Rep. Sitte Section 2, Only if application results in an reduction of the number of students in enrolled in the district by more that 20% of the average daily membership in the previous school year. That leaves me to believe that another 17 can transfer out.

Lestmeister That is correct, but my daughter is going to be a sophomore next year she has to wait another year, then what are we going to do. I want her to have the choices now.

Rep. Sitte Will that same list students be kept or will you have to sign up again.

Lestmeister I 'm not sure how that works, the ones that open enrolled will just move up. But there are still, there are 37 students, it is going to take them three years to get them to a school where they want to be. We feel very strongly about our children's education. We want more than what they are getting. It should be our choice, if you are happy in a small school, stay, but if not don't impose regulations on us by the school board or Legislature saying that we don't have the choice. And Halliday is a very turmoil district right now. The town is divided, people don't talk to one another, boycotting business. It is awful to be in this situation, because you want something better for your children.

Rep. Herbel What electives are being taught in Halliday in Math and Science?

Lestmeister We have 7 ITV classes, if we would go to a larger school such as Kildeer, they may offer the same classes as we do, but there will actually be a teacher in the classroom. And that is one of our big concerns. As far as the classes, they rotate, one year they will do Geometry and then the next year Algebra II.

Rep. Herbel So how much Calculus and advanced math is offered?

Lestmeister This year they are offering Geometry, Algebra I, and Pre-calculus. I lot of times there is a conflict in schedule. Sometimes you don't have a choice.

Rep. Herbel How about in the sciences & how many are offered by a teacher in the class room?

Lestmeister Physics and Chemistry and advanced Biology, these three are by classroom.

Rep. Jon Nelson Has this always been a concern of yours that the school district no longer offer a quality instruction, or was it always there? And if it was, why were you not on the first of the list to open enroll out, prior to the 19 families that beat you.

Lestmeister Because I was on the reorganization plan, and I really believed that the school board were doing the right thing for our children. A guess I didn't think it would fail.

**Rep. Williams** You mentioned ITV, refer to emergency teachers, Do you have any

Lestmeister Yes, we have 2. They shouldn't be a teacher because they say they have had some classes in the field, there is more to teaching, you need to know how to present the material to the students, how to learn. This is a difficult situation for small school districts.

Rep. Williams I understand, sec 2, sec 15.1-31 07, read.

This section is only relating to a reorganization yet on the bottom we are getting rid of the 20% cap, why is this bill only relating to the dissolution?

Vice Chair Johnson Tom Decker, will you come forward and address this issue.

#### Tom Decker, Department of Public Instruction

There are two parts to this bill. The first part is what the testimony has been on so far the repeal of the 15.1-31-02. 15.1-31-07 deals with a narrow piece of business you have passed legislation in the past that says when a student is in a district that is reorganized or dissolved, they have a choice of school districts. It is simply a choice not open enrollment. Choice of school of attendance. So that striking the last sentence means that for purposes of determining how many

students can open enroll, students can choose another district under that provision, aren't counted in average daily membership.

**Rep. Meier** What courses is your daughter taking on ITV?

Lestmelster She is taking Art, Chemistry I and Math. It is hard to take Art with no one in the class and do it over a monitor. Rep. Hanson This repealer is only the 20%.

Susi Weisz, Halliday parent, See Attached Testimony, read 1400-1688

Tom Decker, Department of Public Instruction

Open enrollment is ultimate form of local control. It is letting parents make the decision for the best setting for their children's education. When we set up open enrollment in 1993, we put the 20% cap on for pragmatic political reasons to get the bill passed. There should be no limit on open enrollment, if we believe in the concept of letting parent make the choice, any cap is artificial. Over the history of open enrollment, after the first year very few school where it rose to the 20% cap. The first year we had a back log of student who were in other school districts on tuition agreements or waivers. They converted to open enrollment that was about 1/2 of the number the 1st year. Every year we have one or two situations where this cap has been a crisis, where parents have been put in a position of having to make difficult decisions about the education because of the 20% cap existed. If we believe I open enrollment, if we believe it is important for parents to choose where their students will get the best education, we should remove the cap. It will have very little effect on the vast majority of schools in ND. I should point out that any school board in ND is free to go beyond the 20%. I have talked with a lot of school board members personally, if you want to live there you don't vote to beyond the 20% cap. We support removing this cap.

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Rep. Williams many of us felt for a long time we need more consolidations in the state, yet we run into local control issue. If this bill passes, and take the cap off, will this force some to consolidate due to loss of numbers?

Decker: I don't think that in the history of open enrollment that would indicate that is the case. We have had any instances where numbers exceed the 20% cap want to open enroll out in any given year. There is a steady pattern of increasing numbers of students open enrolling. Overall direction is smaller to larger districts. More districts, regardless or weather we act here to mandate or speed up consolidation, will be going out business, because of declining enrollment. This is really a chicken or egg argument. The pattern that we see is that as districts numbers get smaller and if there is any discussion of consolidation, open enrollment immediately increases. In any case, it is in this circumstance that parents need the choice most.

Rep. Sitte Can students open enroll for just a few classes, example for the vo-tech classes. Decker: we have provisions in ND law to pay prorated foundation aid, for any student who want to attend a public school on a part time basis. It is also allowed under ND law, that school districts can reduce there scope of k-12 to k-6 or 8, and tuition there students out. Practically speaking in rural ND, the kind of course work that students want to go to another school for, may not be available. In much of ND we do not have good access to vocational programing and AP and high end course work.

Vice Chair Johnson If we were to remove caps and school boards doesn't agree to reorganization, how are they going to address the open enrollments when they come in, will they eliminate teachers?

Decker: Right now the 20% cap the district of residence has no choice in weather or not they let students go. If you remove the cap they will have no choice, in the number of student, as long as the student apply for open enrollment through the correct process by the deadline. It will make them rethink their staffing. We have set the timelines so that they can plan for that through the spring.

Rep. Williams Is optional for school districts to participate in open enrollment?

Decker: It is optional on the receiving end. They may still choose not to take in students who are open enrolling. If they take in they need to establish a policy, class size, program size criteria, and how many they take based on that criteria.

Rep. Jon Nelson How many cases has there been where the 20% cap a problem:

Decker: A print out, it is a very small number, some as small as 20% of 6 students.

Rep. Jon Nelson The 20% rule as a tool is turning into a weapon in some cases.

**Decker:** Who is holding who hostage, School boards can deal with this before it gets to this level.

#### **OPPOSITION**

#### (2890) Dean Bard, Association of Small Organized Schools

When open enrollment first came into being back 8 years ago, we did not oppose the open enrollment concept because there were certain safe guards built in at that time, one being that there is a deadline only one time in the year. And then 20% requirement so that a district could not be drained to where it would make it difficult to function. I sympathize with this situation that is occurring. By in large it is not a good idea to pass legislation because of one situation. There are avenues available for pupil movement from one district to another.

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(3159) Larry Klundt, ND Council of Education Leaders

I think Mr. Bard is right, when he said the reason that our association didn't oppose open enrollment was because of the cap, timelines and things of that sort. Times change and sometimes change. I would like to point out some things that may be helpful here. I have analyzed this situation, it really gives credence to concept that I have been telling you for some time, that consolidation in ND is an extremely emotional issue. It is not a logical issue. But when it comes to matters of the heart, difficult to fix the heart and appeare the brain. Currently as it stands, the people voted. Eleven more people voted to not consolidate in Halliday than voted to. If we remove the cap and we allow the people to open enroll, then we have disenfranchised the majority of the people, because the effect of that is to close the school and get what was wanted in the first place by the people who voted for the reorganization. On the other hand we also have this serious dilemma about the people who have kids in school and their concern to provide a quality education that they think is appropriate for their children. Mr. Clark proposed and amendment to remove the cap when a reorganization is involved. What if we were to look at this situation from the same point of view and said if the reorganization is NOT successful, only for those districts where you have a failure in the reorganization or a successful reorganization where there is a period of time where the 20% cap would not affect them. It appears a way to solve the issue to keep the 20% cap in place across the state, but in those unique situations it gives people some options.

Rep. Herbel Would you be in favor that being retroactive then?

Klundt: No problem with it.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

**SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-31-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

#### 15.1-31-02. Open enrollment - Grounds for denial - Exception.

Except as provided in section 15.1-31-04, the board of a student's school district of residence may deny an application under section 15.1-31-01 only if the application will result in a reduction of the number of students enrolled in the district by more than twenty percent of the average daily membership the previous school year. However, if denying an

  - a. <u>Denying the</u> application would result in the enrollment of children from the same nuclear family in different school districts, the school board of the district of residence may not deny the application; or
  - b. The application for open enrollment is filed on behalf of a student whose district of residence took part in an election to approve a reorganization plan and if the reorganization plan was rejected under section 15.1-12-11.

**SECTION 2. EMERGENCY.** This Act is declared to be an emergency measure."

Minutes: CHAIRMAN FREBORG called the committee to order. Roll Call was taken with all (6) members present.

CHARIMAN FREBORG opened the hearing on Engrossed HB 1361 which relates to grounds for the denial of open enrollment applications.

#### Testimony in support of Eng. HB 1361:

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REPRESENTATIVE C.B. HAAS, Dist. 36, testified in support of the bill. He stated the legislature should not be in the business of guaranteeing districts but should guarantee quality education for our students. ND is losing about 2000 students per year. We should try to do what is best for the students. He feels we can do better than capping the reduction of students at 20% of the average daily membership the previous school year in the open enrollment policy. If two schools pass a reorganization plan, the 20% cap is off. This bill also eliminates the 20% cap if the reorganization plan fails.

SENATOR LEE asked if this impairs the democratic process. REP. HAAS stated no. There are already other options, tuition waivers, etc., and the appeal process if needed.

SENATOR FLAKOLL asked if this would allow for failed reorganization plans to be retroactive.

REP. HAAS does not think so. He would prefer a proactive approach.

SENATOR COOK asked if there were any other instances with over 20% exit enrollment. REP. HAAS stated very few.

SENATOR FREBORG stated that if these course offerings with minimum standards to meet were passed, every student would have an equal opportunity. Are we now eliminating this?

REP. HAAS feels this is more about a quality education than course offerings. There is a difference in how courses are taught. He feels there are stress points out there with some people..

MAROLYNN LESMEISTER presented testimony in support of the bill. (see attached)

ROBERT FEREBEE testified in support of the bill. (see Attachment A). His best guess as to the number of students next year is there would be 25 students in the Halliday school.

SENATOR CHIRSTENSON, asked which teachers aren't qualified. MR. FEREBEE replied that two are not teaching with certificates. They are on emergency credentials.

KENNY WEISZ testified and expressed his concern with what the future will bring. (He is also a signatory on Attachment A). He has three areas of concern with one of his children. One class she is the only student and it is offered only over ITV. One class she is with all senior students and must strive to keep up to their level. The other concern is in music where he feels she is playing below her level. He stated his family has open enrolled to another school but fell below the 20% cap.

BEV NIELSON, NDSBA, stated this bill removes the 20% cap and doesn't require a timely enrollment process. They understand it is the state's obligation to provide a statewide system of education with reasonable parental choice. They believe there should be parameters set. They feel that this situation should not be compared to a reorganized district's situation since they are very different. They further believe this bill came from a volatile situation which has been addressed and resolved fairly well. There will always be a district that offers something your own doesn't. The Engrossed bill is more palatable to NDSBA. She also believes the situation from which this bill came is now being solved locally and that is how it should be. SENATOR COOK asked whether mandates or local control are used, or NCLB from the Feds, is she not now saying that local control (parental wishes) is not being considered. MS. NIELSON stated that she does advocate local control by the school boards to determine the operation of their districts. She does not advocate wholesale parental choice all over the state, as there are too many issues, and the education system would not function will if that were the case. SENATOR COOK stated that if we are to support local control, do we not have to support control by the parent. MS. NIELSON stated that is not how things work in our system. All taxpayers vote, not just parents of youth attending school.

SENATOR COOK has concerns over the 20% cap.

DEAN BARD, ND Small Organized Schools, stated their concern is in the repealing of the 20% cap. He stated the Engrossed bill is better. He wonders if the decision by a school district would be to not allow open enrollment, that this legislation would override that.

SENATOR TAYLOR asked what is being done to remedy the situation between Halliday and Killdeer. MS. BIFFERT would not expound on that because she was not in attendance at the last school board meeting and deferred the question to the school board president, Lynnette Frafford. SENATOR COOK asked if the 20% cap applies to parents who want to home school or enroll their students in a private school. She is not sure, but thought it applied to public school. QUINTANA BIFFERT, student, presented testimony from herself and SHAUN KLEE. (see attached)

LYNNETTE FRAFFORD, Halliday School Board Fresident, presented testimony. (see attached) SENATOR COOK asked if the legislature could have done something two years ago to avert this problem, or can they do something now. MS. FRAFFORD feels the criteria for reorganization should be given a longer time frame. They were only given five months to do it. With a longer time frame, the schools would be able to address all issues involved. It could take two to three years.

Hearing no further testimony, the hearing was closed on Eng. HB 1361.

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## New standards set tor North Dakota teachers

GRAND FORKS (AP) — North Dakota's teacher licensing agency has set new standards for educators that will require such things as skills testing and the compiling of portfolios to demonstrate proficiency.

The purpose of the standards set by the North Dakota Education Standards and Practices Board is to comply with the "No Child Left Behind" act that President Bush signed in January.

"These new standards will have a profound effect on teachers and teachers-in-training," said board member Chris Douthit, a teacher at Schroeder Middle School in Grand Forks.

The national education reform law that took effect in the current school year aims to broaden academic testing, increase spending for literacy programs and help children escape America's worst public schools.

It requires teachers to fulfill certain standards to be considred highly qualified. The deadne under federal rules is June

The standards set by the state board list requirements for new teachers and describe how experienced teachers who do not fulfill those requirements can become qualified.

New elementary school teachers applying for their initial license must pass a subject

knowledge and teaching skills

New teachers in grades 7-12 must have a bachelor's degree with a major or what is known asa professional education sequence in the subject they

teach.

They also can fulfill a major equivalency by earning a minor and then completing a test; earning a minor and completing a skills portfolio; taking a national board exam for teaching the subject; or completing coursework equivalent to the major.

Future teachers will know quickly what the new policy is about and should have little trouble fulfilling the education requirements, Douthit said. However, teachers who have been working for years, many of whom have switched subjects once or twice, might have a harder time.

Board members said they are worried that some experienced teachers will retire or leave the profession father than complete

the requirements.

"A seasoned teacher brings so much to a school," Douthit said. "We don't want any of our experienced teachers to feel as though they can't become quali-fied."

The board also has drafted a proposal for teachers who have experience in an academic field but do not hold a major or ininor in the subject they are teaching. Those educators would be considered highly qualified after completing a portfolio demonstrating their understanding of the subject, or by taking a test on the subject

The standards are necessary for the state to receive federal funding after 2006.

Some educators said North Dakota already has a high standard of teaching.
"We have to have faith in our

own system because we already hold ourselves to high stan-dards," said Peggy Shaeffer, director of teaching education at the University of North Dakota.

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#### OPEN ENROLLMENT CENTURY CODE GUIDELINES

15.1-31-01

- 2. By March 1 of the year preceding the year of enrollment, the school board of the student's residence shall act on the application, notify the parent of the board's decision within five days.
- 5. All applicant's must be reviewed in the order they are received.

15.1-31-02

Grounds for denial- Exception. Except as provided in section 15.1-31-04, the board of a student's school district of residence may deny an application under section 15.1-31-01 only if the application will result in a reduction of the number of students enrolled in the district by more than twenty percent of the average daily membership the previous school year. However, if denying an application would result in the enrollment of children from the same nuclear family in different school districts, the school board of the district of residence may not deny the application.

15.1-31-05

Transportation. A school district of residence may provide transportation to a student participating in open enrollment. If a district of residence does not provide transportation to a student participating in open enrollment, transportation may be provided by the admitting district, and the admitting district is then entitled to state payments for the transportation of that student.

15.1-31-06

School Boards - Standards. The board of each school district shall set standards for the acceptance and denial of applications for admittance under open enrollment as provided in section 15.1-31-01. The standards may address the capacity of a program, class, grade level, or school building. The standards may not address previous academic achievement, participation in extracurricular activities, disabilities, English language proficiency, or previous disciplinary proceedings.



Not being forced to take a class just because there is nothing else offered. We want teachers in the classrooms and not TV

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monitors. We want teachers available when our children need help after the class period ends. We want qualified teachers who actually are teaching in their majors and have had education classes. We do not want combined classes. We want classes that are based on abilities and not economic restraints. Now our lower classes are all combined and yet have only 5-6 students. You don't even have enough children in phy-ed classes to divide into teams for a sport. If we have to travel 25 miles to another school, we are willing to make that sacrifice for a quality education for our children. These small high schools do not adequately prepare our children to enter the large colleges. Being an A student in a class of 5 is way different than in a class of 40.

Right now more than one-third of our state's schools have enrollments of less than 100. Fewer districts would reduce administrative expenses, allowing more money to expand curriculums and hire more teachers. Are these small districts really in the best interest of the children? Some parents may like small schools. Others may prefer home schooling. Please don't force restrictions on those of us that don't. Let us make the choice for our children. Don't hold our children captives, in a school where they don't want to be. Most of all don't make them feel they are responsible for their town's economic survival by keeping a school's doors open.

We need to change the laws. Do away with the 20% open enrollment ceiling. If we want a better education for our children, let us go.

Those who want stay in a small school can. My daughter will be a sophmore next year and doesn't have the luxury of time.



Interpretation and application of North Dakota Century Code 15,1-29-03

North Dakota Century Code 15.1-29-03 subsection 1 states, "After taking into account the best interests of all affected parties, the board of a school district may elect to send its students to another school district. In this instance, the board may pay tuition for the students. The board may arrange, and when petitioned to do so by qualified electors of the district equal in number to at least a majority of those who voted in the most recent annual school district election shall arrange, with other boards to send students to the other districts and to pay for their tuition and transportation." This section of the law has not been applied in a North Dakota school district but may well be applied in the next few months.

The issues or questions relate to circumstances in which the electors of the district would petition the school board to make arrangement for students to attend in other districts. The language of the section states that at least a majority of those who voted in the most recent annual school district election would be needed as signatories on the petition. Does that mean 50% of those who voted in the last election plus one in order to submit a valid petition? 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If electors petition the board is there any alternative to the board's paying tuition and transportation as indicated by the section? Would it be possible for the board to negotiate tuition free agreements for the students who are attending out of district as a consequence of the petition?

When a school board receives a petition under this section of code what is the time frame in which the board must make a decision? Presumably their decision must fit a timeframe in which the involved parents could make necessary arrangements to exholl their students in neighboring school districts. If as a result of the petition the school district continues to operate a school while sending some number of students to other districts as the petitioners requested is there any timeline on the effect of the petition or would those students who are attending out of district as a result of the petition be presumed to be in attendance in their chosen district as long as they or their parents wanted that circumstance to continue? If a petition is filed by the required number of electors under this section of the code, would a subsequent petition from another group of electors asking the board not to send students out of the district have any impact or standing.

Hill, who's scheduled for a preliminary hearing Feb. 27 in Beach on the North Dakota charges, was working as an agent for Allstate Insurance in McMin-

's, Ore,, and apparently got s to the personal informa-. of another Steve Hill. That occurred in April 2000 and Hill left the state a short time later.

He told the Oregon Insurance Division he was moving to New Jersey and received a letter of clearance, which he presented to North Dakota insurance officials instead. Allstate investigators began looking into Hill's dealings after he left the state.

The telephones to Great River Energy have been buzzing and callers want to know more about the company's grant-winning

Great River, which is ploneering the technology to dry lignite coal before it's dumped into the huge bollers at the power plant, recently secured an \$11 million grant from the Department of

North Dakota's lignite has more water than barder coals and is less marketable because it

doesn't burn as efficiently.

The new project at Great River seeks to reduce that liability by reducing the water in coal

by 25 percent.
"This would level the playing field," said Charlie Bullinger, lead

engineer at the plant.

The project has created a buzz in the industry because of its implications both for coal and the environment. Using dried coal will reduce the amount of carbon dioxide in the plant's emission scream plus reduce operational costs by 70 cents a megawatt hour.
The grant money will allow

Great River to build a one-tentily scale prototype that will dry three tons of coal an hour. The plant burns 450 tons an hour in each of the two units.

Great River is conducting the coal drying experiment at its Coal Creek Station at Underwood. It also operated the Stanton Station plant.

- 9. MINOR EQUIVALENCY ENDORSEMENT: ME 16 or ME 24 in content are Me 16 requires 16 semester hours in a specific content area. ME 16 is goo five years. Coursework to complete ME 24 must be completed within five y period. This endorsement can not be used if someone wants to change fro elementary to secondary education or vice versa. Requirements must be completed prior to entering classroom.

I am concerned about the education that Amy may receive in the Halliday School District next year. With the allowed open enrollments for the school year of 2003-04, Amy maybe the only one left in her class. Attending school in Killdeer will allow Amy more educational opportunities, classroom interaction, and socialization. I want more classes than Halliday can offer, I want a teacher in the classroom and not an ITV monitor. I want a teacher to be readily available if Amy should have any questions on classroom assignments. By being in a school system with more than one student in a class, she can be in a classroom split into sections based on abilities and not economic restraints.

In the past, the school board has always made decisions for my family that was always in their best educational interest. In 1999-00 you approved a tuition-free agreement for Ashley to Golden Valley. In Ashley's best educational interest, we agreed, and you provided an education for Ashley that was home-based. This was in the best interest of Ashley and the Halliday School at that time. In 2000-01 you approved open enrollment

applications for Anthony and Ashley to Golden Valley School District. I am asking you to again put aside all personal preferences, public pressure, economic development, and the school district finances. Look only at the best educational interest of Amy. With the students allowed to open enroll next year, she may well be the only one left in her class. For a child's emmotional welfare, they need comradeship and competition. If they didn't, why is the school involved in and sponsoring extracurricular activities such as FFA, and sports? Amy needs this. She is a very out going person. Don't punish her by putting her in a class by herself, just so the Halliday School will remain open. Don't let her lose scholarship opportunities that she needs to prepare for now. ITV classrooms are not directly supervised. No adult in classroom.

We want teachers available after the class is over if help is needed for homework. This is not possible with the ITV teachers.

ITV scheduling conflicts with other class scheduling.

We do not want combined classrooms.

We want our children split into classes because of abilities and not because of economic reasons.

We want our children to have a full day of teaching-not the half day they get with combined teachers. They deserve a full time teacher to give them the full time attention that they deserve.

We do not want distractions in the classroom when the other class is being taught. How can this be possible in a combined classroom?

We want enough children in a classroom for activities. Classroom discussions, and interaction.

We want our children in high school not to have to take classes alone. Where is the classroom discussion and interaction?

We want larger classes for socialization. Some classes have only had 2 children. One boy and one girl. Is that fair to them? Small is not necessarily always better!

We want qualified teachers who are actually teaching in their majors and have had corresponding educational sequence classes. We now have two teachers who are not teaching in their majors nor had educational sequence classes. They are currently

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studying to be certified teachers. They were hired on an emergency basis just to say we had teachers. Is this fair to the children? Learning on the job?

Killdeer offers 20 classes that are scheduled twice a day. This helps to eliminate classscheduling conflicts.

Killdeer has no ITV Classes. Each course is taught by a classroom teacher. An adult supervises their classes at all times.

Killdeer's teachers are available after class is over for help if needed, not like the ITV courses.

Killdeer does not have combined classrooms. More classroom interaction.

Killdeer's library is open all the time and not locked like Halliday's.

Killdeer has a much larger class course offering.

Killdeer has more varied extracurricular activities for the children to pursue outside interests.

Killdeer has more full-time teachers.

Killdeer has a higher computer per student ratio.

Killdeer has more qualified special education teachers.

We want to make the choices for our children. We are locking at our children's futures. We don't want our children to feel responsible for our towns economic survival by keeping the schools doors open.

Don't put our children in the middle of a town's conflict.

#### Halliday School Board Members:

we have been concerned with the lack of curriculum choices open to the upper grades in our school system. We hesitated to enroll our children in another school because we liked the convenience of having a school close to our home, preferred to support our local school district, and hoped that somehow more choices could be offered "next year". It has become clear with the declining student numbers that our local school can no longer offer many choices in addition to the basic courses, and would now like to open enroll Josh with the Killdeer school district next year. Josh has two years left in high school and was limited with the choices of Vo Ag classes offered because one of the classes would have been a repetition of last year's class. He is now enrolled in an accounting class thru the ITV and while this situation keeps him out of another study hall, it does not offer him a course with a teacher in the room during the class period. ITV can offer classes for one or two students that are not usually included in small high school curriculums, but they do not offer an ideal learning situation for all students. Some students need a teacher in the room with them during the class time allowed and not one who is accessible only thu u à screon.

We are also concerned about the size of Josh's junior class next year and would prefer that he be in a class with more than four classmates. At the present time his class of eight (total) will decrease again next year by another three students open enrolling in another district. He has lost two classmates in previous years to other schools, and we would like him to be in a larger classroom situation. Classroom discussions and class projects are difficult enough with less than a dozen students, and Josh's class next year could be down possibly to three students. A combined classroom with older students is not necessarily a good solution either. As a freshman Josh was in a welding class, which included freshman thru seniors. Any high school teacher will tell you a class with that much range in age is not an ideal situation either.

Josh has the ability to learn easily with little effort on his part and has been on the honor roll every quarter since seventh grade. We would like him to have the opportunity to learn with a larger base or classmates to strengthen his study skills, push his abilities in the classroom for learning, and provide competition in learning and discussion. We hope you will allow him to open enroll in a larger school system which will offer more choices in curriculum and extra curricular activities.

I am a parent with children in the Halliday School district, and currently there are 37 students from our district open enrolled to another district for the 2003-2004 school year. My children are in the 20 percent that will be allowed to go, but there are 18 other students that did not make the 20 percent. As you may know, a consolidation plan was developed between the Halliday School District and the Killdeer School District, but in November of 2002, the plan was defeated in a special election by a very narrow margin of 11 Votes. We are testifying in favor of HB 1361. Our district recently went through a reorganization vote that was defeated by a narrow margin. The opposition chose economic development over the future educational needs of our students. Patrons supporting the reorganization plan did so out of concern in some of the following areas:

- 1. Increasing difficulty in recruiting and retaining qualified teachers
- 2. Declining enrollment (We currently have a K-12 enrollment of 76)
- 3. More educational opportunities for our students
- 4. Larger class sizes with single classroom settings allowing more student interaction, classroom discussion and competition (Grade school classes are now combined)
- 5. Lower mill levy thus reducing school taxes

As parents we felt, and still do, the reorganization would provide all of these advantages, therefore we have open enrolled our child to a district that can provide these opportunities. Unfortunately, she and several others are above the 20% cap and would need board approval to leave. At this time we do not feel the board will approve the balance of open enrollments. Due to many circumstances, the plan did not pass in our district. Halliday will lose state financial aid for every student that goes to Killdeer, therefore damaging Halliday's finances. According to open enrollment limits set by state law, it appears the Halliday board will have to allow the departure of at least 19 students who are patrons, suggested that the 'named in the first set of applications. The other applications can be rejected by the board.

But doing so would have placed board members such as Ferebee in an odd situation. "I can't be involved in curriculum planning when my own kids are open enrolled," said Ferebee.

· If board members rejected the additional applications, then they would be going against the wishes of many parents. If the applications were approved, the board would be putting the district's finances in peril.

"If I let them out it would be detrimental for the school district - it would destroy the

But attending school in Killdeer would provide more educational opportunities and more socialization, she said. "I have a son who is in a class with one classmate. I just wanted more for him."

Frafford opposed the merger plan because she said it lacked details regarding what would happen to the Halliday district's buildings in the event of a consolidation. Opponents also feared the consolidated district's board would close the Halliday School.

The loss of students won't cause the closure of the Halliday School, Frafford said.

"We'll still have a viable district for (next) year," said Fraf- for comment.

ford. The district expects to have about \$400,000 in interim and reserve funds which can be used to keep the school operating.

"We hate to see ahyone leave," Frafford said of her former board members. "I feel we should have been able to sit down at the table and discuss this more."

The two board members who are appointed by the State Board of Public School Education may have the positions only for a short time.

Once the Halliday board has a quorum, the members who were appointed by the state board have to resign, according to North Dakota law. The Halliday board would then fill those vacancies through appointments or with a special election.

Dawn Marquardt, a parent and Halliday city's auditor, wonders if the state board will be able to find any unbiased appointees. "I don't know if you could find someone like that here," she said.

Discussions regarding the future of Halliday's school and the merger have been swirling for about a year.

"The more it goes on the more hard feelings there are." said Marquardt. "It's really torn the community apart.".

I am writing to ask for your support for HB1361 and to applaud those that are sponsoring this bill. I am from the community of Halliday and as you all know our community voted down a reorganization plan with the Killdeer School District this past November. I was a member of the Halliday School Board until my resignation on 12/20/02. It was with very mixed emotions that I resigned. I believed very strongly in the consolidation plan that had been worked on and truly believed we were doing what would have benefited the students first and foremost. I felt that I as a board member could not do anything more proactive for the district and when pressured to choose between my duties as a board member and my role as a parent, I chose my role as a parent.

I witnessed with horror as one of the newly appointed school board members lashed out at a special meeting on 1/29/03 to the parents who have open enrolled by calling their actions (filing open enrollments) stupid and idiotic. He went on to say that this is a democracy and those who lost need to accept it and not stomp their feet and act like spoiled brats. Most of the open enrollments had been filed long before the consolidation vote ever took place. These were not filed in retaliation to the defeat of the plan; however they were filed because the parents felt so strongly about their children's rights to receive more opportunities. I do not believe the original intent behind the present law Section 15.1-31-02 was to force students to stay in a school that does not provide them with the choices they are entitled to. Yes this is a democracy.....and those parents should have the right to decide what is in the best interest of their child. As a junior my daughter FINALLY was able to take an entry level computer literacy class as we did not have a technology teacher when she was a freshman and a required course was scheduled at the same time as computer literacy when she was a sophomore. We now had a Vo-Ag teacher so she ended up having to take that to fill her course load. She is going to attend Minot State University next year to pursue a degree in Communication Disorders and did not need to learn how to weld, wire outlets, plumb, etc. She needed the computer courses or other courses more suited to her field. I feel the time is right for my son who is a freshman to open enroll to Killdeer so that he will not have to face what my other 2 children did. He is within the 20%; however, it does not deter my feelings about the rights of all parents to decide where their children attend school and their children's right to receive the best education possible.

I strongly urge you to support this bill and I thank you for your time.

To ND Education Committee Members:

Good Morning, my name is Marolynn Lesmeister of Halliday. I would like to thank you for giving me this opportunity to speak on behalf of my daughter Amy and 36 other openenrolled children from the Halliday School District.

I am requesting you to vote favorably for bill 1361 to drop the 20% ceiling on open enrollments allowed by a local school board. Please allow us as parents the right to hold our own children's educational futures in our hands where it belongs. Let us be allowed to give them the same opportunities that children at larger schools receive. Yes, it does mean more time on the school bus, but we are willing to make that sacrifice. We want a wider variety of class offerings, to be able to choose classes that fit our children's future goals and not just to take a class because there simply is no other choice. We want teachers in the classrooms and not ITV monitors. To have teachers readily available for homework and not to have to wait for an e-mail or make a long distant phone call when help is needed. We do not want combined classrooms in which 2 grades share the same teacher. They deserve a full time education with minimal distractions. We want our children in classes based on their abilities and not economic restraints and class size numbers. Enough children in a classroom for discussion and interaction to do projects, provide competition in learning, and push their abilities for learning in the classroom. You can not do this with 1 or 2 students in a classroom. My daughter is a senior in high school this year. She has been taking three classes by herself - one independent study. one ITV, and one math class by herself. I don't want my other daughter who is a freshman this year to have to go through the same thing. She has open-enrolled to a larger school, but is not in the 20% allowed to go. She may be the only one left in her class next year if not allowed to go.

Right now we are seeing many of our children entering into college. We see how some of our children are struggling at the college level. They are limited in lab areas and courses such as advanced sciences and maths. Adjusting to classes with 100 or more students is very difficult after being in a class of 4 or 5. Getting an A in a class of 5 is much easier than a class of 30. I know this for a fact, as my son is in college right now and so are many of my friend's children.

We want teachers who have level II or III licenses and not ones with emergency licenses who are learning on the job while they are teaching our children, because there are no other teachers available. Just because someone has the content courses does not make him or her a teacher. The new Leave No Child Behind Act is going to make this very difficult.

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Our children are being put in the middle of small town's economic conflict. Saying a school consolidation may take away jobs, businesses would close, and the town would die. Is it fair to make our children feel responsible for a town's economic survival and sacrifice the educational opportunities that they deserve?

At the present time my daughter's education is in the hands of a school board who had a member state that the actions of the parents of open enrolled school children are stupid and idiotic, acting like little kids stomping their feet because they didn't get what they wanted. This may not be an exact quote, but the meaning is there. He was referring to the failure of the Halliday/Killdeer reorganization plan in Nov. and the parents who had open enrolled as a result. Killdeer overwhelming voted to accept the plan by 84% and in Halliday it was narrowly defeated by 11 votes. Of the 327 votes in Halliday, only 72 people who voted actually had children in the Hailiday School. Now out of 75 children 37 have open enrolled and that does not include those open enrolled from the Twin Buttes School District, who do not have a high school to attend in their district. We have 6 students graduating and no kindergartners next year. Maybe we should be listening to the parents with children in school and not the entire community.

I know that open enrollments cost dollars to school districts. There must be a way to make districts more equitable in funding other than forcing a child to stay where he doesn't want to be. Right now more than one third of our state's schools have enrollments of less than 100. Fewer districts would reduce administrative expenses, allowing more money to expand curriculums and hire more teachers. Are these small districts really in the best interest of the children? Some parent's may like small schools, others may prefer home schooling, but please doesn't force restrictions on those of us that don't. Let us make the choice for our children. Don't force them to stay in a school where they don't want to be. Our children have personally requested this from us.

We have 37 open enrolled children. Nineteen will be allowed to go because they happened to be the lst in line. Is that fair?

By lifting the 20% ceiling, the schools will not have to close, as in a consolidation. Those that want to stay can, and those that want to leave will have the right to go.

Now remember you are placing my daughter's and that of 36 other open enrolled children into the hands of a school board member who stated that our wanting the best educational opportunities for our children is idiotic and stupid.

Please vote yes on House Bill 1361 to drop the 20% ceiling on open enrollments. We need this law in effect as soon as possible under emergency legislation to help our children this year. It is our parental right and responsibility to choose what is best for our children's future. Thank You.

#### Testimony of Lynnette Frafford

#### **HOUSE BILL NO. 1361**

March 17, 2003

Chairman Layton Freborg, and Senate Education Committee members:

My name is Lynnette Frafford, School Board President and parent from Halliday, ND., and I am providing testimony against House Bill No. 1361.

I find it hard to believe that due to a reorganization vote not passing, a bill could be introduced to change a law because of the agenda of a few people. I am opposed to House Bill 1361 as it undermines the decision of the voters, which consisted of all taxpayers in the district. It also penalizes current school board members and what they have to work with, even though there may have been other board members on at the time of the reorganization vote. This bill is narrow, targeting one issue because of one situation. Common sense needs to come to the forefront, and we need to look at the havoc this would cause for all future reorganization plans. This bill would mean that it doesn't make any difference what taxpaying patrons believe, as their vote wouldn't count. When did our state come to this conclusion? The change needs to come in the criteria for reorganization, but that's another issue which I won't even address for now.

We, the school board at Halliday, did not approve open enrollment applications over the 20% cap because we felt the law on open enrollment is a good law and it has certain safeguards built into it. It allows districts the time to plan for a certain number of students leaving, or entering a district, when they are working on finances and plans for their districts. Imagine the confusion if you lift the cap.

However, there are other avenues for students to move from district to district. There are No Charge agreements, and we as a board did approve No Charge agreements, (or Tuition Waiver agreements as some call them), which a neighboring district had signed, for the remaining students above the 20% cap. So, the issue has been taken care of. Other avenues are District Paid Tuition agreements, or Parent Paid Tuition agreements. The legislature has been protective of local control for School Boards, and most school boards will make decisions based on their area and most of the time the issue will take care of itself, rather than changing a law that could prove detrimental for other schools in the state.

Contrary to testimony that was given in the House, I need to leave you with correct information, about our school in Halliday. Halliday is an accredited and approved school and always has been. Our CTBS scores are as high, or higher than National and State averages. We offer a core curriculum, and electives, and they are taught by qualified certified teachers. We support our teachers, and did give them the monies that the state allocated for teachers salaries two years ago. We were futuristic in joining the Great Western Interactive Video Network several years ago, which is a boon for districts that have it, as it offers more choice for extra curricular courses, than districts around us can. Through ITV students can take extra curricular classes offered by Bismarck Public Schools and other schools. Halliday Public School District has great students, parents, and taxpayers that believe in our school and want to continue to educate our children in Halliday, rather than put them on buses for up to three hours per day, as it would be for some students. The district is financially sound, and the board plans to be involved and responsible.

As a parent and Halliday School Board President, I urge a **DO NOT PASS** on House Bill No. 1361.

This Representative said that "the students of the Halliday Public School unfortunately were not getting a good education," and also used Halliday as a pawn to get this bill to pass.


We were both shocked and hurt! How could this Representative make statements about a city and a school that this person has never been to nor probably will never go to?

We are writing this testimony in opposition to House Bill 1361. In passing this bill it would ultimately be taking away control of all school boards. It also eliminates the rights of voters who may or may not be in favor of a consolidation.

Should not one tax payers voting opinion be worth as much as anyone else's? Whether you are from a large school district or a small one you should have the same rights as anyone else.

We have heard different Representatives state that "the people of Halliday should not hold their children hostage to the community". To us this is a ridiculous statement, because the children who live in Halliday do not view themselves as being held hostage! It is our opinion that it is a select group of parents who feel this way.

The 20% cap was put in the North Dakota Century Code to protect all school districts from being forced to close at any particular time through open enrollment. This should not be any different for a school district if a consolidation fails.

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## Testimony of Jonas and Debra Biffert

#### House Bill 1361

#### March 17, 2003

Mr. Chairman, Senate Education Members: My name is Debi Biffert. I live in rural Halliday and here to testify in behalf of my husband and myself against House Bill 1361 that would remove the twenty percent enrollment cap for school districts.

For the past few weeks, Halliday has received unwarranted negative publicity regarding a failed proposed consolidation plan developed between the Halliday and Killdeer School districts. The vote in November reflected that the majority wanted Halliday School to remain as is. We wanted our school to share resources with 2 schools in close proximity, rather than consolidate with a school 22 miles from Halliday.

When the plan failed, proponents began contacting patrons, convincing them to open enroll by telling them there would be no school in Halliday. Or, they told them, with this many students open enrolling, your child will be the only one in his/her class. Scare tactics were and continue to be used to get their way simply because they could not accept the vote. We know this was happening because many who had been approached told us of the comments said to them.

Proponents of this bill have said that Halliday is not offering the required curricula. False. We offer all that any school district offers to their students, except Family and Consumer Science (FCS). We are an approved and accredited school and could offer FCS by sharing services with other schools. HB 1361 came into existence due to a few who are angered over the failed vote, not because the quality of education in Halliday is poor.

Should this bill pass, it allows opportunity for anyone with an ax to grind to try to close a school. I don't believe the legislature nor this committee is in favor of hampering all ND schools and pass a bill based on our situation in Halliday.

Contrary to what you have been told, we are not trying to place the burden of keeping a school and community on the students. It's just common sense that economic development and closure of schools do not go hand in hand. Beside the fact that we provide a good education, if this bill passes, then we lose sight of the future and the possibility of those moving to our community. People will not move to a community where there is no school.

Proponents have said, "We cannot expect the school to keep the town alive. We cannot put that burden on the children and expect them to be prepared educationally and socially to go to college if they do not have the variety of classes to choose from and are forced into classes they are not interested in just to put them somewhere."

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To counter this, we submit to you that if there was so much dissatisfaction with the availability of classes, why did these parents not go to their elected school board? Why didn't they choose to work with the administration regarding available classes rather than look to consolidation as an out? The individual who made the above statement in written testimony is a former school board member with open enrolled children, who resigned in December 2002. That member was someone with the ability to make changes.

Early in January and February of 2002, three out the five former board members filed open enrollment papers for their children, yet remained on the board. In November 2002, it was suggested to them that they resign if they felt that it would be a conflict of interest to work for the school and community. Four of the five school board members resigned on December 20, 2002.

Is this what we truly want to teach to our students as well as demonstrate to the state of North Dakota, that if we do not get our way, then out of spite or because we don't like certain individuals that we run away from our problems rather than face them and find a fair solution?

Our new school board is working hard to salvage this school and community, to bring back the positive, to raise the morale of the staff and patrons, and to continue to provide a quality education to those who wish to remain in Halliday. However, if this bill passes, then we lose our local control and the state is then dictating what a school can and cannot do.

Passage of HB 1361 with the current amendment penalizes a district considering consolidation in the future, if the majority vote no on a proposed consolidation plan. Why tell a district to develop a plan, take it to a vote of the people, and then allow all who wish, to open enroll if it fails? Where is the democracy in this bill? If the locals don't like certain components of a plan and wish to vote it down, the vote should stand. Passage of HB 1361 undermines the will of the people.

Had the consolidation plan passed, our elementary school was to have remained open for three years. Just about every parent who has open enrolled since the vote failed, seemed perfectly content to leave their child in the elementary with the proposed consolidation plan. However, since it failed, it appears our elementary is not good enough for their child. We have the same good teachers after the vote as we did before the vote. Nothing has changed. It is just sour grapes.

We have a group in Handay working hard to bring tourism dollars here in the next few years in relation to Lewis and Clark. While we struggle to bring people to the south shore of Lake Sakakawea, it appears we have those who are also working hard to close our schools.

We respectfully request that you allow our new board to work towards keeping our school open, rather than passing this bill and allowing those with an agenda to close a viable school. We need a school between Killdeer and Beulah.

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In conclusion, it is no longer necessary to pass this bill based on "No Child Left Behind" (NCLB) Act. In recent news reports, a halt has been put on NCLB by Sen. Dorgan until changes are made in the guidelines for schools and teachers, and money is given for the project.

Talk to those in our community who can give you a positive report on our school. We respectfully ask that you recommend a "Do Not Pass" on HB 1361. Thank-you.

We are asking for your support of HB 1361. This bill would remove the 20% open enrollment cap for a district that went through a reorganization vote and the vote failed, thereby allowing parents the right to send their children elsewhere.

We are from the town of Halliday and things are a real mess here. Last November, an election was held on whether to consolidate our school with Killdeer, our neighbor to the west. The vote was defeated by a mere 11 votes. 158 – 169. Of the total 327 votes, only 72 actually represented parents with children in the school system.

The main drive behind the opposition to the reorganization was the economic impact this could have on the community. 158 voters went to the polls with one main focus – the educational benefit to the student with the financial benefit to the taxpayers. We live in a democratic society and while there were questions surrounding the legality of all the absentee ballots, the voters accepted the final vote. The parents however, are now asking to be allowed to have their children attend the Killdeer Public School by filing open enrollments. The vast majority of these open enrollments had been filed long before the vote ever took place. The 20% cap had already been met by 3/8/02, 8 whole months prior to the election. Early on, it was evident the opposition would work diligently to defeat the consolidation and parents signed up early to guarantee their children would receive more opportunities. Following the vote, there were 15 open enrollments filed by parents who were convinced the reorganization plan would pass. After the plan failed, they too realized their only option for their children to receive more educational opportunities was through the open enrollment process.

The N.D.C.C. has a provision for students if a reorganization vote is successful; however, there are none if a reorganization vote fails. This bill would provide equity to all students involved in a reorganization – pass or fail, all students would have the same opportunity to attend a school of their choosing. This bill is not only about open enrollments, but a parent's right to decide what is in the best educational interest for their children.

It may seem like HB 1361 is focusing only on Halliday. But, as the enrollments continue to decline in other North Dakota schools, many more may be faced with this same dilemma. By passing this bill, a lot of heartache can be avoided for others. Unfortunately for Halliday, things may never be the same.

Thank you for your consideration on this important piece of legislation.

To ND Senate Education Committee Members:

Good Morning, my name is Marolynn Lesmeister. I would like to thank you for giving me the opportunity to speak to you on behalf of 39 students and their parents from Halliday.

We feel very strongly about our children's education. We want them to be able to have equal opportunities at the best education that she/he can. Not to have this right taken away because of economics, demographics, and population loss. We don't want them to feel responsible for a town's economic survival and sacrifice the educational opportunities that they deserve.

We want the right to choose our children's futures. Not to have their futures in the hands of a school board only concerned about keeping a school open as long as possible, even if it is not offering what the children really need. Let us be allowed to give them the same opportunities that the larger schools offer. Yes it does mean more time on the school bus, but we are willing to make this sacrifice. We want a wider variety of classes. To be able choose classes that fit our children's future goals and not just to take a class because there simply is no other choice. We want teachers in the classrooms and not TV monitors, we don't want combined classrooms in which two grades have to share one teacher. They deserve a full time education with minimal distractions. We want our children in classrooms based on their abilities and not economic restraints and class size. Enough children in a classroom for discussion and interaction to do projects, provide competition for learning, and push their abilities for learning in the classroom. You can not do this with one or two students in a classroom. Right now we are seeing many of our children entering into college. We see how some of our children are struggling at the college level. They are limited in lab areas and courses such as advanced sciences and math's.

Our district recently went through a reorganization that failed by a narrow margin. Of the 327 votes only 72 people actually had children in school. The opposition choose economic development over the future educational needs of our children. Patrons who supported the reorganization did so out of concern for the following reasons:

- 1. Increasing difficulty in recruiting and retaining qualified teachers
- 2. Declining enrollment
- 3. More educational opportunities for our children
- 4. Larger class sizes with single classroom settings allowing more student interaction
- 5. Lower mill levy thus reducing school taxes

As parents we felt and still do, the reorganization would have provided all these advantages. Maybe we should be listening to the parents with children in school and not the entire community.

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10/3/03 Date 74

NDCC 15.1-31-07 states: If a student as a result of a school district dissolution or reorganization, resides in a district other than the one the student chooses to attend at the time of the dissolution or reorganization, the student is not subject to the provisions of this chapter and may attend school in the chosen school district.

To make this equal to all students, if a reorganization fails, then they also should have this same opportunity to choose which school they want to go to.

I know that open enrollments and tuition-free agreements cost dollars to school districts. There must be a way to make districts more equitable in funding other than forcing a child to stay where he doesn't want to be. Some parent's may like small schools, others may prefer home schooling, but please don't force restrictions on those of us that don't. Let us make the choice for our children. Don't force them to stay in a school where they don't want to be.

I know of other districts having to make tough decisions in the near future. Please don't let happen to other communities what has happened in Halliday. Families, churches, and businesses have been torn apart by this close failed reorganization vote. In our opinion, Halliday will never be the same again.

Thank you for considering a yes vote on HB1361.
