I am testifying in OPPOSITION of SB 2307.

Libraries, particularly those in small towns, are struggling to survive. Space is limited (most are in a single room) and professional librarians are in short supply. Now, the state wants to make their jobs more difficult by placing random qualifications on the material they MAY possess, costing the taxpayers additional dollars.

Most legislators have a cell phone. Most legislators have internet service and computers. I would bet at least one of these devices is open on your desk now. A vast majority of minors have access to these devices. Most of them OWN their own cell phones.
