



Senator J. Lee opened the hearing on SB2089. All committee members present. Sponsors not present at this time. Closed hearing for now.

Mr. Zentner - There is no indication that funds will be withdrawn. Other states have recently signed on so I see this as a permanent program.


Senator Polovitz - What happens to people that a diagnosed with cancer after age 65?

This bill removes the sunset clause for the treatment of breast and cervical cancer for women who are eligible for the Women's Way program, and have no insurance to pay for services. Women's Way has funds to pay for cancer screening, but does not provide funds for treatment if problems are found. The current program allows these women to become eligible for the Medicaid Program during the course of the cancer treatment. If the bill is allowed to sunset, these women will no longer have ready access to pay for needed services because they do not have other health care coverage.

The additional other revenue is enhanced Federal Medicaid funds.

The additional grant expenditures are based on the cost of providing medical assistance to 23 individuals each year during the course of the cancer treatment, plus the costs associated with the cancer treatment.

The Executive Budget for the 03-05 biennium includes a total of \$544,120 for breast and cervical cancer treatment with \$114,755 coming from the Community Health Trust Fund.

Senator Bowman, Vice chair opened the hearing on SB 2089 (#2586).

David Zentner, Director of Medical Services for the Department of Human Services. (written testimony is attached--Exhibit #1). In October 2000, Congress passed legislation that permitted the Medicaid program to cover women who were screened for breast and cervical cancer under the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Early Detection Program. Women must not have any other credible health insurance coverage and be under 65 years of age. The period of eligibility is limited to the time required to treat the disease. Eligible woman have access to all Medicaid services during their period of eligibility. The federal match is at the same enhanced rate as the Healthy Steps Program, which is currently 77.85%. Since the program began, a total of 37 women have been determined eligible for the program, and 16 remain eligible based on their treatment needs. The appropriation for the current blennium is \$55,120, of which \$114,755 is state funds from the Community Health Care Trust Fund, which is the Tobacco trust fund. The

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anticipated expenditures for the next biennium are estimated to remain unchanged from this biennium. The funds have been included in the Executive Budget. The Legislature passed HB 1472 but placed a sunset clause on the Legislation. This would eliminate the sunset clause and make permanent the payment of treatment services for women who have no other means to pay for the needed services. The Department supports the bill and recommends a do pass.

Questions: (#2813) Senator Kilzer: How many of these cases are breast cancer and how many are cervical? Mr. Zentner responded that he didn't have that information with him but he would get it for the committee. Senator Kilzer continued wanted to know if it had to be a full blown cervical cancer or could it be a pap smear? Mr. Zentner responded that if there was an indication that it might require treatment. Senator Mathern: Wanted to know if there were anybody complaining about this program serving this kind of illness and not others. Mr. Zentner replied that he was not aware of any complaints.

Senator Bowman stated that this bill would be considered with the other Human Services. With no other testimony, SB 2089 was closed. (#3124).

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



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Testimony of SB 2089 Senate Human Services Committee January 14, 2003

Good morning Madam Chair and members of the Senate Human Services Committee.

I'm Sheila Peterson, Director of the Fiscal Management Division of OMB.

The 2001 Legislature passed a bill allowing the Dept. of Human Services to provide medical assistance for women found to have breast or cervical cancer. There was, however, a sunset clause on that legislation.

SB2089 removes the sunset and allows the program to continue into the future.

In the Governor's budget recommendations, the cost of the program is approximately \$550,000. Of that amount, \$430,000 is funded through enhanced federal Medicaid funds. The remaining \$115,000 is funded from the Community Health Trust Fund.

Madam Chairman, I'd be happy to answer any questions.

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## TESTIMONY BEFORE THE SENATE HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE REGARDING SENATE BILL 2089 JANUARY 14, 2003

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Chairman Lee, members of the committee, I am David Zentner, Director of Medical Services for the Department of Human Services. I appear before you today to provide information and support this bill.

In October 2000, Congress passed legislation that permitted the Medicaid Program to cover women who were screened for breast and cervical cancer under the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Early Detection Program. During the 2001 Legislative Session the legislature passed enabling legislation that allowed the Department to enroll women in Medicaid who had gone through the screening process and required treatment.

Women must not have any other credible health insurance coverage and be under 65 years of age. The period of eligibility is limited to the time required to treat the disease. Eligible women have access to all Medicaid services during their period of eligibility. The federal match is at the same enhanced rate as the Healthy Steps Program, which is currently 77.85%.

Since the inception of the program, a total of 37 women have been determined eligible for the program. At the present time 16 remain eligible based on their treatment needs.

The appropriation for the current biennium is \$544,120, of which \$114,755 is state funds from the Community Health Care Trust Fund. The anticipated expenditures for the next blennium are estimated to remain unchanged from this biennium. The funds have been included in the Executive Budget.

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While the number of women served is relatively small, the ability to obtain needed treatment and other related medical services is vital to these individuals. The Department supports this bill and recommends a do pass.
