The amendments approved by the conference committee do not change anything from that which was conveyed in the first fiscal note dated January 20, 2003.

Traditionally, the expense of conducting elections has been and continues to be a county expense. However, the fiscal impact to the counties under this bill is unknown. It will vary and will depend on whether or not a county chooses to open an early voting precinct according to Section 5 of the bill, the number of days the precinct would be open, and the hours of voting. The fiscal impact of opening an early voting precinct, staffed by a paid election board, is also uncertain due to the potential savings that may be ultimately gained in printing/ordering fewer absorbee applications and absentee ballot envelopes, along with reduced mailing costs associated with the increased interest in absentee voting during recent elections. This bill allows each county to make that decision for themselves.

The purpose of this bill is to allow countles the option of opening an early voting precinct. It also clarifies the absentee balloting process.

Traditionally, the expense of conducting elections has been and continues to be a county expense. However, the fiscal impact to the counties under this bill is unknown. It will vary and will depend on whether or not a county chooses to open an early voting precinct according to Section 5 of the bill, the number of days the precinct would be open, and the hours of voting. <u>Representative Haas</u>: did I hear you say that in the given precinct the early precinct is established and that could cross district lines?

<u>Cory Fong</u>: that is correct, it would be one place for all voters in that particular county to come during the early voting hours designated by the county in which they could cast a vote as a voter does on election day.

<u>Representative Sitte</u>: the votes being cast are decreasing and this is the national trend, but it seems that the more we open up the system and the more we have the early voting, the fewer people get excited about coming up to vote, is this true just here or what is the national take on this?

<u>Cory Fong</u>: its a interesting question and an on going debate, in other states registration laws have opened up a process, voting has become easier and yet turnout has continually declined. <u>Representative Winrich</u>: I'm concerned about the agent, Sec. 5 on page 4, where we are talking about the agent actually receiving the absent voters ballot, we have a agent getting the ballot but then the new language in Sec. 2, lines 23-27, talks about someone collecting a number of absent voter applications and submitting them, is one person going to be able to act as a agent for several voters and get a whole bunch of ballots for these voters under that section or are these ballots going to be mailed out to the voters from the county auditor?

RE: Senate Bill No. 2248 – Absentee and Early Voting

The Secretary of State's office strongly supports Senate Bill No. 2248. The legislation incorporates additional security and integrity measures into our absentee voting laws intended to address concerns that were brought to the forefront during the 2002 election cycle. Senate Bill No. 2248 also brings efficiencies to the administration of absentee voting that takes place at the county auditors offices during the last days before the election by officially introducing an early voting option for counties to voluntarily adopt.

Before I explain the highlights of Senate Bill No. 2248, the Secretary of State's office is proposing some amendments to the bill. Some of the amendments are technical corrections and others are related to putting North Dakota in compliance with the Help America Vote Act of 2002 (HAVA). My explanation of the bill will also include discussion of these proposed amendments.

The bill with the proposed amendments accomplishes the following:

- Requires a completed absentee ballot application to be returned directly to an election official and not through an intermediary (e.g. a political party, association, etc.). (Section 1)
- Requires absentee ballot applications provided by election officials to be prescribed by the Secretary of State. (Section 2)
- Requires absentee ballot applications provided and distributed by anyone other than an
 election official (e.g. a political party, association, etc.) to be approved by the Secretary of
 State and to include a statement disclosing the person, as defined in section 16.1-08.1-01,
 or political party, responsible for paying for distribution of the application. (Section 2)
- Requires absentee ballot applications to require a space for voters to include their precinct or voting location, if known. (Section 2)
- Provides a process for persons who cannot sign an absentee ballot application to mark an (X) and have it witnessed. (Section 2)
- Provides the same restriction for whom may provide assistance to an individual voting an absentee ballot as a voter voting a ballot in the polling location on Election Day. An absentee voter who cannot read English or may have a disability that prevents them from reading or marking the ballot could not receive assistance from the absentee voter's

employer, officer or agent of the voter's union, or a candidate for any office, or a relative of a candidate for any office. (Section 4 with proposed amendments)

- Prevents election officials from providing a ballot to anyone acting as an agent who cannot . provide a signed, written, authorization form. (Section 4)
- Authorizes countles, as a voluntary option, to establish an early voting precinct on business • days during the 15 days immediately preceding the election that would process early voters like a traditional election board. The early voting precinct election board would be comprised of an independent person to act as the inspector and equal representation of each political party represented on the election board. Results from the early voting precinct may not be counted, canvassed, and released until the closing of the poils on Election Day. The early voting precinct must operate according to all existing laws governing the conduct of election boards, precincts, the opening and closing of the polls, and the counting and canvassing procedures. (Section 5)
- Restricts the ability to fax voted ballots to only those members of the armed forces living . outside the United States and other qualified electors living outside the United States. (Section 1)
- Restricts the ability to receive an absentee ballot without submitting an application to only ٠ those members of the armed forces living outside the United States and other qualified electors living outside the United States. (Section 2)
- Allows a U.S. cltizen who is 18 years of age or older who has never lived in the United . States and whose parent is a qualified elector of the state, to vote absentee in North Dakota for federal offices only. (proposed amendments)

Chairman Krebsbach and members of the Senate Government and Veterans Affairs Committee

I am Michael Montplaisir, Cass County Auditor and am here in support of Senate Bill 2248.

Senate Bill 2248 is a bill that changes some of the absentee voter application requirements and allows for an early voting precinct.

Absentee voting has really taken off over the past few years. Besides the applications for absentee ballots that counties publish in the papers, applications are available on state and county web sites, political parties and other groups mail applications to potential voters, and political candidates hand out applications as they go door to door campaigning. The whole effort is geared toward getting the public out to vote.

In Cass County, we have seen more interest in voting absentee, particularly in the general elections. The chart below shows the number of people applying for absentee ballots since 1996.

2000	296	6,427	Presidential
2002	968	5,080	

The increase can be attributed to a number of factors, including convenience, fear of the weather in November, and our busy 21st century life style. If our goal is to increase the voter participation, an early voting precinct would seem to be the next logical step for the November elections.

An early voting precinct would operate very much like any other precinct on Election Day. An election board would be established through the same political process other election boards are nominated, the days and hours the poll would be open would be set by the County Commission; again, the same as they do for regular polling sites.

Some of the differences between a regular polling site and the early voting site might be in the level of technology. Because of the proximity to the county auditor's office, we would have the possibility of the poll workers using computers to record the voters. With new technology available, we may be able to use either direct recording devices for voting or precinct scanners which would speed up election reporting on Election Day.

An early voting precinct would give us one more tool to serve the voters in North Dakota, without significantly increasing the cost of elections. I estimate that an election board operating the same hours as the courthouse would cost the county about \$350 per day.

Madam Chair and members of the committee, I am here today to raise some concerns I have regarding absent voter ballots and to make a plea to allow counties to <u>conduct all</u> elections by MAIL.

Current law only authorizes MAIL ballot elections for Primary elections. However, both political parties have circumvented this through their attempts to get out the vote. Please note the attached GOP and DEMO\NPL mailings. Other groups have quickly followed (attached).

If in fact we want a vote by mail system then allow vote by mail and lets call a duck a duck.

I have been an advocate of voter turnout during my entire tenure. I have opened my office on Saturdays to accommodate college students and those who work out of town. I have spent many hours at local high schools explaining voting procedures and encouraging and challenging young people to vote.

I understand the goal of all the political party mailings – increased voter turnout. I understand the previous legislation to remove the requirement to state a reason for voting absentee – increased voter turnout. I do not think the present system increases participation, only shifts voting methods from traditional precinct balloting to mail balloting.

I understand the attempt to make voting more convenient as a means to increase participation. However, we as citizens need be responsible. We need to realize how important our vote is. I am a firm believer that two (2) of the most important things I did in the year 2002 were voting on June 11 and November 4. I agree that voting is a right and a privilege. Moreover, it is my DUTY and REPSONSIBILITY.

The effect of the present absent voter system is placing an administrative and fiscal burden on counties. There is no easy way to handle absentee ballots. The political party mailings compound this burden by increasing the number of absent voters. From my visits with people returning absent voter ballots to my office, their only reason for voting absentee was the convenience, and if they had not received an absent voter application they would have voted on election day at their normal precinct. I received several duplicate applications for absent voter ballot from the same elector -1 from each party and the AFLCIO. I received many, many incomplete applications which required follow



up by a phone call or mail (all of which must be done on a very timely basis). My records show that the combined staff of the Burleigh County Auditor, Treasurer and Director of Tax Equalization basically shut down everyday between October 15th thru November 3rd from 7:00AM until 3:00PM to process the applications for absentee ballots and get the ballots in the mail for delivery to the electors.

Presently county auditors have to prepare for two (2) types of elections: traditional polling places and vote by mail. County auditors have no way of knowing how many people will vote "absentee" and how many will show up on election day. County auditors need to staff polling places and order enough ballots for both the traditional and mail election. I estimate that this increases costs in Burleigh County by at least 15%.

Madam Chair and members of the Committee, please consider these items when deliberating over this bill.

The latest trend in North Dakota voting uld be a lot like an elfin work stoppage at ita's toy factory. Smaller turnout at the polls. County auditors, who saw a record num-

ber of absentee ballots in the 2000 election, said they're getting even more this year. "We certainly can't see that number going down," said Lee Ann Oliver, election specialist for the secretary of state's office. "It's a matter of convenience for people. In talking to the auditors, they're all seeing more absentee bal-lote" lots."

The reason for the increase, auditors say, is a target-marketing campaign by the state's political parties and other interest groups. They've mailed ballot applications to voters they consider sympathetic to their cause, in an attempt to generate more support.

Those who wish to vote prior to the Nov. 5 election simply send a request to their county auditor, who mails them a ballot. Completed ballots are eventually returned to the auditor's office.

Burleigh County Auditor Kevin Glatt said he received about 6,000 absentee ballots in the 2000 election. He expects to easily exceed that total this year. The county has more than 1,000 back already, and voters still have until Nov. 4 to return their ballots. Election workers mailed another 1,000 ballots Tuesday alone.

RE: Senate Bill No. 2248 – Absentee and Early Voting

Senate Bill No. 2248 Incorporates additional security and Integrity measures into our absentee voting laws intended to address concerns that were brought to the forefront during the 2002 election cycle. Senate Bill No. 2248 brings efficiencies to the administration of absentee voting that takes place at the county auditors offices during the last days before the election by officially introducing an early voting option for counties to voluntarily adopt. Senate Bill No. 2248 also attempts to make changes intended to put North Dakota in compliance with parts of the new federal election reform bill, the Help America Vote Act of 2002.

The bill accomplishes the following:

- Allows completed absentee ballot applications to be returned to an intermediary (e.g. a political party, association, etc.) as long as the intermediary submits all completed applications received from applicants to the appropriate election officials in a timely manner to allow a voter to receive, vote, and mail an absentee ballot before the day of the election. (Section 2)
- Requires absentee ballot applications provided by election officials to be prescribed by the Secretary of State. (Sections 3 and 4)
- Provides that absentee ballot applications distributed by anyone other than an election official (e.g. a political party, association, etc.) be approved by the Secretary of State <u>unless</u> the application meets the requirements set out by law. (Section 3)
- C Requires absentee ballot applications to require a space for voters to include their precinct or voting location, if known. (Section 3)
- Provides a process for persons who cannot sign an absentee ballot application to mark an
 (X) and have it witnessed. (Section 3)
- Provides the same restriction for whom may provide assistance to an individual voting an absentee ballot as a voter voting a ballot in the polling location on Election Day. An absentee voter who cannot read English or may have a disability that prevents them from reading or marking the ballot could not receive assistance from the absentee voter's employer, officer or agent of the voter's union, or a candidate for any office, or a relative of a candidate for any office. (Section 5)

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• Prevents election officials from providing a ballot to anyone acting as an agent who cannot provide a signed, written, authorization form. (Section 5)

REAL BRIEF

- Authorizes countles, as a voluntary option, to establish an early voting precinct on business days during the 15 days immediately preceding the election that would process early voters like a traditional election board. The early voting precinct election board would be comprised of an independent person to act as the inspector and equal representation of each political party represented on the election board. Results from the early voting precinct may not be counted, canvassed, and released until the closing of the polls on Election Day. The early voting precinct must operate according to all existing laws governing the conduct of election boards, precincts, the opening and closing of the polls, and counting and canvassing procedures. The bill requires early voting precincts to be in government-controlled facilities. (Section 6)
- Clarifies that only those members of the Armed Forces living outside the United States and other qualified electors living outside the United States may receive ballots and return ballots by fax and request absentee ballots without completing and submitting an application. (Sections 2 and 3)
- Allows a U.S. citizen who is 18 years of age or older who has never lived in the United States and whose parent is a qualified elector of the state, to vote absentee in North Dakota for federal offices only. (Section 1)
- Establishes the Secretary of State's office as the single office in the state for providing information regarding absentee voting by military and overseas citizens who are eligible to vote in the state according to the Heip America Vote Act of 2002. (Section 7)
- Directs the Secretary of State to develop uniform procedures for county auditors to follow when transmitting and receiving voting materials to and from military and overseas voters. (Section 7)
- Directs the Secretary of State to establish uniform procedures for county auditors to follow when notifying military or overseas voters that their ballot was rejected. (Section 8)

The Secretary of State's office supports Senate Bill No. 2248 and encourages this committee to give it a do pass recommendation.

Senate Bill 2248

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Chairman Klein and members of the House Government and Veterans Affairs Committee

I am Michael Montplaisir, Cass County Auditor and am here in support of Senate Bill 2248.

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Senate Bill 2243 is a bill that changes some of the absentee voter application requirements and allows for an early voting precinct.

Absentee voting has really taken off over the past few years. Besides the applications for absentee ballots that counties publish in the papers, applications are available on state and county web sites, political parties and other groups mail applications to potential voters, and political candidates hand out applications as they go door to door campaigning. The whole effort is geared toward getting the public out to vote.

In Cass County, we have seen more interest in voting absentee, particularly in the general elections. The chart below shows the number of people applying for absentee ballots since 1996.

The increase can be attributed to a number of factors, including convenience, fear of the weather in November, and our busy 21st century life style.

An early voting precinct would operate very much like any other precinct on Election Day. An election board would be established through the same political process other election boards are nominated, the days and hours the poll would be open would be set by the County Commission; again, the same as they do for regular polling sites.

One of the differences between a regular polling site and the early voting site might be in the level of technology. Because of the proximity to the county auditor's office, we have the possibility of the poll workers using computers to record the voters in the poll book. With new technology available, we may be able to use either direct recording devices for voting or precinct scanners which would speed up election reporting on Election Day. I estimate that an election board operating the same hours as the courthouse would cost the county about \$350 per day.

If our goal is to increase voter participation, an early voting precinct would be beneficial to both the voters and the election administrators. This early voting precinct would give us one more tool to serve the voters in North Dakota, without significantly increasing the cost of elections.
