### **ENGROSSED SENATE BILL NO. 2015**

*In place of amendment (25.0182.03009) adopted by the House, Engrossed Senate Bill No. 2015 is amended by amendment (25.0182.03018) as follows:* 

- 1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of
- 2 corrections and rehabilitation; to authorize a line of credit; to provide a statement of legislative
- 3 <u>intent;</u> to provide for a report; to provide for a legislative management study; and to provide an
- 4 exemption.

## 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

6 SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds 7 as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state 8 treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from other funds derived from special funds and 9 federal funds, to the department of corrections and rehabilitation for the purpose of defraying 10 the expenses of the department of corrections and rehabilitation, for the biennium beginning 11 July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027, as follows:

11 The other funds line item in section 1 of this Act includes \$989.891 from federal funds or 12 proceeds from a line of credit for purchasing tasers, body cameras, and ballistic vests. If the 13 department of corrections and rehabilitation is unsuccessful in obtaining a federal grant of 14 \$989.891 for this purpose and notifies the office of management and budget that it will not 15 receive federal funds for this purpose during the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending 16 June 30, 2027, the department of corrections and rehabilitation may borrow up to \$989,891 17 through a line of credit from the Bank of North Dakota for the purchase of tasers, body cameras, 18 and ballistic vests during the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027. The 19 interest rate on the line of credit may not exceed the prevailing interest rate charged to North 20 Dakota governmental entities.
