15-20.1-10. Specific powers - Tuition payments - Bond issues. The school board of a vocational school district is specifically authorized to accept on behalf of the district any real or personal property available for distribution by the United States or any of its departments or agencies, and also, to accept any federal grants which may be made available in the field of vocational education. It may accept enrollments and set the amount of tuition for students residing outside of the district; provided, that the amount of tuition so see may not exceed the difference between the average cost per student for educating a student in the district and the payments, if any, received by the district from state payments on behalf of such student. State payments on behalf of each student attending a vocational school must be made to the vocational school of attendance at the same rate as paid for high school students. A vocational school district must be deemed a municipality within the meaning of section 21-03-01.
