Minutes: Joint Appropriations Hearing

Rep. Svedjan opened the hearing on HB 1506, Roll was taken, those in attendance: Rep. Svedjan, Rep. Timm, Rep. Martinson, Rep. Brusegaard, Rep. Aarsvold, Rep. Gulleson, Rep. Monson, Rep. Rennerfeldt, Rep. Wald, Rep. Carlisle, Rep. Carlson, Rep. Glassheim, Rep. Koppelman, Rep. Kroeber, Rep. Skarphol, Rep. Thoreson, Rep. Warner, Rep. Delzer, Rep. Warnke, Rep. Bellew, Rep. Kempenich, Rep. Kerzman, Rep. Metcalf, Sen. Holmberg, Sen. Bowman, Sen. Grindberg, Sen. Andrist, Sen. Christmann, Sen. Kilzer, Sen. Krauter, Sen. Kringstad, Sen. Lindaas, Sen. Mathern, Sen. Schobinger, Sen. Thane. THOSE ABSENT: Sen. Robinson, Sen. Tallackson.

Rep. Berg shared an overview with the committee addressing the changes to the previously pass bill, Those changes include a 1M increase in general fund dollars, leaving the introduced bill to 81.7M. He noted the 01-03 biennium, this agency was funded at 75M with a 1.2M turnback amount.

Rep. Svedjan noted the changes include a 1M addition and the emergency clause.

Rep. Berg noted the increase is being addressed to due an increase in inmate estimates that exceed inmates being contracted out.

Elaine Little, Director, Dept. Of Corrections introduced Dave Krabbenhoft who would address the departments response.

Dave Krabbenhoft, Fiscal Director, DOCR provided an overview of the estimates.

(see written testimony)

Rep. Koppelman noted in the admit and release column there appears changes seasonal in nature, he noted a reduction in numbers rather than an increase.

Dave Krabbenhoft, Fiscal Director, DOCR noted typically in the summer the department sees a decrease in their intake numbers this maybe be due to judges being on summer vacations and the reduction in the court calendar. The totals on the chart show an increase in 76 inmates. With the increase in meth. Arrests and the increase in county jail populations this points to a trend of an increase in the system population.

Rep. Koppelman questioned the legislative estimates and the DOCR estimates in past sessions.

Dave Krabbenhoft, Fiscal Director, noted the department looks at trends and bases the estimates on those trends. He noted last session those estimates came pretty close.

Sen. Bowman regarding Section 11, What if the contracting is more effective? Why are you limiting it to June 30, 2005?

Dave Krabbenhoft, Fiscal Director, DOCR This is on a trial basis, the legislature will look at the contract situation after the biennium.

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Rep. Kroeber asked if there were concerns foreseen with progressive parole and the reduction in Field Services.

Dave Krabbenhoft, Fiscal Director, DOCR This presents a challenge to us, this could have a negative effect on parole numbers.

Rep. Aarsvold noted that a factor not taken into account with the numbers is the length of the prison stay. Do you factor that in, and are we seeing an increase or decrease in sentencing?

Dave Krabbenhoft, Fiscal Director, DOCR we do take that into account, I can't tell you if a change in noted, I don't know.

Rep. Wald asked what effect the repeal of the mandatory sentencing has been.

Elaine Little, DOCR noted this is a difficult analysis to make, there doesn't seem to be much impact. In response to a question from Rep. Wald regarding section 5 of the bill, she also noted, the DOCR had no part in this section of the bill. We will report to the interim committee. The DOCR will work hard to make the contract program work.

Rep. Timm commented, You say you are 3M short, you must have made you case in the House and Senate during the regular session and neither bought it. Your trying to sell the same idea.

Elaine Little noted the Senate added 3M to the budget and the conference committee removed it.

Sen. Holmberg advised the committee, 4.5M was added in the Senate, the Conference

Committee split the difference. The final bill was passed at 2.1M less than the Senate has originally passed.

Sen. Mathern asked if the 1M will deal with the Governors concerns.

Rep. Kerzman What success have you seen with the Crime Bill money.

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Dave Krabbenhoft, Fiscal Director, DOCR the crime bill money is going to the transition center, Approximately \$500,000 will be spent in this current biennium, and turnback the additional \$500,000. Next biennium we have around \$700,000 to spend on the transition center. We used all with the exception of \$40,000

Sen. Schobinger 1M will this address the safety needs noted in the newspapers. (inaudible)

Dave Krabbenhoft, Fiscal Director, DOCR we don't know were those issues came from. We have a safe facility, a budget reduction will increase the risk

Rep. Warnke 01-03 appropriate of 102.5M, with turnback of 1.3M. The appropriation in the bill is 111M. We heard testimony the two juvenile line came in at 95%, so that 95% rolled up into additional prison funds. I get extremely frustrated when we hear about the prison cuts when there are increases of 8M in this bill.

Dave Krabbenhoft, Fiscal Director, DOCR agreed there is an increase, but there is 1.2M for increased health insurance for employees, (inaudible) we need another 1.3M, there is an increase of cost where the department took on the dietary and laundry at the state hospital, this was a 15 position transfer.

Rep. Warnke In the executive recommendation the crime bill money was all going (inaudible) you claim a 2-3M reduction in the prisons line item. It's basically a transfer in line items.

Dave Krabbenhoft, Fiscal Director, DOCR we are saving millions in Jamestown with meals and laundry, by combining services. We can do it cheaper with the DOCR rather than contracting. We can do things cheaper.

Rep. Delzer commented, here we have new numbers are again. The numbers never seem to add up, they are always different, even the male population are totally different again. That is part of

what we deal with when we work with this budget. We ask for the inmate count of the females right before we did the conference committee and all of a sudden it's up 9 right now. I think they have enough funds. This is a hard budget to work, last time we tried to cut some things back and we did. We ended up with 1.2M then add the \$500,000 crime bill dollars we are looking at a 1.7M turnback is expected. I think we did a good job with this budget, and I don't think adding additional dollars is necessary.

Sen. Nething, District 12, Jamestown spoke in favor of HB 1506, he offered his amendment 30802.0201. The proposed change in the amendment moves the project to the LaHaug Building in Jamestown. He also noted 2 women inmates have filled a discrimination suit in Federal Court; they have asked for an injunction to stop the movement of female inmates to county facilities.

Sen. Bowman we haven't moved anyone yet, who is behind this action? We need to find the force behind that is, because we are setting a policy to study this for two years and now we are going to have a lawsuit to stop that policy. I find that really interesting.

Sen. Nething Let me assure you, it's not me.

Elaine Little, DOCR some women have been writing throughout the session claiming the filing of a lawsuit. Staff has informed me they have been spending many hours in the law library.

Rep. Warnke commented, we struggled with the County concept vs. LaHaug through the entire session. In the beginning I was all for the LaHaug building. If you look at the LaHaug funding and contract funding the question was asked. We have revised numbers of the women and the original budget was built on 164 women. When the revised numbers came in reducing the number to 144, we asked what the saving would be with the LaHaug building, the answer we go was, most of the cost with the LaHaug building are fixed. So a reduction in inmates doesn't

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equal to a saving in the LaHaug building. We had far less numbers than projected, so that's why the contracting option became cheaper. Contracting feels those cost reductions. The Nething amendment of 7.5M with LaHaug vs. The 6.8M for contracting. That's why we went with the contracting approach. The study will address these issues.

Dave Krabbenhoft, Fiscal Director, DOCR the department estimates show housing is \$500,000 more for contracting vs. The LaHaug building.

Rep. Delzer If we go down this route, we're saying the lawsuit is going to win. I don't think there is anyway we can pay that. We had testimony all during the hearing there was going to be a lawsuit of some sort regardless of where we went and what we do. I think worse case scenario is we would have to address that when the time comes. I decided to support the county idea for the 2 years, is the fact, that if proves better to go to LaHaug we can go, but if you go to LaHaug you cant' come back.

Sen. Krauter noted these 2 individuals have been bringing quality issues up over a period of months.

Elaine Little, DOCR one of the women you are referring too, is not involved in the suit. In reference to a question from Rep. Gulleson, she noted the study previously conducted was on equal treatment. We recommended some changes just for the males.

Rep. Gulleson How do their concerns match up with the study we had done?

Elaine Little the study focused on equal treatment, we recommended some changes just for the male, that's the basis of the lawsuit. Using the LaHaug most of those issue could have been resolved. Programs with the males can be addressed by contracting.

Sen. Kringstad Would the New England idea address part of the problem?

Dave Krabbenhoft, DOCR I would like to respond to Rep. Delzers comment. He said that the number are changing all the time. I don't agree with the statement. I went back and looked, it is true we revised our female numbers down, it started early on. Our numbers are staying the same. It's hard to build our creditability when comments are made like that about constantly changing numbers. I think I can show that isn't happening.

Rep. Svedjan asked for any opposition to the bill, \



This amendment also:

- Removes Section 2 of the bill, which appropriates \$500,000 of federal funds to the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation to defray the expenses of the transition center for the 2001-03 blennium.
- Removes Sections 5 and 6 of the bill which provide legislative intent and a Legislative Council study relating to contract housing state female inmates with county jalls.
- Amends Section 7 of the bill relating to the exemption from public improvement contract bids and architect, engineer, and lands surveying services, to include the purchase of the LaHaug Building.
- Removes Sections 9 and 11 of the bill which create a new section to North Dakota Century Code Chapter 12-44.1 relating to female Inmates In grade one correctional facilities, and provides an expiration date.

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² This amendment removes the two new FTE positions and funding for transportation officers that were added as a result of contracting with counties to house women inmates.

This amendment restores funding and 65 FTE positions for a women's prison at the State Hospital LaHaug Building.

⁴ This amendment restores nine new FTE positions (three FTE positions for the State Penitentiary and six FTE positions for the James River Correctional Center) which are funded by the federal money estimated to be received from boarding 20 Bureau of Prisons female inmates at the proposed women's prison.

⁵ This amendment removes the funding source change that replaced some general fund dollars with federal dollars to fund the transition center for the 2003-05 biennium. This funding source change was a result of the inability to use the federal dollars, which would be used for the purchase and renovation of the LaHaug Building under the women's prison option, for contracting to house female inmates at county jails.

 Amends Section 12 of the bill, which provides an emergency, to include the federal funding for the purchase and renovation of the LaHaug Building.

Minutes: CHAIRMAN HOLMBERG opened the hearing to HB 1506. A bill to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of corrections and rehabilitation (originally HB 1016). Testimony was heard yesterday at the joint session. The House made no changes to HB 1506 with the exception of page 1, line 17, there is an additional one million dollars in the prisons division than was in the bill passed some weeks ago. That is the only change in this bill.

(Meter 1478) There was a motion of a DO PASS by SENATOR GRINDBERG and a second by SENATOR THANE.

Discussion

(Meter 1491) **SENATOR MATHERN** stated he has concerns about the proper funding in this bill. He wondered if this would be the opportune time to look at the issue of presentence assessments. The testimony heard during the session about how that can and has saved money in the juvenile corrections. He is concerned that they are under funding and hopes they could do

something proactive to decrease that and put some more money into field services. We are going to let some people out and he thinks now is the time to put some more money in there.

(Meter 1580) **SENATOR KRAUTER** stated with the testimony that was provided yesterday, it identified that they are seven hundred thousand dollars (\$700,000) still short in field services and two point three million dollars (\$2.3) in the prisons division. So, he made a motion to add additional seven hundred thousand (\$700,00) into field services and additional one point three million dollars (\$1.3 million) into the prisons division. Everyone receives the testimony and that was the big issue. This was the big issue that we worked on during the session and in the conferences gave into all that. It was seconded by **SENATOR MATHERN**.

(Meter 1658) CHAIRMAN HOLMBERG allowed his motion but reminded the committee that when this bill came over to the Senate, the Senate added to the budget, four point five million dollars (\$4.5 million) to the budget as it came over from the House, the conference committee removed two point one million (\$2.1 million) so they were still two point four million dollars (\$2.4 million) above the House as it went to the Governor. With the additional money that is in line 17, it would be three point four million dollars (\$3.4 million) above the House. He felt the Senate did much more than split the difference between the House and the Senate on this particular budget. He felt they went way beyond splitting the differences. He accepted the motion of adding seven hundred thousand dollars (\$700,000) and one point three millions dollars (\$1.3 million).

(Meter 1750) A roll call vote was taken with 4 yeas, 8 nays, 2 absent and not voting. Motion failed.

(\$500,000) to field services, he is concerned since they are not properly funding the prison services, they will be creating additional pressures to release prisoners early or move more into the use of parole. Into a situation where we are not properly funding those people who keep track of prisoners and make watch the prisoners to see they make progress- field services is that division. He understands the other amendment didn't pass but he hopes they can move on with this one.

(Meter 1979) There was a roll call vote of 4 yeas, 8 nays, 2 absent and not voting. The motion failed.

NOTE: The 2003-05 proposed legislative appropriation represents an increase in total funding for the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation of \$8.8 million over the 2001-03 appropriation. Of the \$8.8 million, the general fund increase is \$6.6 million after adjusting for the 1.05 percent general fund allotment of \$812,000, the 2001-03 estimated general fund turnback of \$1.2 million, and the general fund turnback amount used for the nurses' building remodeling of \$242,000. The 2003-05 proposed legislative appropriation provides for 644.18 FTE positions for the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, an increase of 29 FTE positions from the 2001-03 appropriation of 615.18.

Other Sections of the Bill

Appropriation - 2001-03 Biennium - Section 2 was added to provide a federal fund appropriation of \$500,000 to the department, in Adult Services of the Field Services Division, for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the department's transition center, for the 2001-03 blennium. This section was declared an emergency measure.

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Crime Victims Restitution and Gift Fund - Section 3 provides that \$100,000 included in the Field Services line item is from the crime victims restitution and gift fund and shall be used by the department for the purposes provided in North Dakota Century Code Section 54-23.4-05.

State Penitentiary Land Fund - Section 4 provides that \$82,500 included in the Youth Correctional Center line item is from the State Penitentlary land fund and shall be used by the department for capital projects at the Youth Correctional Center.

Legislative Intent - County Contract Housing State Female Inmates - Reports to Budget Section - Section 5 was added providing a statement of legislative intent that the state contract with county facilities to house state female inmates during the 2003-05 biennium, with the continuation of the contracting subject to the results of the study in Section 6, and that the department and the county jails contracting to house state female inmates shall report to the fall 2003 and the summer 2004 meetings of the Budget Section.

Legislative Council Study - Contract Housing - Female Inmates - Section 6 was added providing for a Legislative Council study of the long-term needs of all state inmates and if the department should continue to contract to house state female inmates with county jails or if the state should expand the prison system.

Transfer of Land and Buildings - Exemption From North Dakota Century Code Chapters 48-01.1 and 54-44.7 - Section 7 was added providing that the ownership of the food service building, the dining facility and attached building 18A, the laundry building, and buildings eight and fifty on the grounds of the State Hospital must be transferred to the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation. The department is not subject to the provisions of North Dakota Century Code Chapters 48-01.1 and 54-44.7 relating to public improvement contract bids and architect, engineer, and land surveying services for construction and renovation relating to the nurses! building, food service building, the dining facility and attached building 18A, laundry building, and building eight.

Performance Audit - Section 8 was added providing for the consideration by the State Auditor of conducting a performance audit of the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation.

Female Inmates in Grade One Correctional Facilities - Section 9 was added creating a new section to North Dakota Century Code Chapter 12-44.1 to allow a grade one correctional facility that has a contract with the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation to confine female inmates who have been sentenced to the legal and physical custody of the department to confine the female inmate for more than one year in accordance with the terms of the contract. This section expires June 30, 2005.

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The appropriations level in HB 1506 reflects female inmate head counts assumed by the legislature. To the extent the female inmate head count exceeds the numbers assumed in the bill, the Corrections Department may request from the Emergency Commission and the Budget Section permission to expend funds, according to the provisions of NDCC 54-16-04, in excess of appropriations in an amount determined by multiplying the average daily cost of incarceration times the number of days incarcerated times the number of excess female inmates.
