REP. AL CARLSON, CHAIRMAN Opened the hearing.

SEN. MIKE POLOVITZ, DIST. 42, Introduced the resolution. The reason I am here before you is to try to impress upon the state, I think, the importance of retention of our young people and the people we have here. Submitted a newspaper article which appeared in the Grand Forks Herald, written by Jason Bernhardt, a student at the University of North Dakota, and is also the student representative of the State Board of Higher Education. In reading that, this is what we should be looking at. The resolution studies the affects of not only young people, but, those under thirty who are here, I am interested in keeping what we have. He felt the fiscal note was on the high side. They actually don't know what affect it will have. It is basically based on date of birth. I talked to the tax commissioner and see if we couldn't have that date of birth on the tax statements. It would give you a wealth of information as to where the money comes from and how you might even, in the future, develop some tax reform. The method they used, was not too

scientific. He stated there were thirty six hundred less students in our schools this year. The projections for the next four to five years is losing over sixteen thousand students, which will have a tremendous impact on our state. He related back to the newspaper article that he submitted stating we could learn from what the young people are thinking regarding our state. He felt in the study, wages, tax credits, etc., could be discussed.

REP. HERBEL With all your years of wisdom, and considering the way of retaining young people, in your opinion, would you feel the tax rate or a lack of higher paying jobs, is the cause of young people leaving?

SEN. POLOVITZ It is hard for me to say which is more important, higher paying jobs, I would say yes, but in other cases, I think the way of life we have in this state, can play into it. I don't think there is one answer. There is a combination of a lot of things. I was tickled pink when I read that letter to the editor, by a student, who has a lot of wisdom and recognition of how the business community can relate to the students before they even graduate. It does give both sides. I have no problem with better paying jobs. Related to when he was the mayor, and how he focused on new businesses and employees, etc.

With no further testimony, the hearing was closed.

Tear down walls to keep our youth

GRAND FORKS — North Dakotans talk a lot about the need to keep young people here. However, as a member of this "cherished" generation, I want to know: Where is the action behind these impassioned pleas?

Adults regularly declare that, "We are the future." But they serve this message on the same old platter, "This is what you get." It's a vision of the future that doesn't match our dreams and desires. So, many of us leave. And we don't have to look hard to find brighter opportunities and

leave. And we don't have to look hard to find brighter opportunities and more interesting lifestyles elsewhere. So, what does it take to keep young people here? Involving us would be a big first step. Ask us why we are leaving and what specifically can be done to keep us here. We hear business and community leaders complaining about the lack of young workers, but I don't know anyone who has been asked what will entice them to stay in North Dakota.

Fortunately, there is a movement afoot to change that. Last month, members of the North Dakota Student Association talked to the business leaders who are coordinating the statewide New Economy Initiative. We shared our ideas about recruiting young people and improving the state's economy.

the state's economy.

The good news is that the challenges are surmountable. I believe North Dakota could have great success attracting and keeping young people with just a few, meaningful initiatives.

For starters, businesses should work harder to grab students before we leave. The university system is a great resource for North Dakota. Higher education generates talent. Businesses should be working more closely with colleges and universities to recruit students before we move out of state.

Internships, co-ops, special training seminars, meaningful summer jobs and holiday programs could involve us in your business and give you first dibs on recruiting us when we graduate. The options are endless — businesses just need to be more proactive in involving young workers before someone else does.

Second, students have a strong perception that salaries in North Dakota are much lower than national or regional averages. At some point, companies must decide what is more important: paying the wages needed to keep good, young talent or continuing to struggle with an inadequate work force.

At the same time, money is not everything. Benefits such as stock options, equity in a company, training or education can be just as important as money.

Loosen up the dress codes. Try some unusual perks. Businesses should be creative with their incentive packages — use them to demonstrate your commitment to recruiting young people.

A fun work environment that rewards innovation also is important to young people. Involve us in leadership positions, and let us try to make a difference in your company. Students want opportunities for advancement.

And in today's tight labor market, we have the luxury of going where we feel the most valued.

Finally, North Dakota must get serious about stimulating diversity. The quality of life here is high. Our communities are safe. Traffic is light. All these are valuable assets, but they are not top priorities for new college grads who feel invincible.

The reality is North Dakota is rather dull for young, single people who don't have kids, and much of that is caused by a lack of cultural diver-

sity.
Young people are open-minded.
We want to learn and explore new
things. The foods, customs, languages,
accents and fashions of different cultures create a dynamic and energy
that is sorely missing here. The lack
of diversity makes North Dakota generic compared to other regions.

But we can change that. North Dakota should launch a deliberate, highly visible campaign to entice immigrants to our state. Offer incentives to get them here, and help them succeed when they arrive. Let's make North Dakota the most welcoming state in the nation and declare this to the world.

North Dakotans have created walls around this state — walls built on outdated traditions, low expectations, resistance to change, stubbornness. These walls are driving young people away and discouraging new people from entering.

If leaders are serious about preserving and revitalizing North Dakota, tear down these walls, get creative and aggressive and make every attempt to welcome new ideas and new people. Then, you will create the atmosphere and opportunities needed to convince a lot more young people to make North Dakota their home.

But don't just take my word for it, ask some students yourself.
