Senator Freborg: Is there any testimony for SB 2088?

Linda Kahl testified in support. Testimony attached.

Senator Kelsh: What specified divided land, top of page 2 the very first word and section 3 the last sentences, the sold once on a contract and can't be sold as a single unit. Would that mean that by taking that out of there it couldn't be any longer? What is the reason for taking this language out of the last sentences of section 3?

Linda Kahl: Board has the authority under the statutes to sub divide. Basically this is one of he exceptions I was talking about. If something is subdivided already we don't have to go with court exception. Lands that have not been subdivided especially can be offered. Trying to get

that anymore because that is one of the exceptions.

Senator O'Connell: Give me a brief 101 course in grant and non grant.

Linda Kahl: Grant was given to us, non grant are acquired property or we maybe sold them and

got them back.

Senator Redlin: You lease pasture, say a section, I know there are several, do you lease that all

in one shot.

Linda Kahl: We lease it by quater sections. The leases can vary on the land.

Senator Kelsh: Do you sometimes lease 40 acre plots or 80 acre plots?

Linda Kahl: Yes.

Senator Freborg: You cannot sell more than a quarter section. You can't sell a part of a quarter

with a full quarter. Is that right?

Linda Kahl: We can sell all of it, it is just a matter of how accurate.

Senator Freborg: I understand that you show the current restrictions and then the proposed

change. Why wouldn't you sell the 115 acres in blue with the 180 acres in yellow above it? In

other words the southwest quarter and the northwest quarter together. Can't do that now so you

have to stay with the quarter, the full quarter or something less.

Linda Kahl: Unless with the exception of a road by passing it, etc. Can hook it if it is under 100

acres.

Senator Cook: Do we have any land in CRP?

Linda Kahl: Yes.

Chairman R Kelsch: We will open the hearing on SB 2088 and ask the clerk to read the title.

<u>Linda Kahl:</u> Administrative Officer & Leasing Coordinator: (See attached testimony)

Rep. Mueller: A point of clarification for me, in section four, leases made under this section must be for cash only and the rental must be collected in advance. Advance in the case of four years previous to the four year period in its total etc.

<u>Kahl</u>: Not sure what your question is. If you are asking if it makes a difference when the payment is made, is that what you are asking?

Rep. Mueller: I am asking do those who lease the land, have to pay for those five years in

advance.

<u>Kahl:</u> They pay one year at a time, regardless of the lease.

Rep Nelson: In section two, where you hold the public auctions, wouldn't it be more efficient to

hold the public auctions in Bismarck for you.

Kahl: Yes. But from a customer service standpoint, it wouldn't be very nice of us to do that.

Rep Nelson: With this change, it looks to me, in the law, is it could happen that all auctions

could be in Bismarck.

Kahl: It could. That is not our intent.

Rep Johnson: Who decides when they want to bring it back.

Kahl: The decision is made by the Land Department staff and it would be on a case by case. IT

would also be what makes sense from a financial stand point. For the most part it is going to be

leased by the association, there are not a lot of cases where it is necessary, but where it is, it is

very necessary.

Rep. Hanson: Are all leases open to the public?

Kahl: Open in what way.

Rep. Hanson: Grazing Association do they have dibs on certain areas that no one else can bid

on?

Kahl: There are tracts within the grazing association that we lease that they manage for us.

Rep. Hanson: So you will only derive the maximum amount of money if someone wanted to bid ten dollars an acre and they are paying you four. So you would have to lease it because it is in the grazing association.

<u>Kahl:</u> As I understand it, someone outside the association wanted to come in bid that tract away they are free to do so.

Rep. Hanson: So it is not an automatic.

<u>Kahl</u>: If those tracts come up for public auction, just like all the other tracts, and whoever wants to come to the auction is free to bid on those.

<u>Vice Chair Drovdal</u>: For the committee sake, and while the land department is still here, I am going to purpose an amendment. The amendment has to do with is to require the land department to pay the local county five per cent, to help cover the cost of road maintenance, fire and police protection. I would ask Bob to address the amendments.

Bob Olheiser: I represent the board of university and school lands. I will explain what the amendments what it does and what the impact will do. All tracts when they come up for lease are open to anybody to bid on. There are no dibs on the part of the grazing association. The location of the auction, again Linda is correct, the technical part is, we could do this from Bismarck but we go out to where our business is.

Rep Nelson: I agree with you on that point, but when we make changes to century code I would feel more comfortable with some language that brought in some regional affiliation rather than leaving it open ended.

Olheiser: We have reviewed the amendments and basically what the amendments would do is require the land board to take a maximum of five per cent of the revenue that we generate from

surface grass lands and distribute that revenue back to the counties where those lands are located. This is not an in lieu tax payment or anything like that. It would be to pay for services such as fire, it is clear that the counties provide road service and access to school trust land and that adds value to lands and so as we understand the amendment it would be an attempt to give something back to those counties in payment for those services that they provide. Based on our current numbers, the five per cent could be \$160,000 to \$200,00 a year. The board is not opposed to paying for services. We have no objection to the amendment if the committee wishes to put that on the bill.

Rep. Nowatzki: What would be the fiscal note?

Rep. Mueller: In the language of the amendment, may not exceed five per cent, why are we not saying five per cent?

<u>Vice Chair Drovdal</u>: We can discuss that when we actually propose the amendment.

Rep Nelson: If this amendment would pass, and the money would go back to the counties, in situations where townships are organized, would the money go back to the townships?

Olheiser: As we understand the amendment, we would make a single payment to the County

Commissioners and they would decide how to subdivide that or they may keep it.

Rep Nottestad: Would there be a five per cent reduction payment of the school payment?

Olheiser: The answer is no and the reason we would not reduce school payments is because currently the land board has the option of all the monies that we produce for schools, is divided two ways. Currently about 25 million dollars of that is distributed to grades k-12 but the land board currently is taking a portion of that money and putting that money back into the permanent trust fund. We need to develop a critical mass in the permanent fund so it gets to a point to about

eight hundred million dollars, according to the land board investments will allow us to increase distribution to schools by four per cent every year forever.

Rep Nottestad: Where the money goes to can still slow down the building up the money.

<u>Rep Nelson</u>: How much revenue do you generate per year in the lease of school and trust lands? <u>Olheiser:</u> About three point eight million dollars.

Vice Chair Drovdal: Are there any other questions for Mr Olheiser, if not we thank you input. Are there any other testimony on SB 2088 at this time? Anyone who opposes the bill?

Mike Donahue: Representative of the North Dakota Wild Life Association, we are not opposed to SB 2088, we are neutral. But we would like to see an amendment to section three that would preclude any sale of any school lands at least until July 1, 2003. The purpose there, our organization is opposed to the sale of any school land. North Dakota started with three point two million acres of school land and now we are down to seven hundred and fourteen thousand surface acres. Currently the association has a request for comments out and in that request it has listed nineteen thousand one hundred eighty seven acres. Those acreages are within forty one counties in the state. The request came out December 1998 and ends September 30, 1999, and they must be tracked. We need time to develop recreation and the request only has agricultural

<u>Vice Chair Drovdal</u>: Can you tell me how many acres have been sold since the moratorium has been put on.

<u>Donahue:</u> I can't answer that.

land. We need time to affirm all these values.

Vice Chair Droydal: Anyone wishing to testify on SB 2088.

Joe Westby: NDEA and I would like to lend my support to the amendments.

County services benefiting school trust lands - Payment. SENATOR KELSH REP. HANSON

SENATOR WANZEK called the Senate Conference Committee to order on SB2088. All members present. We're here in conference to discuss SB2088 and the amendments the House had adopted. Will one of the House members please explain the amendments.

REP. H. DROVDAL: The amendments that we proposed in section 3 have to do with land that is owned or managed by the State Land Department (school land) and what it is asking is that the board send out to the counties to which the land is located a fee of up to 5% of the lease money that they get that year to help maintain the central services such as roads, road repair, that serves

that particular land. It would be at the same rate that a neighbor taxpayer pays for those same essential services. It does not include social services, it does not include school/education funding, it just means essential services. Doesn't touch the permanent trust fund or the interest of the permanent trust fund, it is only the additional money that is coming from leases for that.

SENATOR FREBORG: It is all general fund money.

REP. DROVDAL: This is money that the Land Department received each year, leases from farmers and ranchers.

SENATOR FREBORG: Where does it go.

REP. DROVDAL: It goes into their special fund that they generally disperse out to tuition payments.

REP. HANSON: It is not tuition apportionment, tuition apportionment is on the student, maybe it is.

SENATOR WANZEK: We have Robert Olheiser here, would you mind explaining.

BOB OLHEISER, COMMISSIONER OF ND STATE LAND DEPARTMENT. The answer to the question is all of the funds involved in this particular amendment are special funds that would go, if it does not go to the purpose of 1% to help counties, then it goes into the permanent trust fund which we are responsible for managing and those permanent funds would be mainly the common school trust fund. In addition there might be some institutional educational trust funds out such as Veteran's Funds, etc.

REP. NELSON: In the House testimony you testified as to how much the per pupil ADM payment would decrease if this was enacted. Could you enlighten the committee as to how much that was.

BOB: It's approximately \$7-8 per student depending on how enrollments go, maybe as much as \$9, but let's say \$7-9 per student would be the maximum amount. The money we're talking about here, the 5% would not decrease the distribution that we would be making to DPI on an annual basis. The reason for that is because the Land Board has distributions coming in place that will pretty much guarantee certain increases in those distributions for at least the next 5 or 6 years. Where this money would have an impact is when we distribute part of our funds and part of those incomes don't back into the permanent trust fund. This would be money that would be earmarked normally to go into the permanent trust fund so the funds won't grow as fast.

SENATOR FREBORG: Can't relate to the \$7-9 that it affects the payment to the schools. What money are you talking about.

BOB: The amount we put in which is about \$266,000 a year. What would that equate to per student and that is equivalent to \$7-9 per student, but we're not going to decrease distributions by that amount. I gave the number to provide an answer. If you take \$266,000 and divide by the number of students it comes out to an average of \$7-9.

SENATOR FREBORG: \$266,000 per biennium, not yearly. I always related a million dollars to \$8 per student. Where are we getting \$144,000 a year relating to \$7-9. A million dollars will provide approximately \$8 per student state wide.

BOB: You triggered my memory, in the original testimony that we did for the bill it would have included full taxation, so I have to back off the number I gave you. It wouldn't be \$7-9 for this bill it would be about 1/3 of this amount for this bill. The \$7-9 was if we paid full taxes which was the original idea.

SENATOR FREBORG: 1/3 per biennium. \$7-9 was for a biennium. So you're talking about the \$266,000 that's about a 1/3. Let's say a million dollars is worth \$9 per student so this costs us about \$3.

BOB: \$2-3 per biennium.

SENATOR WANZEK: Roughly \$7-8 per student if there was full taxation being paid on this property. Does that only include the amount of taxation that would go to schools on an average or is that the total taxation.

BOB: That original number was based on full taxation. The original bill we dealt with was about 1.1 million, that was total amount. He is right that is the \$7-9 depending on the number of students, but that was if we paid full taxes for all the services the county provided including counties, school districts, cities and everything. That would be if the full taxes went to the school.

BOB: It would be the 1.1 million if we paid full taxes and that would come from the school. It would come from the county school trust fund for example.

SENATOR KELSH: Can you explain the last sentence of that amendment "does not include any moneys that must be deposited in the permanent trust fund." How would you separate.

BOB: That language is in there because for example in our mineral area any royalties or bonuses that we receive from land, they must be deposited in the permanent trust fund. This particular amendment only deals with surface lease revenue so it could not.

REP. NELSON: My recollection of this amendment is in my own township there are 17 quarters of nontaxable land. Most of you know the school gets the revenue on property tax, schools receive in a ballpark figure about 50% of the taxes. In my case all 17 quarters aren't state land. I

think we have 8-9 quarters of state land. Of that 50% the township isn't getting for road construction, obviously that is the biggest cost that the townships have when there is road repair, etc. We're not getting any help at all from this state school land and the Department seemed to be very favorable as far as contributing this 5 % money. It doesn't get us up to true and full value as far as what the townships would give, it contributes to the growing needs that our counties and townships have in this area as well as the schools. It doesn't seem like it is going to be a burden, I think it will improve relationships with the State Land Department and help increase the ability of townships to work on these roads.

REP. DROVDAL: The bill that was referred to earlier was one that Senator Bowman and Senator Solberg sponsored in the Senate that was defeated and that included in lieu of tax for all taxes that the neighboring property owners paid. The objection there was that we were paying, we were taking money from education and putting into other services other than education that they didn't feel that the Land Department should pay for because they didn't use, like social services, etc. This particular version is a good neighbor policy it should take some pressure off the Land Department as far as the sales of land. We hope you will go along with the amendment. SENATOR WANZEK: Wouldn't payments in lieu of, wouldn't a major part of that go to education but they'd go to schools in that vicinity.

REP. DROVDAL: That was part of the other bill and Senator Bowman and myself plan to meet with the ND Land Dept. and discuss having payment to the school districts in which land is located.

SENATOR WANZEK: All the money in this amendment goes to the township.

REP. DROVDAL: This money still up to 5% goes back to the county or township. Whichever is responsible for the road.

SENATOR KELSH: This has some affect, \$2-\$3 but if this was put into the fund and then that was built it would have a ballooning affect at some point. The increase is paid off. This is going to have a continuing affect on the amount of money that they pay out in tuition apportionment.

REP. DROVDAL: The money we're talking about, if it didn't go to the counties for this purpose it would go back, it would not go into the permanent trust fund, so it would not have a ballooning affect or inflationary affect. Different proportions to it because there are different amounts in different counties. Those county taxpayers are currently paying for repairing roads and bridges.

Lease holders who are leasing the state land are using those roads and bridges so shouldn't they be paying a share just as the neighbor is doing because it is the state land in many cases that is setting the lease rate for the neighbor land.

SENATOR KELSH: 5% goes directly out, it doesn't go into the county school trust fund.

REP. DROVDAL: Up to 5% goes into what the tax rate is in that particular county. Currently if we didn't pass this it would go into the fund and then go out. An oil lease goes into permanent trust fund, this goes into tuition apportionment payment.

SENATOR FREBORG: Need to explain this ballooning affect you were talking about. It does accrue it's paid out.

BOB: It is not distributed, the money we are talking about here would not be distributed on an annual basis. There could be potential long term growth that we would miss if this passes. On the other hand the amount of money we're talking about here with an investment portfolio, what we make and lose that amount of money everyday with market fluctuation. It is really hard to

quantify the affect this would have on the fund because it depends on what the market does. This is not an amount of money that would be distributed on an annual basis only the interest and income would be the distributed portion annually. So it has impact but not to the extent that it actually takes money away from school kids directly, but indirectly it does because the fund wouldn't grow as fast without it.

REP. HANSON: Is there any state law that the lease holder has to pay taxes on.

BOB: On all original grant money it was given to the state by the Congress, the answer is no.

No one pays taxes on that land at all.

REP. HANSON: None of those tax paying lands are included in this list.

BOB: That is correct. These are only grant lands.

SENATOR FREBORG: Is there any money that comes in for schools that isn't distributed.

Only the interest in all cases is distributed right.

BOB: The Century Code define distributable income for the purpose of our payments to the DPI. That is defined as interest from bonds, rent, dividends from stock and 10% of any gains or losses amortized over a 10 year period. Those would constitute distributable income for the purpose of our making our payment.

SENATOR WANZEK: Does the money we're talking about this \$132,000 per year actually is generated from revenue but there is a certain % of the revenue that must be reinvested and permanently reinvested in trust funds. So that \$133,00 is not going to be reinvested which will result in a little slower growth of the overall trust.

BOB: Exactly right. There is an impact but it is hard to measure that relatively. In addition to this discussion we would like to ask the House members if you would consider page 1 of the bill

line 22, the House took out, we ask to remove language that our auctions must be held in the county seat and House put language back in. We're asking if you would reconsider again and take it out again because this is an element of our auction program that really is an inefficiency in government opportunity for us. If you feel its necessary of course we'll do that, but if you're asking our professional opinion on how to save money and not reduce our customer service that is when that would help us.

THE REMAINDER OF THE TAPE WAS VERY BAD WITH LOUD SCREECHING NOISES.

SENATOR KELSH: Is it all right to take the notification out of section 1.

BOB: Section 1 of course in our original draft of the bill we took the County Treasurer out and we would prefer that but that particular provision isn't that important to us as the county seat provision. That simply is a mailing that we do. \$53.00 to inform everyone. Arranging an auction at county seat for 5 tracts and going through all the work which we could combine 2 or 3 of those auctions in one setting. That was almost as convenient to everyone.

SENATOR WANZEK: We'll give the House a chance to explain their concern.

REP. NELSON: I did offer an amendment that would allow one of the cases where the county seat were within 10 miles of each other and they wanted to hold the land auction at one of the counties, seemed like a reasonable amendment to offer and the language was 100 miles. Just as a safeguard if and when there was a change in land board management that they wouldn't have to come to Bismarck. The amendment was lost in committee, so I would question if whether we had the ability to change it again. I don't know if there is a place where our committee would feel comfortable.

SENATOR KELSH: Hundred miles isn't unreasonable.

REP. DROVDAL: Our minutes did answer some of the questions concerning the amendments we put on the bill. The reason talks about 100 miles and we felt for the future and now the lands located in that county and the bidders in that county the consumer is in that county, it may be sure there may be one person will come and there may be 5 or 6 people will learn what it's all about and when that person decides not to farm anymore we'll have people who will understand the process and it will be open to the public and they'll be no question about open records. If you go 100 miles away there is only one person who will go that 100 miles or into Bismarck as originally presented, they could all be right in Bismarck. We want to protect that and make sure it is out there were the consumer is protected and will always know it is an open process right there in his own county. There is nothing wrong with having the state people who are paid for their mileage and paid for their time to drive out there.

SENATOR WANZEK: Understand where you're coming from but I don't believe it is the intent of the Land Board to try and circumvent locating the auction in a general geographic vicinity to the land. I do see sometimes where they might be a lot more efficient. Provide some convenience and efficiency and I would have to believe the landlord is not going to abuse that,

REP. HANSON: If the land is within a county it should be sold within that county. Everything in the past has always taken place at the courthouse and if it is not accessible or handicap accessible they can meet at the door and recess and go up town to the coffee shop.

personally I think we should somehow allow them to do that.

REP. DROVDAL: I did visit with the Land Department after the meeting and asked if we added an amendment of 100 miles of county seat if they felt that would be helpful and they said you betcha, we just love that it would help us out a lot. It only goes to prove to me that in fact they would take it away from the area and make it more convenient to them instead of for the consumer/taxpayer.

SENATOR WANZEK: I'm not sure I would even support the amendment to go to 100 miles, I'm just saying this is giving them some flexibility. I can see circumstances where it would be helpful.

REP. DROVDAL: Do you see it as inconceivable that a hunting group may want to lease that land.

SENATOR FREBORG: I move the Land Board amendments by the Land Department. I believe it is section 2, payment would be based on the previous year. "After the word county it would read, "during the year preceding the payment period." Overstrike during that period and after the word county insert, "during the year preceding the payment."

Senate Bill 2088 is being introduced to accomplish the following:

- 1. Create consistency between leasing and sale statutes.
- 2. Increase flexibility and allow discretion to create more leasable and manageable school trust land units.
- 3. Reduce administrative leasing costs.

A BRIEF DISCUSSION OF THE PROPOSED CHANGES FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. To amend and reenact section 15-04-09 of the North Dakota Century Code.

This section of the bill eliminates the requirement of providing county treasurers with prior notification of lease auctions. The 1995 legislative assembly approved changes to the statute that formally removed county officials from the leasing process. The response we have received from the counties indicates they have been pleased with the results of the 1995 legislation because it has reduced their workload. However, unless the notification provision is removed, we risk having an auction invalidated if we unintentionally forgot to provide a county with advance notice of the lease auction. While we have continued to provide notice to county officials as a professional courtesy, this portion of the statute is no longer necessary and the ramification of failing to comply could be disproportionately damaging to our leasing program.


SECTION 2. To amend and reenact section 15-04-10 of the 1997 supplement to the North Dakota Century Code.

There are two proposed changes in this section: 1) Allows public auctions in the fall at locations other than the county seat, and 2) Allows the combination of tracts into more efficient leasing units.

The current statute requires that public auctions be held at the county seat of the county in which the parcels are located. This restriction on auction locations made more sense when transportation systems were poor, but now the difference between holding an auction in Foster County (Carrington) and Eddy County (New Rockford) is only 15 minutes of driving time. In most

cases, it would still make sense for us to have our auctions at the courthouses, and our intention would be to continue that practice to the extent possible. However, there are times that it would be beneficial for us (and our lessees as well) to have discretionary authority to change the auction location. For instance, in years where there are only a handful of expiring leases in each of three adjoining counties, it seems reasonable for us to be allowed to choose a location central to the tracts being offered. Computer mapping allows us to plot the tracts being offered and establish an appropriate centralized location. Besides increasing efficiency, there would be some minimal economic advantages as well through decreased auction costs.

The second proposed change in this section would allow us to combine tracts into more logical and efficient leasing units if it made sense to do so. The majority of our tracts are logically leased by quarter-section. However, in some cases, from a land management and leasability standpoint, it would be preferable to cross quarter lines to combine tracts for leasing purposes. We currently have limited combination authority under NDCC 15-08-25, which allows us to hook a tract of 100 or less useable acres to another tract, but that still doesn't always create the best leasing unit from our perspective, or that of a rancher. For example:



SECTION 3. Amends and reenacts section 15-06-26 of the North Dakota Century Code.

The changes to this section are intended to make sales of school trust land consistent with the proposed changes to the leasing provisions of the previous section. If a parcel of school trust land were to be sold, it is common sense to allow the board of university and school lands to sell it in a unit that produces the greatest return for the trusts. That may be as a quarter section or it may be in some other unit such as "everything east of the highway".

It should also be noted that the language we propose to delete on page 2, lines 10-12, was actually removed from the State Constitution back in 1944, however, it was never removed from the Century Code.

Testimony of Linda Kahl in Support of SB 2088 Page 3 House Education Committee March 10, 1999

SECTION 4. Amends and reenacts section 15-07-20 of the North Dakota Century Code.

15-07-20 currently restricts the lease term of crop acres on **non-grant** land to a maximum of four years. This is inconsistent because cropland on grant land and all grassland may be leased for a maximum of five years. It is only cropland on non grant land that is restricted to a 4-year lease. This is confusing to our lessees and creates problems when a quarter section includes both cropland and pasture, or when a cropland tract has a pasture that overlaps onto an adjacent tract. In those cases, we have to reduce the lease term on the grass to 4 years so it will come up for lease with the cropland. Making this change would reduce confusion about lease terms, provide consistency throughout the statutes, and create opportunities for further administrative efficiencies in our leasing program.


