

Senate Appropriations – Human Resources Division Testimony in Favor of Senate Bill #2012 1-24-23

Mister Chairman and members of the committee,

My name is Greg Kasowski and I am the executive director of the Children's Advocacy Centers of North Dakota.

As you may be aware, Children's Advocacy Centers serve victims of child sexual abuse, physical abuse, and other forms of maltreatment. Before Children's Advocacy Centers existed in North Dakota, children would have to tell of their experience of abuse an average of 10 to 12 times—as they shared with law enforcement, human services, prosecutors, and therapists—further traumatizing the child.

Now with Children's Advocacy Centers, children only need to tell of their experience once, and to a trained forensic interviewer who asks age-appropriate questions in a child-friendly environment.

In addition to forensic interviews, we serve victims of child abuse by providing mental health counseling, medical exams, victim advocacy, telehealth, and an array of other services. These services are in alignment with the North Dakota Department of Health and Human Services' goal of becoming the healthiest state in the nation.

Since our last appropriation increase in 2017, we have experienced a 73% increase in the number of services provided. In that same timeframe, we have also increased the number of our locations from six to nine. By 2025, we project a 181% increase in services compared to 2017.

Our exceptional staff at Children's Advocacy Centers are stretched to the limits as we meet the demands of the increase in cases while striving with the same amount of resources. This trajectory is unsustainable.

We are appreciative of the executive recommendation to increase funding for Children Advocacy Centers from \$1.6 to \$3.2 million. However, last summer we had worked on

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a proposal with the Children and Family Services Division for \$4.1 million, as they are well aware of the on-going needs of Children's Advocacy Centers.

We respectfully request an additional \$900,000 to:

- 1. Correlate with the increase in services we are providing and expect to provide for victims.
- 2. Match the rising costs of retaining our staff and serving children.
- 3. Have the state of North Dakota cover a larger share of the cost of serving our state's children, from 20% of our budgets to 33%.

This further funding will allow us to:

- 1. Increase our capacity to respond to the number of children requiring services
- 2. Boost workforce retention efforts for our professionals who work in a highstress, high burnout profession
- 3. Increase access to services, especially tele mental health and new locations
- 4. Recruit and train more social work professionals into the field
- 5. Streamline administrative operations
- 6. Implement a statewide awareness campaign to bring healing to unreached victims
- 7. Boost prevention efforts to decrease the amount of children being victimized
- 8. Conduct a community assessment to determine gaps in service delivery

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



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What Is a CAC?

A Children's Advocacy Center is a victim-focused, community-orientated, safe facility in which members of a multidisciplinary team work together to provide a comprehensive coordinated and compassionate investigation and intervention of abuse allegations.



Without CACs



Before CACs, children had to tell the worst story of their life over and over again to social workers, nurses, law enforcement, lawyers, therapists, investigators, etc.

With CACs



With CACs, children only need to tell their story once to a trained interviewer who knows the right questions to ask in a way that does not retraumatize the child.

What CACs Do

Forensic Interviews

Specially trained Forensic Interviewers work with the multidisciplinary team (MDT) to ensure victims are not interviewed unnecessarily and allow them to do so in a safe, legally sound and neutral setting.

Advocacy Services

Advocacy focuses on the needs of the youth and non-offending caregiver(s), providing needed support and information along with a compassionate, listening ear.

Medical Evaluations

Specialized medical evaluations are offered to ensure the health and safety of each victim, identify any evidence of abuse, and refer for additional care as needed.

Mental Health Care

Specialized evidenced based, trauma-focused mental health services are offered to the victim and family to help them cope with the trauma and to assist them through the healing process.

Multidisciplinary Team

In the past, responses to child abuse were fragmented and poorly coordinated. Now children and families receive a collaborative approach from a multidisciplinary team made up of law enforcement, social services, prosecutors, victim advocates, forensic interviews, mental health clinicians, and medical personnel. 997 Forensic Interviews



Where CACs Serve


CAC Locations



Children Served by County




How CACs Made an Impact
