Presentation Before the 1999 House Ag Committee January 8, 1999 Charles Linderman, NDSC Board Member and Soybean Producer

Chairman Nicholas, members of the committee and visitors, I am Charles Linderman, an NDSC board member. I am here today to testify on behalf of House Bill 1078 to amend and reenact section 4-10.5-11 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the penalty for nonpayment of soybean assessments. A house keeping matter for the Council which align our legislative bylaws with federal law. I invite any questions you may have regarding the policies of the NDSC and the intent of this bill.


In 1985, through Senate Bill 2284, during the Forty-Ninth Legislative Assembly, the North Dakota Soybean Council was established to formulate research, education, publicity, and promotion programs for the advancement of the soybean industry. The initial checkoff of two cents per bushel has been changed to one-half of one percent of the net market price under the national Soybean Promotion, Research and Consumer Information Act (SPARC) of 1991. Under federal law fifty percent of this revenue is sent from the state to the national soybean promotion effort. The remaining assessment is administered by the Council and must be utilized for research, education, publicity, and promotion.

Under federal law, first purchasers are required to collect and remit the checkoff assessment. Those first purchasers who do not collect the assessment, or producers who do not pay will be in violation and subject to civil penalty of no more than \$1,000 for each violation and an additional penalty for willful failure to pay equal to the amount of such assessment. A late payment charge of 2% is added each month to assessments not remitted on time. Currently state law states that a first purchaser shall pay a late payment charge of 10% of the assessment due, plus interest at the rate of twelve percent per annum from the due date.

House Bill 1078 will bring state law into compliance with federal law and eliminate this legislative contradiction. While this action reduces the penalty assessed against those first purchasers out of compliance, the financial statement of the Soybean Council should not be affected by this action. Due to the Soybean Council's federally mandated audits of first purchasers, penalty assessments are rare. An independent audit keeps first purchasers aware of soybean checkoff practices and policies. A majority of which have been audited and are well within compliance.

I would appreciate your support of this bill and its passage into law for the soybean producers within the state of North Dakota. Thank you for your consideration of House Bill 1078. Should anyone have any questions, concerns, or comments I would be happy to entertain them at this time.
