Testimony on SCR 4004 Senate Human Services Committee January 26, 1999

Chairman Thane and members of the Senate Human Services Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify on SCR 4004. My name is Shelly Peterson, President of the North Dakota Long Term Care Association. I am here to testify on behalf of Association Members.

Over 100 year ago North Dakota build and supported their first nursing home. Today we have 88 nursing facilities, spread throughout North Dakota. In the past the standard of care was families cared for their aging relatives and when families couldn't provide care the nursing home was the main choice available. Today, older people and families are advocating for choice and options, delivered in a variety of care setting and we support this initiative.

Many nursing facilities have diversified into other services and we are helping seniors to prevent or postpone nursing facility care. As this development into care alternatives continues, it may be appropriate to downsize beds or close entire facilities. This could have a dramatic impact on any community and one which should be planned.

SCR 4004 will study what incentives and other forms of assistance could be made available to help facilities transition into other care models.

SB 2168, which creates a Health Care Trust Fund will significantly help facilities downsize and transition into other care models. SCR 4004 can help establish the incentive package that will assist rural and urban facilities to prepare for the future care needs of our aging population.

TESTIMONY BEFORE THE SENATE HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE REGARDING SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 4004 JANUARY 26, 1999

Chairman Thane, members of the committee, I am Barbara Fischer, Manager for Long Term Care and Hospital Services with the Department of Human Services. I am here today in support of SCR4004 which provides for a study to create incentives to assist rural communities and nursing facilities who reduce capacity or close facilities.

The study resolution is a result of the Task Force on Long Term Care Planning's recommendation to the interim Budget Committee on Long Term Care.

Closure of a facility can have a dramatic effect on the entire community which could be likened to the community losing schools, hospitals, churches, or other local businesses. The Task Force recognized that assistance may be needed in a community, where a nursing facility closes or significantly reduces capacity, to ensure that the health care needs of citizens can still be met and to lessen the impact of loss of a facility.

Facilities in rural communities that are experiencing decreased occupancy and staffing problems usually lack the necessary resources to develop alternatives to nursing care. The Task Force feels that incentives and other forms of assistance should be available to enable and encourage facilities to transition towards providing alternative services to individuals who currently are served in nursing facilities.

Suggestions for incentives ranged from a flat payment for each bed delicensed to

grants and subsidized loans for developing alternatives. In addition, it was suggested that resources and expertise from various state agencies be made available to assist facilities and communities in developing viable alternatives.

SB 2168 which establishes a North Dakota Trust Fund will makes funds available for facilities who develop alternatives to nursing facility care. SCR 4004, however, is still necessary to determine if other incentives should be made available to assist facilities in reducing capacity and assist communities who are impacted by the loss of or changes occuring to a major part of the community.
