Chairman Flakoll opened the hearing on SB 2198. All members were present.

Dr. Larry Schuler, State Veterinarian and Executive Officer of the Board of Animal Health testified in favor of the bill with the proposed amendments. (written testimony) Senator Erbele has distributed a proposed amendment to the bill that gives the bill the intent they had originally intended. As amended, this section would make the farmed elk penalty section equal to the domestic animal penalty section.

Senator Flakoll asked about the appeal process.

Dr. Schuler said the Board of Animal Health issues a complaint which is sent to the producer. The producer has the option of requesting a hearing in front of an administrative law judge. The administrative law judge issues an opinion and the Board of Animal Health has the final say in the matter. The producer can take the matter to district court if he is unsatisfied with the decision.

Senator Flakoll asked if there are many cases appealed?

Dr. Schuler said to date they have had no one appeal.

Senator Urlacher asked if there has been any problem with brucellosis in bison.

Dr. Schuler said the brucellosis and tuberculosis programs apply to bison and cattle. There has not been a case of brucellosis since Dr. Schuler has come to work as the North Dakota State Veterinarian. Recently South Dakota had a brucellosis infected bison herd of several thousand head. That herd has become a research herd.

Senator Klein asked if elk are classified as non traditional or domestic livestock?

Dr. Schuler said in 1999 farmed elk were classified as domestic animals and no longer as non traditional livestock. There is a separate section in the administrative code that deals with farmed elk.

Senator Klein asked if there is a separate section that lists the species classified as non traditional livestock?

Dr. Schuler said there is not a list of non traditional livestock. Under the non traditional livestock there are five categories with varying regulations with each category.

Senator Urlacher asked if the bison in the Teddy Roosevelt Park are tested for brucellosis?

Dr. Schuler said they are periodically rounded up and tested for brucellosis and tuberculosis.

Senator Flakoll asked if an incidence of brucellosis is discovered, do you go back to the herd and deal with it?

Dr. Schuler said in that case they would find all the infected and exposed animals and euthanize them.

Dennis Swanson, buffalo rancher from New Rockford and President of the North Dakota Buffalo Association, testified in favor of the bill. He said bison breeders are very conscious of health issues in bison and have done lots of testing. He said the current testing requirements are very expensive for bison producers. South Dakota and Minnesota have already passed similar legislation. Producers from these states could bypass North Dakota markets if the rules don't change. (meter # 1931)

Craig Gunning, President of the North Dakota Elk Growers, testified in favor of the bill. His industry relies on the health status of their herds and they want to maintain the rules on movement of elk into the state to preserve their health status.

Senator Klein asked if the fence law of 1999 is working well?

Mr. Gunning said with the changes in 1999, going domestic, control by the Board of Animal Health, it is all working well. They have an excellent working relationship with the Board of Animal Health.

Peter Lies, a producer from New Rockford, testified against the bill. (written testimony) He is not in agreement with the North Dakota Elk Growers.

Senator Flakoll asked what is the rational for wanting a grandfather clause?

Mr. Lies said some producers were raising elk before the regulations were put in place and now they are expected to change their way of doing things.

Senator Klein said he knows Mr. Lies has some ongoing issues with the Board of Animal Health. This bill changes a violation to an infraction instead of a misdemeanor. Isn't that an improvement?

Mr. Lies said he continues to have problems with the Board of Animal Health.

As Senator Erbele had mentioned the buffalo in this state have been declared brusolosis free. It cost between \$7.00 and \$15.00 dollars per animal. Some of the buffalo calf's sold for less then \$100.00 dollars so this is a significant portion of just producing an animal. A number of States have passed similar laws that allow North Dakota take our cattle into those states for sale. If we insist on this testing it will encourage producers to sell in other states. This treats buffalo the same as other cattle. I am speaking only to buffalo.



Chairman Flakoll and Committee members, my name is Larry Schuler. I am the state veterinarian and executive officer of the State Board of Animal Health. I am here to testify in favor of SB 2198 which deals with modifying the importation requirements for bison, modifying the definition of farmed elk and clarifying the penalty section of the farmed elk statute.

Section 1 would allow bison to move directly from a producer's premises to a licensed auction market or inspected slaughter facility without a certificate of veterinary inspection. Bison and cattle are considered together in both the brucellosis and tuberculosis eradication programs. Therefore, a state's free status for cattle is also the result of a free status in bison. This is an effort to recognize the work that the bison industry has done to eradicate disease in that species. In addition, there is a veterinarian present at licensed auction markets to inspect the animals for other diseases before they are sold and inspectors at slaughter facilities inspect the bison before they are slaughtered.

Section 2 modifies the definition of farmed elk in the statute. Under the present statute if someone is keeping an elk as a pet and does not sell any elk or elk products they would not fit the definition of a "farmed elk". Therefore, we are asking to expand the definition of farmed elk to include all farmed elk "maintained"

Section 3 is an effort to bring the penalty section of the farmed elk statute to the same level as the other domestic animals. The original farmed elk statute would allow a penalty of up to \$5000. The statute that applies to other domestic animals allows a penalty of up to \$5000 per violation. The goal of this section is to make the penalty section of the elk statute equal to the penalty section of other domestic animals. We support the amendments to the original bill that are being proposed.

Senator Flakoll and committee members I urge a do pass on SB 2198 with the proposed amendments. I will be happy to answer any questions you may have.
