### Minutes:

SB 2159 relates to rest area vending machine permits from the Department of Transportation.

SEN. B. STENEHJEM opened the hearing on SB 2159 at 9:50 a.m. Committee members present: Sens. B. Stenehjem-Chairman; R. Schobinger; D. Mutch; D. Cook; D. O'Connell; and V. Thompson. Senator Bercier was absent.

BRUCE MURRY, STAFF ATTORNEY FOR DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION testified in favor of SB 2159 (See attached testimony).

<u>SEN. MUTCH</u> Is there any charge for permits for vending machines?

<u>BRUCE MURRY</u> We would treat the vending machines in two categories. One would be the dispense of written publication which has the first amendment right to sell these publications.

We could only charge for the cost and base the permit on that. For other vending machines, we might charge slightly higher than our cost. There is no charge for pop machines.

SEN. B. STENEHJEM Why not?

BRUCE MURRY Administration to that permitting process is left to Vocational Rehabilitation Services through federal and state statutes. The Randolph Shepphard Act creates business opportunities for the blind by allowing venders associated with the blind access to vending machines at rest areas.

SEN. MUTCH What is the policy now for pop machines?

BRUCE MURRY Pop machines cannot be at a rest area unless they have a permit.

JERRY HORNER, MAINTENANCE DIRECTOR FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF

<u>TRANSPORTATION</u> I'd like to address a few questions. The placing of vending machines has been primarily beverages except for the placement of the written publications at the rest areas.

Tape 1, Side B

There was discussion of the committee.

<u>SEN. SCHOBINGER</u> So someone put a newspaper on a rest area and they were thrown off so they sued.

<u>SEN. THOMPSON</u> There is no opposition so I don't see any problem with it, but we will want to check with the first amendment in state stature.

<u>SEN. O'CONNELL</u> I'm sure the written publications are some sort of propaganda magazines.

<u>SEN. THOMPSON</u> They probably want more regulation on the rest areas. I don't see any harm in giving them the tools to re-enforce.

<u>SEN. SCHOBINGER</u> The only way to regulate would be to have security out there. There is usually more trouble once you heighten the awareness such as having security.

SEN. THOMPSON I vote for a DO PASS.

SEN. O'CONNELL I second.

Roll Call Vote was taken. 3 Yeas, 3 Nays, 1 Absent and Not Voting. Vote was tied.

SEN. B. STENEHJEM The motion failed. We'll hold the bill.

SENATOR B. STENEHJEM opened the second hearing on SB 2159.

JACK MCDONALD, ND NEWSPAPER ASSOCIATION AND MIDWEST COCA-COLA, testified and proposed some amendments to SB 2159 (see testimony). We feel the permit fee should be \$25.00.

BRUCE MURRY, STAFF ATTORNEY FOR NORTH DAKOTA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION We have no objections to these amendments.

JERRY HORNER, MAINTENANCE ENGINEER FOR DEPARTMENT OF

TRANSPORTATION answered questions relating to SB 2159.

SENATOR B. STENEHJEM What is the process for vending machines?

JERRY HORNER We only allow vending machines for beverages. Vending companies have certain territories. For someone who would want to place a vending machine on a rest area, they would have to go to our licensing agent and make an application there.

SENATOR B. STENEHJEM Do pop machines get money compensation because they go to vocational public sources?

JERRY HORNER They will take a certain percentage of proceeds but the program is to provide a service to the blind of the state.

SENATOR THOMPSON Is the licensing process separate from this \$25.00 fee?

JERRY HORNER That has not been addressed.

SENATOR B. STENEHJEM You've seen the proposed amendments.

JERRY HORNER Yes and we have accepted them.

SENATOR COOK Can a group such as Kiwanis put candy vending machines at rest areas? Who says yes or no?

JERRY HORNER They would go to Vocational Rehabilitation and ask for a permit. We don't want to get into competition with other local consumer venders. We try to limit the vending machines to beverage machines.

SENATOR COOK If you exclude candy can you not exclude newspapers?

SENATOR BERCIER Do you have a cap on how many vending machines?

JERRY HORNER We accept one vending machine for Coke and one for Pepsi.

SENATOR BERCIER It seems like this is being done for two permits.

SENATOR B. STENEHJEM If there is a profit to be made on vending machines then the Vocational Rehabilitation Services gets it for the blind.

BRUCE MURRY The division of Vocational Rehabilitation Services has said no because the Department of Transportation has said no. The actual cost would be 0 if someone else took care of the permit costs such as the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation. Any vending machine that does not fall under the Randolph Sheppard Act would be \$25.00.

SENATOR B. STENEHJEM What vending machines fall under the Randolph Sheppard Act?

BRUCE MURRY Beverages and candy machines would. Newspaper vending machines would not. The Randolph Sheppard Act deals with those rest areas that are on the federal highways. SENATOR COOK The intent of this legislation is because your authority to say "no" has been challenged, right?

BRUCE MURRY That is correct. We don't have the authority to say "no" to written publications, but we want to make sure the safety and functionality of the rest area is preserved. SENATOR COOK The original testimony dealt with the problem of newspapers. Are we even going to solve that problem now?

BRUCE MURRY The problem hasn't happened yet in North Dakota because the newspapers requesting to be on the rest areas is new to us. But we introduced the provisions in the bill to ensure the safety of the rest areas when it does start to become a problem.

BONNIE LARSON STAIGER testified in a neutral position but stated that the bill does not address public access to tobacco for minors.


JEANNIE PROM, NORTH DAKOTA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH testified in a neutral position. There is no state law addressing placement of vending machines but there are several local ordinances addressing the placement of tobacco vending machines.

SENATOR SCHOBINGER Is it addressed in Federal Law?

SENATOR B. STENEHJEM Are there any other questions? Is there anymore testimony? The hearing on SB 2159 was closed.

SENATOR COOK I would move we adopt the amendments proposed by Jack McDonald dated January 22, 1999 be adopted and insert the fee of \$25.00.



SENATOR THOMPSON I second that motion.

The amendment passed unanimously.

SENATOR COOK It offers through statutes a lot of control on vending machines. They want some means of order and maybe they need it. I move for a Do Pass.

SENATOR THOMPSON I second that motion.

SENATOR MUTCH Are we in conflict with the Randolph Sheppard Act?

SENATOR COOK There is nothing that guarantees them to generate a profit.

SENATOR THOMPSON By controlling who gets the permit, they can get a handle of free propaganda.

SENATOR O'CONNELL I don't think we need this in the code; it can be done by policy or rule.

Roll call was taken (5 Yeas, 2 Nays, and 0 Absent and Not Voting). The motion passed.

Senator Cook will carry SB 2159.

Minutes:

CHAIRMAN KEISER OPENED THE HEARING ON SB 2159; A BILL RELATING TO REST AREA VENDING MACHINE PERMITS FROMT HE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION.

BRUCE MURRY, Staff Attorney for the Department of Transportation introduced SB 2159.

(See written testimony). He noted that this does not address tobacco vending machines.

REP. KEMPENICH asked what the problem is that this bill is meant to address.

BRUCE said that the problem that just started is the number of newpaper vending machines and pop machines and whatnot are beginning to clutter the sidewalks. This in part is violating the ADA requirements of space for wheelchairs to get through and is creating crime and unsafe rest area situations.

REP. MAHONEY noted that the fee is up to \$25. Are you limiting yourself or are you considering a commercial agreement on the cuts?

BRUCE said that it is a possibility. A rest area is a quasi public forum meaning that speech can only be regulated in time, place, or manner restrictions. It might be unconstitutional.

REP. MAHONEY asked if it applied to pop machines.

BRUCE said yes.

REP. SCHMIDT questioned the cameras already in place at many rest stops.

BRUCE said that they do help, but unfortunately they may not deter until it is already too late.

REP. KEISER asked if this is a one time fee or if it is annual?

BRUCE said that it is a one time fee but the bill is not specific to that.

REP. KEISER noted the second part of the bill. Should there be a reasonable policy to limit to 50 vendors?

BRUCE said that the language allows the director to set the number of machines at each rest stop.

LINDA KOHLS, American Cancer Society, testified in support of SB 2159. She noted that the ACS has no problems with the bill as stated, but asked for it to be amended to restrict tobacco machines. Allowing them to be placed at rest areas gives young people access to them. North Dakota already has the third highest rate in youth smoking and it is not going down.

JACK MCDONALD, North Dakota Newspaper Association and Coca Cola Bottling Company testified in support of SB 2159. He simply gave support from both in favor of a Do Pass vote.

REP. MAHONEY asked if the money goes to certain locations?

JACK said that a portion of the money already goes to the disabled.

REP. LEMIEUX noted that the agreement is that a portion of the money goes to vocational

rehab. Is that equal to what a private vendor gives to a private business?

JACK said that 15-20% of the money earned goes from the vocational rehab division to the blind

vendors in the federal court buildings. It is more of a break even deal with this bill.

CHAIRMAN KEISER mentioned that this is a permissive bill. The DOT may charge a fee.

BRUCE said that they had no problem changing the may to a shall or must.

CHAIRMAN KEISER asked why no fiscal note was made if there is a transfer of funds.

JEROME HORNER, Department of Transportation, answered that at the time the fiscal note was

requested there was not fund transfer anticipated.


CHAIRMAN KEISER asked if they plan to charge.
