• Youth and Young Adults coming to the Stepping Stones Resource Center have **experienced extreme trauma** including human trafficking, addiction, mental illness, and violence.

• SSRC **saves the lives** of traumatized youth and young adults so they can live again:

• Suicide prevention with on-site access to mental health professionals

• Crisis intervention and response to overdose;

• Childcare assistance, Hygiene, Nutrition, and Vocational support; and

• Extended, 24-7 shelter hours from November through May. • SSRC is a STATEWIDE inclusive, **wraparound** model that enables youth and young adults to achieve a new quality of life;

• Recent explorations of alternative funding have indicated SSRC services exceed the scope and purpose of FTR, Community Connect, and 1915(i).

• The **need has exploded** to support youth and young adults in crisis due to growing threats from mental illness, substance abuse, and the disruption of society, while traditional supports struggle to respond.

• The **North Dakota State Hospital** and local mental health providers routinely refer youth and young adults to SSRC because of our integrated model of support.

• SSRC receives less than 10% of its funding from HHS sources.

• Crisis intervention programs for youth and young adults need financial support NOW for their ongoing operations.

In 2016 I needed to escape the life that threatened to ensnare me in violence, crime, and prison. At 19 years old, I found myself homeless, sleeping in a car, and going weeks without a shower. Friends encouraged me to come to Stepping Stones Resource Center (SSRC) to get help. SSRC helped me with a room at Permanent Supportive Housing and assisted me in getting enrolled in high school where I earned my GED. I also became a nursing assistant and am now a certified medical assistant.

I was introduced to drugs and alcohol by my parents at age 11. My first experience with homelessness was at age 15 when my parents abandoned me. It took a lot of work and I continue to work on my mental health, but I am now able to Identify myself as a survivor, not a victim.

When I arrived at SSRC I only communicated using gestures, and at times, in writing. Once I moved into Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) I started speaking with staff and other youth. When someone from my treatment team asked why I decided to start talking again, it was because I finally felt safe.

I struggled with substance abuse my whole life, but when I moved back I ended up losing my life to an overdose.
