

#### Testimony in support of Engrossed HB 1124:

SENATOR RICH WARDNER, Dist. 37, stated this bill was introduced because of a program at Dickinson State Univ. called Business Challenge. This program started as a partnership between GNDA and DSU. GNDA is no longer involved with the program, so DSU has taken it over by themselves. It has been funded through sponsors. The program was running in the "red" but has now taken care of it's deficit. However, sponsors are hard to come by so therefore DSU feels it needs to charge a fee for meals and rooms if possible. If a student can not afford the fee, it will be waived. The reason for the emergency is DSU is waiting for the outcome of the bill before they send materials for this year's Business Challenge. SENATOR COOK asked if this is

Committee put this bill in a chapter of law dealing with higher ed., hence Ch. 15-10. That is why it creates a new section.

Senator Rich Wardner, District 37, Dickinson, spoke in behalf of HB 1124. No written testimony. He spoke about the history of this bill, GNDA sponsored Business Challenge on the campus of Dickinson State University for years, however GNDA decided a few years ago not to continue the partnership, and the college then took it over. Business Challenge has always been supported by corporate sponsors, but in recent years it has become harder and harder to find those sponsors to take care of the costs of Business Challenge.
