- 1 A BILL for an Act to create and enact a new section to chapter 11-33, a new section to chapter
- 2 40-47, a new chapter to title 51, and a new section to chapter 58-03 of the North Dakota
- 3 Century Code, relating to blockchain technology and protection for digital asset mining.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

5 SECTION 1. A new section to chapter 11-33 of the North Dakota Century Code is created 6 and enacted as follows:

Protection for digital asset mining.

- 8 An individual may not be prohibited, restricted, or otherwise prevented from <u>1.</u> participating in digital asset mining in an area zoned for residential use if the individual 10 engaging in digital asset mining complies with all county noise ordinances.
- 11 In an area zoned for commercial use, a county may not: 2.
- 12 Place a limit on sound decibels generated from a digital asset mining business a. 13 which is more restrictive than limits imposed for sound pollution in that area 14 generally.
- 15 Place restrictions on a digital asset mining business which do not apply to other <u>b.</u> 16 businesses in that area.
- 17 Change the zoning of a digital asset mining business without providing notice and <u>C.</u> 18 an opportunity for comment.
- 19 A digital asset mining business may appeal a change in zoning to the district court. <u>3.</u>

2	<u>In th</u>	his chapter, unless the context of use clearly requires otherwise:				
3	<u>1.</u>	"Blockchain protocol" means any executable software deployed to a blockchain,				
4		including an additional standardized set of rules that use a previously existing				
5		blockchain as a base and which facilitate the transfer of data and electronic records				
6		and allow that data to be broadcast to nodes.				
7	<u>2.</u>	"Central bank digital currency" means a digital currency, a digital medium of exchange,				
8		or a digital monetary unit of account issued by the United States federal reserve				
9		system or a federal agency which is made directly available to institutions or				
10		consumers by those entities, or which is processed or validated directly by those				
11		entities. The term does not include a digital asset backed by legal tender or				
12		government treasuries and issued by a private entity.				
13	<u>3.</u>	"Digital asset" means virtual currency, cryptocurrencies, natively electronic assets,				
14		including stablecoins and nonfungible tokens, and other digital-only assets that confer				
15		economic, proprietary, or access rights or powers.				
16	<u>4.</u>	"Governing authority" means any state agency or board, commission, or department				
17		or any political subdivision.				
18	<u>5.</u>	"Hardware wallet" means a physical device that is not continuously connected to the				
19		internet and allows an individual to secure and transfer digital assets. The term				
20		includes a physical device under which the owner of digital assets retains independent				
21		control over the digital assets.				
22	<u>6.</u>	a. "Node" means a computational device that:				
23		(1) Communicates with other devices or participants on a blockchain to				
24		maintain consensus and integrity of that blockchain;				
25		(2) Creates and validates transaction blocks; or				
26		(3) Contains and updates a copy of a blockchain.				
27		b. A node does not exercise discretion over transactions initiated by the end user of				
28		the blockchain protocol.				
29	<u>7.</u>	"Self-hosted wallet" means a digital interface used to:				
30		a. Secure and transfer digital assets; and				

1		b. Retain independent control over the secured digital assets by the owner of the				
2		digital asset.				
3	<u>8.</u>	"Staking" means committing digital assets to a blockchain network to participate in the				
4		blockchain network's operations by validating transactions and securing the network.				
5	Pro	Prohibitions on use and testing of central bank digital currency.				
6	<u>1.</u>	A governing authority may not accept or require a payment using central bank digital				
7		<u>currency.</u>				
8	<u>2.</u>	A governing authority may not participate in any test of central bank digital currency by				
9		the board of governors of the federal reserve system or any branch or agency of the				
10		federal government.
