

Rep. Kretschmar: We will open the hearing on HB 1415.

Rep. Maragos: Introduced the bill, HB 1415.

Reed Soderstrom, Attorney and bail bondsman: Support (#31-42). I have 18 agents working part-time for me, and we work with the court statewide. This is a very essential part of the system.

Rep. Delmore: How many bondsmen are in North Dakota.

Mr. Soderstrom: Between 35-40, not all are practicing.

Rep. Delmore: What are the most common reasons for bail.

Mr. Soderstrom: Usually DUI, small misdemeanors, etc.

Rep. Delmore: Is 5% for court costs enough?

Mr. Soderstrom: That 5% is in the original law.

Rep. Delmore: If this bill passes, will it make more people decide that they don't need to show up for court cases.

Mr. Soderstrom: I don't think so, because the minute they're not there, the judge immediately issues a bench warrant for that person's arrest.

Rep. Bernstein: You say, up to six months to bring an individual back, by what authority do you do that, are you deputized or something.

Mr. Soderstrom: We are not deputized per se, we have a right to revoke the bond. We have the power to bring them in.

Rep. Klemin: So you are wanting to establish a uniform time across the state, how much time you have to return a defendant to court after you receive the notice that he failed to appear.

Mr. Soderstrom: Yes.

Rep. Klemin: The amount of time varies - is six months on the outside of what you get now.

Mr. Soderstrom: Yes, it is not the longest. Georgia gets six months, which is what we modeled this bill on.

Rep. Klemin: How much time do you realistically need.

Mr. Soderstrom: Realistically need three months at a minimum.

Rep. Klemin: Time runs when you get notice.

Mr. Soderstrom: If district judges only meet once a week or less, we don't always get notified immediately when the time starts to run, so three months is a minimum.

Rep. Klemin: But it doesn't begin to run until you get the notice.

Mr. Soderstrom: That is my position, but it doesn't always work like that, try to explain that to the judge and have him see it that way.

Rep. Onstad: What is the charge for bonding, how do you secure your part of it.

Mr. Soderstrom: That is a good question, we get 10% or \$50, whichever is more. No money other than the 10% or \$50 changes hand. We sign the papers at the court, and if he skips, we are on the line for the amount of the bond. We try to get collateral.

Rep. Boehning: What are the time lines in Montana, SD, Minnesota under the scenario you are asking for 6 months, what are they doing?

Mr. Soderstrom: I don't know.

Rep. Kretschmar: If bail is at \$5,000, do you put cash with court.

Mr. Soderstrom: No, just our signature at the court gets them out of jail.

Rep. Kretschmar: You are bonded by insurance company.

Mr. Soderstrom: Yes, my underwriter is Ceneca. If a person skips, the court can come after the bail bondsman personally for the entire bail amount. Only if a bail bondsman files bankruptcy, would the insurance company come up with the money.

Rep. Delmore: If the person fails to appear, you track them down, do you then get the complete bond money from that person.

Mr. Soderstrom: Sometimes we will hire bounty hunters around the state that do it part-time, and they charge 10% plus expenses, so I will usually lose money. You can sue the defendant to get back your costs, but it's not going to be quick, and that is the reason for the six month time period, to give the bonding agent plenty of time to go get the collateral, resell it and take care of all the necessary work with the court. No we're out that money.
