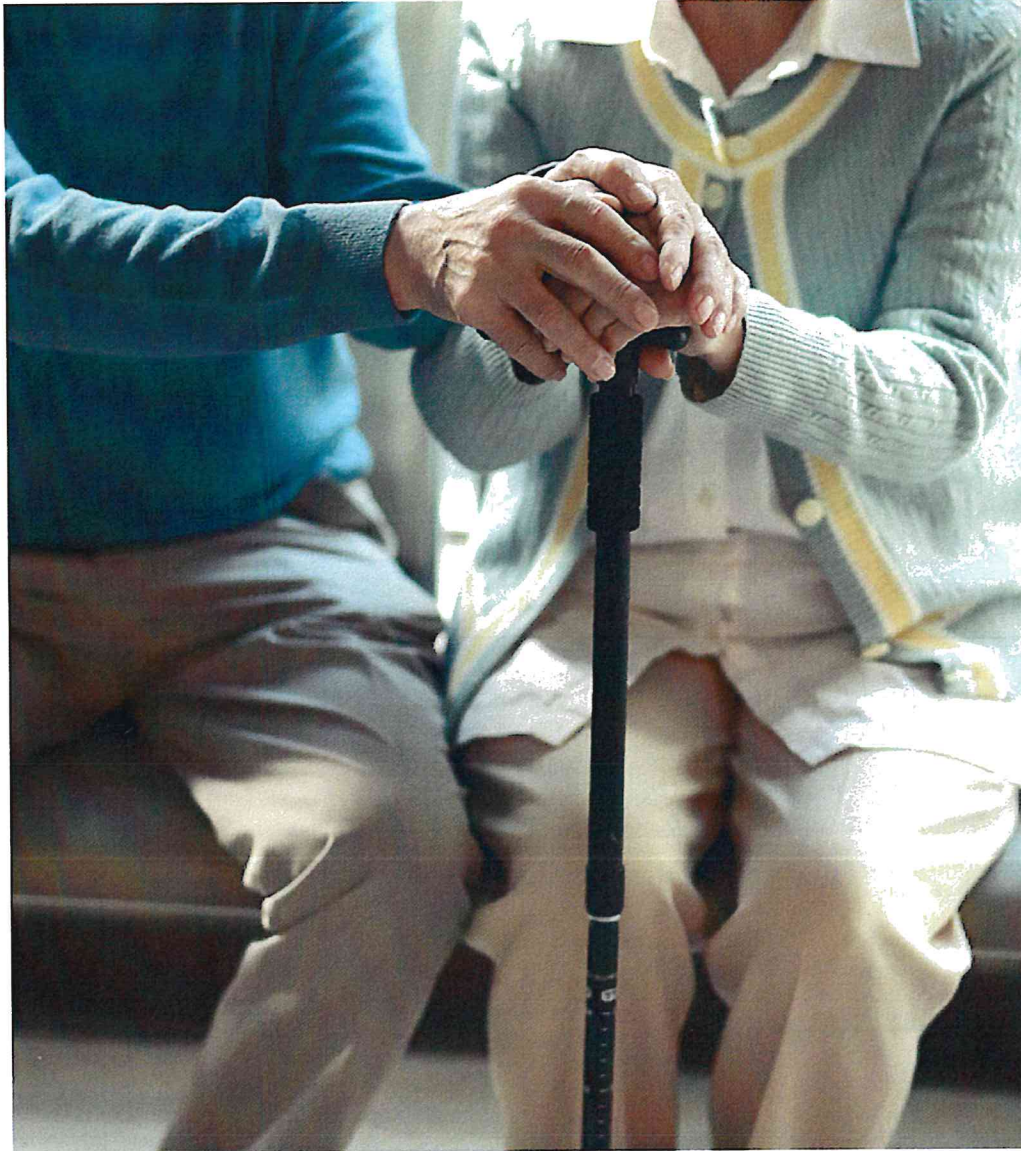

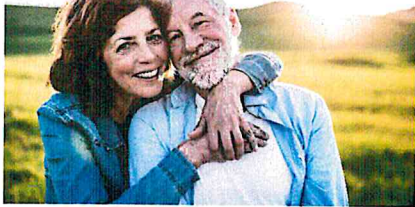


## Who we serve

The Adult and Aging Services Section administers and delivers more than 40 in-home and community-based services to eligible North Dakotans.

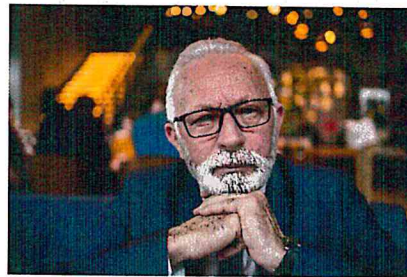
We also protect the health, safety, welfare and rights of vulnerable adults in the community and long-term care residents.

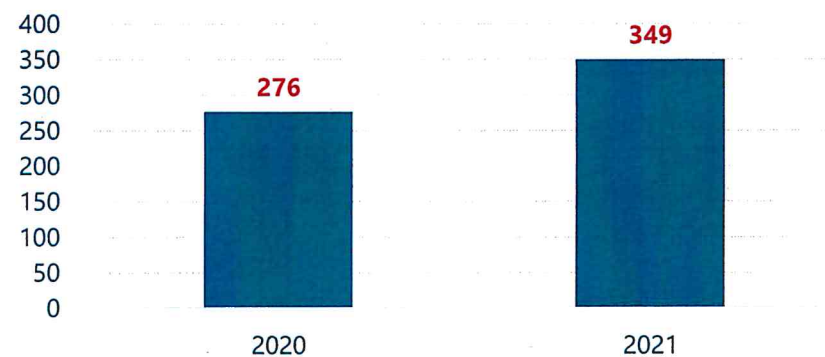

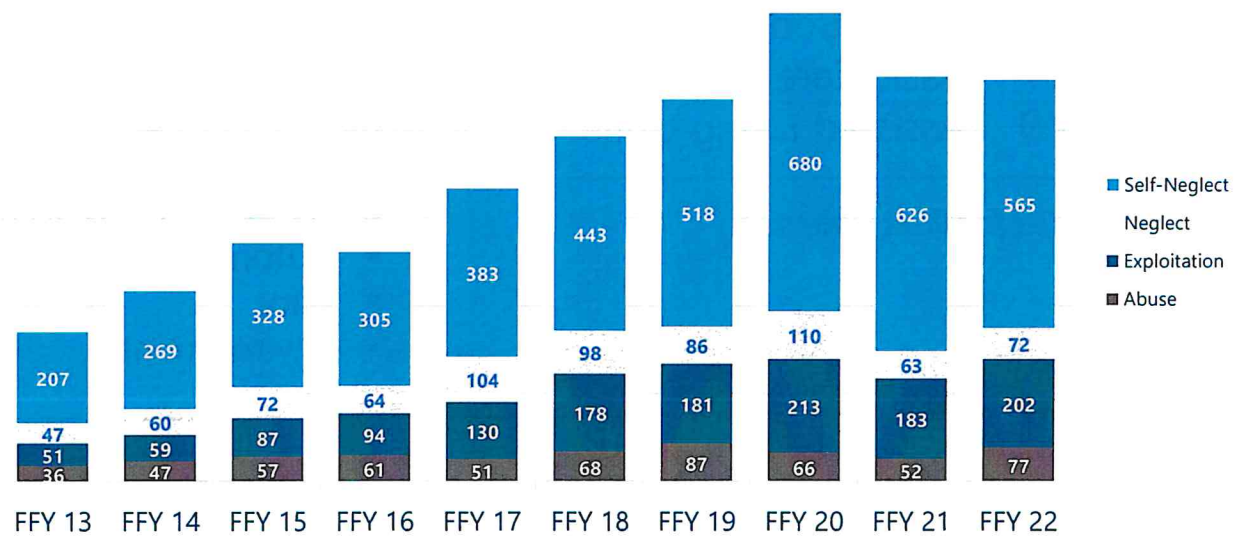

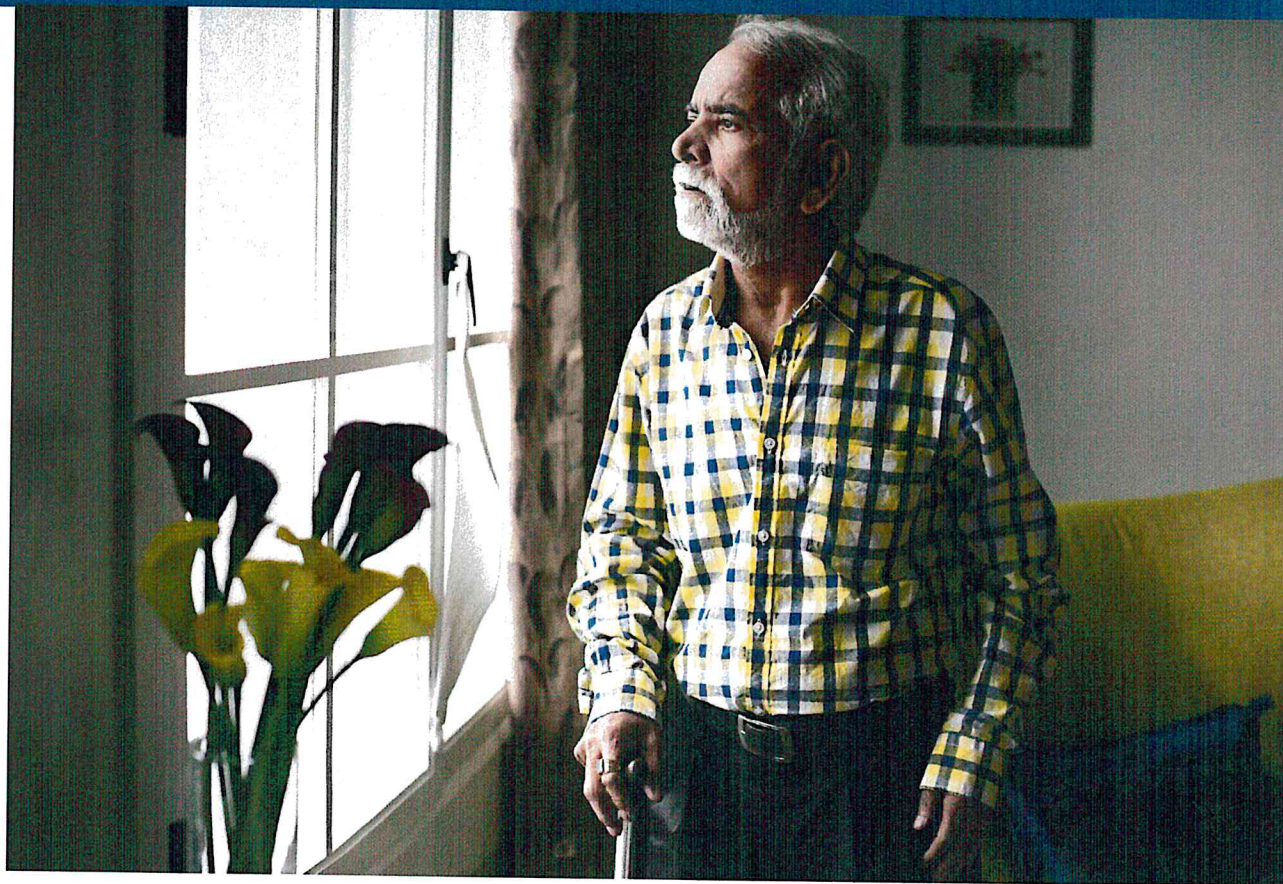

- Frozen meal options

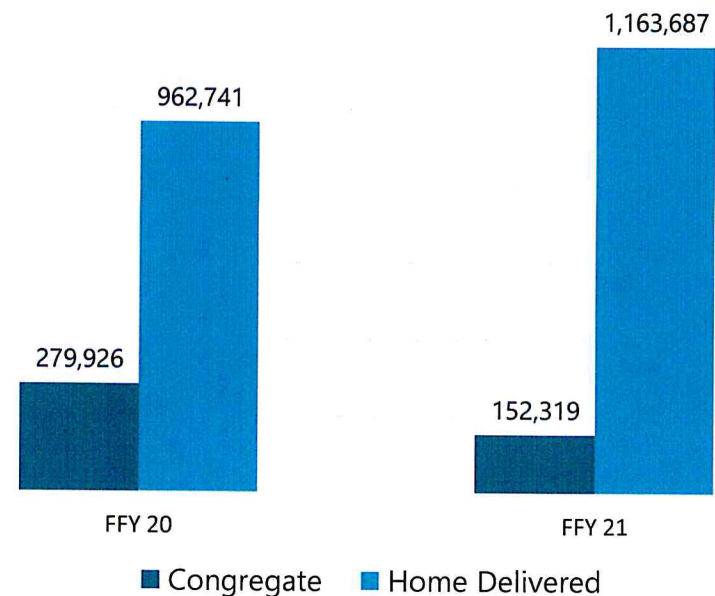

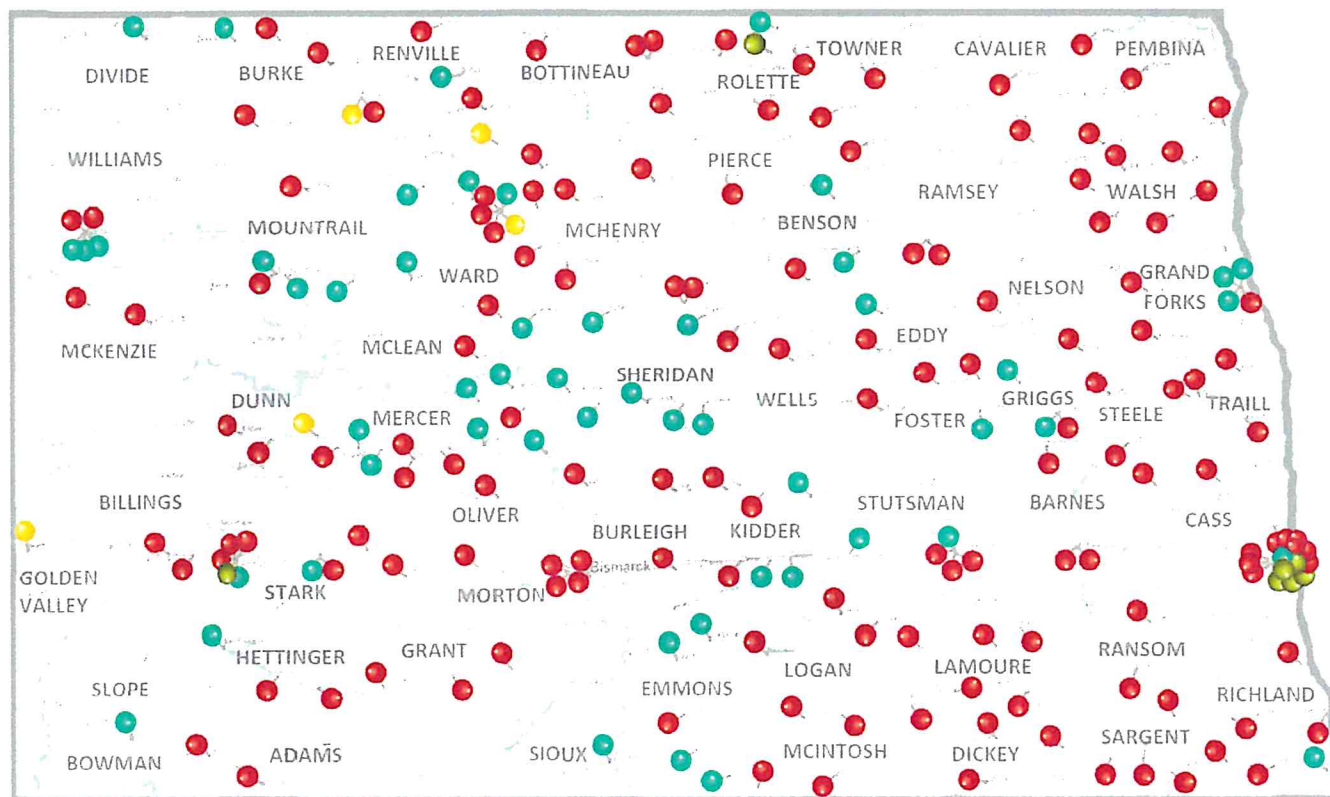

# ADULT & AGING SERVICES

## Nutrition Services

### Home-Delivered Meals & Congregate Meals

Current contracts (July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023): all meals are reimbursed at \$6 per meal

Executive Budget Request increase meal rate to \$7.62 congregate, and \$8.89 for home-delivered meals



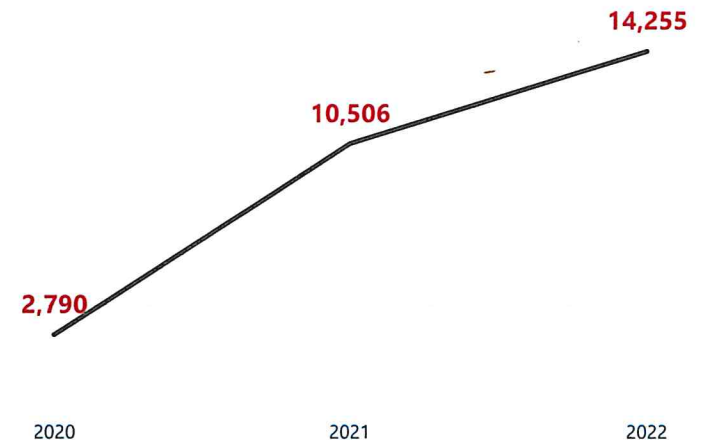


# ADULT & AGING SERVICES

## ADRL Centralized Intake

- **Process to receive services referrals**
- Based on “no wrong door” approach
- Network built to support individuals needing long-term care services by simplifying and streamlining access to information and services
- 6 FTE dedicated to centralized intake
- Fully implemented January 2021

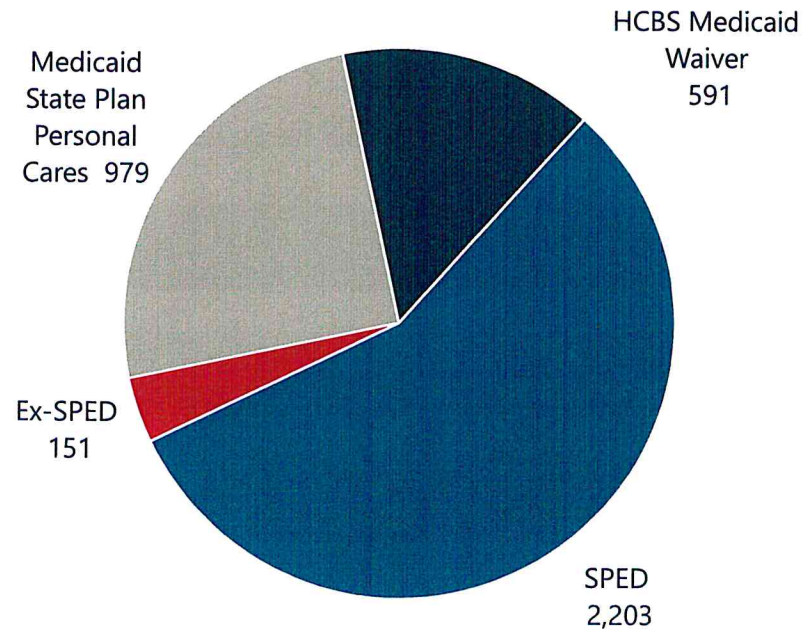

- Primarily serves older adults and individuals with physical disabilities
- Recipients must be both functionally and financially eligible
- May have client cost share based on income
- Federal and state funds
- Recipients range in age from 15-104 years old
- Case Management conducted by 66 FTE

Individuals Receiving HCBS in Dec 2022

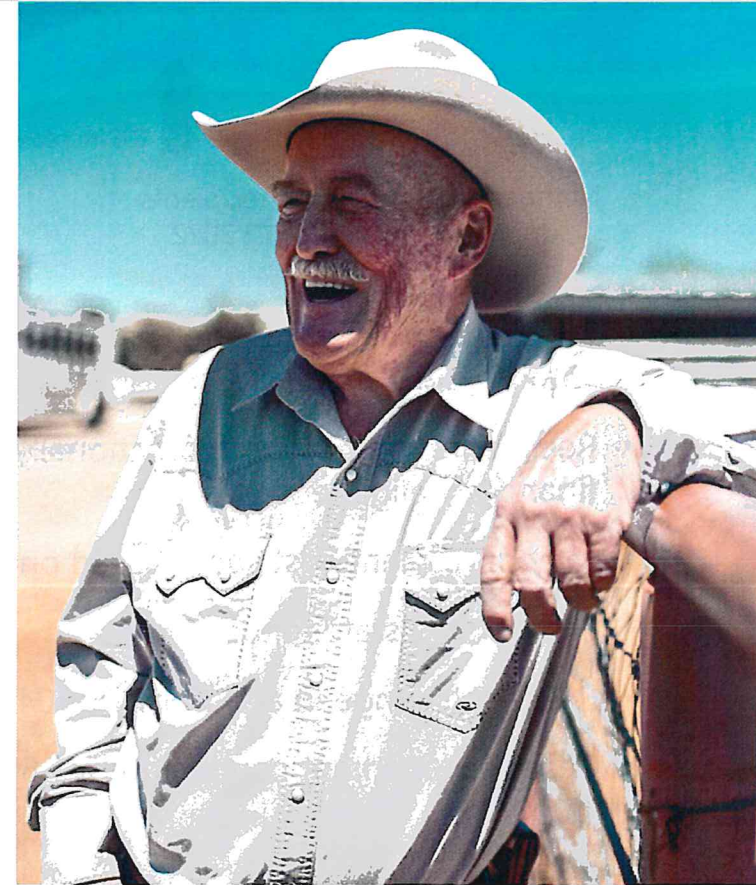
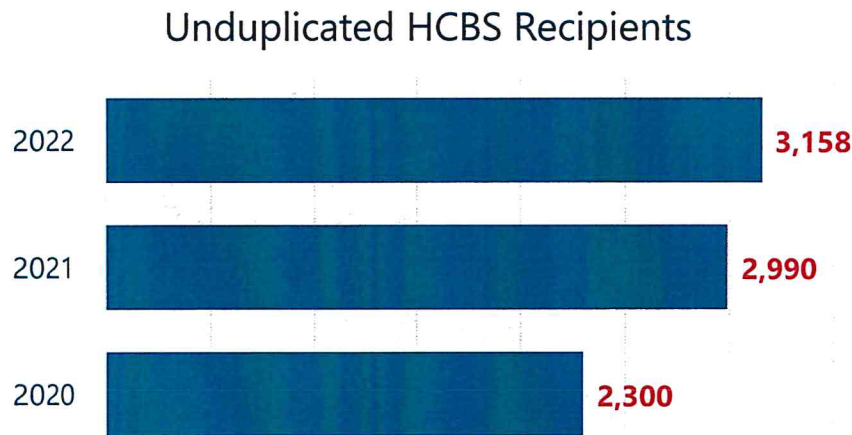

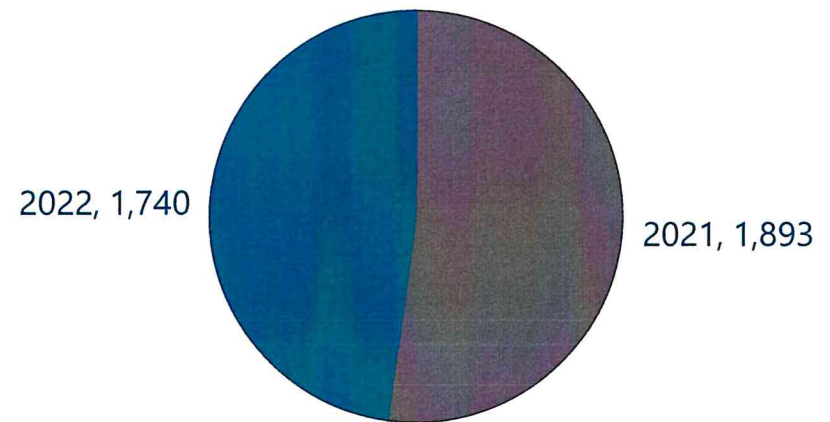

Increased demand has increased the **average caseload** per HCBS Case Manager

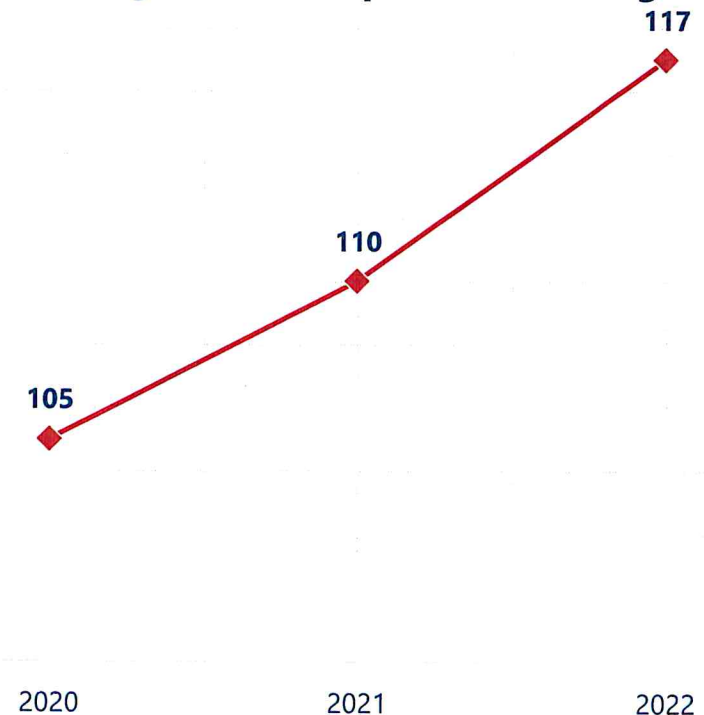


**Many HCBS participants have complex needs** (medical and behavioral health needs) that increase the amount of time it takes to provide quality case management services

**Average Caseload per Case Manager**

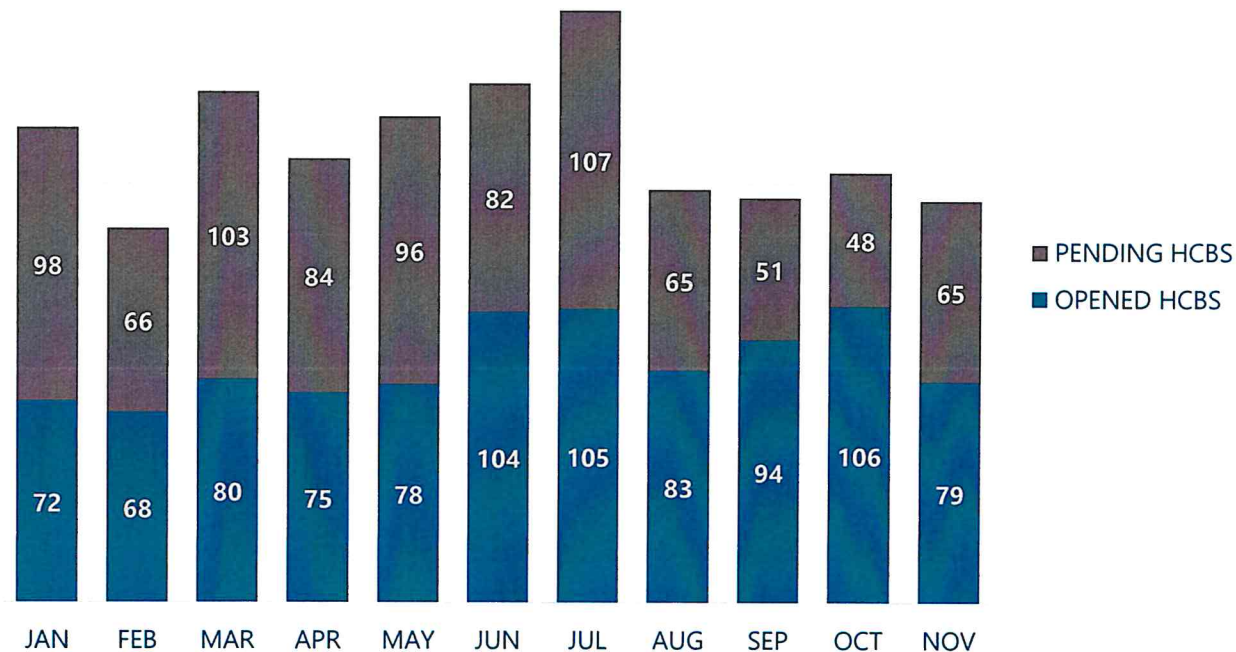


# ADULT & AGING SERVICES HCBS Case Summary

## 2022 HCBS Referral Summary

In addition to the HCBS Case Managers' caseload they are required to manage all pending cases, new referrals, and case closures each month

**Because of the population served, there are many cases opening and closing each month.**

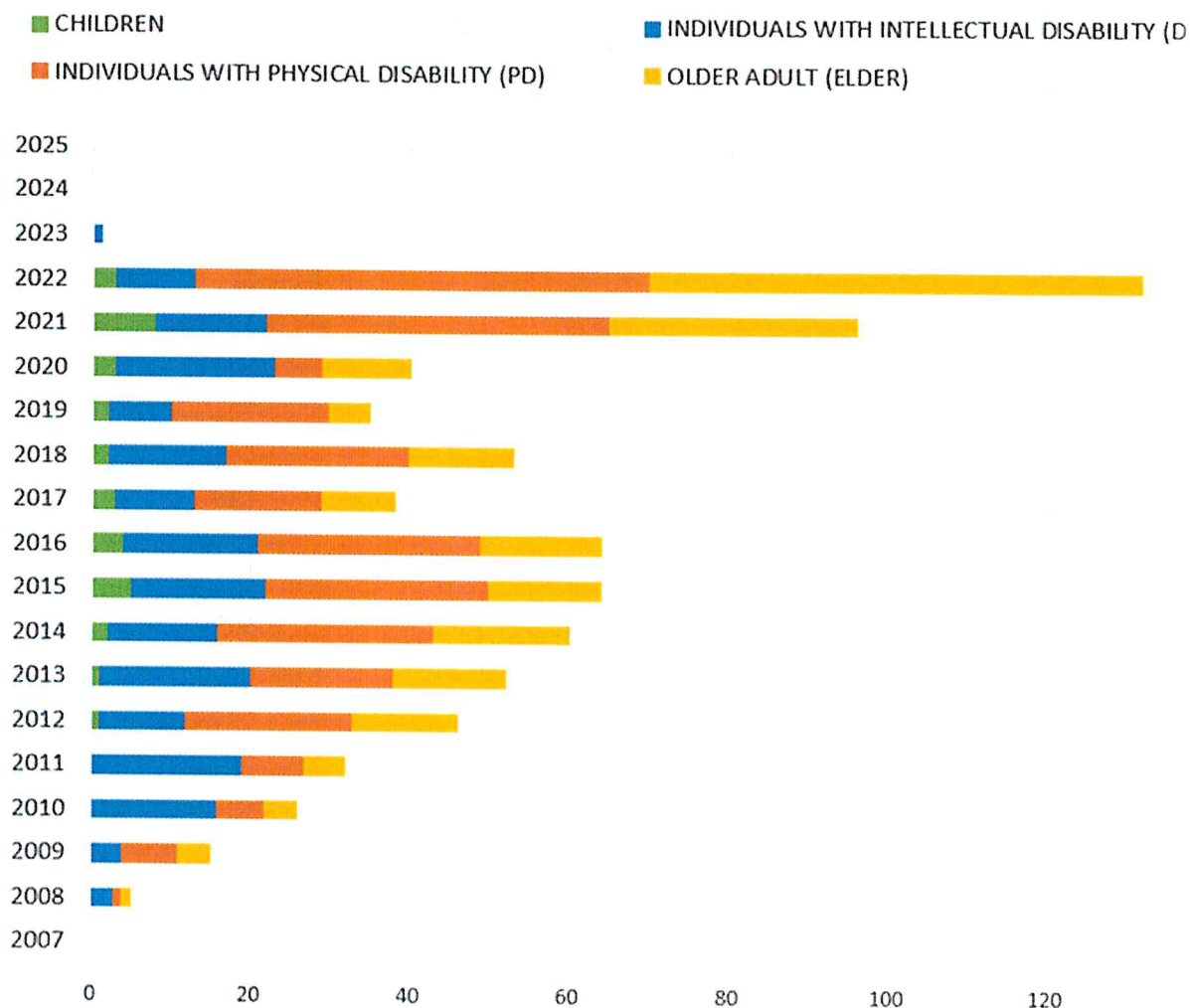




# Adult & Aging Services Money Follows the Person Grant

- Federal Grant designed to assist states to increase the use of HCBS to achieve Long Term Service (LTSS) and Supports System Rebalancing
- Eliminate barriers that prevent individuals from receiving LTSS in the setting of their choice
- MFP Grant started 2007 - \$8.9 million
- Award through 2022 \$47.8 million (fed) and \$4.3 (state)
- Transitioned 759 individuals over the past 15 years

# Implementing the Settlement Agreement between U.S. DOJ & State of North Dakota

PURPOSE is to ensure that ND will **meet Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements** by providing services, programs, and activities for individuals with physical disabilities in the most integrated setting appropriate to their needs.

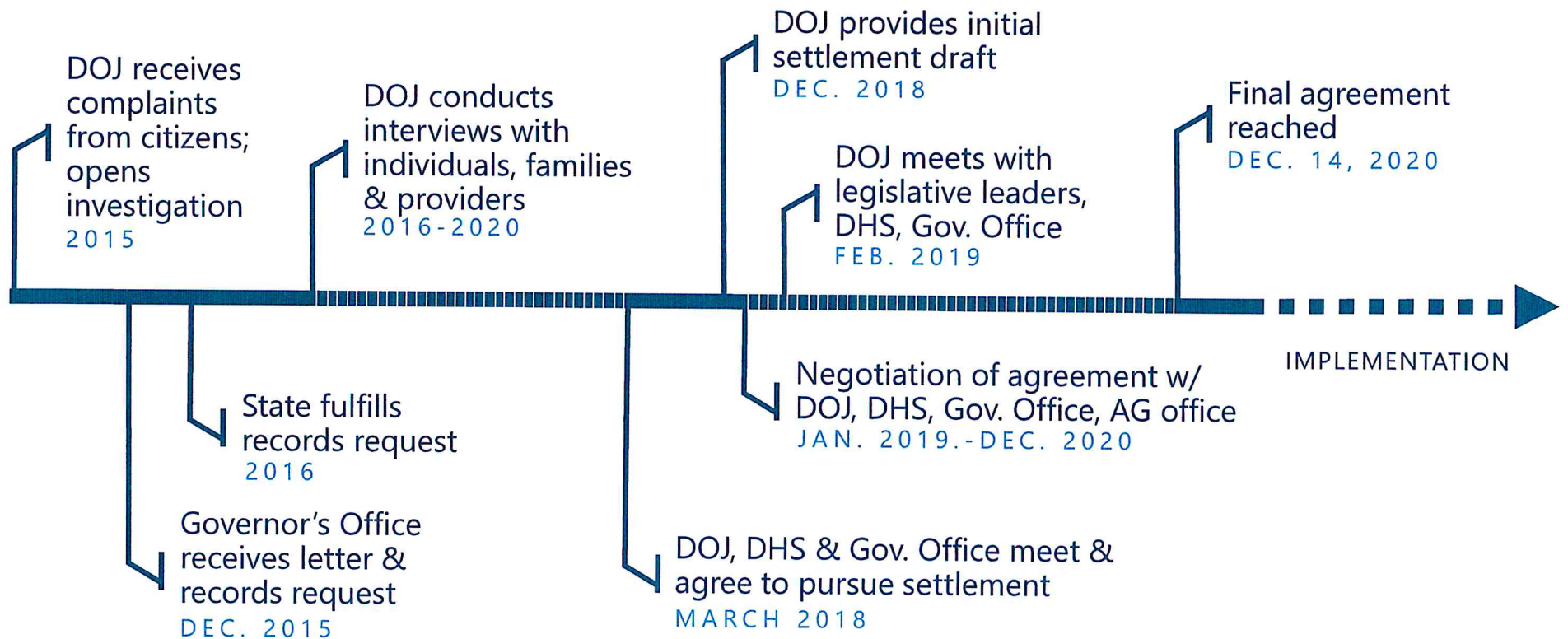
## **Effective Dec. 14, 2020**

*Agreement will terminate eight years after effective date if Parties agree that the state has attained substantial compliance with all provisions and maintained that compliance for a period of one year.*

# VARIETY OF CONCERNS

## EXAMPLES PROVIDED BY DOJ

 **Unnecessary segregation** of disabled individuals in skilled nursing facilities

Adults in skilled nursing facilities who would **rather be in their community** 

 **Imbalance of funds** to skilled nursing facilities and community-based services

**Lack of awareness** about existing transition services and available tools 



# KEY TERMS | DOJ Settlement Americans with Disabilities Act

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requires public agencies to **eliminate unnecessary segregation** of persons with disabilities and provide services in the **most integrated setting appropriate** to the needs of the individual.

In **1999** the Federal Supreme Court **Olmstead** decision **affirmed** the **ADA** requirements.





# WHO ARE WE TRYING TO REACH?

## Target population

### Basic Eligibility

- Individual with physical disability
- Over age 21
- Eligible or likely to become eligible to receive Medicaid long-term services and supports (LTSS)
- Is likely to require LTSS for at least 90 days.



### IF in skilled nursing setting

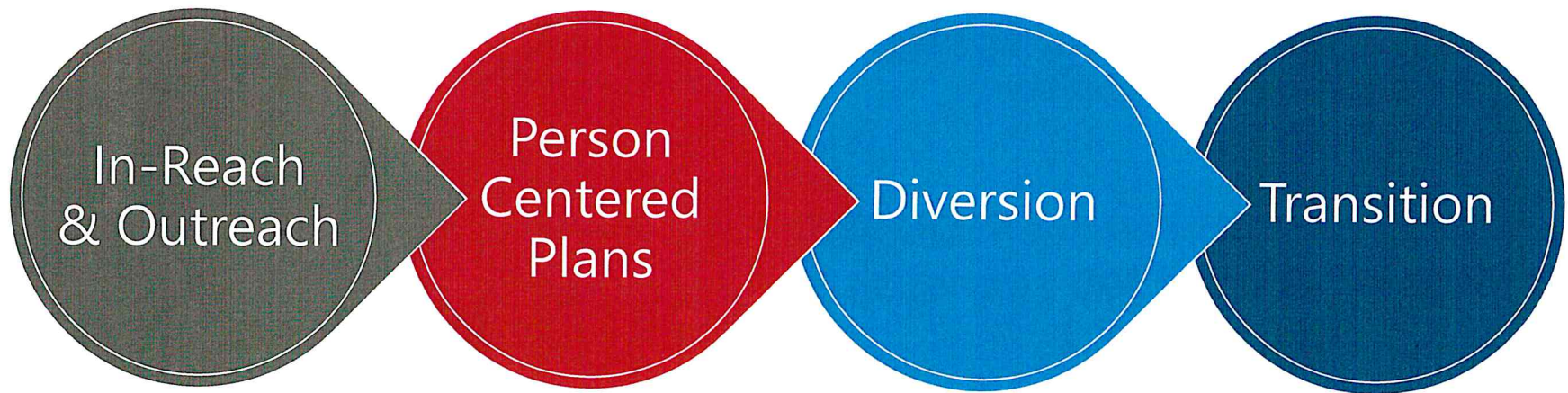
- Receive Medicaid-funded nursing facility services AND
  - Likely to require long term services and supports
- Receive nursing facility services AND
  - Likely to become eligible for Medicaid within 90 days, have submitted a Medicaid application, and have approval for a long-term nursing facility stay

### IF in hospital or home setting

- Referred for a nursing facility level of care determination AND
  - Likely to need services long term
- Need services to continue living in the community AND
  - Currently have a HCBS Case Manager or have contacted the ADRL

# New Target Population Members (TPMs) Receiving HCBS that were DIVERTED from a SNF

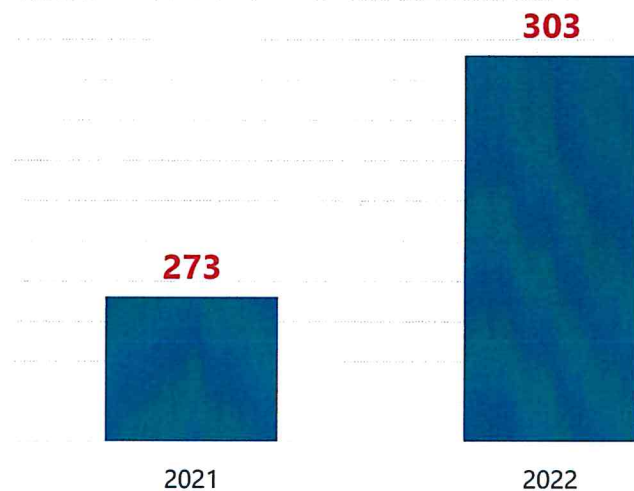
“**Diversion**” happens when a Medicaid eligible individual who screens at a nursing facility level of care receives a set of services (HCBS, housing etc.) that allows them to remain in an integrated setting and avoid institutionalization.

DOJ Settlement Agreement **REQUIRED**  
ND to **divert at least 100** individuals by  
Dec. 13, 2022.

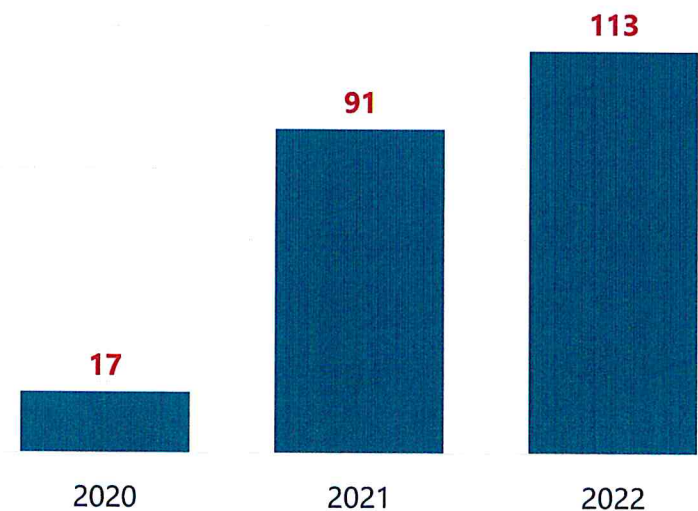
## TPMs who Transitioned to an Integrated Setting

**“Transition”** happens when a Medicaid eligible individual who resides at a nursing facility receives transition supports and a set of services (HCBS, housing etc.) that allows them to move to an integrated setting in the community.

**DOJ Settlement Agreement**  
**REQUIRED** ND to transition at least 100 individuals by Dec. 13, 2022.

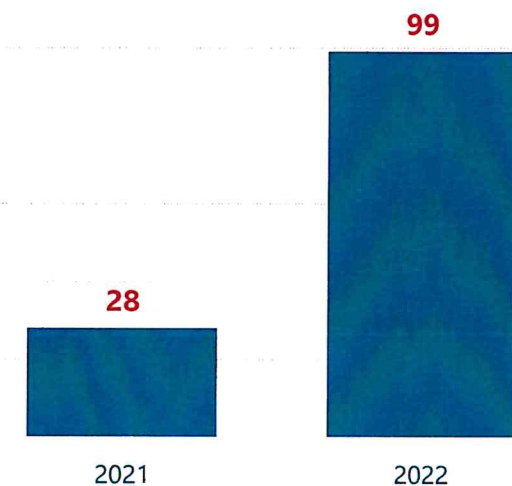
## TPMs Receiving Permanent Supported Housing

**“Permanent Supported Housing”** is providing affordable housing, rental assistance, meeting with landlords, application assistance etc., in addition to other traditional HCBS that allows an individual to live in a private residence alone or with family, their significant other or roommates of their choosing.

**DOJ Settlement Agreement REQUIRED**  
**ND to provide this service to**  
20 individuals by Dec. 13, 2021, and  
30 individuals by Dec. 13, 2022

## TPM Accessing Various Forms of Rental Help

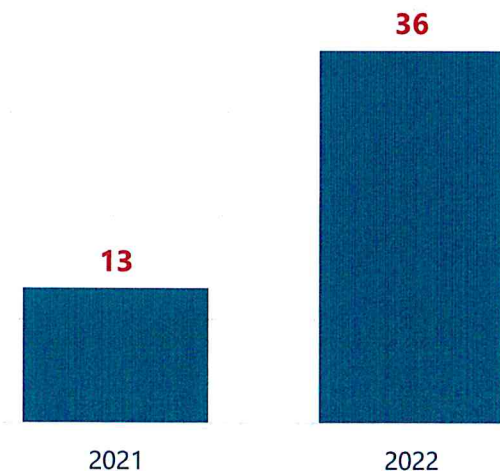
**“Rental assistance”** is assisting individuals in paying for affordable housing in the community and may also involve paying for affordable housing costs during an institutional stay, so the individual does not lose their place to live in the community.

2021-2023 approved budget included \$300,000 to fund approx. 375 months of housing assistance over the course of the biennium.

# Continued progress requires additional investment in HCBS

- Increase daily rates paid for adult foster care and family home care;
- QSP Agency on-call staff;
- Bed hold days for residential habilitation and community supports;
- Base rate for personal care services;
- Increase the senior meal rate- Reimburse for 2 home-delivered meals/ day (up from 1);
- Add companionship to SPED & EX-SPED;
- Inclusion of 1 FTE for the DOJ settlement agreement specialist;
- Increase FTE capacity to deliver HCBS case management and keep up with growing demand;
- Increase guardian establishment funds.

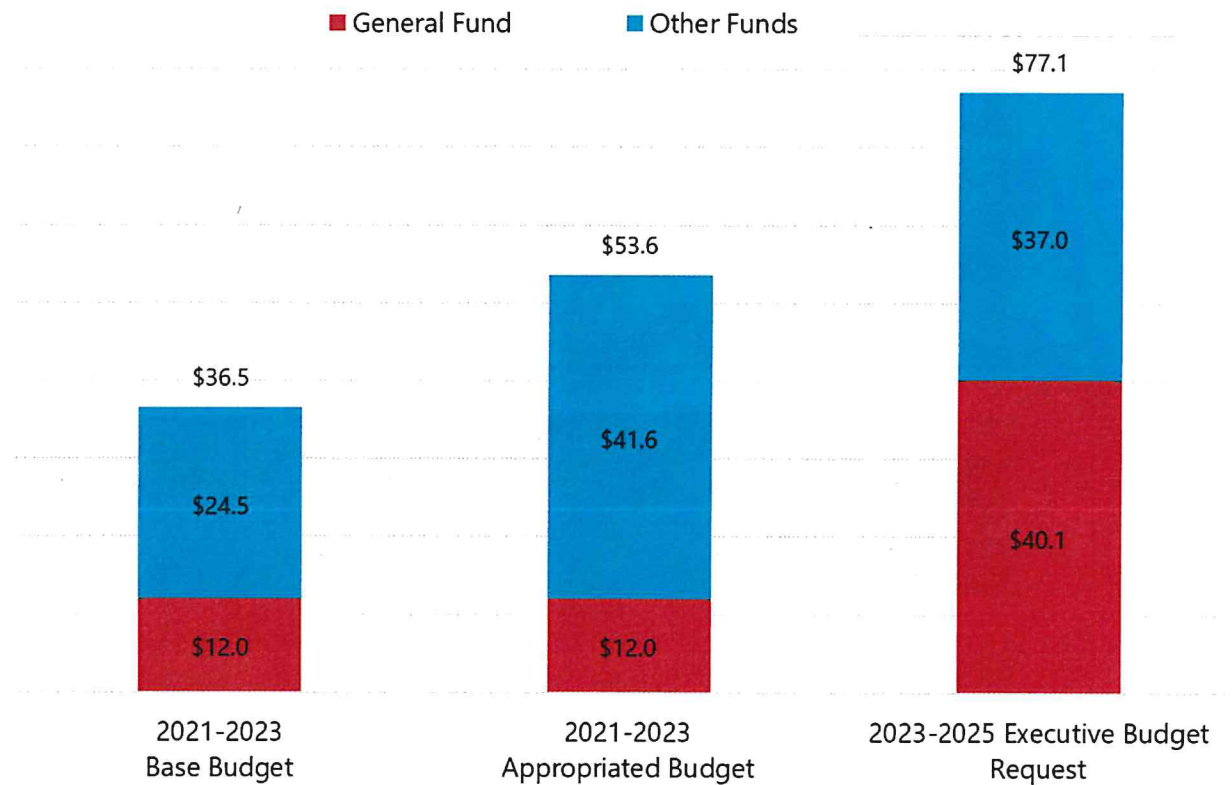

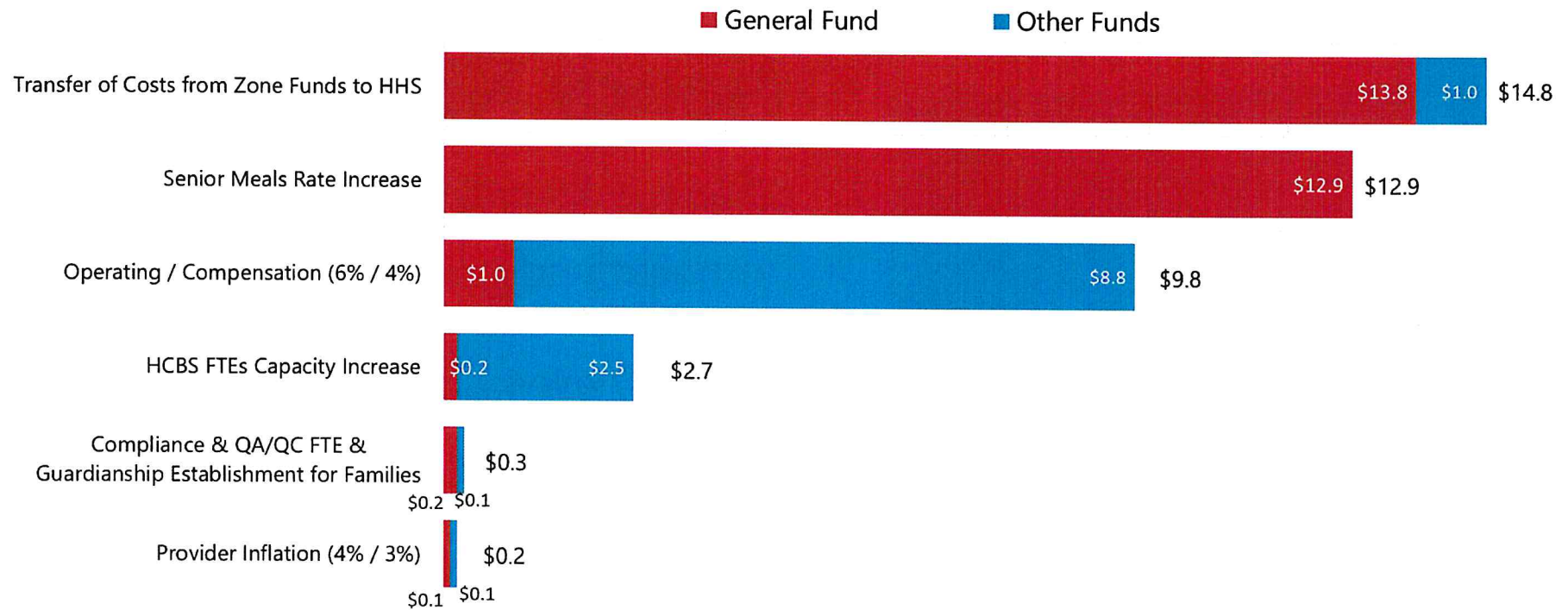
