Chairman Klemin and Members of the House Judiciary Committee,

I write today in adamant opposition to SB 2307.

Professional Librarians are educated and trained to maintain library books in a manner that respects citizens and their right to freedom of expression. Do not make it their job to censor what children and/or students read. Clearly parents should be setting their own expectations and boundaries for their own children not the ND government.

There is educational value to an exposure to a wide range of controversial and challenging range of ideas. This helps young people develop critical thinking skills to analyze and question rather than take things at face value. A diverse selection of books teaches people about the very diversity of the human experience, eliminates stereotypes, promotes empathy and understanding feom those different from us. Parents who actually take an active role in their children's learning should not have their right to make informed choices to guide their children taken away.
