PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO FIRST ENGROSSMENT

ENGROSSED HOUSE BILL NO. 1351

A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new section to chapter 12.1-27.1 of the North Dakota
Century Code, relating to prohibiting sexually explicit deep fake videos and images; to amend
and reenact section 12.1-32-15 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to sexual offenders
and registration requirements; and to provide a penalty for an Act to amend and reenact
subsection 13 of section 12.1-27.1-01 and section 12.1-27.1-03.3 of the North Dakota Century
Code, relating to sexually expressive images; and to provide a penalty.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

8 SECTION 1. A new section to chapter 12.1-27.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is 9 created and enacted as follows: 10 Sexually explicit deep fake videos or images prohibited - Penalty - Civil action. 11 As used in this section: 12 "Sexual performance" means any performance that includes sexual conduct. 13 "Sexually explicit deep fake video or image" means any video recording, motion-14 picture film, electronic image, or photograph created with the intent to deceive, 15 which appears to depict an individual engaging in sexual conduct or a sexual 16 performance that did not occur in reality or that the individual did not actually 17 perform, and whose appearance in the video recording, motion-picture film, 18 electronic image, or photograph is a result of digitization.

2		promote, advertise, sell, exhibit, broadcast, or transmit a sexually explicit deep fake
3		<u>video or image.</u>

5		of this section has a cause of action against the person if the person produced,
6		possessed, distributed, promoted, advertised, sold, exhibited, broadcasted, or

14		plaintiff's name and other identifying characteristics.
15		c. The court may make further orders as necessary to protect the identity and
16		privacy of a plaintiff.
17	<u>4.</u>	In an action under subsection 4, a prevailing plaintiff may recover:
18		a. The greater of:
19		(1) Economic and noneconomic damages proximately caused by the
20		defendant's violation of this section, including damages for emotional
21		distress whether or not accompanied by other damages; or
22		(2) Statutory damages not to exceed ten thousand dollars against each
23		defendant found liable under this section;
24		b. An amount equal to any monetary gain made by the defendant from the
25		distribution, promotion, advertising, sale, exhibition, broadcasting, or transmission
26		of the sexually explicit deep fake video or image; and
27		<u>c. Exemplary damages.</u>
28	<u>5.</u>	In an action under subsection 4, the court may award a prevailing plaintiff:
29		a. Reasonable attorney's fees and costs; and
30		b. Other remedies available by law, including injunctive relief.

2	federal law or a law of this state other than this section.
3	SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 12.1-32-15 of the North Dakota Century Code is
4	amended and reenacted as follows:
5	— 12.1-32-15. Offenders against children and sexual offenders - Sexually violent
6	predators - Registration requirement - Penalty.
7	— 1. As used in this section:
8	a. "A crime against a child" means a violation of chapter 12.1-16, section
9	12.1-17-01.1 if the victim is under the age of twelve, 12.1-17-02, 12.1-17-04,
10	subdivision a of subsection 6 of section 12.1-17-07.1, section 12.1-18-01,
11	12.1-18-02, 12.1-18-05, chapter 12.1-29, or section 14-09-22, subsection 3 of
12	section 12.1-41-02, subsection 3 of section 12.1-41-03, or an equivalent offense
13	from another court in the United States, a tribal court, or court of another country,
14	in which the victim is a minor or is otherwise of the age required for the act to be
15	a crime or an attempt or conspiracy to commit these offenses.
16	b. "Department" means the department of corrections and rehabilitation.
17	c. "Homeless" means an individual who is physically present in this state, but is
18	living in a park, under a bridge, on the streets, in a vehicle or camper, or is
19	otherwise without a traditional dwelling, and also one who resides in this state but
20	does not maintain a permanent address. The term does not include individuals
21	who are temporarily domiciled or individuals residing in public or private shelters
22	that provide temporary living accommodations.
23	d. "Mental abnormality" means a congenital or acquired condition of an individual
24	that affects the emotional or volitional capacity of the individual in a manner that
25	predisposes that individual to the commission of criminal sexual acts to a degree
26	that makes the individual a menace to the health and safety of other individuals.
27	e. "Predatory" means an act directed at a stranger or at an individual with whom a
28	relationship has been established or promoted for the primary purpose of
29	victimization.
30	f. "Reside" means to live permanently or be situated for a considerable time in a
31	home or a particular place.

1	g. "Sexual offender" means a person who has pled guilty to or been found guilty,
2	including juvenile delinquent adjudications, of a violation of section 12.1-20-03,
3	12.1-20-03.1, 12.1-20-04, 12.1-20-05, 12.1-20-05.1, 12.1-20-06, 12.1-20-06.1,
4	12.1-20-07 except for subdivision a of subsection 1, 12.1-20-11, 12.1-20-12.1,
5	12.1-20-12.2, 12.1-20-12.3 except for subdivision a of subsection 1 and
6	subdivision b of subsection 1 if the offense involves only a demand for money,
7	section 1 of this Act, chapter 12.1-27.2, subsection 2 of section 12.1-22-03.1,
8	subdivision b of subsection 1 of section 12.1-41-02, section 12.1-41-04,
9	12.1-41-05, or 12.1-41-06, or an equivalent offense from another court in the
10	United States, a tribal court, or court of another country, or an attempt or
11	conspiracy to commit these offenses.
12	h. "Sexually dangerous individual" means an individual who meets the definition
13	specified in section 25-03.3-01.
14	i. "Temporarily domiciled" means staying or being physically present in this state for
15	more than thirty days in a calendar year or at a location for longer than ten-
16	consecutive days, attending school for longer than ten days, or maintaining
17	employment in the jurisdiction for longer than ten days, regardless of the state of
18	the residence.
19	2. The court shall impose, in addition to any penalty provided by law, a requirement that
20	the individual register, within three days of coming into a county in which the individual
21	resides, is homeless, or within the period identified in this section that the individual
22	becomes temporarily domiciled. The individual must register with the chief of police of
23	the city of the individual's place of residence, or the sheriff of the county if the
24	individual resides in an area other than a city. A homeless individual shall register
25	every three days with the sheriff or chief of police of the jurisdiction in which the
26	individual is physically present. The court shall require an individual to register by
27	stating this requirement on the court records, if that individual:
28	a. Has pled guilty or nolo contendere to, or been found guilty as a felonious sexual
29	offender or an attempted felonious sexual offender, including juvenile delinquent
30	adjudications of equivalent offenses unless the offense is listed in subdivision c.

1	————b.	Has pled guilty or nolo contendere to, or been found guilty as a sexual offender
2		for, a misdemeanor or attempted misdemeanor. The court may deviate from
3		requiring an individual to register if the court first finds the individual is no more
4		than three years older than the victim if the victim is a minor, the individual has
5		not previously been convicted as a sexual offender or of a crime against a child,
6		and the individual did not exhibit mental abnormality or predatory conduct in the
7		commission of the offense.
8	С.	Is a juvenile found delinquent under subdivision d of subsection 1 of section
9		12.1-20-03, subdivision a of subsection 2 of section 12.1-20-03, or as a sexual
10		offender for a misdemeanor. The court may deviate from requiring the juvenile to
11		register if the court first finds the juvenile has not previously been convicted as a
12		sexual offender or for a crime against a child, and the juvenile did not exhibit
13		mental abnormality or predatory conduct in the commission of the offense.
14	————d.	Has pled guilty or nolo contendere to, or been found guilty of, a crime against a
15		child or an attempted crime against a child, including juvenile delinquent
16		adjudications of equivalent offenses. Except if the offense is described in section-
17		12.1-29-02, or section 12.1-18-01 or 12.1-18-02 and the person is not the parent
18		of the victim, the court may deviate from requiring an individual to register if the
19		court first finds the individual has not previously been convicted as a sexual
20		offender or for a crime against a child, and the individual did not exhibit mental
21		abnormality or predatory conduct in the commission of the offense.
22	е.	Has pled guilty or nolo contendere, been found guilty, or been adjudicated
23		delinquent of any crime against another individual which is not otherwise
24		specified in this section if the court determines that registration is warranted by
25		the nature of the crime and therefore orders registration for the individual. If the
26		court orders an individual to register as an offender under this section, the
27		individual shall comply with all of the registration requirements in this chapter.
28	— 3. If a	court has not ordered an individual to register in this state, an individual who
29	resi	des, is homeless, or is temporarily domiciled in this state shall register if the
30	indi	vidual:

forty-five days before the scheduled release of that individual. The attorney general

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shall forward one copy to the law enforcement agency having jurisdiction where the individual expects to reside, attend school, or work upon discharge, parole, or release, one copy to the prosecutor who prosecuted the individual, and one copy to the court inwhich the individual was prosecuted. All forms must be transmitted and received bythe law enforcement agency, prosecutor, and court thirty days before the discharge, parole, or release of the individual.

- An individual who is required to register pursuant to this section who is released onprobation or discharged upon payment of a fine must, before the release or discharge, be informed of the duty to register under this section by the court in which that individual is convicted. The court shall require the individual to read and sign a form asrequired by the attorney general, stating that the duty of the individual to register underthis section has been explained to that individual. The court shall obtain the addresswhere the individual expects to reside, attend school, or work upon release or discharge and shall report the address to the attorney general within three days. The court shall give one copy of the form to the individual and shall send two copies to the attorney general. The attorney general shall forward one copy to the appropriate lawenforcement agency having jurisdiction where the individual expects to reside, attendschool, or work upon discharge, parole, or release.
 - Registration consists of a written or electronic statement signed by the individual, giving the information required by the attorney general, and the biometric data and photograph of the individual. An individual who is not required to provide a sample of blood and other body fluids under section 31-13-03 or by the individual's state or court of conviction or adjudication shall submit a sample of blood and other body fluids forinclusion in a centralized database of DNA identification records under section-31-13-05. The collection, submission, testing and analysis of, and records produced from, samples of blood and other body fluids, are subject to chapter 31-13. Evidenceof the DNA profile comparison is admissible in accordance with section 31-13-02. A report of the DNA analysis certified by the state crime laboratory is admissible inaccordance with section 31-13-05. A district court shall order an individual who refuses to submit a sample of blood or other body fluids for registration purposes to show cause at a specified time and place why the individual should not be required to-

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submit the sample required under this subsection. Within three days after registration, the registering law enforcement agency shall forward the statement, biometric data, and photograph to the attorney general and shall submit the sample of the individual'sblood and body fluids to the state crime laboratory. If an individual required to registerunder this section has a change in vehicle or computer online identity, the individualshall register, within three days after the change, with the law enforcement agencyhaving local jurisdiction of the individual's place of residence of the individual's newvehicle or computer online identity. If an individual required to register pursuant to thissection has a change in name, school, or residence or employment address, that individual shall register, at least ten days before the change, with the law enforcementagency having local jurisdiction of the individual's place of residence of the individual'snew name, school, residence address, or employment address. A change in school oremployment address includes the termination of school or employment for which anindividual required to register under this section, the individual shall register withinthree days of the termination with the law enforcement agency having local jurisdictionof the individual's place of residence. The law enforcement agency, within three daysafter receipt of the information, shall forward it to the attorney general. The attorney general shall forward the appropriate registration data to the law enforcement agency having local jurisdiction of the new place of residence, school, or employment. Upon a change of address, the individual required to register also shall register within threedays at the law enforcement agency having local jurisdiction of the new place of residence. If an individual required to register in North Dakota, including in a tribalregistry, resides in another state or on tribal lands, that individual shall registeremployment and school addresses and any changes in required registration information with the law enforcement agency having local jurisdiction over the schoolor employment address. The individual registering under this section shall periodicallyconfirm the information required under this subsection in a manner and at an intervaldetermined by the attorney general. A law enforcement agency that has previously registered an offender may omit the biometric data portion of the registration if that agency has a set of biometric data on file for that individual and is personally familiar-

1		this section. The juvenile courts or the agency having legal custody of a juvenile
2		shall provide the attorney general any information, including the offender's level
3		of risk and supporting documentation, concerning juveniles required to register
4		and who are about to be released or placed into the community.
5		d. The attorney general shall notify the offender of the risk level assigned to that
6		offender. An offender may request a review of that determination with the attorney
7		general's sexual offender risk assessment committee and may present any
8		information that the offender believes may lower the assigned risk level.
9	13.	An individual assessed as a high-risk sexual offender in accordance with
10		subsection 12, may not reside within five hundred feet [152.4 meters] of a public or
11		nonpublic preschool or elementary, middle, or high school.
12	14.	Relevant and necessary conviction and registration information must be disclosed to
13		the public by a law enforcement agency if the individual is a moderate or high risk and
14		the agency determines that disclosure of the conviction and registration information is
15		necessary for public protection. The attorney general shall develop guidelines for
16		public disclosure of offender registration information. Public disclosure may include
17		internet access if the offender:
18		a. Is required to register for a lifetime under subsection 8;
19		b. Has been determined to be a high risk to the public by the department, the
20		attorney general, or the courts, according to guidelines developed by those
21		agencies; or
22		c. Has been determined to be a high risk to the public by an agency of another state
23		or the federal government.
24		If the offender has been determined to be a moderate risk, public disclosure must
25		include, at a minimum, notification of the offense to the victim registered under chapter
26		12.1-34 and to any agency, civic organization, or group of persons who have-
27		characteristics similar to those of a victim of the offender. Upon request, law-
28		enforcement agencies may release conviction and registration information regarding-
29		low-risk, moderate-risk, or high-risk offenders.
30	15.	A state officer, law enforcement agency, or public school district or governing body of a
31		nonpublic school or any appointee, officer, or employee of those entities is not subject

- to civil or criminal liability for making risk determinations, allowing a sexual offender to attend a school function under section 12.1-20-25, or for disclosing or for failing to disclose information as permitted by this section.
- offender or as an offender against a child under this section, the juvenile shall comply with the registration requirements in this section. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a law enforcement agency shall register a juvenile offender in the same manner as adult offenders and may release any relevant and necessary information on file to other law enforcement agencies, the department of health and human services, or the public if disclosure is necessary to protect public health or safety. The law enforcement agency shall release any relevant and necessary information on file to the superintendent or principal of the school the juvenile attends. The school administration shall notify others in similar positions if the juvenile transfers to another learning institution in or outside the state.
- 17. If an individual has been required to register as a sexual offender or an offender against a child under section 12.1-32-15 or former section 27-20-52.1 before August 1, 1999, the individual may petition the court to be removed from the offender list if registration is no longer mandatory for that individual. In considering the petition, the court shall comply with the requirements of this section.
- 18. A sexual offender who is currently assigned a moderate or high-risk level by the attorney general may not use a state park of this state as a residence or residential address to comply with the registration requirements of this section. Before arriving at a state park for overnight lodging or camping, a sexual offender who is assigned a moderate or high-risk level by the attorney general shall notify a parks and recreation department law enforcement officer at the state park where the sexual offender will be staying.
- 19. When an individual who is required to register pursuant to this section plans to travel outside of the United States, at least twenty-one days before the intended travel, the individual shall inform the agency with which the individual last registered the individual's residence address the details of the intended travel. Upon receipt of the

information from the registering law enforcement agency, the attorney general shall report the travel to the United States marshal service.

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Subsection 13 of section 12.1-27.1-01 of the North Dakota

Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

 13. As used in this chapter, "sexually expressive image" means a <u>real, altered, or computer-generated</u> photograph or visual representation that exhibits a nude or partially denuded human figure, as defined in section 12.1-27.1-03.1, or sexual conduct.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 12.1-27.1-03.3 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

12.1-27.1-03.3. Creation, possession, or dissemination of sexually expressive images prohibited - Exception <u>- Civil action</u>.

- 1. A person is guilty of a class A misdemeanor if, knowing of its character and content, that person:
 - a. Without written consent from each individual who has a reasonable expectation
 of privacy in the image, surreptitiously creates or willfully possesses a sexually
 expressive image that was surreptitiously created; or
 - b. Distributes or publishes, electronically or otherwise, a sexually expressive image with the intent to cause emotional harm or humiliation to any individual depicted in the sexually expressive image who has a reasonable expectation of privacy in the image, or after being given notice by an individual or parent or guardian of the individual who is depicted in a sexually expressive image that the individual, parent, or guardian does not consent to the distribution or publication of the sexually expressive image.
- 2. A person is guilty of a class B misdemeanor if, knowing of its character and content, that person acquires and knowingly distributes any sexually expressive image that was created without the consent of the subject of the image.
- 3. This section does not authorize any act prohibited by any other law. If the sexually expressive image is of a minor and possession does not violate section 12.1-27.2-04.1, a parent or guardian of the minor may give permission for a person to possess or distribute the sexually expressive image.

1 This section does not apply to any book, photograph, video recording, motion picture 2 film, or other visual representation sold in the normal course of business through 3 wholesale or retail outlets that possess a valid sales tax permit or used by an attorney, 4 attorney's agent, or any other person obtaining evidence for a criminal investigation or 5 pending civil action, or by a medical professional or a peace officer acting within that 6 individual's scope of employment. 7 Nothing in this section may be construed to impose liability on a provider of an 8 interactive computer service, as defined under 47 U.S.C. 230, or an information 9 service or telecommunication service, as defined under 47 U.S.C. 153, for content 10 provided by another person. 11 A depicted individual who is identifiable and who suffers harm from a person's violation 12 of this section has a cause of action against the person if the person produced, 13 possessed, distributed, promoted, advertised, sold, exhibited, broadcasted, or 14 transmitted the sexually expressive image for the purpose of sexual arousal, sexual 15 gratification, humiliation, degradation, or monetary or commercial gain. 16 The court may order the filing party to redact from all pleadings and documents 17 filed in the action other identifying characteristics of the plaintiff. 18 A party to whom subdivision a applies shall file with the court and serve on all 19 other parties a redacted and unredacted version of the filing and a confidential 20 information form that includes the redacted plaintiff's name and other identifying 21 characteristics. 22 The court may make further orders as necessary to protect the identity and 23 privacy of a plaintiff. 24 In an action under subsection 6, a prevailing plaintiff may recover: 25 The greater of: 26 Economic and noneconomic damages proximately caused by the (1) 27 defendant's violation of this section, including damages for emotional 28 distress whether or not accompanied by other damages; or 29 Statutory damages not to exceed ten thousand dollars against each 30 defendant found liable under this section;
