Todd Kranda: (Attorney with Kelsch Law Firm, Mandan) See attached testimony in support of SB 2342 on behalf of Eveready Battery Company. Also attached is a copy of the statute that would be changed and a picture of the safety devices. Reported that there might be some concern from the DOT with the flashing red light. His understanding is that out of the 49 states that already allow this type of device a majority of them did require it to be a red flashing light.

Senator Bercler asked if this pertains to trucks also.

Todd Kranda said that it is intended for passenger motor vehicle usage. The package labeling will be recommending it for that type of use and not commercial usage.

Senate Trenbeath asked if the bill would limit it to that.

Todd Kranda say that it doesn't limit it.

Minutes:

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<u>Rep.Hawken</u> opened the hearing on SB 2342, a bill for an Act to create and enact a new subsection 39-10-07.2 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the display of an electronic lighting device.

<u>Rep. Dekrey:</u> began the hearing by handing out some materials -- first was the written testimony of Todd D. Kranda, a lobbyist for the Eveready Battery Company, Inc.. He could not be present -the other handout was a photograph of an "Auto Alert" battery powered device. Representative DeKrey represents District 14 and was one of the sponsors of this proposed legislation. the whole purpose of bill was to allow use of this battery power light which was designed to be used in place of emergency flares on roadways when parked vehicles without lights were present at nighttime. the big advantage is that while the do last a long time in storage and in use but the greater advantage may be that they are not open flames. Open flames can create a variety of

different hazards. The present law doeas not specifically permit this type of device therefore the need for this legislation which specifically does not prohibit them.

<u>Rep. Thorpe:</u> Two questions -- Some company must have asked for this legislation (Ans. Rep. DeKrey - yes - the Everready company) -- and could they not make this in amber also? <u>Rep. DeKrey:</u> I don't believe that amber is universally accepted distress color -- it may be a problem.

<u>Reop. Thorpe:</u> The reason I asked is because if I came upon one in a low visibility situation I might hit the brakes whereas an amber one would mean caution. Red to me means stop right now.

<u>Rep.Ruby:</u> In Todd Kranda written testimony it refers to the section of the code on this subject and it references red reflectors and I wonder if we shouldn't take a look at that section to see if some change is needed there and maybe we should include that with this bill. then when you take your driving test for your CDL and they show you how you are supposed to park your truck you are suppose to leave three of these reflectors out -- I think this is a good idea because a flare which you can use -- you could start a fire.

<u>Rep. DeKrey:</u> What I think about those triangle reflectors is that is the symbol for a slow moving vehicle. On the farm you are required to have that on your farm vehicles for highway movements.

Rep. Galvin: Is there more than one company that makes these?

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Testimony in Support of Senate Bill No. 2342

Chairman Trenbeath, Senate Transportation Committee members, my name is Todd D. Kranda. I am an attorney with the Kelsch Law Firm in Mandan and I appear before you today as a lobbyist on behalf of Eveready Battery Company, Inc. to testify in support of SB 2342.

SB 2342 would allow the use of a new safety device for disabled, stranded or stopped motor vehicles in North Dakota. The Auto Alert safety device by Eveready is a new product for use by drivers of passenger motor vehicles. If a vehicle were to become disabled during night time hours the driver would place the Auto Alert device on the ground. The flashing red light of the Auto Alert device would give oncoming traffic advance warning of the hazard.

Currently, it has been determined that this type of a device is acceptable for use in the 49 other states. However, in North Dakota, Section 39-10-07.2 provides a general prohibition of the use of a flashing red light with certain limited exceptions. SB 2342 would amend Section 39-10-07.2 by adding a new subsection that would allow "the use of portable battery powered warning devices emitting a flashing red light placed upon a highway to alert oncoming traffic to a disabled or stopped motor vehicle." The Auto Alert device from Eveready uses one "D" cell battery, stands 12 to 14 inches high, withstands 40 mph winds with no movement, and is clearly visible from a distance of 1 mile.

A copy of SB 2342 has been provided to the Highway Patrol and the Attorney General's office for review and there has been no objection stated to the suggested changes that would allow the use of this type of a safety device by motorists in North Dakota. Allowing this type of a safety device for use in North Dakota would be beneficial for North Dakota motorists

Accordingly, I urge a DO FASS recommendation for SB 2342. If there are any

questions I would be willing to try to answer them.

WEST'S NORTH DAKOTA CODE TITLE 39, MOTOR VEHICLES CHAPTER 39-10, GENERAL RULES OF THE ROAD

Current through the Special Session of the 57th Legislative Assembly (2001)

§ 39-10-07.2. Display of unauthorized signs, signals, or markings

1. No person may place, maintain, or display upon or in view of any highway, any unauthorized sign, signal, marking, 'or device which purports to be or is an imitation of or resembles an official traffic-control device or railroad sign or signal, or which attempts to direct the movement of traffic, or which hides from view or interferes with the effectiveness of an official traffic-control device or any railroad sign or signal.

2. No person may place or maintain nor may

any public authority permit upon any highway any traffic sign or signal bearing thereon any commercial advertising.

- 3. This section may not be deemed to prohibit the erection upon private property adjacent to highways of signs giving useful directional information and of a type that cannot be mistaken for official signs.
- 4. Every such prohibited sign, signal, or marking is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and the authority having jurisdiction over the highway is hereby empowered to remove the same or cause it to be removed without notice when located on highway right of way.
- 5. No person may place, maintain, or display upon or within the right of way of any highway any sign, post, pole, mailbox, or signal which has a red lamp or red reflector visible to traffic. The provisions of this subsection do not apply to official traffic devices, lamps, or reflectors on motor vehicles or bicycles, or railroad signals or signs.
