Minutes: 6 members present: Sens. Brown, Erbele, Polovitz, Reps. Grande, Kingsbury, & Onstad.

Rep. Grande: We will call the Conference committee on HCR 3037 to order. Roll call was called and a quorum is present. What we have before us is HCR 3037, where the Senate has made a considerable amount of changes. The House has looked through the amendments and feel that it further enhances the bill except that we would like to change a little bit of the language to it.

Rep. Onstad: The reason for enhancing that was why?

Sen. Brown: There were three bills that came to us, and what we did in Human Services was put them all together and enhance it from a mental health study point of view, while trying very hard to maintain the prison and corrections side of it. So we think we've got the whole thing put together.

Rep. Onstad: Yes, all in one then.

Sen. Brown: Yes.

Rep. Onstad: Good.

Sen. Brown: And we used HCR 3037 as the vehicle, which was one of the three bills.

Rep. Grande: Part of that really comes down to, one of the things that I had a concern with as I had put together this particular resolution, the original 3037 was, my concern really to it from the mental health aspects of the criminal justice system and how are we dealing with them, and how are they phasing through. That's why in my initial request, there was the process from arrest to release, and when were the treatments taking place and how were we dealing with drugs, alcohol and mental illness, and so on. So when they looked at combining those bills, we did see this as a vehicle to try and combine them.

Sen. Brown: And look at it especially from a female prisoner point of view.

Rep. Grande: And you can kind of see through, as you point out, Rep. Onstad, 13-18, we are still dealing with the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, prison capacity, and also really taking into the female offender aspect in line 18. Considering then in line 19, where we are dealing with patient and prisoners, and that is where a lot of what I was concerned about came into place, and if we have that type of situation, what are some alternatives to incarceration and that was the real key to me because I really feel that we're not looking as solidly as we should be at the recidivism rates, and how can we solve that, because so much of this deals with the drug and alcohol side that drops them right back into that setting. So how can we see the whole person, let's just not look at this person as a criminal, but as the whole person. I think mental health falls into that exactly, because I think there comes a time where, due to mental illness, they either turn to drugs or violence or crime and so how do we deal with that person. I

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think that is what the Senate really did when they put together and dealt with community's mental health, clinical practices, and that aspect of it. So I thought it was a nice combination. I just had one other thing that I wanted just for real clarification to make sure that the criminal side does not get left out and that is what I would like to further amend that.

Rep. Onstad: That would be my second question. You're pretty specific in the original of your bill, and then just to make sure that those things are covered and not leaving something out.

Rep. Grande: So I would propose, if everybody is looking at the original bill, in the statement, where it comes to a concurrent resolution directing the Legislative Council to study, that is in the engrossment, if we at the end of line 6, added in "along with the state's criminal justice process from arrest to release, including the cost effectiveness and efficiency in incarcerating large numbers of inmates." I don't think at this point, we need to worry about large facilities and electronic monitoring because that really comes into play in the numbers of inmates in lines 13-20, there. So then I am jumping to "Alternatives to incarceration and the effectiveness of incarceration and treatment" and deleting sentencing laws.

Rep. Onstad: This is a lot to study, this could take around five years.

Rep. Grande: I think they do combine themselves real well, we'll see it goes. It does encompass a huge thing.

Rep. Onstad: You have a huge number of departments to deal with here.

Rep. Grande: And the thing is, though, if we don't start getting these departments to communicate and work together on this..., we all sat through those judiciary bills and you guys do on the human service side and you just start to shake your head.

Sen. Brown: If we don't start somewhere, we'll never get anywhere.

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Rep. Onstad: Right.

Rep. Kingsbury: The system will just be more fractured as we go along.

Sen. Brown: So let's give it a try.

Rep. Onstad: They all come at it at a different angle and we've got to get them on the same track.

Sen. Erbele: That language will come in on the engrossed bill on line 6.

Sen. Brown: All we are asking for is an additional sentence, it will work.

Rep. Grande: It is just more so for clarification as to what comes in as the whereas is for.

Sen. Polovitz: Is there any need for this to go to the appropriations committee.

Rep. Grande: No.

Sen. Polovitz: I mean if we're going to have a study, I was just wondering if we were going to have to have money.

Sen. Brown: This is going to be folded into the OMB budget.

Rep. Kingsbury: Why is it going to be folded into OMB.

<u>Sen. Brown:</u> It was put into their budget, so we don't have to have an appropriation. This is what the leadership told me on our side.

Rep. Grande: Right now there is no appropriation in here, but if it requires money, we're going to have the language in OMB to cover us.

(At this point, a motion was made by Rep. Kingsbury and seconded by Rep. Onstad to accede to the Senate's amendments, and a voice vote was unanimous. The intern then informed the committee that the Senate had to recede from their amendments because it

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was a hog house amendment and had to be treated as one long line and Rer. Grande's amendment would not be able to be added to the bill unless the Senate receded.)
