SUMMARY OF ACTUARIAL INFORMATION: North Dakota Workers Compensation, together with its actuary, Gienn Evans of Pacific Actuarial Consultants, has reviewed the legislation proposed in this bill in conformance with Section 54-03-25 of the North Dakota Century Code.

The proposed legislation would forbid NDWC from assessing a penalty against an organized township for failing to provide an annual payroll report.

DAVE O'CONNELL: (Testimony in support) If you read on line 15, the penalty could be \$100 each day until the bureau receives the records, in addition to the two thousand dollar penalty set forth above. At first we were looking at not having any penalty at all, the townships would be exempt. Working with Mark Armstrong, we've come to this agreement on an amendment in the Senate side, that in case they want the records, at least they have some. In most cases, the townships don't employ anybody. They contract most of their services out.

(39.0) SEN. JOHN ANDRIST: (Testimony in support) I was pleased to be a part of the process of restructuring of Worker's Compensation legislation in the 1990's. (46.2) REP. SALLY SANDYIG: I used to be a Township Clerk. The township that I lived in was very small. The \$150 penalty fee would have broke us.

(47.1) ANNE JORGESON GREEN: ND WORKER'S COMP.: (Testimony in support) I'm an attorney with ND Worker's Compensation. I would be happy to answer any questions that you may have.

(47.5) REP. DALE SEVERSON: The flat fee that the Township Officers pay, is that based on just as volunteer?

(47.8) ANNE JORGESON GREEN: That is the minimum premium for any ND Worker's Compensation account.

(48.0) REP. DALE SEVERSON: If there is a client that the township has to pay, do you turn around and bill back for the claim, the \$250?

(48.2) ANNE JORGESON GREEN: The first \$250 of any claim is billed back against the employer. After that, presuming that all liability issues were off the table, then Worker's Compensation would pick up the tab for medical, rehab, or vocational. Claims are paid by Worker's Compensation dollar for dollar after that initial \$250 medical expenses are billed back initially to the employer. Even in the case of a volunteer account, where a premium is paid for a volunteer, claims cost are paid dollar for dollar after that first \$250.

Were they incorrect?

The premise behind even volunteer coverage is that it's almost difficult to qualify the amount, because there is no payroll associated with a volunteer. A flat premium rate is built on a volunteer. My understanding is that claims cost then, should a volunteer file a claim for benefits for Worker's Comp., those claim costs would be paid dollar for dollar.

Testimony on SB2309 House Political Subdivisions Committee

Mr. Chairman and Committee Members

My Name is Ken Yantes and I represent over 6000 grassroots elected leaders of our state, The North Dakota Township Officers Association. I have come here today to ask for your favorable consideration on SB2309. For the last two years, the members of our policy development committee have developed policy asking for a reduction in the \$2000 penalty for late filing of the forms required by the Workers Compensation Bureau. In the past, several of our township members had been sent notification that they owed the Bureau a \$2000 penalty and some were notified of the \$100 per day in addition to the \$2000 penalty. This seemed pretty severe as an average annual township budget probably is around \$5500 to \$6000. An officer from DeGroat Township in Ramsey County told of the problems experienced by them. The township officer charged with filling out the Workers Compensation forms was hospitalized for a couple of weeks after his annual meeting (he had a real bad flu). His father died and the funeral and estate settlement took a considerable amount of time. Then his house burned and his records perished. He then moved to town and his mail delivery was interrupted. Upon receiving a penalty notification from Workers Compensation, he submitted his resignation to the Chairman of DeGroat township. To make this long story shorter, the township called Workers Compensation and the fine was rescinded upon the receipt of the required forms. We feel that the threat of a \$2000 or more penalty is just too heavy a hammer to hold over the heads of these officers and we ask for it to be reduced. We feel that the compromise reached with the Workers Compensation Bureau setting a maximum penalty at \$150 for any township is a reasonable penalty. We hope you will agree and vote a do pass unanamously on this bill to limit township penalties at \$150 as the Senate did.
