Chairman Flakoll opened the hearing on HB 1128. All members were present.

Jeff Olson, Program Manager for the North Dakota Department of Agriculture, testified in favor of the bill. (written testimony)

Senator Flakoll asked on page 4, line 10, what does mandamus mean? (meter # 3126)

Mr. Olson said it is a legal terminology used by the attorney general's office.

Senator Flakoll asked what kind of type A medications are we looking at?

Mr. Olson said he would refer that question to Gary Wagner, the coordinator in this area.

Senator Urlacher asked if this bill will expand this regulation to feed additives?

Mr. Olson said they are presently registering medicated feed, that has nutritional type additives,

vitamins and minerals. They want to discontinue this registration and add the drug additives.

Senator Urlacher asked if the nutritional additives are regulated by the health department?

Mr. Olson said FDA still has regulatory power over them. He doesn't think the health department does this.

Senator Flakoll asked if rumensin would be covered by this?

Mr. Nelson said rumensin would be covered only in the type A form.

Senator Seymour asked about the fiscal note of \$1300. What will you do with it?

Mr. Olson said that will go to the general fund.

Senator Klein asked if there has been a problem that has caused this to be addressed at this time?

Mr. Olson said there has not been a big problem. They try to keep in step with other states. They try to keep uniform policy across state borders and with FDA.

Senator Klein asked if the \$10 penalty is worth the effort?

Mr. Olson said the \$10 is meant to be an incentive to get the products registered on time.

Senator Klein asked if this is paid by the manufacturer? Maybe its not a very big incentive.

Mr. Olson said the \$10 would cover the added administrative work necessary to process a late application.

Senator Urlacher said its really the end user that foots the bill.

Senator Flakoll asked about page 4 lines 21 - 22. What is meant by each day of noncompliance constitutes a separate violation?

Mr. Olson said this is language from the attorney general's office.

Senator Flakell confirmed if a product was in noncompliance for 100 days there would be a fine of \$50,000?

Mr. Olson said that is correct. The penalty is be not to exceed \$500 per day. They usually don't go to the max unless it is a very severe violation.

Senator Nichols said even though it has been called a housekeeping bill, there is a lot of new

language. Is this typical?

Mr. Olson said the attorney general's office review drafts of agency bills and sometimes they add language. It happened twice this session.

Senator Nichols asked how often does a penalty have to be assessed over many days?

Mr. Olson said usually once they have been notified, the product is pulled until it is registered or recalled. Sometimes this happens with old products and the Agriculture Department tries to help with disposal.

Senator Urlacher asked if the Agriculture Department goes and looks to be sure it is off the shelf?

Mr. Olson said they do random checks and can issue a stop sale order if they find a non-registered product.

Senator Flakoll asked in the case of a class B misdemeanor, who is charged?

Mr. Olson said they can take enforcement action against an entity or person selling the product.

If they abide by the stop sale order, no further action is taken. (meter #4351)

Senator Flakoll asked what if a product is illegal in North Dakota but legal in Minnesota? Could a farmer go to Minnesota and get it and bring it into North Dakota?

Mr. Olson said he would have to find an answer for that question.

Gary Wagner, North Dakota Department of Agriculture, stood for questions.

Senator Flakoll asked if vitamins are included?

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Mr. Wagner said no, vitamins are considered strictly nutritional.

Senator Flakoll asked if there is any conflict in the language because some vitamins are said to prevent disease.

Mr. Wagner said the wording is regulated by FDA.

Senator Flakoll asked about crossover uses, for example iodine. It can be used internally or externally for the treatment or prevention of ringworm.

Mr. Wagner said it depends on how the product is labeled.

Chairman Flakoli closed the hearing on HB 1128.

Senator Klein said in reviewing this, Senator Urlacher made a good point. The consumer will shoulder the additional cost. He is not comfortable with the penalties and enforcement.

It was moved by Senator Klein, seconded by Senator Nichols and passed on a roll call vote that the Senate Agriculture Committee take a Do Not Pass Action on HB 1128. Voting yes were Senator Erbele, Senator Klein, Senator Urlacher, Senator Nichols and Senator Seymour. Voting no was Senator Flakoll. Senator Klein will carry the bill to the floor.

After discussion Senator Klein moved to reconsider the action on the bill, seconded by Senator Nichols, passed on a roll call vote. Voting yes were Senator Flakoll, Senator Erbele, Senator Klein, Senator Urlacher, Senator Nichols, and Senator Seymour. There were no negative votes cast.

It was moved by Senator Klein, seconded by Senator Nichols and passed on a roll call vote that the Senate Agriculture Committee take a Do Pass action on HB 1128. Voting yes were Senator Flakoll, Senator Erbele, Senator Klein, Senator Urlacher, Senator Nichols and Senator Seymour. There were no negative votes cast. Senator Nichols will carry the bill to the floor.

Chairman Flakoll moved on to other business of the committee.

Chairman Nicholas and members of the committee. My name is Jeff Olson. I am a Program Manager at the Department of Agriculture. I am here to testify in support of HB 1128 a bill that amends Chapter 19-14 of the North Dakota Century Code. This bill is a housekeeping bill to clarify existing language and to add a late fee for registering livestock medicines.

Confusion concerning the language used in the current law has created problems with the registrants. We also deleted the requirement to register all medicated stock feeds and added a requirement to register "Type A Medicated Articles" as livestock medicines. "Type A Medicated Articles" are primarily drugs added to feed to create a medicated livestock feed, whereas Medicated Stock Feeds are used primarily for nutritional purposes.

A fiscal note was prepared showing an increase of approximately \$1,300 to the general fund because of the addition of a late fee. This figure was based on the approximately 1,240 livestock medicine registrations and the projection of approximately 70 new registrations based on the Type A Medicated Article requirements for a total projected registration of 1,310 products.

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Rational for including each section follows:

Section 1. Changes the term "Livestock Medicine Defined" to "Definitions". This also eliminates the inclusion of all medicated stock feed and defines "Type A Medicated Article". I would also like offer an amendment to delete the word devices from section one. It is nearly impossible to enforce the registration of devices as it is all inclusive. It includes items such as. syringes pipettes and kits used in delivering the drug. We feel it is more appropriate to register. the medications than the devices.

Section 2. Line 12 changes the language from the "second ensuing" year to read "every even numbered" year. This allows the department to maintain a registration process that is cost effective and time efficient. It also allows the department to coordinate registration renewals.

Section 4. Adds a penalty fee for the late renewal of livestock medicine registrations as allowed for other product registrations and that encourages timely registrations prior to product sales.

Section 7. At the request of the Attorney General's office, clarification to the section was added for enforcement compliance to make it uniform to other registration chapters in the Century Code.

Section 8. At the request of the Attorney General's office, this change defines the penalty provision of this chapter to include a civil penalty and to allow for an administrative hearing according to chapter 28-32.

Chairman Flakoll and members of the committee. My name is Jeff Olson. I am a Program

Manager at the Department of Agriculture. I am here to testify in support of HB 1128 a bill that

amends Chapter 19-14 of the North Dakota Century Code. This bill is a housekeeping bill to

clarify existing language and to add a late fee for registering livestock medicines.

We deleted the requirement to register all medicated stock feeds and added a requirement to register "Type A Medicated Articles" as livestock medicines. "Type A Medicated Articles" are primarily drugs added to feed to create a medicated livestock feed, whereas Medicated Stock Feeds are used primarily for nutritional purposes.

In an effort by the Department to maintain a registration process that is cost effective and time efficient, we are proposing to change the language in Section 2, from "second ensuing" year to "every even-numbered" year. All registrations at this time follow the even-numbered year timeline.

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In Section 4, the Department is proposing to add a penalty fee of ten dollars for the late renewal of livestock medicine registrations. This provision is allowed for other product registrations and it also encourages timely registrations prior to product sales. A fiscal note was prepared showing an increase of approximately \$1,300 to the general fund because of the addition of a late fee.

This figure was based on ten-percent of the approximately 1,240 livestock medicine registrations and the projection of approximately 70 new registrations for the Type A Medicated Article requirements for a total projected registration of 1,310 products.

Section 7 was made at the request of the Attorney General's office. This clarification to the section was added for enforcement compliance to make it uniform to other registration chapters in the Century Code.

Section 8 was also made at the request of the Attorney General's office. This change defines the penalty provision of this chapter to include a civil penalty and to allow for an administrative hearing according to chapter 28-32.
