

Testimony in Opposition to SB2307 Presented to the Senate Judiciary Committee Prepared by Jenna Kahly, Library Director, West Fargo Public Library Friday, Feb. 7, 2025

- 1 Senator Dianne Larson, Chair and members of the Judiciary Committee,
- 2 I am writing to express my strong opposition to Senate Bill 2307. I have worked in libraries for 20
- 3 years in various roles at every level. What I've learned during that time is that every person who
- 4 enters a library has their own goals, values, and needs. We, as librarians, are doing our job well
- 5 when we connect people with the most appropriate information, media, and entertainment for
- 6 their unique situations.
- 7 Library workers take seriously our responsibility to protect and enrich the lives of children. We also
- 8 take seriously the responsibility of ensuring all members of our community have access to a
- 9 comprehensive collection of materials, resources, and opportunities that help them achieve
- 10 their goals, strengthen our communities, and promote lifelong learning.
- 11 In recent years, our library has seen significant growth in usage, with more people using
- 12 traditional library services than ever before. Circulation has increased more than 61% since 2019.
- 13 In 2024, nearly 70% of our circulation was of traditional physical library materials checked out
- 14 from our building.
- 15 Our residents trust and love their librarians and place value on access to knowledge, literacy
- 16 programs, and the public services that our library provides. We do our job well.
- 17 The West Fargo Public Library has robust policies and procedures in place to ensure materials in
- 18 our popular collection are carefully curated, appropriate for our library, and placed in the
- 19 proper collection.
- 20 Before an item is placed in our collection, it goes through multiple levels of review by our team
- 21 of professionals following professional standards and our Collection Management Policy.
- 22 Materials are regularly reviewed while they are in our collection, as they are checked in and
- 23 during our weeding process.
- 24 Our robust policies and procedures include a formal request for reconsideration process. In the
- 25 last 8+ years, we have not received a single request for reconsideration voicing opposition to an
- 26 item from our residents or library users. Our patrons have confidence in our staff and collection
- 27 management processes. They continue to use the library more than ever before. Our policies
- and procedures are working as written.
- 29 This legislation would impose unnecessary barriers and financial implications for libraries like West
- 30 Fargo Public Library, which already have policies in place for collection management and are
- 31 doing our job well. Changes would cause significant and costly burdens on our library, added
- 32 barriers for residents, unnecessary structural changes to our humble facility, and limitations on
- resources available to our growing patron base.

- To comply with the bill, all youth and adult materials must be physically separated. Doing this in our library would result in:
 - At least a 25% reduction in non-youth materials to allow all of them to fit upstairs
 - Significant construction or renovation costs to create a physical barrier to stop kids from being able to have access upstairs
 - Youth being denied access to upstairs, which means no youth programs will be permitted in our meeting rooms
 - Youth being denied access to public computers, as they may need to move upstairs as well, into one of our meeting rooms
- Implementing this bill would create a domino effect of issues with accessibility for patrons, especially elderly patrons, those with mobility issues, and families.
 - To ensure children cannot go upstairs using our elevator, it would need to be operated by staff key access only, which means adults with mobility issues needing to get upstairs will require a staff person to accompany them.
 - Children and families may not have access to a restroom when visiting the library, as our primary restrooms are upstairs. Downstairs restroom access could be lost at any time, as those bathrooms are not part of the library's lease and belong to the school.
 - Parents will no longer be able to have their child with them when browsing the adult collection. This is unsafe and a violation of our unattended child policy.
 - The bill's language would require significant investment in changes to electronic resources or would prevent us from offering them at all.
 - A recent quote to provide age verification to some of our databases like Libby/Overdrive would cost \$4500 just for the first year, with annual subscription costs increasing overtime.
 - Significant cost of the required age-verification software to continue offering Libby/OverDrive would result in the reduction of other library services and funds for programs like our Summer Reading Program for children.
 - In conclusion, the West Fargo Public Library is an example of one of hundreds of North Dakota libraries that already implement strong policies and are trusted by taxpayers but would greatly suffer if this bill was enacted.
 - As a Library Director and a mother, I firmly believe that this bill would not enhance child protection but would instead create unnecessary barriers to access, eliminate essential library services, and disrupt the very structure that makes the local library a welcoming place for all.
- I urge a Do Not Pass on this bill. Please allow libraries to continue serving our communities effectively and efficiently, as we currently do. Thank you for your time and consideration.
