I feel First Nations Day has more strength that Native Americans day, people sometimes think negatively when they hear Native American, this would not create a new holiday, this would be a day to recognize the indigenous people of this state, many towns in the state are even named after the tribal language. Native American people serve in military more per capita than every other people.

Senator Nelson: during the Olympic games Sydney, Australia made a lot of their stars that were indigenous people, do you have any ideas how those tribes are handled in those countries?

Senator Bercier: Indigenous games are in Canada, that are games of tribal people. We have tribal person on that board who tried to bring those games to Fargo but it didn't happen.

Senator Bercier: I would prefer not to have that day then, I would prefer to change that day.

Senator Fairfield, sponsor of the bill is in support of SB 2410.

Mervin Packineau, vice Chairman of the Three Affiliated Tribes (Testimony attached)

Senator Dever: Is this to bring Columbus Day and First Nations Day together?

Packineau: I am not sure. I have not spoken with Tex Hall specifically about this. I believe it is because the Native Americans believe that they were the natives to this land and this is in celebration of Columbus. Indians would like to celebrate their day instead of having to celebrate Columbus Day. in fact our tribe already celebrates this day.

Testimony of Three Affiliated Tribes Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation

Madam Chair, members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to present testimony today in favor of SB 2410. My name is Mervin Packineau, and I am the Vice-Chairman of the Three Affiliated Tribes. I represent the Lucky Mound segment on our Tribal Business Council. My testimony today is provided on behalf of the Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation.

This bill is very simple. It simply adds to the North Dakota Century Code a paragraph calling on the Governor of North Dakota to issue a proclamation each year on the second Monday of October in honor of the Tribal Nations and their members that are present within the State of North Dakota and the contributions they have made and are making to our state. Other states have such days, such as South Dakota.

Some have asked why we should have such a day placed into state law, rather than simply let the Governor issue a proclamation on that day. Putting the requirement to issue a proclamation in state law means that each Governor, no matter who that might be, has to take a small amount of time and recognize the First Nations of our state, which are the Federally recognized Indian tribes and their members, on the day that the Federal government has designated as a Federal holiday known as "Columbus" day.


We believe that it is important for the State of North Dakota to recognize the First Nations of our state, as this simple act can emphasize the positive relationship our First Nations have developed with the State of North Dakota. There is no better day for that proclamation to be given than the day set aside for the person who began the process of leading Europeans and others to the lands of my ancestors. It is a small way of emphasizing the connections we now have with each other, and the consequences of the interactions over the years between those who followed Columbus and our Tribal Nations, including the contributions that our Triba and our leaders such as 4 Bears and Sakakawea made to the Lewis and Clark Expedition as they wintered in our villages on the Knife River.

This bill will not cost the state anything, and so I urge a DO PASS recommendation from this Committee for this bill.

Testimony of David M. Gipp, President, United Tribes Technical College On SB 2410 - First Nations Day

Chairman Klein & Members of the Committee:

Thank you for this opportunity to testify before you today on SB 2410, a bill to establish First Nations Day in the State of North Dakota. I am David M. Gipp, president of the United Tribes Technical College, which has been serving American Indian Students and their families since July, 1, 1969. We are also known as the United Tribes of North Dakota, when our tribal leaders from the five tribes of North Dakota convene to discuss intertribal policy matters.

As indicated, our board is made up of the five tribal chairmen from each of the five tribes of North Dakota and one other elected councilperson from each of the five tribes. United Tribes, itself, was established to serve our many American Indians who are not served or are poorly served as to the issue of receiving education and training. We are proud of our record of service and typically we serve some 450 to 500 adults and 250 children from as few as 25 to as many as 40 or more tribes from throughout the nation.

I am here today to express our support of SB 2410. We believe this will represent an important and significant population within the state, as well as from around the nation. North Dakota has five Indian Tribes and reservations located within it boundaries. Some seven percent of our population in North Dakota are American Indian or indigenous people, These of course include the Mandan, Arikara, Hidatsa of the Three Affiliated Tribes of Fort Berthold, The Lakota and Dakota Indians who are at The Standing Rock Sioux Reservation and the Spirit Lake Dakota Tribe and reservation, and the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa. Of course, the Sisseton Wahpeton Dakota also have territory here in North Dakota, but the

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predominant population resides on the South Dakota portion of that reservation.

I understand this bill has already passed the North Dakota Senate with a substantial margin.

Likewise, we hope the committee will offer a "do pass" on this bill and refer it to the floor for successful passage.

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, there is much to say about the contributions of American Indians, indigenous people, to the Great State of North Dakota and to the United States and our surrounding nations. These people are citizens of the state and enrich the state with their presence and diverse history of cultures of songs, dances, customs and languages. The Indian Tribes in the state have a special legal standing, as well.

Indeed, we know that this is a "growing population." It is and will be an increasingly important factor in the growth and well being of North Dakota. From what I can see, over 50 percent of the American Indian population is under age 24. Our Indian Tribes continue to expand their local economies and have plans for more local in-state investment by developing more businesses and industries. This means more jobs and more retention of North Dakotans as continued residents.

Our North Dakota Tribal Colleges, including United Tribes, work hand-in-hand with the state university system and are moving toward greater dialogue on education program offerings and other strategies.

Tribal leadership works well together from the various tribal governments and have a strong interest in the positive future of North Dakota, as well.

We believe passage of this SB 2410 will promote (1) greater educational awareness of American Indian or indigenous peoples and their contributions, (2) provide for greater knowledge and exchange between our tribes and other cultures, and (3) greater recognition of a growing population and its ongoing contributions to the state in all aspects of life—particularly as it relates to the economic and cultural well being of all North Dakotans.

Thank you for your time and we wish you well in your deliberations.

Mr. Chairman, members of the Committee, this testimony is being officed on behalf of the Mandan, Hidatas and Arikars Nation, the Three Affiliated Tribes, in favor of SB 2410.

This bill is very simple. Rather than celebrate the person who led Europeans to our shore, the day recognizes us as the "first peoples" of our state.

This simple act of recognition of who we are can emphasize the positive relationship our First Nations have developed with the State of North Dakota. It is a small way of emphasizing the connections we now have with each other, and the connecquences of the interactions over the years between those who followed Columbus and our Tribal Nations, including the contributions that our Tribe and our leaders such as 4 Bears and Sakakawea made to the Lewis and Clark Expedition as they wintered in our villages on the Knife River. With passage of this bill, we can further take advantage of the Lewis and Clark Expedition Bicontennial and work on developing other activities that will help focus the attention of visitors to our state on that event.

This bill will not cost the state anything, and so we unje a DO PASS recom mittee for this bill. ion from this

SB 2410 provides that the Governor shall issue a proclamation each year designating the second the Monday of each October celebrating First Nation's Day. The celebration, which coincides with Columbus Day would not create an additional holiday but would recognize the indigenous peoples of North Dakota.

[The only catching point is that First Nation's Day would fall on Columbus Day.

Like as not, this was not pure coincidence but I would suggest simply explaining that when Columbus arrived here the indigenous people were already here and the indigenous peoples were crucial to the establishment of the United States and North Dakota and have made significant contributions to our state and nation.

Therefore, it makes sense that we would celebrate First Nation's Day on Columbus Day.]

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
