Minutes:

A bill for an act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the veterans' home and department of veterans' affairs.

1A: 0.2 Chairman Svedjan called the hearing to order with all members present.

<u>1A: 0.8 Ray Harkema</u>, Commissioner of ND Veterans' Affairs, testified in favor of the bill and presented their budget requests. (See attached testimony.)

1A: 9.0 Rep. Svedjan asked if the department chose to take a portion or all of the bonuses to create a fund that was used for loan purposes. Mr. Harkema said that it was a portion of the funds that was given to them. Rep. Svedjan asked if the loans they provide are repaid in full. Mr. Harkema said that they have a 72% payback rate. Their loans are very well screened. They received 300 applications per year, but approve only 140 per year.

1A: 17.0 Ken Andersen, North Dakota Veterans' Home, testified in support of the bill. (See attached testimony.)
1A: 18.5 Jacie Grenier, North Dakota Veterans' Home, testified in support of the bill. (See attached testimony.)
1A: 32.2 There was a discussion regarding the 7% proposed pay increase for Veterans' Home nurses. Ms. Grenier said that they have had a difficult time recruiting qualified nurses at the current salary level.

1A: 41.0 Rep. Bernstein asked for further clarification on the \$15,000 requested funds for capital improvements. Mr. Andersen responded that there has been a great deal of leakage on the north side of the building. He also said that some of the floor tiles are breaking and coming off and need to be repaired and several rooms have not been painted in over 10 years.

<u>1B: 2.6 Rep. Hoffner</u> noted the \$467,000 increase in general funds. The department request was \$1,936,000. Rep. Hoffner asked for an explanation of the great increase in that area. A representative of OMB said that \$1.9 million is the 95% request, so the \$467,000 represents the OAR.

1B: 6.8 - 36.8 Several questions were posed and the chairman requested that additional information be provided to the committee.

Chairman Svedjan adjourned the hearing on HB 1007.

SENATOR NETHING: Opened the hearing on engrossed HB 1007; a BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the veterans home and department of veterans affairs.

VETERANS' HOME

KEN ANDERSON: Commandant of the ND Veterans Home, to testify in support of HB 1007. (testimony attached #1) (tape 5500)

JACIE GRENIER: To testify in support of HB 1007, stressing the need for nursing salaries (testimony attached #2) (tape 5800)

EMMY DOTZENROD-STRANDER: To testify in support of HB 1007 as it relates to nursing salaries (testimony attached #3) (tape 5956-end; tape 2, side B 0-125)

SENATOR NETHING: In the Legislative Council reported changes, in the differential there was a reduction of \$33,100. Is that what you're talking about?

EMMY DOTZENROD-STRANDER: I'm talking about the differential as well as the 7 or 10% salary increase. The Governor recommended a 7% increase; we requested a 10% increase.

SENATOR NETHING: The change the House made was the differential?

EMMY DOTZENROD-STRANDER: Yes, they made the differential as well as the 7% equity increase.

SENATOR ST. AUBYN: Why did you choose to do the sprinkler system now?

KEN ANDERSON: The Health Dept. safety inspector, during a recent health inspection, wrote us up and gave us until July 1 to make the changes. However, we can get an extension. We don't have any sprinklers in the old barracks. They consider our building as one; formerly they looked as the building as two. The first time it was brought up to me was after the State Architect was in the building, the next time when the Health Dept. came. They've been in our building about 7 times, including the original walk-through in 1991. The State Fire Marshall's Office did it for four years; then the Dept. of Health took over. We had a different inspector there this year. If we don't meet code, we lose Medicare and Medicaid.

SENATOR NETHING: What did the House do when you told them about this? (tape 460)

KEN ANDERSON: I wasn't here during that time, and didn't have time to really address it. It was put in the budget by OMB because of the State Architect.

SENATOR ROBINSON: The House increased special funds by over \$50,000 with a subsequent reduction to general funds. Where is that \$50,000 to come from? Have you applied for federal funds to help with the sprinkler?

KEN ANDERSON: We'll try to get federal funding from the VA. (tape 730)

SENATOR ROBINSON: Do you have another account to access for the \$50,000 plus?

KEN ANDERSON: I believe they wanted us to utilize some of what used to be called the Veterans Home Improvement fund which is now kind of our operating fund. But, we do have a certain amount of carryover. They want us to spend down that fund. If we have residents that have a higher amount of physical needs, our payments will be higher.

TOM MOE: Chairman, Administrative Commission of Veterans' Affairs, a 15-member citizen committee appointed by the Governor, Mayville; in effect the Board of Directors with the supervisory function of the Home and the Commissioners' Office, to testify in support of restoration of funding to HB 1007. He also introduced 5 board members in attendance. (tape 904)

BERNIE WAGNER: State Ombudsman for Veterans' Home, District 24, to request favorable consideration of funding for HB 1007. (tape 955)

JOHN MUELLEN: Chairman, Veterans' Coordinating Council, to urge restoration of the Governor's recommendation for funding for the Home. He introduced board members from the Council. (tape 1341)

SENATOR ST. AUBYN: In regards to the statement of \$7,000 in the budget to pay expenses of the members of the committee. I don't see where that was in the Executive Budget. Was it?

TOM MOE: That was listed under the optional package, but not included in the Governor's Budget.

SENATOR SOLBERG: What percent of resident pay is from Medicaid?

KEN ANDERSON: No, we were eliminated from that bill about 2 sessions ago.

RAY HARKEMA: Commissioner of ND Veterans Affairs, to testify in support of the bill and to note concern about the House cuts of \$13,994 general reduction. CATHY HALGUNSETH: Administrative Assistant, ND Veterans Affairs explained the breakdown of the lump sum budget. (the last page of Harkema's testimony)

SENATOR SOLBERG: Why did your rent jump from \$20,000 to \$33,000?

CATHY HALGUNSETH: When we looked at our '95 budget, we looked at where we could reduce, our budget is small with rent being our largest object code. So that is where we took it out of. We put the additional money needed to pay the rent into the optional package.

SENATOR SOLBERG: What was your rent this biennium?

CATHY HALGUNSETH: I'll provide that to you later.

RAY HARKEMA: I'd like to stress how critical this \$13,994 is. We would have to reduce our travel budget by one-third this next biennium to operate.

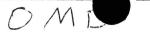

Representative Svedjan and members of the Appropriations committee,

I am Ray Harkema, Commissioner of Veterans Affairs for the great state of

North Dakota. On behalf of the Administrative Committee on Veterans Affairs,

the committee that oversees the operation of the North Dakota Department of

Veterans Affairs, I thank you for allowing us the time to appear before you with

an overview of our budget needs for the 1999-2001 Biennium.

I would like to give you an outline of our duties. Our department has the responsibility of informing the 60,000 plus veterans of North Dakota and their dependents of benefits due them from the U.S. Veterans Administration and assist those who qualify for such benefits as compensation, pension, hospitalization, education, home loans and burial benefits in making proper application using our network of County Service Officers. Our Department acts as Power of Attorney in channeling claims for benefits and assists in the preparation and development of the claim. When claims for benefits are denied, we arrange for an appeal with the VA Board of Veterans Appeals in Washington, D.C. The Department also assists with State benefits such as state educational benefits for dependents of MIA, POW, tax exemptions for the disabled, job reinstatement, and veterans preference in public employment. We also administer a Veterans Aid Loan Program, a Grant Program and a

Transportation program. We are responsible for supervision, training and advising the 52 County Veterans Service Officers (who service 53 counties) located throughout the state.

Our goal is to preserve the dignity and self-determination of veterans through awareness and procurement of available benefits that may improve their living conditions and opportunities; we also serve as a focal point for coordination among agencies, both public and private, in all programs and projects affecting veterans and their dependents. We also provide counseling to North Dakota veterans and their dependents or survivors in all matters pertaining to benefits and entitlements earned as a result of military service. We develop and manage all of the Departments programs and projects in a most timely and cost-effective manner, in terms of tangible client service, from funds allotted.

Our objective is to keep informed on the ever changing Federal laws and regulations relating to the numerous veterans benefits programs, to disseminate this information to our County Veterans Service Officers and the public by means of training, news releases and public speaking programs. Also, to bring into North Dakota increased VA monetary benefits through an increase in VA claims properly filed.

According to the latest available statistics, last fiscal year North Dakota received from the VA system monetary benefits in the amount of \$106,963,912 to include: \$49,879,512 in Hospital & Medical benefits; \$43,764,649 Compensation & Pension; \$7,362,571 Vocational Rehabilitation; \$5,345,006 Insurance & Indemnities; and \$612,174 in Construction related costs distributed to those eligible throughout the state.

Should we relent in any way in informing and assisting our veteran population in establishing their claims, the state and local jurisdictions would lose their share of federal benefits and in many cases the cost of care for these people would fall directly back on our state responsibilities.

The 106 million in federal benefits just do not come to North Dakota on their own, they must be sought after daily. This is what those of us assigned the task attempt to do.

Our Department now has 6 FTE's. Our services include: Loans, Grants, Transportation and Claims/Training.

We have been mandated by the North Dakota Veterans Coordinating Council and the Administrative Committee to address some of the glaring needs of some of our veteran population.

Transportation was a major problem for many because of the distance to

a VA Medical Facility. We now have four vans on the road, manned by volunteer drivers, that bring veterans to the Fargo VA Medical Facility and the Mile City Medical Facility on a regular scheduled basis. The purchase of the vans was accomplished with the earned interest of the Post War Trust Fund.

Our Grant program is used to provide dental care, optical care and hearing aids to our veterans in need of emergency hardship assistance. This also is accomplished with the earned interest of the Post War Trust Fund.

We are very thankful that we have been able to maintain a County Veterans Service Officer in each county that can reach out to the veterans in their community and supply the help where needed. We hold two training sessions each year for the County Veterans Service Officers and maintain daily contact with these people on a need basis. All Veterans Service Officers are required to maintain a certification status on an annual basis.

The Loan Program requires a lot of administration but it has proved to be extremely valuable in helping veterans through a financial hardship. This is an unsecured loan that requires constant monitoring. We process approximately 140 applications per year.

There is one specific issue I would like to address and request an amendment:

Travel expense for the Administrative Committee who serve without receiving compensation. Expenses are permitted by Century Code in the same manner as are elected officials and employees of the state. The Governor appoints these individuals to represent the five veterans organizations. The cost for the Biennium would be \$7,000.00 for our subcommittee.

Request the operating expense be increased by \$7,000.00.

There is nothing in our budget that is not minimum requirements to meet the needs of the demands placed on this small but effective department. We have made changes in our operation to increase efficiency. We operate as conservatively as possible, we need every dollar requested. We have a responsibility to serve a major portion of our state population. We feel we do an excellent job with the few dollars requested.

We sincerely appreciate the cooperation we have received in the past from the Legislative process and we look forward to maintaining this spirit of cooperation as we enter the next Biennium. Our job is to see that the people who defend our freedom are taken care of after they hang up their uniform. It is not an easy task, but very necessary. We thank you for making this effort possible.

CHAIRMAN SVEDJAN AND MEMBERS OF THE HUMAN RESOURCES DIVISION OF THE HOUSE OF APPROPRIATIONS,

I AM KEN ANDERSON, COMMANDANT OF THE NORTH DAKOTA VETERANS HOME. IT IS A PLEASURE TO BRING FORTH TODAY THE PROPOSED BUDGET OF THE NORTH DAKOTA VETERANS HOME. WE HAVE BEEN SERVING VETERANS AND THEIR DEPENDENTS FOR 105 YEARS. WE ARE VERY PROUD OF THE FACILITY WE HAVE, THE CARE WE GIVE, AND OUR CLOSE LINKS WITH THE VARIOUS VETERANS ORGANIZATIONS AND VETERANS ADMINISTRATION IN WASHINGTON. WE HAVE A BASIC CARE FACILITY THAT IS 111 BEDS AND A SKILLED CARE FACILITY WHICH IS 38 BEDS. WE HAVE APPROXIMATELY 100% POPULATION IN OUR SKILLED CARE FACILITY AND ABOUT 90% POPULATION IN OUR BASIC CARE FACILITY.

OUR MISSION IS TO PROVIDE A SAFE, CLEAN, HOMELIKE ENVIRONMENT TO MEET THE MEDICAL, SOCIAL, EMOTIONAL, AND PSYCHOLOGICAL NEEDS OF ELIGIBLE RESIDENTS, WITH THE FOCUS ON IMPROVING THEIR HEALTH AND MAINTAINING THEIR INDEPENDENCE WHILE RESPECTING THEIR CONFIDENTIALITY AND PERSONAL DIGNITY.

WITH ME TODAY ARE MEMBERS OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE ON VETERANS AFFAIRS WHO ARE APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNOR FROM THE VARIOUS VETERANS ORGANIZATIONS TO REPRESENT THE NORTH DAKOTA VETERANS HOME AND THE NORTH DAKOTA DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS.

TESTIMONY ON HB 1007 Thursday, January 21, 1999

NORTH DAKOTA VETERANS HOME

CHAIRMAN SVEDJAN AND MEMBERS OF THE HUMAN RESOURCES DIVISION OF THE HOUSE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE, I AM JACIE GRENIER AND I AM THE ACCOUNTANT AT THE NORTH DAKOTA VETERANS HOME. I AM HONORED TO BE HERE TODAY TO TESTIFY TO THE 1999-2001 BUDGET NEEDS OF THE VETERANS HOME. THE BUDGET, AS RECOMMENDED BY THE OFFICE OF MANAGEMENT AND BUDGET, IS A FAIR PRESENTATION OF WHAT OUR EXPECTED COSTS WILL BE AT THE HOME DURING THE UPCOMING BIENNIUM.

THE MOST SIGNIFICANT IMPACT ON THE BUDGET IS THE INCREASE REQUESTED FOR NURSING SALARIES. RECRUITING AND RETAINING THE DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS' (VA) REQUIRED LEVEL OF NURSING STAFF IS A MAJOR PROBLEM FACING THE HOME. THIS IS DUE TO THE HIGH COMPETITIVENESS OF THE HEALTH CARE INDUSTRY. REGIONAL HEALTH CARE FACILITIES ARE VYING FOR THE SAME NURSING PERSONNEL AND ARE OFFERING MUCH MORE ATTRACTIVE SALARY PACKAGES THAN THE HOME CURRENTLY CAN, SUCH AS HIGHER STARTING WAGES, SHIFT DIFFERENTIAL PAY AND SIGN ON BONUSES. IN ORDER TO COMPETE WITH THESE PACKAGES, WE ARE REQUESTING A 7% INCREASE IN SALARIES FOR ALL NURSES. WE ARE ALSO PROPOSING ADDING A \$1/HOUR SHIFT DIFFERENTIAL ON EVENINGS AND WEEKENDS FOR RN'S AND LPN'S

THE HOME IS ALSO REQUESTING 1.40 FTE FOR TWO LPN POSITIONS. DURING THE PAST TWO VA INSPECTIONS, WE HAVE BEEN CITED FOR INADEQUATE STAFFING LEVELS FOR THE NIGHT AND EVENING TOURS OF DUTY ON THE BASIC CARE UNIT. THE VA FEELS THAT THE ADDITION OF





1.40 FTE LPN POSITIONS WILL ADDRESS THE NEEDS TO PROVIDE MEDICALLY ORDERED NURSING CARE AND EXPEDIENT MEDICATION ADMINISTRATION FOR THE PRESENT LEVEL OF OCCUPANCY. HOWEVER, IF MAXIMUM OCCUPANCY IS REACHED, ADDITIONAL STAFFING WOULD BE REQUIRED TO MAINTAIN AN ACCEPTABLE RATIO OF NURSING STAFF TO RESIDENTS.

AN ADDITIONAL .50 FTE RN POSITION IS ALSO NEEDED ON THE SKILLED CARE UNIT, AS A RESULT OF MEDICARE AND MEDICAID CHANGES EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1ST OF THIS YEAR. THESE CHANGES REQUIRE SUBMISSION OF A MINIMUM DATA SET (MDS), DESCRIBING THE CARE PROVIDED FOR EACH SKILLED CARE RESIDENT. THE MDS IS THE INSTRUMENT USED BY THESE PROGRAMS TO DETERMINE THE RATE CHARGED BY THE NURSING HOME. THESE MDS'S MUST BE COMPLETED BY A REGISTERED NURSE AND MAY TAKE UP TO 8 HOURS TO COMPLETE. THEY ARE TO BE SUBMITTED AT RESIDENT'S ADMISSION OR HOSPITAL RETURN AND QUARTERLY, THEREAFTER, FOR MEDICAID AND PRIVATE PAY RESIDENTS. MEDICARE OR DEMAND BILL RESIDENTS REQUIRE THE SUBMISSION OF 5 MDS'S WITHIN THEIR FIRST 100 DAYS OF STAY.

THE ADMINISTRATION BUDGET WAS AFFECTED BY INCREASED AUDIT FEES, PAPER AND OFFICE SUPPLY NEEDS, ADDITIONAL PHONE LINES AND DATA PROCESSING EXPENSES WHICH REFLECT THE OFFICE OF MANAGEMENT AND BUDGET COST REIMBURSEMENT AND INFORMATION SERVICE DIVISION CHARGES.



TRAVEL COSTS ARE FORECASTED TO INCREASE PRIMARILY BECAUSE OF INCREASES IN MOTOR POOL RATES, INCREASED TRAVEL NECESSARY TO RECRUIT NEW RESIDENTS AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT ATTENDANCE.

THE UTILITY BUDGET CONSISTS OF FUEL OIL NEEDS AND ELECTRICITY, WATER AND PHONE USAGE. FUEL CONSUMPTION AND ELECTRICITY USAGE MAY FLUCTUATE BASED ON THE HARSHNESS OF THE WEATHER, WINTER AND SUMMER. THE PRICE OF FUEL OIL HAS ALSO FLUCTUATED IN THE PAST UP \$.40/GALLON.

THE HOME IS COMMITTED TO IMPROVING THE SERVICES PROVIDED ITS RESIDENTS, THEREFORE, MORE EMPHASIS HAS BEEN PLACED ON PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT. THIS BUDGET HAS INCREASED FOR TRAINING TO FACILITATE MEDICARE AND MEDICAID PROGRAM CHANGES, FOR LICENSURE REQUIREMENTS, SOCIAL SERVICES, NURSING AND ADMINISTRATION AND ATTENDANCE AT ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE MEETINGS AND OTHER HEALTH CARE RELATED FUNCTIONS.

THE HEALTH CARE NEEDS OF THE RESIDENTS CONTINUE TO INCREASE AS THE VETERAN POPULATION AGES. THIS IS REFLECTED IN INCREASED BUDGET NEEDS FOR MEDICAL COSTS AND PROFESSIONAL SERVICES, SUCH AS DOCTORS' FEES, PHARMACY SERVICES, ADDICTION COUNSELOR FEES, PSYCHIATRIC COSTS AND PHYSICAL AND OCCUPATIONAL THERAPISTS. THIS ALSO AFFECTS OUR FOOD COSTS WHICH INCLUDE INCREASED USAGE OF DIETARY NOURISHMENTS AND TUBE FEEDING ADMINISTERED TO RESIDENTS AND THE NEED FOR INCONTINENT BRIEFS.

THE MISCELLANEOUS SUPPLIES BUDGET HAS INCREASED BASED ON ERGONOMIC CONSIDERATIONS (DESKS, CHAIRS, KEYBOARDS), RESIDENTS' ROOM NEEDS (CHAIRS, HOSPITAL BEDS, LAMPS), LIFT CHAIRS FOR NURSING, HAND TOOLS FOR MAINTENANCE DEPARTMENT AND OTHER SMALL EQUIPMENT NEEDS LESS THAN \$750.

Last night at 2:45 a.m. it occurred to me that the \$6,782 increase to the Veteran's Affairs administrator's salary is NOT included in the \$17,202 general fund increase amount. The \$6,782 increase for the administrator's salary is on top of the \$17,202. It was considered part of the salary package.

As I recall it was your intent to end at \$3,218 above current general fund level. If it is still your intent to do this, you would need to take out the administrator's increase of \$6,782 and an additional \$13,984 (the \$7,202 you had taken out plus \$6,782).

We appreciate the opportunity to share our concerns about properly funding the Veterans Home with you.

We want to emphasize the importance of adequately funding the following areas:

- 1) SALARIES We cannot emphasize strongly enough the importance of providing the 7% equity adjustments and the shift and holiday differentials for nurses. This is needed to retain and recruit qualified nurses in a tight labor market.
- 2) OPERATING We are concerned about how the proposed reduction will impact the ability to purchase the fuel oil necessary to operate the boilers which provide heat for the facility as well as the Home's laundry. We are also concerned how this impacts the ability to replace bedding and mattresses as required by law, as well as, other necessary supplies such as incontinence diapers, drugs and other medical supplies.
- 3) CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS We want to emphasize the need to immediately address the re-tucking of the north and east walls of the 1950's buildings which are rapidly deteriorating.
- 4) EQUIPMENT While concerned about the proposed \$8,500 reduction. We will do our best to live with that cut.

Again, thank you for listening to our concerns. We believe it's important to insure that the resident's of our home are provided with a safe, properly staffed and equipped home.

Concerning House Bill 1007 Department of Veterans Home and Affairs

The Governors budget was due before the Health Department was scheduled to perform a code review of the Veteran's Home. They are on a federal calendar.

The purpose of their inspection is for state licensure, and federal certification.

Upon completion of their inspection and subsequent report, it has been determined the remainder of the Veteran's Home must be provided with a fire suppression sprinkler system.

As a result of this conclusion, the Commandant is in complete support of this project.

According to the Health Department, the Veteran's Home has six months to rectify the deficiencies from the time of the inspection. The inspection was in the latter part of January, so they have until about the end of July. They may obtain a waiver from the Denver federal office for an additional six months. That appears to be the maximum allowed time to remove deficiencies.

Re: Fire suppression sprinkler system.

First of all, I would like to correct a statement made previously. State buildings are NOT subject to code revisions made by local municipalities. According to the Attorney General: "...it is my opinion that the building-related ordinances of a city do not apply, by their own force, to property and buildings owned by the state of North Dakota." (H. Heitkamp) She goes on to say a state facility MAY waive its immunity to local ordinances but does not have to.

The second clarification involves having a dollar value trigger a time frame within which code deficiencies must be corrected. The 1997 Uniform Building Code (UBC) has changed to a single determining factor – regardless of cost. It states that when found to be in violation, the occupant has 18 months to prepare corrective documents and 18 months after that to complete the work or the building must be vacated until made to conform.

The last issue to address is the authority of the fire department to use the National Fire Protection Agency code (NFPA).

The UBC, and the Uniform Mechanical Code, were adopted as the State Building Code in 1979. The UBC is considered a *building* code as opposed to an *inspection* code. The provisions covering existing low-rise buildings are limited. In this section the code indicates that buildings undergoing major renovation or addition or that have a change in occupancy must be brought up to the current code in it's entirety. According to the fire marshal's office this made it difficult to address existing buildings. At this point all buildings in the state before 1979 are existing buildings.

Currently there are three model buildings codes used throughout the United States, the UBC, the Southern Building Code, and the Building Officials Code Association. The federal government has building occurring in all three regions. They have adopted the NFPA as an additional level of safety requirements. When our health department inspects state nursing homes, they go by the NFPA as required by the federal government. The enforcement of the UBC (which is more restrictive than the NFPA) is left to the state. When the fire marshal's office became familiar with the NFPA, they decided it was easier for them to use when inspecting existing buildings. They revised the administrative rules to allow use of the NFPA code.

In 1985 the Veteran's Home took steps to be in compliance with the NFPA requirements.

APPROPRIATION COMMITTEE. I AM KEN ANDERSON,
COMMANDANT OF THE NORTH DAKOTA VETERANS HOME. IT
IS A PLEASURE TO BRING FORTH TODAY THE PROPOSED
BUDGET OF THE HOME.

WE HAVE BEEN SERVING VETERANS AND THEIR DEPENDENTS FOR 105 YEARS. WE ARE VERY PROUD OF THE FACILITY WE HAVE, THE CARE WE GIVE, AND OUR CLOSE LINKS WITH THE VARIOUS VETERANS ORGANIZATIONS AND VETERANS ADMINISTRATION. WE OPERATE A 111 BED BASIC CARE FACILITY AND A 38 BED SKILLED CARE FACILITY.

OUR MISSION IS TO PROVIDE A SAFE, CLEAN, HOMELIKE ENVIRONMENT TO MEET THE MEDICAL, SOCIAL, EMOTIONAL, AND PSYCHOLOGICAL NEEDS OF ELIGIBLE RESIDENTS, WITH THE FOCUS ON IMPROVING THEIR HEALTH AND MAINTAINING THEIR INDEPENDENCE WHILE RESPECTING THEIR CONFIDENTIALITY AND PERSONAL DIGNITY.

WITH US TODAY ARE MEMBERS OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE ON VETERANS AFFAIRS, THE VETERANS COORDINATING COUNCIL, JACIE GRENIER CPA, AND EMMY



DOTZENROD STRANDER D.O.N. FROM THE NORTH DAKOTA VETERANS HOME.

JACIE WILL PRESENT THE DETAILS OF OUR BUDGET AND I WILL THEN RECAP KEY AREAS.

I'D LIKE TO REITERATE ON SOME OF THE POINTS MADE BY JACIE. ONE OF THE ITEMS THAT IS A CONCERN TO ME IS THE EXTRA ORDINARY REPAIRS.

AFTER THE HOUSE AMENDMENT WE ARE BASICALLY LEFT WITH APPROXIMATELY \$20,000 FOR REPAIRS ON THE HOME. I JUST FEEL THAT AMOUNT IS VERY MINIMAL. I DON'T WANT TO BE IN THE POSITION WHERE I HAVE TO GO TO THE EMERGENCY COMMISSION FOR EVERY REPAIR WE MAKE.

WE HAVE DONE MAJOR REPAIRS ON OUR KITCHEN EQUIPMENT AND AS THE BUILDING AND EQUIPMENT GETS OLDER WE WILL CONTINUALLY DO REPAIRS. EACH TIME WE MAKE REPAIRS ON OUR BOILERS IT COSTS \$2,000 TO \$2,500.

MY OTHER CONCERN IS THE WAGES FOR THE NURSES. LISBON IS A VERY PROGRESSIVE COMMUNITY, WE HAVE THREE NURSING HOMES AND A HOSPITAL, TWO CLINICS, FOUR CHIROPRACTORS, THREE DENTISTS, TWO HOME HEALTH AGENCIES, HOSPICE, A COUNTY NURSE AND A SCHOOL NURSE. I THINK THE FIGURES WE HAVE BEEN LOOKING AT ARE GOING TO BRING US TO JULY 1, 1999, BUT WHAT ARE WE GOING TO DO AFTER THAT? IT'S VERY DIFFICULT TO RECRUIT GOOD EMPLOYEES AND IT'S VERY SAD WHEN WE HAVE ONE THAT COMES TO US AND SAYS "BUT I GOT A BETTER OFFER DOWN THE STREET."

TESTIMONY ON HB 1007 Friday, February 26, 1999

NORTH DAKOTA VETERANS HOME

CHAIRMAN NETHING AND MEMBERS OF THE SENATE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE, I AM JACIE GRENIER AND I AM THE ACCOUNTANT AT THE NORTH DAKOTA VETERANS HOME. I AM HONORED TO BE HERE TODAY TO TESTIFY TO THE 1999-2001 BUDGET NEEDS OF THE VETERANS HOME. THE BUDGET, AS RECOMMENDED BY THE GOVERNOR, IS A FAIR PRESENTATION OF WHAT OUR EXPECTED COSTS WILL BE AT THE HOME DURING THE UPCOMING BIENNIUM.

THE MOST SIGNIFICANT IMPACT ON THE BUDGET IS THE INCREASE REQUESTED FOR NURSING SALARIES. RECRUITING AND RETAINING THE DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS' (VA) REQUIRED LEVEL OF NURSING STAFF IS A MAJOR PROBLEM FACING THE HOME. THIS IS DUE TO THE HIGH COMPETITIVENESS FOR PROFESSIONAL NURSES IN THE HEALTH CARE INDUSTRY. REGIONAL HEALTH CARE FACILITIES ARE VYING FOR THE SAME NURSING PERSONNEL AND ARE OFFERING MUCH MORE ATTRACTIVE SALARY PACKAGES THAN THE HOME CURRENTLY CAN, SUCH AS HIGHER STARTING WAGES, SHIFT DIFFERENTIAL PAY AND SIGN ON BONUSES. IN ORDER TO COMPETE WITH THIS, WE REQUESTED A 10% INCREASE IN SALARIES AND WAGES FOR ALL LPN'S AND RN'S. THE GOVERNOR HAS RECOMMENDED A 7% INCREASE. IN ADDITION, WE ARE REQUESTING LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY TO OFFER A \$1.00/HOUR SHIFT DIFFERENTIAL ON EVENING AND WEEKEND SHIFTS FOR RN'S AND LPN'S.

THE HOME ALSO REQUESTS AUTHORIZATION FOR 1.40 FTE FOR TWO LPN POSITIONS. DURING THE PAST TWO VA INSPECTIONS, WE HAVE BEEN CITED FOR INADEQUATE STAFFING LEVELS FOR THE EVENING AND NIGHT TOURS OF DUTY ON THE BASIC CARE UNIT. THE VA FEELS THAT THE CURRENT STAFFING LEVEL COULD RESULT IN UNSAFE AND UNTIMELY ADMINISTRATION OF MEDICATIONS.

THE HOME'S **OPERATING BUDGET** NEEDS HAVE INCREASED AND WILL CONTINUE TO INCREASE DUE TO INFLATION AND THE HIGHER HEALTH CARE NEEDS OF AN AGING VETERAN POPULATION.

THE BULK OF THE **DATA PROCESSING** BUDGET IS FOR THE CENTRAL SERVICES INDIRECT COST RECOVERY. THIS BUDGET ALSO INCLUDES THE COSTS OF A 56K DEDICATED LINE IN ORDER TO ACCESS THE STATE'S ACCOUNTING AND REPORTING SYSTEM AND ENABLING CLAIMS FOR PAYMENT, PAYROLL, INTERDEPARTMENTAL BILLING, AND JOURNAL VOUCHER PROCESSING; BUDGET PREPARATION AND MONITORING; AND ACCESS TO CURRENT SAMIS AND PAYROLL REPORTS. THE INFORMATION SERVICE DIVISION OF THE OFFICE OF MANAGEMENT AND BUDGET ALSO CHARGES EACH AGENCY FOR COMPUTER PROCESSING TIME.

THE **TRAVEL** BUDGET INCLUDES COSTS OF TRANSPORTING RESIDENTS TO THE VA MEDICAL CENTER LOCATED IN FARGO AND THE COST OF PROVIDING THEIR MEALS WHILE THERE. OTHER TRAVEL COSTS ARE FOR NECESSARY ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE MEETINGS, AUDIT AND BUDGET HEARINGS, NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF VETERANS HOME AND OTHER VETERAN AND PROFESSIONAL CONVENTIONS, FUNERALS AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT ATTENDANCE. THE HOME ALSO CONTRACTS TO PAY TRAVEL EXPENSES TO BRING A PSYCHIATRIST TO THE HOME. TRAVEL COSTS ARE FORECASTED TO INCREASE PRIMARILY BECAUSE OF INCREASES IN MOTOR POOL RATES AND INCREASED PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT ATTENDANCE DUE TO CHANGES IN FEDERAL MEDICAID AND MEDICARE PROGRAMS AND THE NEED TO STAY CURRENT ON HEALTH AND GERIATRIC RELATED ISSUES..

THE **UTILITIES** BUDGET IS OUTLINED IN ATTACHMENT A. AS NOTED, HEATING OIL FOR THE BOILERS, LAUNDRY BOILER, ELECTRICITY, WATER/SEWER AND TELEPHONE COSTS ARE BUDGETED THROUGH THIS LINE ITEM.

POSTAGE REFLECTS THE INCREASE IN POSTAL RATES.

THE **EQUIPMENT LEASE/RENT** BUDGET REFLECTS THE LEASING COST OF THE HOME'S COPIER MACHINE AND OTHER MISCELLANEOUS EQUIPMENT RENTAL NEEDS, SUCH AS PUMPS FOR FLOOD CONTROL. THE **BUILDING LEASE/RENT** BUDGET REFLECTS THE WATER CONDITIONING EXPENSE NECESSARY FOR THE UPKEEP OF THE BOILERS AND HUMIDIFIERS.

THE HOME IS COMMITTED TO IMPROVING THE SERVICES PROVIDED ITS RESIDENTS, THEREFORE, MORE EMPHASIS HAS BEEN PLACED ON **PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT**. THIS BUDGET HAS INCREASED FOR TRAINING TO FACILITATE MEDICARE AND MEDICAID PROGRAM CHANGES; LONG TERM CARE MEDICAL PROGRAM CHANGES; CONTINUING EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS; AND PROFESSIONAL DUES. ALSO, IN ORDER TO PREVENT THE LOSS OF AN EXCELLENT EMPLOYEE AND DUE TO THE DIFFICULTIES OF RECRUITING REGISTERED NURSES, THE HOME HAS AGREED TO PAY THE TUITION COSTS FOR A LPN PURSUING HER RN DEGREE.

THE **OPERATING FEES AND SERVICES** BUDGET INCLUDES THE FOLLOWING COSTS:

- LTC SOLUTIONS ANNUAL SUPPORT FEE AND MONTHLY UPGRADE FEES -(Medical Records Software)
- LTCN SATELLITE Nursing training updates
- EXTERMINATION SERVICES
- LICENSE RENEWALS
- REQUIRED INSPECTION OF SPRINKLER SYSTEMS
- ADVERTISING AND PROMOTION
- CHAPLAIN FEES
- WORKERS COMPENSATION CLAIMS
- DISPOSAL OF BIO-HAZARDOUS WASTE PRODUCTS

REPAIRS BUDGET INCLUDES THE COSTS OF INSPECTION AND MAINTENANCE AGREEMENTS FOR OUR FIRE ALARM SYSTEM, NURSES' CALL LIGHT, THE COOLING SYSTEM AND ELEVATOR. THESE ARE REQUIRED TO BE TESTED AND MAINTAINED BY THE VA, STATE HEALTH DEPARTMENT AND INSURANCE PURPOSES. THE BALANCE OF THIS BUDGET IS FOR EQUIPMENT AND MINOR BUILDING REPAIRS.

THE **PROFESSIONAL SERVICES** BUDGET WAS AFFECTED BY INCREASED AUDIT FEES AND RE-NEGOTIATED FEES FOR THE FOLLOWING PROFESSIONAL SERVICES: MEDICAL DIRECTOR, PHARMACISTS, ADDICTION COUNSELOR AND PHYSICAL AND OCCUPATIONAL THERAPISTS. OTHER CONTRACT SERVICES MAY INCLUDE SPEECH PATHOLOGISTS, MEDICAL RECORDS CONSULTANT AND OTHER SERVICES, AS DEEMED NECESSARY.

THE HEALTH CARE NEEDS OF THE RESIDENTS CONTINUE TO INCREASE AS THE VETERAN POPULATION AGES. THIS IS REFLECTED IN INCREASED BUDGET NEEDS FOR **MEDICAL SUPPLIES**.

INSURANCE IS BUDGETED FOR COST OF MAINTAINING ADEQUATE LEVELS OF INSURANCE ON THE BOILERS, BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.

OFFICE SUPPLIES ARE ANTICIPATED TO INCREASE DUE TO ADDITIONAL AND MORE FREQUENT REPORTING REQUIREMENTS OF THE FEDERAL MEDICARE AND MEDICAID PROGRAMS.

THE **PRINTING** BUDGET REQUEST DECREASED AS INCONTINENT BRIEFS WERE INCLUDED IN THIS LINE ITEM IN THE PREVIOUS BIENNIUM'S BUDGET. THEY ARE BUDGETED IN THE FOOD AND CLOTHING LINE ITEM FOR THE CURRENT BIENNIUM.

PROFESSIONAL SUPPLIES INCLUDE CHEMICALS FOR DIETARY, NURSING AND HOUSEKEEPING FOR THE PURPOSE OF INFECTION CONTROL. SUBSCRIPTIONS TO NEWSPAPERS AND BOOKS ARE PROVIDED FOR RESIDENT LOUNGES AND LIBRARIES. BOOKS, EDUCATIONAL SUPPLIES AND PROFESSIONAL RESOURCES ARE ALSO NECESSARY FOR TRAINING STAFF, ESPECIALLY IN OUR CERTIFIED NURSING ASSISTANTS' TRAINING PROGRAM.

THE **FOOD** BUDGET INCLUDES THE COSTS OF PROVIDING RESIDENTS WITH 3 BALANCED MEALS PER DAY PLUS TWO NUTRITIONAL SNACKS. THE COSTS FOR GROCERIES, ESPECIALLY MEAT AND DAIRY PRODUCTS, CONTINUE TO INCREASE. ALSO, SPECIAL DIETARY NEEDS OF RESIDENTS, INCLUDING INCREASED USAGE OF DIETARY NOURISHMENTS AND THE ADMINISTRATION OF FEEDING TUBES, ARE ADDING TO INCREASED COSTS. OTHER DIETARY RELATED COSTS ARE FOR PAPER PRODUCTS, INCLUDING NAPKINS, CUPS, BAGS, FILTERS, LIDS. THE **CLOTHING** BUDGET INCLUDES COSTS FOR INCONTINENT BRIEFS, BEDDING (VA REQUIRES THE HOME TO HAVE 5 CHANGES ON HAND), LINEN, TOWELS, BIBS AND SAFETY CLOTHING.

THE **BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS** BUDGET REFLECTS INCREASED NEEDS FOR PARTS, SAFETY PRODUCTS AND SERVICES BASED ON STATE AND VA INSPECTIONS AND THE NORMAL AGING AND DETERIORATION OF THE BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS. ALSO INCLUDED IN THIS BUDGET ARE THE NECESSARY CHEMICALS FOR THE BOILERS AND JANITORIAL USE.

THE **MISCELLANEOUS SUPPLIES** BUDGET ENCOMPASSES THE FOLLOWING:

- LAUNDRY CHEMICALS
- DISHES AND SILVERWARE
- RESIDENTS' ROOM NEEDS (CHAIRS, LAMPS AND HOSPITAL MATTRESSES WHICH MUST BE REPLACED IF DAMAGED FOR INFECTION CONTROL)

CHAIRMAN NETHING AND MEMBERS OF THE SENATE

APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE, I AM EMMY DOTZENROD-STRANDER

DIRECTOR OF NURSING SERVICES AT THE NORTH DAKOTA VETERANS

HOME. I AM HONORED TO BE HERE TODAY TO TESTIFY TO THE 1999-2001

BUDGET NEEDS OF THE VETERANS HOME NURSING DEPARTMENT. THE

BUDGET, AS RECOMMENDED BY THE GOVERNOR IS WHAT IS NEEDED

DURING THE UPCOMING BIENNIUM.

THE NURSING DEPARTMENT IS SEEING AN IMPACT DUE TO THE RECRUITING AND RETENTION NEEDS. THIS IMPACT IS THE IMPETUS FOR OUR REQUESTED INCREASE IN NURSING SALARIES. THE DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS MANDATES RN'S ON EACH EIGHT HOUR TOUR OF DUTY. WHICH ONLY INTENSIFIES OUR NEED. IN LISBON ALONE WE COMPETE WITH 1 HOSPITAL, 2 OTHER NURSING HOMES, 2 CLINICS, 3 DENTIST OFFICES, 4 CHIROPRACTIC OFFICES, 2 HOME HEALTH AGENCIES, HOSPICE AND AN ASSISTED LIVING FACILITY. IN THE DIRECT COMMUTING DISTANCE WE VIE WITH FORMAN, OAKS, LAMOURE AND ENDERLIN NURSING HOMES AS WELL AS THE HOSPITAL IN OAKS. SO YOU CAN SEE THAT WE ARE ALL TAPING THE SAME LIMITED PROFESSIONAL MARKET.

AS THIS MARKET IS TAPED SO INCREASES THE SALARIES AND BENEFIT PACKAGES DUE TO THIS DEMAND. DURING THE 1998 CALENDAR YEAR THE RANSOM COUNTY GAZETTE RAN ADS FOR PROFESSIONALS FOR OVER 30 WEEKS. THE ADS BEING FROM SEVERAL OF THE CITED FACILITIES. THEY CONTAIN SIGN ON BONUSES RANGING FROM \$ 300 TO \$ 1000. THEY OFFER SIMILAR OR BETTER BENEFIT PACKAGES. OAKS OFFERS SCHOLARSHIPS FOR EDUCATION AND AN ADDITIONAL 12% INCREASE OVER BASE SALARY IN LIEU OF BENEFITS.

IN THE RECENT PAST THIS FACILITY TENACIOUSLY RECRUITED ONE OF OUR LPN'S OFFERING TO PAY HER EDUCATION FROM LPN TO RN, \$12/HR, \$3/HR OVER WHAT WE WERE AND IF SHE DIDN'T TAKE THE BENEFITS \$13.44/HR. TO KEEP THIS NURSE ON STAFF WE NEEDED TO PAY FOR HER EDUCATION OR LOOSE AN EXCELLENT NURSE WHO IS LOYAL, DEPENDABLE, A TEAM PLAYER AND ORIENTED TO THE FACILITIES RESIDENTS AND POLICIES. CURRENTLY SHE REMAINS ON STAFF AND WE CAN NOT AFFORD TO LOOSE HER.

IN THE CITY OF LISBON, PARKSIDE NURSING HOMES RN STARTING WAGE IS \$ 15/HR WITH A \$ 500 SIGN ON BONUS. THIS IS \$ 1.38/HR HIGHER THAN AN RN WE'VE HAD ON STAFF SINCE 1992.

MOST ALL OF THESE FACILITIES ALSO OFFER SHIFT DIFFERENTIALS FROM \$.05 TO \$ 1.00/HR FOR THE EVENING, NIGHT AND WEEKEND SHIFTS.

SOME GIVE A CHARGE PAY DIFFERENTIAL ABOVE THIS AND SOME EVEN GIVE A DIFFERENTIAL IF YOU SHOW UP TO WORK ON TIME AND WORK YOUR SCHEDULED HOURS. ALL OF THIS MAKES RECRUITING A DEFINITE CHALLENGE.

FOR LPNS WE HAVE BEEN ABLE TO LIMIT OUR RECRUITING TO THE COUNTIES ON THE EASTERN SIDE OF THE STATE. THIS IS NOT TRUE HOWEVER FOR RN'S. WE HAVE NEEDED TO BE MUCH MORE AGGRESSIVE WITH RN RECRUITMENT. AD'S ARE PLACED STATE WIDE AND INTO SOUTH DAKOTA, WE USE LOCAL PAPERS AND STATE WIDE CLASSIFICATIONS IN THOSE PAPERS. THE NORTH DAKOTA PRARIE ROSE WHICH IS SENT TO ALL NURSES IN THE STATE, RADIO ADS, JOB SERVICE NORTH DAKOTA, POSTING AD'S ON NORTH DAKOTA SCHOOL OF NURSING BULLETIN BOARDS AND WE ALSO PURCHASE NAMES AND ADDRESS'S OF RN'S FROM THE NORTH DAKOTA BOARD OF NURSING. THESE INDIVIDUALS ARE RN'S WHO ARE CURRENTLY PRACTICING, HAVE CHOSEN NOT TO WORK, JUST TRANSFERRED INTO THE STATE AND JUST GRADUATED FROM SCHOOL. AFTER THE LIST IS RECEIVED WE SEND OUT LETTERS TO THE GRADUATES FIRST AND THEN TO THE OTHER NEW NAMES ON THE LIST FROM THE AREA.

IN THE CURRENT FISCAL YEAR OF THE BIENNIUM WE HAVE
RECRUITED AND REPLACED ONE OF OUR RN POSITIONS THREE TIMES.
THIS POSITION IS CURRENTLY OPEN GIVING US A 50% TURN OVER RATE.

ONE OF THESE NURSES TRANSFERRED TO A DIFFERENT STATE POSITION
FOR AN INCREASE IN SALARY AND FEWER MILES TO DRIVE AS IT WAS
CLOSER TO MARION, ND WHERE HER FAMILY LIVES. AS THIS HAS
TRANSPIRES IT PRODUCES A DECREASE IN MORALE, INCREASES STRESS
LOAD, INCREASES OVERTIME HOURS AND INCREASES THE RISK OF ERROR.

AS YOU CAN SEE OUR REQUEST FOR A 10% INCREASE IN PROFESSIONAL SALARIES WOULD BE WITH IN REASON FOR ALL OF OUR LPN'S AND RN'S ON STAFF, AS WELL AS OUR REQUESTED LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY TO OFFER A \$ 1.00/HR SHIFT DIFFERENTIAL. THE GOVERNOR HAS RECOMMENDED A 7% INCREASE AND I RESPECTFULLY REQUEST THE COMMITTEES ENTIRE SUPPORT OF THIS INCREASE. WITH THIS SUPPORT I WOULD RECOMMEND THAT THE POSSIBLE EQUITY INCREASE BE VOID FOR THESE INDIVIDUALS.

THE HOME IS ALSO REQUESTING 1.4 FTE FOR TWO LPN POSITIONS.

DURING THE LAST TWO INSPECTIONS FROM THE VETERANS

ADMINISTRATION WE HAVE BEEN CITED FOR INADEQUATE STAFFING

LEVELS ON THE NIGHT SHIFT. WITH A RESIDENT/STAFF RATIO WHICH

DOES NOT MEET MINIMUM STANDARDS. THEY CONTINUE TO STATE THAT

THIS RESULTS IN "UNSAFE AND UNTIMELY ADMINISTRATION OF

MEDICATIONS." CURRENTLY THE RN FROM THE SKILLED CARE UNIT IS

RESPONSIBLE FOR ALL 149 RESIDENTS IN THE BUILDING AND 3 NURSES

AIDES. THIS WOULD ADD AN LPN TO THE BASIC CARE UNIT ON THE NIGHT

SHIFT TO MEET THE NEEDS OF THOSE RESIDENTS ENABLING THE RN TO CARE FOR THE RESIDENTS ON THE SKILLED UNIT. WE HAVE BEEN TOLD BY THE VA THAT THIS ADDITION WOULD MEET THEIR REQUIREMENTS.

THE HOME IS LASTLY REQUESTING A .5 FTE RN TO ASSIST WITH THE MINIMUM DATA SET (MDS) PROCESS. WITH THE ADVENT OF MEDICARE AND MEDICAID HINGING REIMBURSEMENT TO THE MDS THE WORK LOAD HAS MORE THAN DOUBLED. ONE FULL MDS WITH RAP SUMMARY REVIEW TAKES 8 HOURS TO COMPLETE. IN THE PAST THE MDS WAS COMPLETED ANNUALLY AND A SHORTER VERSION COMPLETED QUARTERLY.

NOW THE FULL MDS IS COMPLETED FOR ALL TIME FRAMES.

ADMISSION ASSESSMENT WITHIN 14 DAYS, ANNUALLY, SIGNIFICANT

CHANGE IN STATUS ASSESSMENT AND QUARTERLY REVIEW ASSESSMENT

TIME FRAMES ARE COMPLETED FOR MEDICAID.

MEDICARE REQUIRES AN ASSESSMENT AT DAY 5, DAY 30, DAY 60, DAY 90 AND FOR MEDICARE READMISSION. AS YOU CAN SEE THE LOAD IS BURDENSOME FOR ONE INDIVIDUAL AND IF NOT COMPLETED AND ELECTRONICALLY SUBMITTED IN THE APPROPRIATE TIME FRAME OUR REIMBURSEMENT RATE IS SET AT THE DEFAULT WHICH IS THE LOWEST RATE FOR THE NEXT ENTIRE QUARTER OR UNTIL A SIGNIFICANT CHANGE IN STATUS WHICH WOULD REQUIRE A NEW ASSESSMENT.

On behalf of the veterans organizations of North Dakota we want to express our support for HB 1007 as submitted by Governor Edward T. Schafer, including the raises allowed for state employees. We are concerned the House of Representatives' reductions in the budgets for the ND Veterans Home and the Department of Veterans Affairs will have an adverse impact on service to our state's veterans.



For example, Governor Schafer addressed the critical issue of retaining and recruiting quality nurses at the Veterans home, due to an extremely tight labor market for nurses in that geographical area, by including a 7% salary adjustment for RN's and LPN's, as well as shift and holiday differentials of about \$1.00 per hour in his budget. The Governor's proposal is supported by a salary survey done by the Home. Unfortunately, the Governor's amount for these areas was reduced by a little over \$69,000. We ask that this amount be reinstated.



In addition, \$50,000 was removed from the Home's capital improvement line item for needed maintenance to, and in, the Home. We especially agree with the Governor that re-tucking certain areas of the building to keep the wind and rain out of the building must be done now. We ask for restoration of the dollars necessary to maintain both the exterior and interior of the Home.

We have concerns about the reduction in the Home's operating budget. Rising health care costs, instability of fuel prices and health care mandates are examples of areas which all make us feel uncomfortable about loss of funds in this line item. We ask you to adequately fund this line item.

We encourage you to restore the dollars removed from the Department of Veterans Affairs' budget. Most of the money taken was to replace antiquated machines as well as upgrade some of the department's computer capabilities. Some computers in the department are so old they can't handle windows, or deal with e-mail. One copier is so old, the manufacturer has said parts don't even exist to fix the machine. We also ask that you put \$7000 in this budget to pay the expenses of the members of the Administrative Committee on Veterans Affairs. These are the 15 appointees of the Governor responsible for the administration and operation of both the Veterans Home and the Department of Veterans Affairs. We've been informed this may be the only committee, with the level of responsibilities it has, which has not been provided funding for its authorized expenses (travel, meals, and lodging.)

It is our sincere belief, deviation from the Governor's recommendations could have a severe, negative impact on veterans in the state.



We understand and appreciate the task before you. We thank you for your consideration of the veterans in our state who need our help.

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Ray Harkema HB 1007

Senator Nething and members of the Appropriations committee, I am Ray Harkema, Commissioner of Veterans Affairs for the state of North Dakota. On behalf of the Administrative Committee on Veterans Affairs, the committee that oversees the operation of the North Dakota Department of Veterans Affairs, I thank you for allowing us the time to appear before you with an overview of our budget needs for the 1999-2001 Biennium.

I would like to give you an outline of our duties. Our department has the responsibility of informing the 60,000 veterans of North Dakota and their dependents of benefits due them from the U.S. Veterans Administration and assist those who qualify for such benefits as compensation, pension, hospitalization, education, home loans and burial benefits in making proper application using our network of County Service Officers. Our Department acts as Power of Attorney in channeling claims for benefits and assists in the preparation and development of the claim. When claims for benefits are denied, we arrange for an appeal with the VA Board of Veterans Appeals in Washington, D.C. The Department also assists with State benefits such as state educational benefits for dependents of MIA, POW, tax exemptions for the disabled, job reinstatement, and veterans preference in public employment. We also administer a Veterans Aid Loan Program, a Grant Program and a



Transportation program. We are responsible for supervision, training and advising the 52 County Veterans Service Officers (who service 53 counties) located throughout the state.

Our goal is to preserve the dignity and self-determination of veterans through awareness and procurement of available benefits that may improve their living conditions and opportunities; we also serve as a focal point for coordination among agencies, both public and private, in all programs and projects affecting veterans and their dependents. We also provide counseling to North Dakota veterans and their dependents or survivors in all matters pertaining to benefits and entitlements earned as a result of military service. We develop and manage all of the Departments programs and projects in a most timely and cost-effective manner, in terms of tangible client service, from funds allotted.

Our objective is to keep informed on the ever changing Federal laws and regulations relating to the numerous veterans benefits programs, to disseminate this information to our County Veterans Service Officers and the public by means of training, news releases and public speaking programs. Also, to bring into North Dakota increased VA monetary benefits through an increase in VA claims properly filed.

According to the latest available statistics, last fiscal year North Dakota received from the VA system monetary benefits in the amount of \$106,963,912 to include: \$49,879,512 in Hospital & Medical benefits; \$43,764,649 Compensation & Pension; \$7,362,571 Vocational Rehabilitation; \$5,345,006 Insurance & Indemnities; and \$612,174 in Construction related costs distributed to those eligible throughout the state.

Should we relent in any way in informing and assisting our veteran population in establishing their claims, the state and local jurisdictions would lose their share of federal benefits and in many cases the cost of care for these people would fall directly back on our state responsibilities.

The 106 million in federal benefits just do not come to North Dakota on their own, they must be sought after daily. This is what those of us assigned the task attempt to do.

Our Department now has 6 FTE's. Our services include: Loans, Grants, Transportation and Claims/Training.

We have been mandated by the North Dakota Veterans Coordinating

Council and the Administrative Committee to address some of the glaring

needs of some of our veteran population.

Transportation was a major problem for many because of the distance

to a VA Medical Facility. We now have four vans on the road, manned by volunteer drivers, that bring veterans to the Fargo VA Medical Facility and the Mile City Medical Facility on a regular scheduled basis. The purchase of the vans was accomplished with the earned interest of the Post War Trust Fund.

Our Grant program is used to provide dental care, optical care and hearing aids to our veterans in need of emergency hardship assistance. This also is accomplished with the earned interest of the Post War Trust Fund.

We are very thankful that we have been able to maintain a County Veterans Service Officer in each county that can reach out to the veterans in their community and supply the help where needed. We hold two training sessions each year for the County Veterans Service Officers and maintain daily contact with these people on a need basis. All Veterans Service Officers are required to maintain a certification status on an annual basis.

The Loan Program requires a lot of administration but it has proved to be extremely valuable in helping veterans through a financial hardship. This is an unsecured loan that requires constant monitoring. We process approximately 140 applications per year.

There are two specific issues I would like to address:

Travel expense for the Administrative Committee who serve without receiving compensation. Expenses are permitted by Century Code in the same manner as are elected officials and employees of the state. The Governor appoints these individuals to represent the five veterans organizations. The cost for the Biennium would be \$7,000.00 for our subcommittee.

The second issue is the House reduction of \$13,984.00. It is <u>critical</u> that this be restored. Since this is a lump sum budget and you have no line items or object codes to refer to, I have an attachment to my testimony showing the breakdown of our budget.

There is nothing in our budget that is not minimum requirements to meet the needs of the demands placed on this small but effective department. We have made changes in our operation to increase efficiency. We operate as conservatively as possible, we need every dollar requested. We have a responsibility to serve a major portion of our state population. We feel we do an excellent job with the few dollars requested.

We sincerely appreciate the cooperation we have received in the past from the Legislative process and we look forward to maintaining this spirit of

cooperation as we enter the next Biennium. Our job is to see that the people who defend our freedom are taken care of after they hang up their uniform. It is not an easy task, but very necessary.
