### 1 Testimony in Opposition to HB 1540

- 5 Chair Heinert, members of the committee, my name is Dr. Chris Larson, and I serve as the
- 6 Superintendent of Milnor Public School. I am also a member of the Legislative Focus Group for the
- 7 North Dakota Council of Educational Leaders (NDCEL). I appreciate the opportunity to testify in
- 8 **opposition** to HB 1540.

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### 9 **Constitutional Violations**

- 10 The North Dakota Constitution is clear:
- Article VIII, Section 5: "No money raised for the support of public schools shall be appropriated or used for the support of any sectarian school."
- Article X, Section 18: "Neither the state nor any political subdivision thereof shall make any direct or indirect appropriation or payment from any public fund ... in aid of any sectarian school, or for any other sectarian purpose."
- 16 By allowing public funds to be used for private school tuition, HB 1540 violates these constitutional

17 provisions. While families should have educational choices, **taxpayer dollars should not be used to** 

subsidize private or religious institutions. This bill opens the state to potential legal challenges,

19 creating **financial and operational instability** for North Dakota's education system.

## 20 Public Schools Serve All Students—Funding Must Reflect This Priority

North Dakota's public schools educate over 90% of the state's students, providing essential services
 such as:

- Special education for students with disabilities
- **Student transportation** to ensure equitable access
  - Mental health support and school counseling
  - Career and technical education (CTE) programs that build our workforce

Private schools and homeschool programs are not required to serve all students, yet this bill directs
public dollars toward these alternatives without requiring the same level of accountability.

- 29 Public schools have **fixed costs** that do not disappear when students leave for private institutions.
- 30 Reducing their funding while still expecting them to serve the most vulnerable students **jeopardizes the**
- 31 stability and quality of public education.

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#### **1 Public Funds Require Public Accountability**

2 HB 1540 raises serious concerns about accountability and state oversight of taxpayer dollars.

3	1.	Public	Schools Are State-Regulated; Private Schools Are Not
4		0	North Dakota's public schools must meet state curriculum standards, participate in
5			standardized testing, provide special education services, and undergo financial
6			audits.
7		0	Private schools do not have to follow these same requirements, yet HB 1540 allocates
8			taxpayer dollars to them without enforcing the same level of transparency.
9		0	If private schools accept public money, they should be subject to the same public
10			accountability measures.
11	2.	The St	tate Should Not Fund What It Cannot Oversee
12		0	If the state provides funding to private institutions, it <b>must</b> ensure those schools meet the
13			same standards for financial accountability, curriculum oversight, and student
14			performance.
15		0	HB 1540 lacks any provisions for state oversight of private institutions receiving
16			public funds, which means tax dollars could be spent without any guarantee of quality
17			education or fiscal responsibility.
18	3.	This <b>B</b>	Sill Creates a Double Standard
19		0	Public schools are held to strict financial and academic accountability measures
20			because they serve all students.
21		0	HB 1540 creates an inequitable system where private schools receive public money
22			without being required to meet the same standards.
23		0	If private schools are allowed to operate without state control, they should not receive
24			state funding.
25	The <b>P</b>	Precedo	ent Problem: Unintended Consequences of Funding Religious Schools
26			concerning aspect of HB 1540 is its long-term implications for how public funds could
27	be used	d to sup	port religious education in North Dakota.
28	1	State (	Support for Private Schools Must Be Neutral and Equitable
20	1.		If the state funds private religious schools, it must <b>do so without favoring one faith over</b>
30		0	another.
31		0	HB 1540 sets a precedent—if public dollars can be used for private Christian schools
32		0	today, they could just as easily be used for schools affiliated with any other religion in
33			the future.
34	2	This <b>B</b>	Sill Opens the Door to Unintended Consequences
35	4.	0	If passed, HB 1540 could require the state to fund private schools of all religious
36		Ű	backgrounds, including those that may not align with the values of the legislature or
37			the general public.

1	• Would the legislature be comfortable funding schools affiliated with non-traditional
2	or controversial belief systems?
3	• Once public funds are allocated to <b>private</b> religious institutions, the <b>state cannot</b>
4	discriminate in how those funds are distributed.
5	3. Potential Legal and Constitutional Challenges
6	• Funding <b>only</b> certain religious schools while denying others could lead to <b>legal</b>
7	challenges on the grounds of religious discrimination.
8	• Courts have ruled that if a state provides public funds to religious schools, it cannot
9	exclude any religion without violating First Amendment protections.
10	• This could <b>force</b> the legislature to fund schools it may not intend to support.
11	Conclusion: Public Dollars Belong in Public Schools
12 13	Public education is the <b>foundation of North Dakota's workforce and economy</b> . The students in our public schools today will be the teachers, nurses, engineers, and business leaders of tomorrow.
14	Rather than diverting public funds toward private schools, the state should:
15 16 17	<ul> <li>Fully fund public schools to ensure all students have access to a high-quality education.</li> <li>Expand career and technical education (CTE) programs to prepare students for high-demand jobs.</li> </ul>
18	• Increase mental health services to support student well-being.
19 20	If the state <b>cannot regulate, audit, or mandate accountability in private education, then it should not be funding it.</b>
21 22 23 24	Furthermore, HB 1540 sets a dangerous precedent that could lead to unintended consequences regarding which private institutions receive public funding. This bill, if enacted, could force the state to provide funding for schools it may not have intended to support—raising significant legal and constitutional concerns.
25 26	For these reasons, I strongly urge this committee to <b>reject HB 1540</b> in its current form or <b>remove the private school tuition reimbursement provision</b> to align it with the North Dakota Constitution.
