more appropriate  
25 facilities;:

26 b. Due to the community's inability to provide treatment or services;:

27 c. Due to a lack of supervision in the home or community;:

28 d. In order to allow a parent, guardian, or legal custodian to avoid his or her legal  
29 responsibility;:

30 e. Due to a risk of the juvenile's self-harm;:

31 f. In order to attempt to punish, treat, or rehabilitate the child;:

- 1           g. Due to a request by a victim, law enforcement, or the community; or  
2           h. In order to permit more convenient administrative access to the juvenile.
- 3         6. Alternatives to secure detention may be utilized to include home confinement,  
4           electronic monitoring, and parental or guardian supervision if the court determines  
5           there is no unreasonable risk to public safety.
- 6         7. A child placed in detention must have a mental health and trauma screening tool  
7           completed by the juvenile detention center or by juvenile court upon entry and provide  
8           that information to the juvenile court before release or detention hearing.

9         **SECTION 32. AMENDMENT.** Section 27-20.4-08 of the North Dakota Century Code is  
10        amended and reenacted as follows:

11        **27-20.4-08. Place of detention.**

- 12        1. A child alleged to be delinquent may be detained only in:

26           may not be held in an adult jail or correctional facility, adult lockup, or court holding  
27           facility.

28        **SECTION 33. AMENDMENT.** Section 27-20.4-09 of the North Dakota Century Code is  
29        amended and reenacted as follows:

1           **27-20.4-09. Release from detention or nonsecure care - Hearing - Conditions of**  
2 **release.**

- 3           1. If a child is brought before the court or delivered to a detention, attendant care, or  
4 nonsecure care facility designated by the court, the director, the intake officer, or other  
5 authorized officer of the court immediately shall make an investigation and release the  
6 child unless it appears that the child's detention is warranted or required under section  
7 27-20.4-05.
- 8           2. Reasonable notice of the release from detention must be provided to any victim as  
9 required by subsection 19 of section 12.1-34-02.
- 10          3. If the child is not released, reasonable notice, either oral or written, stating the time,  
11 place, and purpose of the detention or shelter care must be given to the child and, if  
12 able to be found, to the child's parents, guardian, or other custodian. If the child is not  
13 represented by counsel at a proceeding, the court shall inform the child of the right to  
14 counsel, regardless of income. Before the commencement of the hearing, the court  
15 shall inform the child's parents, legal guardian, or custodian of the right to counsel at  
16 public expense at the dispositional stage if the parent, guardian, or custodian applies  
17 and is determined to be indigent and of the child's right to remain silent with respect to  
18 any allegations of delinquent conduct.
- 19           a. If the child is not released from detention, a judge or referee shall hold a  
20 detention hearing within twenty-four hours after the time the child is placed in  
21 detention, excluding weekends or legal holidays, to determine whether there is  
22 probable cause to believe the child has committed the delinquent act alleged,  
23 and whether the child's detention is required under section 27-20.4-05. In  
24 determining whether a child requires detention, the court shall consider the  
25 results of the detention screening tool.
- 26           b. If the child is not released from attendant care or nonsecure care, a judge or  
27 referee shall hold a hearing promptly and not later than ninety-six hours after the  
28 child is placed in nonsecure care to determine whether there is probable cause to  
29 believe the child has committed a delinquent act and whether the child's shelter  
30 care is required.

- 1       4. If the child is not released and a parent, guardian, or custodian has not been notified  
2       of the hearing, did not appear or waive appearance at the hearing, and files an  
3       affidavit showing these facts, the court shall rehear the matter without unnecessary  
4       delay and order the child's release, unless it appears from the hearing that the child's  
5       detention is required under section 27-20.4-05.
- 6       5. If the parents cannot be found ~~or fail to appear~~ for the detention or nonsecure care  
7       hearing and the child does not pose a ~~substantial~~ risk to the community and  
8       needs does not need to be detained, the human service zone is notified and a child in  
9       need of protection or ~~services~~ shelter care hearing is held.
- 10      6. If it appears that any child being held in detention, attendant care, or shelter care  
11      nonsecure care may have an intellectual or developmental disability, the court or  
12      detention personnel shall refer the child to the department of health and human  
13      services for an eligibility determination for intellectual or developmental disabilities  
14      program management services and a level of care assessment and the results must  
15      be filed with the court upon completion. The department of health and human services  
16      shall provide status updates to the court within the time required by the court.
- 17      7. If it appears that any child being held in detention or nonsecure care appears to have  
18      a serious and persistent mental illness, the detention staff or court intake officer shall  
19      request that the court order a diagnostic assessment that includes a recommendation  
20      for necessary level of care that must be conducted within forty-eight hours after the  
21      court's order. The person conducting the diagnostic assessment shall file the results  
22      with the court.
- 23      8. If an individual who is or appears to be a child is received at a jail facility or other  
24      facility for the detention of adult offenders or individuals charged with a crime, the  
25      official in charge of the facility immediately shall inform the court and bring the  
26      individual before the court upon request or deliver the individual to a detention or  
27      nonsecure facility designated by the court.
- 28      9. If a case is transferred to ~~another~~ adult court for criminal prosecution, ~~the~~ a child who  
29      has not reached the age of eighteen may not be transferred to ~~the appropriate officer~~  
30      ~~or detention~~ an adult jail or correctional facility, adult lockup, or court holding facility in  
31      accordance with the law governing the detention of persons charged with a crime. A

1 child who has not reached the age of eighteen may continue to be held in a juvenile  
2 detention facility during the pendency of the criminal prosecution but only as ordered  
3 by the court.

4 **SECTION 34. AMENDMENT.** Section 27-20.4-10 of the North Dakota Century Code is

8 or designee may determine that no further action is required or impose conditions in

12 criteria are met:

16 than twice by the juvenile court within the last twelve months; or
