<u>Minutes</u>: Some of the individuals testifying submit written testimony. When noted please refer to it for more detailed information.

Representative Klein, Chairman of the GVA Committee opened the hearing on January 14, 1999. Summary of the Bill: Relating to debt collection by the state treasure.

Testimony in Favor:

<u>Paul Kramer</u>, Legislative Council appeared before the committee to explain the bill. This bill would create a state collection agency. He walked the committee through the bill, section by section. Please refer to the tape to hear him refer to this. It's a self funding entity.

Representative Klein, How is the debt collection taking place now?

<u>Kramer</u>, The committee looked at how Minnesota is doing it. The agencies for the most part go out on their own and contract to have this done. Some agencies do it themselves.

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Representative Klemin, The federal law now, the way it's written. How does it apply to this bill?

Was there a review done?

<u>Kramer</u>, I would presume so (review), they copied what Minnesota is doing and I would think they are following federal law. An attorney from our office drafted this bill.

Klemin, The answer is that you haven't done a review to see if ND is compliant with federal law.

Kramer, I guess not.

Klemin, Page 6, section 11, establishment of collection penalty. When is this effective? Date of the act?

Kramer, Probably not the date of the act.

Klemin, Are there penalty provisions in addition to interest provisions?

Representative Klemin, I guess I can't answer that. It's not an area the committee reviewed.

Representative Klemin, This would impose a penalty on top of the interests?

Kramer, Basically.

Representative Klemin, Section 12 on page 12 talks about fees. Expressly prohibited by law. Is there anywhere else where this is prohibited by law.

Kramer, Not where I am aware of. This is strictly state law.

Representative Klemin, Page 9, Burleigh county small claims court is 2500 dollars. Why was it 2500 versus the 5000? In ND we have or get 5000 in small claims court.

Kramer, I can't answer that, except that the attorney modeled it after the Minnesota case.

Representative Klemin, Page 10, line 28 it says the debtor has 28 days to request the venue.

Where in ND law do we do this?

Kramer, Once again I am not an attorney and I assume the attorney who drafted it modeled it.

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Representative Thoreson, Time line, is this a half a million dollar budget, give or take?

Kramer, A little more.

Representative John Dorso, This is modeled after Minnesota law. I have asked for information from them and just haven't received it yet. Minnesota had put this agency together to collect bad debt. and it has recovered millions and millions of dollars. They had agencies also that didn't have standarized practices, it was a miss mash. Our state rights off millions of dollars of bad debt. some of it which, is never really pressed (the issue isn't pressed). That is why we want it and to provide a mechanism that is self funding. I don't think it would cost the state anything. The agencies within our state may have a turf issue with this. Every agency has their own way of doing this and one thinks it may be better than anothers. Keep an open mind on this, gather your information and take your testimony. I will get you as much information that I can from Minnesota on how they self funded it, and how much money they have collected. Maybe we can have some amendments drafted by legislative council to fit into this bill. It's time we in ND do pull it together. There are some people out there who do owe us money and we should try to collect this.

Representative Klein, How long has Minnesota been operating under this system?

Dorso, Five years.

<u>Denise Lawson</u>, North Dakota Newspaper Association appeared before the committee. She submitted written testimony and amendments which she read in it's entirety (please refer to this testimony and amendments).

<u>Testimony in Opposition</u>:

Rich Clayburgh, I am here in a neutral compasity. I think you should do a study on this issue. It's got it's benefits but we shouldn't run into this to soon without knowing. I would support a collection agency but I believe and support a study resolution to make sure the legislature knows what their getting into.

Representative Winrich, In a number of places there are exemptions where things are prohibited under federal law. Does that prohibit or delay any of your concerns about the amendment offered by the newspaper association.

<u>Clayburgh</u>, Haven't seen it. There are strict confidentiality laws. My point is I don't object, but a lot more study has to be done before we make it law.

Rod Backman, OMB appeared before the committee to echo what the tax commissioner stated. How big of a problem is this in ND. Based on our limited review of this, we haven't found any wide spread problems. Were not talking about general fund dollars. My main point is that I believe we need to have some additional research to actually identify to what extent if any there is a problem

Representative Klein, 1.3 Billion in loans receivable and only 90 some thousand of that is out of the general fund.

<u>Backman</u>, That's part of the normal operating costs and the bulk of that is paid within that month. The large dollars are part of the on going process.

<u>Pat Fricke</u>, ND Housing and Finance appeared before the committee and stated that he is more neutral on this bill. We have a concern with page 2, line and line 28. The mandatory reporting of debt. receivable, is are normal course of business. There is also confidentiality involved here also.

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<u>Jack McDonald</u>, ND Newspaper and Broadcasters Association appeared and stating what your really setting up here is a collection agency. Once you go to court and collect a debt., that name is public and this bill will do exactly that. There isn't anything wrong with the amendment we have proposed.

Page 4, line 25, add:

"The name of the debtor, and the creditor agency and the amount of the debt shall not be confidential."
