Chair Lee and Committee Members: I am Katie Fitzsimmons and I serve as the Director of Student Affairs for the North Dakota University System. I am here on behalf of Dr. Richard Rothaus, the Vice Chancellor of Academic and Student Affairs, to provide information on educational curriculum for each counseling-related program at the institutions of higher education in our state and information regarding the percentage of students who begin a counseling program but do not complete said program.

We reached out to faculty and staff at Minot State University, North Dakota State University, and the University of North Dakota for insight. We worked from previously provided information (see attached chart) though we know it is not completely exhaustive for all related majors/courses of study in our state.

Providing an exact retention rate for specific undergraduate majors is difficult and at times, deceptive. For example, if we tracked all the incoming first-year students that declared psychology, social work, or addiction studies as a major and then followed to see if they graduated with that major, we will observe retention rates ranging from 20-40% across our state. That does not account for students that start as a psychology major and then switch to social work, or perhaps a different major in a related field that would produce the same workforce asset after graduation. Not to mention that over the course of a college career, an average college student will change his or her major a minimum of three times.

Knowing that, we looked to the data for a storyline. This is simply one snapshot in time to provide some perspective. We pulled data from the Fall of 2011-Spring 2017 (a 6-year graduation window) for full-time enrolled undergraduates at Minot State, NDSU, and UND. You have two tables in front of you. Table I follows students that declare psychology, social work, or addiction counseling as their incoming major (142 individuals) and then shows us what degree they walked across the stage to receive. Of those 142, 83 did not graduate. Of the 124 students that chose a psychology major, 36 graduated with a psychology major, but another six graduated in a related behavioral health field. Of important note, this data does not capture those that declared a psychology major their second semester, let alone their second year, or third, or fourth, etc. You can see how we are limited in tracking this data to a certain extent.

Table II shows the inverse. It details 135 students that graduated with psychology, addiction counseling, or social work majors but did not start with that major as a first year student. Students enrolled in everything from anthropology to zoology and landed in a more behavioral health related major. Again, this does not capture all of our students, but it offers a glimpse into what is happening on the undergraduate level.



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Minot State provided us with some data points that are not articulated on the above tables. From 2010-2018, they had 534 individuals declare social work as a major. 243 of those completed a bachelor degree (in a major other than social work) at Minot State; 223 completed a degree in social work (a retention rate within social work of 42%). The retention rate for psychology clocked in at 21% and addiction studies was at 27%. This data scoops up all students at once (not just first year, full time as the previous tables detailed); while there were 53 graduates in that time, there could still be 20 students awaiting graduation and still on track. Again, it serves as another snapshot in time.

For more data, I attached portions of the NDUS 2015-2016 Programs Completed Report. This does not provide an examination into retention, but it does offer some interesting numbers. 327 students graduated with a psychology-related major in 2016. 174 graduated with either a bachelor degree (98) or master degree (76) in social work. You can review the attachment for other programs of interest that I highlighted. This segues into a discussion about our graduate programs. The retention rate in our postgraduate programs is very high: 90% and up. Here is some feedback we received from NDSU and UND on the matter:

The Counselor Education Program at NDSU has two tracks in the master-level program: School Counseling and Clinical Mental Health Counseling. NDSU also offers a doctoral degree in Counselor Education and Supervision. The NDSU counseling program is the only CACREP accredited program in North Dakota, which is the most widely recognized and rigorous accreditation in the field. The LPC licensure requirements are modeled after CACREP standards. In many states a degree from a CACREP accredited program is the minimum requirement for licensure.

In addition to the knowledge base, the counseling tracks have rigorous clinical application requirements. The school counseling program is a 48-credit program that includes a 100 hour practicum and a 900-hour internship. The clinical mental health track in a 60-credit program also requires a 100-hour practicum and 900-hour internship. Students at NDSU complete their practicum at the in-house clinic, which serves the community. Internships take place at schools, universities, and mental health clinics. Clinical mental health counselors have additional training in psychopathology, diagnosis, trauma, and testing.

The master programs at NDSU always have many more applications than spots available for students. NDSU has rigorous standards and an in-depth interview process that includes role-play, individual, and group interviews. Because of the intense admission process it is very rare that a student does not complete the degree, perhaps one or two students every five years or so. This is typically due to life circumstances or health issues. We assess each student every semester and intervene as necessary to insure that students are well qualified and appropriate for human services work.

The doctoral degree is not a practice degree, but a research degree that prepares professional counselors to work in academia or take on leadership roles as professional counselors. The terminal degree for counseling practice (LPC/LPCC) is a master's degree. All students enrolled in the



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doctoral program already have a master's degree in counseling, and most are practicing counselors and school counselors.

UND's statistics:

Counseling Psychology PhD – 2009 to present, 2 of 49 left before graduation – 96% retention

Counseling, MA:

On-campus program in Addictions, Clinical Mental Health, or Rehab (emphasis areas) – retention rate is greater than 90%

On-line program in School Counseling – retention rate is generally greater than 90%; one cohort had a 40% attrition, due to extenuating circumstances that have been corrected Rehabilitation, BS – Students enter in 2nd or 3rd year and the overwhelming majority then complete, but current retention data is not available.

UND Graduate's Employment:

Counseling Psychology PhD – since implementing a Rural Psychology emphasis (beginning in 2010), the number of graduates who have stayed in or returned to ND has doubled. MA in Counseling (Addictions, CMHC, Rehab) – majority are employed in ND and MN, smaller numbers go on to PhD programs

MA in School Counseling - majority are in North Dakota, but the online program serves national and international audience; most are employed in small rural schools during the program

Other notes from UND:

- 1. Counseling Psychology/Counseling program faculty have obtained three training grants that emphasize interprofessional behavioral health training, placing students in teams across the state.
- 2. One of these grants also supported the development of a Telepsychology clinic, which can provide counseling to people throughout North Dakota.
- 3. Our training clinic serves more than 30 clients each week at a sliding scale fee that goes as low as \$2.00/session. The clinic has recently expanded its services to support NDUS students throughout the state, on campuses without a counseling center. Furthermore, though this is not related to curriculum or retention, one of the NDSU contacts (Dr. Jill Nelson, Associate Dean and Associate Professor) provided anecdotal insight into the shortage of counselors in practice from more of the "retention in the field" perspective. She writes: "Once a counselor graduates with her/his master's degree, they must go through the licensure process, which takes 2-3 years to do. They must first pass the NCE – National Counselor Exam -to be eligible to apply for licensure. NDSU has a 100% pass rate, I am not certain about other programs so I cannot say if this contributes to shortages.



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After passing the exam, they apply to be an LAPC – licensed associate professional counselor. As an LAPC you are required to work under the supervision on an LPCC who is also credentialed in supervision. There are very few people with this credential in the state, as the licensure board changed the requirement in 2016 and many who provide this supervision are no longer deemed qualified. This is especially true in rural areas.

In order to move from LAPC to LPC and LPCC, you must have 100 hours of clinical supervision over the course of two years. If new counselors are fortunate enough to secure a job where clinical supervision is provided, they can typically move through this process smoothly. If they are in a position where no clinical supervision by a qualified supervisor is provided, they must often pay for clinical supervision out-of-pocket at a rate of \$50-\$150 per hour. One key to career longevity in the counseling field is quality supervision, and when beginning counselors are unable to afford this supervision, they may give up on the field altogether.

Most beginning counselor salaries are quite low and only rise when LPC or LPCC is obtained. Insurance companies typically only reimburse practitioners at the LPCC. In some states, Medicaid reimburses counselors at the LAPC and LPC level; North Dakota is not one of those states. Beginning counselors are often only hired at agencies and inpatient settings because of billing limitations. These positions may be grant-funded, part time, or high burnout (especially inpatient work). If a counselor makes it through the first few years, they have a greater chance of maintaining a practice for many years. I hope this helps clarify what I see as some of the issues facing our very qualified graduates."



ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

This publication reports the data submitted to the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) by the postsecondary institutions of the North Dakota University System. The North Dakota University System acknowledges the efforts of each institution for the attention to detail reflected in the quality of these data.

METHODOLOGY

Degree completion data presented in this report summarizes the data reported by each NDUS, private, and tribal institution to the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) for the Summer 2015, Fall 2015, and Spring 2016 academic terms. Inclusive dates of degree completion are from July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016.

IPEDS reported data includes student program completion by Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) code and level of award (diploma, certificate, or degree). CIP codes were originally developed by the National Center for Educational Statistics (NCES) and consist of a taxonomy in which every postsecondary instructional program is classified by a six-digit code. CIP codes are used in this Programs Completed report to identify programs in which NDUS students were awarded diplomas, certificates, or degrees. The table below identifies the IPEDS award level for completed programs, as well as the corresponding abbreviation used in this report.

Total degrees completed reflects both first and second majors in cases where dual degrees were reported. In total, NDUS institutions awarded 10,534 degrees of which 10,245 were first majors and 289 were second majors. At private and tribal institutions, 1,429 degrees were awarded of which 1,337 were first majors and 92 were second majors.

Total program completion data is presented for the North Dakota University System. Additionally, there are collective summaries for Community Colleges, Regional Universities and Research Universities, as well as a breakdown summary for each of the eleven NDUS institutions. Private and tribal institutions collective totals as well as breakdown by institution are presented in the Appendix.
