It is not my legislators' job to govern what is in my library for my children's perusal. If I feel something's inappropriate, I can put it back and tell my children NO. It's my job as their parent. If I feel it's too mature for an area of my library, I can do a reconsideration and ask librarians to think about moving it. That is the LIBRARIAN's job. Reconsideration policies are in every ND library!

Minors and sex and what is appropriate has been a divisive subject. Some would have that no mention of sex, body parts, or childbirth be mentioned. Let's not ever say the word "period" or especially "menstruation". Others have a more open policy, understanding that our children have eyes and can clearly see their own bodies and have questions about them.
