SENATOR NETHING: Opened the hearing on SB 2017; A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the adjutant general.

KEITH BJERKE: Major General Keith D. Bjerke, Adjutant General of the ND National Guard to testify in support of SB 2017. (testimony attached) (tape 1, side A 100-2140).

SENATOR NETHING: I want to focus on that addition to the Emergency Operations Center. I think you indicated it was an \$800,000 project. The Legislative Council has given us an analysis that refers to this project: General Funds \$200,000; Other funds \$427,099. Paul will you describe the difference.

PAUL KRAMER: The yellow sheet we do for an analysis doesn't necessarily lay out the total funding for a line item. What it goes through are the major changes. They had major capital project funding in their current budget. What this identifies are the major funding source changes for that project in that line. It doesn't lay out the total cost. Utility costs shows \$107,000. That is not their total utility budget, that is the increase in the utility budget.

SENATOR NETHING: Do you have other funds to reach the \$800,000. Is this the only project you have going?

KEITH BJERKE: This is the only project coming into this biennium requiring state funding. Seventy-five percent will be coming from FEMA. Those funds are available. That gives us direct access to start that project with your approval.

SENATOR NETHING: The bottom line is that \$200,000 is enough state funds to complete the center.

KEITH BJERKE: Absolutely.

SENATOR NETHING: On page 6 when you refer to operating expenses, you indicate inflationary increases with the largest increases in the utility line. Can you tell us more about those increases?

KEITH BJERKE: The percentage increase in this biennium is 8.3 percent in the utilities.

RONALD GANGNESS: We can provide you with a complete breakdown of those numbers. We had some facilities that came on line last biennium that were not fully funded last biennium.

SENATOR HOLMBERG: The issue of tuition fees. Last biennium you indicated the Guard would pick up the unmet needs. And then you said that wouldn't work out. What was the cause?

KEITH BJERKE: The last two sessions we have set up this process whereby the National Guard would try to fund 50 percent through appropriated dollars, the institution would wave whatever portion could not be met by the National Guard and outside assistance. It was the intent that students would sit down with counselors from the institution early in the year and apply for financial assistance through grants, etc.. The first year's biennium we ended up with about 19% cost to higher education. However, as we got into this biennium, it has gone from 19 percent for higher education to close to 30 percent.

We have gone back to try to find a plan that would assist students and limit the liability to higher education and still have a reasonable figure to present to this body. We are now analyzing grade point averages, outside assistance sources, and attitude toward getting them. Students who work the hardest in achieving grades and securing outside assistance should receive the greatest benefit. Now, a full-time student will receive a \$500 scholarship and part-time students getting less. At a typical institution of about \$1,000 tuition, we give them a \$500 scholarship, the university waves 25 percent, that leaves an unmet need that the student can fill by many different methods. Now it is to their benefit to secure outside financial assistance on their own. If they don't it comes out of their pockets, not yours and mine. By increasing the eligibility to a 2.5 GPA, we can say to the student if you're not serious about going to school, we don't need you.

SENATOR KRINGSTAD: I have felt the various foundations and scholarships in athletics and music had subsidized the National Guard for years. Will the federal funds still be deducted? (tape 3210)

KEITH BJERKE: No, that is gone.

SENATOR ROBINSON: In reference to the Mandan Armory, what is happening to other armories across the state?

KEITH BJERKE: We have no agenda to close any armories. The amount of rent we pay to these armories, is not excessive. There is an increased demand on these community-owned facilities to receive community support.

SENATOR HOLMBERG: The way the scholarship program is set up now, do students know about the changes so we don't receive calls indicating everyone had reneged on their promises? **KEITH BJERKE**: It will continue throughout the biennium. Higher education is aware they have about a \$300,000 additional obligation to wave tuition for these students.

SENATOR SOLBERG: Let me return to this \$107,000 on utilities in the general fund. Do the feds pay anything on utilities?

RON GANGNESS: The federal participation in utilities is all taken care of through the army and air guard contracts. In operations, this line item you are talking about is supporting only those buildings that are supported with 100 percent general funds.

Also, I went back and looked at my records. The other utilities increase in addition to inflationary, is primarily due to the abnormally warm winter we had in 1996. The number we have included now is based on true expenditures based on traditional normal heating days.

KEITH BJERKE: We will provide you with a breakout of those costs.

JOHN DWYER: Staff Judge Advocate in the Air National Guard and Chairman of the Legislative Committee to testify in support of SB 2017. The legislative committee of the ND National Guard is supportive of the Air National Guard budget. (tape 3770)

The challenges presented to the North Dakota National Guard over the biennium were many. They ranged from unit reorganizations to meet future force structure requirements to complex deployments supporting third world countries. We continued a significant home station commitment in support of disaster relief and many community projects.

The individual units' accomplishments can be attributed to the great North Dakota citizens who make up those units as soldiers and airmen. On every level, our overall success can be credited in a major part to the support of our Governor, the Legislature, and the communities of our Great State.

Once again, the North Dakota National Guard led the nation in the **quality** of recruits. This is a very positive reflection on our educational system. We continue to attract the "best of the best" and report for any muster that is requested of us. Our vision is to "Train and Mentor Leaders." With all of the demands that are placed on the National Guard and our partners, it is critical that we remain flexible and responsive to whatever our state or nation requires. This, above all else, requires enlightened, motivated leadership of a top quality force.

As of the first of this year, the North Dakota Army National Guard had an authorized strength of 3,763 personnel and had an assigned strength of 3,333 soldiers and officers. The North Dakota Air National Guard had an authorized strength of 1,057 airmen and officers and had an assigned strength of 1,102 personnel. The National Guard of North Dakota employs 903 full-time personnel of which 125 are State FTE positions with 35.25 equivalent FTE's supported with state general funds.

The past biennium found us not only facing the tasks of today, but also preparing to meet the challenges of tomorrow. Your North Dakota National Guard soldiers and airmen are recognized globally for their pioneer spirit and "can do" attitudes. Engineers braved tropical heat and austere

living conditions to build schools and medical clinics in remote mountainous regions of Honduras. They traveled to Korea to take part in environmental missions. Air Guard pilots accumulated over forty thousand accident free flying hours in the F-16 Falcon (another first), while Civil Engineering Teams deployed to Italy and Germany. As we move into the future, we must begin to think about the unthinkable. Defense of our homeland and responding to weapons of mass destruction are no longer pages from a science fiction novel, but a potential reality.

Of course we cannot forget our response to three Presidential Disaster Declarations of 1997/98. "Operation Snowball" and "Operation Good Neighbor" and the otherwise unnamed "Disaster 1220" have tested our metal and staying power. We played a major role in the response and recovery activities that deployed over 2000 National Guard members on State Active Duty (an all time record) and hundreds of personnel from other State and Federal agencies that saved lives and protected private and public property. This was an extremely intense, pressure filled period of time and your North Dakota National Guard was a pillar of strength and professionalism throughout.

Your Guardsmen also brought value to nearly forty other local communities. We were there when the City of Williston needed water, and likewise when all of Eastern North Dakota had too much. We repaired high school running tracks, and city parks. We built baseball fields, lifted storm sewer pumps, and constructed roadways. Although our deeds and accomplishments are known around the world, we savor opportunities like "Red Ribbon Week," a carnival for hundreds of our youth that promotes a drug free lifestyle, or the chance to bring Christmas to the North Dakota Veterans Hospital in Lisbon.

Our current mission assignments and force structure allocators are relevant and place us in an enviable position with other states. Even in these times of continued military downsizing and re-engineering, the North Dakota National Guard stands tall. None of this would have been possible without the solid support of our North Dakota Legislature. I am here today to ask you to continue your outstanding record. The Governor has given us a sound budget recommendation that will propel us into the next millennium. I would like to review each line item of our proposed budget with you. <u>Salaries and Wages</u> General fund increases are due to the salary benefit adjustment of 3% for both years of the biennium as proposed by the Governor, reclassifications of existing FTE's, and market competitive increases to maintain our temporary work force.

We are also requesting an additional FTE. This is a currently required carpenter position which has been filled with temporary labor. Budgeted temporary funding was reduced appropriately for this position to move it to funding for a full-time position.

To minimize the increase in general funds for salaries and wages and also to fund fixed costs in our state operations, we have not funded the Deputy Adjutant General position for the second year of the biennium.

We have requested and received in the Governor's budget, unfunded special fund authority of \$210,000 and a new FTE in support of the Veterans Cemetery. In total, this is authority for three FTE and 2 temporary positions. Our intent is to secure special funding for the \$210,000 from the Veterans Post War Trust Fund. If not, we will have to utilize funds from the Militia Foundation of the North Dakota National Guard.

<u>Operating Expenses</u> The increase shown in the Governor's recommendation is for inflationary increases with the largest increase in the utilities line.

<u>Capital Improvements</u> We have requested an "Addition" project for the State Emergency Operations Center (EOC). This is building #035 located underground at Fraine Barracks. The project would provide an above ground addition of 7,168 square feet. The total cost of the project is \$800,000 of which 25% or \$200,000 would be state funding, the remaining \$600,000 is federal funding.

This project serves an additional purpose. The existing EOC is in urgent need of a roof replacement. The "Addition" would eliminate a need for roof repair since it would be an upward addition to the building. If we secured federal maintenance and repair dollars for roof replacement, it would be a 50% match rather than 25/75 as described above for the "Addition". The total cost of roof replacement would be approximately \$300,000, costing the State \$150,000, which would not provide any of the needed additional space. The additional space would allow Emergency Management staff to be under one roof and free up needed space for 29 National Guard members in building #040 as we expand our response capabilities for "Weapons of Mass Destruction" and "Homeland Defense".

<u>Grants (City Armories)</u> A decrease of \$11,312 is shown here from the current biennium due to a reduction in occupied space at the Mandan Armory.

<u>Civil Air Patrol</u> An increase in Civil Air Patrol is due to the Governor's proposed salary increase for the one FTE in this line item. In addition, \$10,000 was requested for the purchase of ten radios to replace worn out and outdated equipment necessary for effective operations.

<u>Tuition Fees</u> We have decreased our costs by \$128,500 as a result of revising the program which limits our spending and also limits liability for the state colleges and universities. We are proposing a new program with Senate Bill 2084 that reimburses each student based upon the number of credit hours completed and requires at least a 2.5 GPA. The state colleges

and universities will provide a 25% waiver of the total cost at each individual institution. Students participating in this program have exceeded our expectations at over 600 per semester. The funding included in our budget request allows for the increased enrollment and will allow each student the waiver and reimbursement regardless of the amount of gift aid received by students.

<u>Air Guard Contracts</u> Our request included a small increase (\$15,000) in general fund support which is proportionate to increased federal funds requested for inflationary increases in operations. The Governor's recommendation includes additional general fund support for the proposed 3% salary increases for those employees having a general fund match, normally at 25%.

We have also requested four additional FTE's in this line that were removed during the 1997 Legislature. They are 100% federally funded positions. During our budget preparation we were projecting a need sometime during the 1999-2001 Biennium for the additional FTE's to meet requirements under our existing federal contracts. Due to increasing international tensions we are reevaluating the physical security requirements

at the Air National Guard Base located on Hector Field in Fargo. We have received strong indications that there will be federal funds to support additional security personnel.

<u>Army Guard Contracts</u> We did not request any general fund increases in this line due to prioritizing of general fund supported requirements. The general fund increases in the Governor's recommendation is for proposed 3% salary increases for those employees having a general fund match, normally at 25%.

We are requesting a significant increase in federal fund authority. Those increases are due to a discontinuance of direct federal pay which now passes through the state accounting system and are 100% federally reimbursed. There are a number of programs within this line item that this change affects. The largest of these program changes is in maintenance and repair for 100% federally supported buildings, lands and infrastructure and ISD Telecommunications.

We are also requesting two additional FTE's in Army Guard Contracts that were removed during the 1997 Legislature. They are 100%

federally reimbursed FTE's. These were positions we were projecting a need sometime during the 1999-2001 Biennium to meet requirements under our existing federal contracts. As with the Air Guard Contracts, increasing international tensions have required us to immediately evaluate and plan increases in physical security at critical sites. We have received strong indications that there will be federal funds to support additional security personnel.

North Dakota's National Guard stands ready to respond to our Governor when called, to meet our citizens needs and provide protection and relief from natural emergencies and other contingencies. The Guard does not cost our state; it pays, resulting in our state prospering by our presence. I am extremely proud of our Guard, their level of readiness, their accomplishments, their professionalism and their resolve.

The challenges presented to the North Dakota National Guard over the biennium were many. They ranged from unit reorganizations to meet future force structure requirements to complex deployments supporting third world countries. We continued a significant home station commitment in support of disaster relief and many community projects.

The individual units' accomplishments can be attributed to the great North Dakota citizens who make up those units as soldiers and airmen. On every level, our overall success can be credited in a major part to the support of our Governor, the Legislature, and the communities of our Great State.

Once again, the North Dakota National Guard led the nation in the **quality** of recruits. This is a very positive reflection on our educational system. We continue to attract the "best of the best" and report for any muster that is requested of us. Our vision is to "Train and Mentor Leaders." With all of the demands that are placed on the National Guard and our partners, it is critical that we remain flexible and responsive to whatever our state or nation requires. This, above all else, requires enlightened, motivated leadership of a top quality force.

As of the first of this year, the North Dakota Army National Guard had an authorized strength of 3,763 personnel and had an assigned strength of 3,333 soldiers and officers. The North Dakota Air National Guard had an authorized strength of 1,057 airmen and officers and had an assigned strength of 1,102 personnel. The National Guard of North Dakota employs 903 full-time personnel of which 125 are State FTE positions with 35.25 equivalent FTE's supported with state general funds.

The past biennium found us not only facing the tasks of today, but also preparing to meet the challenges of tomorrow. Your North Dakota National Guard soldiers and airmen are recognized globally for their pioneer spirit

We are showing the largest increase in utilities which is predominately an increase for water and sewer service at Camp Grafton. We have just recently secured such services from Ramsey County rural water and sewer entities due to the rising level of Devils Lake and the abandoning of our lagoon and underground water reservoir systems.

<u>Capital Improvements</u> We have requested an "Addition" project for the State Emergency Operations Center (EOC). This is building #035 located underground at Fraine Barracks. The project would provide an above ground addition of 7,168 square feet. OFFICE OF ADJUTANT GENERAL 1999 – 2001 BIENNIAL BUDGET **SENATE BILL 2017**

Major items affecting Adjutant General 1999-2001 Budget

Emergency Operations Center Addition: The request for this project is \$200,000 general funds and \$600,000 federal fund authority, a total of \$800,000. This building is in urgent need of roof repair which is estimated at a cost of \$300,000 which as a repair would be funded with 50% federal funds and 50% general funds or \$150,000 of each. *However, for an additional \$50,000 or \$200,000 general funds and federal matching of \$600,000 an "addition" of 7,168 square feet can be made to this building. The "addition" will not only add a new roof but it will also create much needed additional space.

New FTE Positions: The Adjutant General has requested 8 new FTE positions. Six of those positions are 100% federally funded positions taken during the 1997 legislative session. Due to increasing international tensions, an increase in National Guard security positions will be required.

A general fund position is also requested for a currently required carpenter position which has been filled with temporary labor.

A special fund position is requested for an additional FTE at the Veterans Cemetery. Special funding for this position will be provided by the Veterans Post War Trust Fund. If those funds are not available for total funding, funds from the North Dakota National Guard Militia Foundation will be utilized.

Increase Funding for Utility Costs: Utility costs have increased by \$107,000. The majority of this increase is due to the loss of the Camp Grafton lagoon and underground water reservoir systems from rising Devils Lake levels. These services are now being provided by the local rural water and sewer entity.

Increase in Federal Funding : An increase has been requested in federal funding for the Army Guard Contracts line of approximately \$4 million. This is due to previous direct federal pay now being passed through the state's accounting system. These items are 100% federally reimbursed.
