Minutes:

SCR4015 is to study the adult correctional system in North Dakota, including its functions, responsibilities, funding, and operation, and the causes of past and projected future increases in the state's adult inmate population, including the impact of sentencing laws.

SENATOR STENEHJEM opened the hearing on SCR4015 at 9:00 a.m.

All were present.

SENATOR NETHING, District 48, testified in support of SCR4015. This came as an outgrowth of an assignment that our Interim Committee had wherein we visited the institutions in the State. As we gathered information, it seemed that now is the time we look at our correctional systems. SENATOR STENEHJEM asked about the resolution limiting the study to adult correctional institutions or should we also include the youth correctional institutions.

SENATOR NETHING stated that he had no objection, you could look at the other testimony.

We don't seem to have the problems in the youth correctional institutions.

ELAINE LITTLE, Department of Corrections, testified in support of SCR4015. Testimony attached.

SENATOR TRAYNOR asked about housing some state inmates in Devils Lake, is there any housed there?

ELAINE LITTLE stated she was not sure if there are any there at the present time. We have used Devils Lake at other times.

SENATOR TRAYNOR stated that they could house up to 15 more.

ELAINE LITTLE stated that they have a contract with Appleton, MN and we have to house 50 there to keep up with the contract.

SENATOR TRAYNOR stated that Dickinson will have room for 25 with their renovations that were made.

ELAINE LITTLE stated that they are hoping to utilize local institutions. They are looking at setting up contracts with the local institutions.

SENATOR LYSON asked about the high intensity treatment to release the inmates earlier, where is this going to take place.

ELAINE LITTLE stated that they are contracting with the Stutsman County Jail for 30 beds there and so the confinement will take place in the Stutsman County Jail but the treatment will be provided by the Department of Corrections.

SENATOR LYSON asked how you choose the local jails.

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ELAINE LITTLE stated the primary reasons for the Stutsman County Jail is that the JRCC is located there but also the State Hospital treatment staff is providing the treatment in the

ELAINE LITTLE (Dept of Corrections) Presented statistics on the inmate population in the state prison system and highlighted the changes, which are dramatic. Wants a study of treatment programs and how that can be used to shorten sentences and reduce the prison population. The highest rate of recidivism is with thieves.

### **COMMITTEE ACTION**

REP. DEKREY We have been asked to amend this bill to include a study to build a new prison or prisons, knock down the old prison and sell the land for development. He called for a motion to that effect and none was forthcoming.

REP. MARAGOS moved that the committee recommend that the bill DO PASS. Rep. Mahoney seconded and the motion passed on a roll call vote with 12 ayes, 0 nays and 3 absent. Rep. Mahoney was assigned to carry the bill.
