higher then normal.

Keiser: Just the opposite is true. However low bid does not mean least expensive.

Rep. L. Thoreson: For clarification, this would still require an informal bidding process for

under 50,000 and normal bidding process for over 50,000.

Keiser: Going back to reality. If you have two local contractors bidding, they are keeping a close

eye and policing the bidding process.

Ron Torgeson: From the North Dakota council of Education Leaders. Appeared in support of

HB 1353.

Rep. Nelson: When was the eight thousand limit put into law?

Torgeson: I don't know.

Bev Nielson: North Dakota School Board Association, appeared in support of HB 1353.

John Jankowski: Larimore Public School Superintendent, appeared in support HB 1353.

Denise Lawson: North Dakota Newspaper Association appeared in opposition of HB 1353 (see

REPRESENTATIVE KEISER, DISTRICT 47, introduced HB1353. The House has already amended this bill which is up to \$25,000 and whichever vehicle that you would choose to work with is fine with me. We might as well take away a limit if we are going to leave it \$8,000. We should strike the section and say everything has to be bid and go forward. I do think an increase in that limit is appropriate and I would hope that the committee would concur.

# **JANUARY 25, 1999**

Madame Chair Kelsch and members of the committee, my name is Tom Tupa and I am representing the National Electrical Contractor's Association - Dakotas Chapter - and the ND Association of Plumbing, Heating, and Mechanical Contractors. I first apologize for not being present at the hearing on HB 1353. I was detained at another meeting and by the time I got the your hearing, I had missed the opportunity to testify on the bill.

I also want to thank you, Madame Chair, for allowing me to submit late testimony on HB 1353.

NECA and the ND APHMC have traditionally opposed raising the floor on bids for public construction. At the same time we understand the costs of construction continue to increase. So, we normally go along with periodic adjustments to take care of inflation and other increases.

HB 1353, however, goes from 8 to 50 thousand dollars. That is a significant increase. We would like to suggest a figure of 25 thousand dollars rather than the 50.

Our reasoning for the lesser increase is to give contractors an opportunity to bid at lower levels. We think some smaller contractors might get more opportunities to provide work with the lower bid levels. It could be, one of these lower bids might be enough to keep a smaller contractor in business and help new contractors get their businesses off the ground.

Raising the bid level might mean a smaller contractor cannot afford bonding at the higher level. Additionally, the process of competitive bidding generally has been demonstrated as a money saver.

We also think this lesser bid figure allows better opportunities for smaller contractors in rural communities

For these reasons we ask the committee to consider replacing the word fifty on line 11 with the word twenty-five. Thank you for you time and consideration.

# HOUSE EDUCATION COMMITTEE HB 1353

#### CHAIRMAN KELSCH AND COMMITTEE MEMBERS:

My name is Denise Lawson. I'm appearing today on behalf of the North Dakota Newspaper Association. We oppose HB 1353.

In the past our association has not opposed reasonable increases to minimum bidding thresholds. However, this would be an increase of 625%, and would result in less public notice to North Dakotans interested in doing business with their school districts.

The law currently allows for several reasonable exceptions, alleviating the need for public notices for certain contracts. We believe that \$50 thousand in aggregate contract services is a substantial amount of business for any school district. Therefore, a public notice should be offered by the school district, both as information to the public that is paying for the school district, and as an opportunity for business.

We respectfully request a DO NOT PASS on this bill.
