Senator Freborg opened the hearing on SB2421. Roll call was taken, all committee members were present. This bill relates to teacher compensation.

Senator Freborg (mtr #45) - Section 38 is the only change in the bill. Have a new bill number but all sections have been heard and passed with the exception of section 38. Because it is a new bill, the hearing is open to testimony in any area of the bill. Without objection from the committee, highly recommends addressing only section 38. If it is necessary to talk about other areas of the bill, will allow it. But doesn't want to get into the rest of the bill unless someone has a very good reason for going there.

Anita Thomas, Legislative Council (mtr #145) - Section 38 replaced a prior legislative intent section. This provides that during the 2003-2005 biennium, the board of each school district would have to use at least 70%, or an amount equal to that, of the new moneys it receives for the purpose of increasing teacher compensation. Definition of new moneys is; new per student

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moneys received this biennium as opposed to last biennium. As currently drafted this requirement would not apply if the district's average annual teacher compensation level is at or above the state average for that level. Section 38 contains one additional exemption, that is for school districts that are providing educational services under a cooperative agreement approved by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. Those multiple districts will be treated as a single district for purposes of applying this section.

Senator Christenson (mtr #235) - Under section two, how many schools does that actually impact.

Ms. Thomas (mtr #247) - Believes there is a printout that shows where the school districts fall.

Does not have that available right now.

Senator Freborg (mtr #284) - In response to Senator Christenson's question, believes the number is 16.

Senator Cook (mtr #310) - Looks to be more than that. It is 23 schools.

Bev Nielsen, School Board Association (mtr #390) - Testified in opposition to SB2421. We resist this concept because it impunes the integrity of local school boards by implying that boards will not raise teacher salaries unless the state mandates them to do so. The Governors continued efforts to intercede in salary negotiations on behalf of the teachers union only diminishes the school board position and its local collective bargaining process. Need to understand that there are unique negotiating agreements in each school district in the state. Teachers receive salary increases automatically moving along salary schedules. Salary freezes in North Dakota are unheard of. North Dakota law requires local school boards to collectively bargain with teachers to establish salary and benefits. If the Governor has no faith in that process, perhaps he should

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introduce legislation that repealing the collective bargaining law. Feels the state should respect the position of the locally elected school board and the teachers union. Believes the 70% language impedes that process.

Gloria Lokken, President, NDEA (mtr #596) - Testified in support of SB2421. Supports section 38 with the exception of provision #2. That provision applies to the average teacher compensation level. The intent of this section is to raise the average teacher salary in the state. Respects the remarks of the previous speaker, but twenty years of history shows that if it is left to collective bargaining the results are slow and the numbers are small.

Senator Taylor (mtr #767) - What does this mean to the rest of the schools outside of the twenty-three mentioned earlier. In schools that are facing declining enrollment will the teachers get a raise?

Ms. Lokken (rntr #811) - Just saw this language a few minutes ago, so have not had time to look at the numbers. But do know that 65 schools are getting less money in the next biennium.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #865) - Did you support of 70% in the House?

Ms. Lokken (mtr #876) - Not sure.

Senator Freborg (mtr #943) - Will return to testimony in opposition to SB2421.

Gary Engwhich, Superintendent of Schools in Killdeer ND (mtr #997) - Testified in opposition of SB2421. Is not in total opposition but has concerns. Handed and referenced exhibit A. Talked about Killdeers increasing enrollment next year. Killdeer will have a net gain of 40 students next year. Based on those figures with original bill, Killdeer would see a net gain of about \$130,000 in next years foundation aid payment. Because of the additional students, will need to increase staffing. Killdeer is currently deficit spending about \$100,000 in the current year. Because of

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that, the 70% factor would hit that school district hard. Would have to raise taxes significantly to offset the funds designated for teacher salaries. Not opposed to teachers getting justified raises. Have increased their compensation over 10% per year. Feels Killdeer is unique in the State of ND because of the projected growth. Governor had originally talked about a 1500,00 per year teacher salary increase. Would support if it was an additional option. Another thing that would help, would be if the moneys designated as new moneys could be used by schools with increasing enrollments to hire additional staff members.

Senator Krauter (mtr #1596) - Proposed amendment #.0103 that relates to the 140 mill issue in the legislation. The amendment refers to page 8 and 9 of the bill. Are asking here to basically exempt the K-8 environment out there.

Larry Klundt, NDCEL (mtr #1787) - Is neutral on this bill. Did testify in favor of the 70% provision in the House Education committee. Superintendents are in a difficult position. They are responsible for administering the budgets along with trying to be the best advocate for staff that they can. The Association took the position early on, was a first priority for foundation aid. But also willing to say that if more money was possible for foundation aid, would not object to a portion of that stipulated for teacher compensation. Average across state shows 57% of expenditures goes to teacher compensation, foundation aid makes up 45% of the districts revenue. With those numbers feels that 100% of foundation aid is already going to teacher salaries. Suggests, and bill does reflect, that the focus remain on per pupil payments and not include tuition apportionment. Again stated that foundation aid is the first priority for his Association. And do not object to the 70% since it does retain the amount of money in the program for foundation aid

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Senator Taylor (mtr #2144) - On the 70%, with the foundation aid increase and declining enrollment, are the teachers going to see an increase in a lot of our schools?

Mr. Klundt (mtr #2190) - Believes that with the amount of money in foundation aid and whether it is 70% or 100%, nobody is going to get a substantial raise.

Sandy Clark, ND Farm Bureau (mtr #2270) - Testified in opposition of SB2421. Are opposed to the 70% dedication of new moneys to teacher compensation. ND Farm Bureau does support teachers and teacher salaries. Opposition is philosophical in nature. Feel that local school boards should have the flexibility to make these decisions. When the Governor attempts to dictate teacher compensation and how schools spend money, feel it is developing a dangerous precedence. Trend would be difficult to sustain over time and fear property taxes would be raised to pay salaries that are set by the state legislature. Feel teachers do receive a significant amount of foundation aid money. Feel school boards are doing a good job and are committed to teachers and quality education. Also feel if teachers receive 70% of new foundation aid, it only leaves 30% of new moneys for other costs such as building, technology and administrative staff. ND Farm Bureau would support the proposed amendment. Urges a do not pass on this bill. Senator Freborg (mtr #2522) - What would they propose?

Ms. Clark (mtr #2545) - Recognizes the difficulty with this bill. Over the long term would like to see a combination of income taxes and property taxes for funding. Can agree with the rest of the

bill without the 70% language.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #2742) - Question for Tom Decker from Dept of Public Instruction. Could you comment on the problem of declining enrollment. Gave numbers of teachers, students lost and the resulting net dollars. Will this trend continue?

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Tom Decker, Department of Public Instruction (mtr #2796) - Went over several reasons for the decline in student numbers and the increase in teachers.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #2866) - Clarified that we have peaked or flat lined on numbers of special education teachers.

Mr. Decker (mtr #2881) - That may be the case, but there is some tendency for increase there.

Senator Freborg (mtr #2960) - Closed the hearing on SB2421

Senator Freborg (mtr #3000) - Called the committee back to order. Open for discussion. Senator Flakoll (mtr #3014) - Had conversations with Legislative Council, trying to get something that may be suitable for situations such as Killdeer and Halliday. Those amendments will not be ready until later.

Senator Freborg (mtr #3055) - We can discuss the contents now to cut down on time tomorrow. Senator Flakoll (mtr #3120) - Amendment will attempt to protect the school districts against large numbers of students moving into the district and the sweeps that would result from that movement. Looking at, school districts that have more than 250 enrollments in K-12 that experience a single year growth of 7-8% would be exempt.

Senator Lee (mtr #3247) - Question regarding the reorganization, the newly reorganized districts for the second half of the biennium.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #3261) - Not sure if those numbers have been taken into account. Schator Christenson (mtr #3320) - Comment regarding this bill, sees conflicting opinion, picking

away at the bill, trying suit different districts. In the end feels we will end up frustrated. Some

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people feel this bill has huge impacts, other people say it doesn't make any difference if we are at 70% because there is no money. Feels the Governor of the state called us back in, in part, over nothing. Has become very unclear as to what this is all about. Subsection 2 of section 38 is abhorrent. They will be penalized because they are at the average for teacher salaries or above. Senator Flakoll (mtr #3463) - Understands that the number of schools above the average will not be penalized because this would not apply to them. Used Fargo as an example of a school that would not be impacted by this bill because more money than the 70% number is designated for teacher salaries.

Senator Christenson (mtr #3576) - Is addressing the issue of the language. Feels the language is symbolic. Also feels it is not about dollars but more about language.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #3650) - Questioned how this differs from other amendments that have been proposed.

Senator Freborg (mtr #3704) - Reviewed an amendment that had been proposed by Senator Christenson during the regular session. Question to Senator Christenson, what if "increasing" was taken out on line 23 and said 100% of that money could go to teachers?

Senator Christenson (mtr #3875) - Teachers getting 100% of anything would be good.

Senator Taylor (mtr #3896) - Here because Governor had vetoed our bill. Governor had proposed \$1500.00 per teacher in each school. Would be surprised if this passed the muster as well. In some school districts, 70% of nothing is nothing.

Senator Freborg (mtr #4000) - Question, if other districts were included would you like this amendment?

Senator Taylor - No.

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Senator Cook (mtr #4060) - To clarify, for the purpose of increasing compensation pay to teachers. Would compensation to new hires be included?

Senator Freborg (mtr #4123) - Would be an increase in compensation, could very well be.

Senator Cook (mtr #4145) - Would that solve the questions raised by the Superintendent from

Killdeer?

Senator Freborg (mtr #4184) - It might. An increase of 42 students is a radical increase for that school.

Senator Cook (mtr #4215) - If we look at 70% of funding for new students, the new teachers needed will cost more than that. Understands that for the purpose of increasing compensation for teachers, that includes compensation paid to new teachers. But now wonders if that is so. Mr. Decker (mtr #4323) - Regarding new hires in a place like Killdeer, would the cost of their salary be a part of that 70%. It is critically important that the committee decides on the regord if they are included or not. Feels Senator Cook is right, if they are included it would solve Killdeer's problem with the 70%.

Schator Freborg (mtr #4418) - Question for Mr. Decker, how does the bill read?

Mr. Decker (mtr #4466) - Inclination now is that the bill already covers that because three new teachers in Killdeer would represent a total increase in compensation for the district over last year. But, so that there is no doubt about that, let's make sure we understand what your intent is.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #4564) - Should I stop the amendment process?

Senator Freborg - You have to make that decision.

Senator Lee (mtr #4603) - His question answered by Senator Cook's interrogation.

Senator Christenson (mtr #4685) - Would like to see subsection 2 of section 38 removed.

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Senator Freborg (mtr #4730) - If removed, would you support?

Senator Christenson (mtr #4790) - To delete that subsection would help.

Senator Christenson (mtr #4880) - Feels this is money vs. language. Does not like the exclusion of any group, especially in the area of salary. Making a statement that the status quo, the average, is good enough. Polieves that overall the language is detrimental to the bill.

Senator Freborg (mtr #5030) - If you were serious about amending to improve the bill, I could support. Feels Senator Christenson's concern is not meaningless but will not fix the bill.

Senator Taylor (mtr #5160) - Senator Krauter had brought in amendment #.0103, but I would like to go further. Do not have an amendment drawn up, but do have the language. Will give you the language for consideration. Would remove the 140 mill levy minimum. Would remove lines 30 & 31 on page 8 of the bill. Would remove lines 1 & 2 on page 9. Would remove lines 19-22 on page 9. Would propose to support this instead of the amendment Senator Krauter proposed. Senator Freeborn (mtr #5420) - Any discussion from committee? This would essentially remove the language for the 140 mill levy minimum.

Senator Cook (mtr #5500) - Feels there are two very important issues to deal with. No Child Left Behind and equity, SB2154 was the best bill passed as far as addressing equity. In regards to what we are doing here and why we are back, we have one section in the bill that is contentious. Hope to keep all efforts towards addressing the needs of that one section and leave the rest of the bill as it was.

Senator Freborg (mtr #5680) - Any amendments should be prepared today.

Senator Christenson (mtr #5807) - Amend her earlier comments on the "mess". Feels the bill contained good honest work. The whole funding issue of the state is beyond one bill.

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Senator Freborg (mtr #5980) - We know it was one of the best bills ever passed.

Senator Freborg (mtr #6180) - Will be limited for time tomorrow morning. If amendments are ready we will meet again at 4:00.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #1) - Will talk to Legislative Council about preparing amendments by 4:00 today.

Senator Freborg (mtr #45) - Committee will meet again at 4:15pm today. Meeting is recessed.

Senator Freborg (mtr #80) - Called the committee back to order.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #88) - Handed out an amendment for consideration. Explained amendment number 30807.0107 and its intent. Moved to amend with 30807.0107.

Motion seconded by Senator G. Lee. Roll Call vote 6 yea, 0 nay. Motion carried.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #201) - This would essentially take care of the concerns such as those that Halliday and Killdeer had.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #298) - Handed out amendment #30807.0104. Explained the amendment and its intent. Moved to amend with #30807.0104

Motion seconded by Senator Cook. Roll Call vote 5 yea, 1 nay, 0 absent. Motion carried

Senator Freborg (mtr #440) - Any other discussion? Any other amendments? Meeting is adjourned.

Senator Freborg called the meeting to order. All committee members are present.

Senator Taylor (mtr #41) - Distributed amendment #30807.0106 which deals with the 140 mill levy minimum. Explained the intent of the amendment. For the record is not against equity. But feels the funding should come from a broader base. Motioned to amend with 30807.0106.

Motion seconded by Senator Christenson.

Discussion followed. Roll call vote 1 yea, 5 nay, 0 absent. Motion failed.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #480) - Distributed amendment #30807.0105. Explained the amendment and its intent. This would allow a school board to exempt itself from the items listed in section 38 with a two-thirds vote of the board. Motioned to amend with 30807.0105. Motion seconded by Senator G. Lee.

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Discussion

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Senator Christenson (mtr #649) - Feels this is setting a dangerous precedent in terms of local school districts ability to avoid state law?

Senator Flakoll (mtr #677) - Feels it could also be argued that the state is infringing on their rights and obligations. They can request waivers on other things.

Senator Christenson (mtr #718) - Is always bothered by the definition of local control. Feels at some time the legislative body needs to take a stand, to nullify and negate a law is not one of them.

Roll call vote 4 yea, 2 nay, 0 absent. Motion carried.

Senator Freborg (mtr #845) - Any other amendments? Will reconvene at 9:15am today. Meeting is recessed.

Senator Freborg (mtr #885) - Called the meeting to order.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #903) - Distributed amendment #38241.0348 which was drafted for SB2154. In lieu of the 70% in section 38, all per pupil payments received by the state, old and new, would be used for teacher compensation. This amendment was not presented before. Senator Cook (mtr #1027) - Pointed out that the amendments were prepared for SB2154 not SB2421.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #1082) - Was just bringing the language forward for consideration.

Senator Freborg (mtr #1130) - Feels it the language still fits. There is no motion at this time, any discussion?

Senator Taylor (mtr #1158) - Clarify that this would use to supersede section 38 in the current bill.

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Senator Flakoll (mtr #1190) - Believes that would be the correct course of action.

Senator Taylor (mtr #1203) - Wouldn't need to delete section 38. Do not see the need for the amendment if schools use 100% of old and new moneys.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #1224) - If that would be the case then section 38 would be counter to this and not needed. This would be a replacement.

Senator Freborg (mtr #1260) - Clarified that in the end this amendment would replace section 38.

Senator Taylor (mtr #1274) - If the school district receives 45% of its funds from the state, we would be looking at 100% going towards compensation. So a school board could have 45% of its budget dedicated to teacher salaries

Senator Flakoll (mtr #1307) - Answered based on cost and compensation.

Senator Christenson (mtr #1357) - Earlier amendment we passed allowed a school board to exempt themselves by a two-thirds vote. Is that going to disappear with section 38 or is it in conjunction with this amendment.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #1379) - Not sure if we would have to decide if there is anything to keep in section 38. Feels it is worth consideration by the committee.

Senator Cook (mtr #1538) - Commented that the clock is ticking on getting the bill out of committee.

Senator Freborg (mtr #1550) - We will get this bill out on time.

Senator Christenson (mtr #1562) - Feels there is a lack of coordination in this section and in this bill. Several ideas are fighting with each other. One contradicts the other, one is all encompassing and one is nothing. The content is unclear and may be unclear to others.

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Senator Flakoll (mtr #1658) - The bill before us does not require the two-thirds vote language.

That would have to be added on.

Senator Christenson (mtr #1695) - To clarify, this section totally supplants section 38.

Senator Flakoll - True.

Senator Christenson (mtr #1746) - Is at a loss of where everything stands, would like subsection

2 deleted from section 38. But now looking at other proposals that have an impact in that. What are we going for?

Senator Freborg (mtr #1809) - Everything is up for discussion. We have not adopted this amendment at this time.

Senator Christenson (mtr #1900) - Is there a different timeline.

Senator Freborg (mtr #1919) - The bill will go out today. Adjourned the meeting until 10:20am.

Senator Freborg called the Education Committee back to order.

Senator Christenson (mtr #2025) - Moves to remove subsection 2 of section 38 of the bill.

Motion seconded by Senator Taylor.

Senator Christenson (mtr #2075) - Explained why she moved to remove subsection 2. Feels that subsection is sending the wrong message regarding teacher pay.

Roll call vote 3 yea, 3 nay, 0 absent. Motion failed for lack of majority.

Senator Freborg (mtr #2275) - Distributed amendment #30807.0109.

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Senator Flakoll (mtr #2435) - Regarding the amendments. Procedurally would have to pull the previous amendment off the bill if we were to adopt this amendment. Moves to reconsider the committee action on #30807.0105.

Motioned seconded by Senator Cook. Roll call vote 6 yea, 0 nay, 0 absent. Motion carried. Senator Flakoll (mtr #2594) - Moved amendment #30807.0109.

Motion seconded by Senator Lee.

Senator Freborg (mtr #2660) - Regarding the .0109 amendment. Does look like the board would need some kind of reason for financial/administrative hardship. Must apply for exemption to DPI.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #2700) - Further clarification on the procedure the school boards would take.

Senator Christenson (mtr #2746) - Voiced same problems as before, allowing local school districts to exempt themselves from state law.

Roll call vote on previous motion to adopt amendment .0109 4 yea, 4 nay, 0 absent. Motion carried.

Senator Freborg (mtr #2900) - Any discussion or issues to bring before the committee? Given none, will accept a motion on the bill.

Senator Cook moved a Do Pass as Amended on SB2421. Second by Senator Lee.

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Roll call vote 4 yea, 2 nay, 0 absent. Motion carried.

Senator Freborg adjourned the meeting.

Senator Freborg called the Education Committee to order. Roll call taken, all committee members are present.

Senator Freborg (mtr#38) - Reviewed the language in the amendment proposed by the House.

House took our sections four and five out and put this language in. It is not acceptable to us.

Thought in only fair that the committee get a look at the amendment and know how it came about. Referred to the blacked out language on the copies.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #125) - Clarified that the blacked out language on the copies was something that was highlighted on the original copy.

Senator Freborg (mtr #132) - Agreed. Was highlighted and came out black on the copy. It reads now that the board after public hearing determines "in its discretion" and by an affirmative vote of two-thirds. It was fully our intent to have the language in there that says, in the boards

discretion. We believe that's necessary, it was totally out of the boards hands prior to that and now it is not. It is our intent that, that be in there. Was not acceptable to us.

Senator Cook (mtr #192) - We don't see subsection 1 here.

Senator Freborg (mtr #211) - Did not bring it down. Subsection 1 has not changed. 1,2 and 3 are still there they took out our 4 and 5 and put only number 4 with three subsections.

Senator Cook (mtr #234) - Agrees with Senator Freborg. The language "in its discretion" is our intent.

Senator Lee (mtr #255) - Under the first line on page 32, "and tuition apportionment", that is different.

Senator Freborg (mtr #269) - That is different. That was in the original. Tuition apportionment and transportation were included, isn't anyway we would agree to transportation.

Senator Lee (mtr #308) - Where is states "two-thirds of its members" in A. That means the elected members of the board?

Senator Freborg (mtr #315) - I believe that is does. Hope something as important as these decisions, the boards would make certain that they had more than the bare quorum.

Senator Lee (mtr #351) - Seems to me that that language is important "in its discretion" and that gives the school board the decision, whether or not it meets the provisions that we are intending it to meet. Is important language to be there.

Senator Freborg (mtr #374) - It now says what we originally wanted it to say.

Senator Christenson (mtr #400) - Do I understand that subsection 2 is out?

Senator Freborg (mtr #415) - We did take out the language that required all the schools below the statewide average. Now it takes in all the schools. Stated that subsection 2 is out, it will apply to all districts. Tuition apportionment money is in. Now have four subsections to section 38.

Senator Flakoll (mtr #480) - Review for clarification. Added tuition apportionment, taking out the statewide average language so it applies to all teachers. It would be my opinion that "in its discretion" would be helpful because it clarifies who has full and final say.

Senator Taylor (mtr #562) - Commented. Added public hearing language in there. We don't put allot of specifics in there about what they need to do for a public hearing.

Senator Freborg (mtr #586) - To clarify. Every school board meeting other than executive session is a public meeting and could be considered a public hearing. All they have to do is designate a portion of that meeting be dedicated to this and it is a public hearing. Wanted the committee to be aware of what the amendment is, so that you know ahead of time. We are going to accept the amendment.

Minutes: Rep. Kelsch called the meeting to order, roll was taken with the following present:

Rep. Kelsch, Rep. Johnson, Rep. Haas, Rep. Hanson, Rep. Hawken, Rep. Herbel, Rep. Hunskor, Rep. Meier, Rep. Mueller, Rep. Meier, Rep. Nelson, Rep. Norland, Rep. Sitte, Rep. Williams, Absent was Rep. Solberg, a quorum was present.

Rep. Kelsch advised the committee was present to address to Section 38 of SB 2421. The Senate amended the bill in the education committee. She called for testimony in support of SB 2421.

Joe Wesby, NDEA spoke in support of SB 2421. In section 38, section 5, it severely limits the amount of dollars that are impacted by the 70%, subsection 2 exempts school districts that have average salaries and benefits totally for \$46, 668. That eliminates most of the largest districts in the state, approx. 24 districts from the 70% provision. That takes out about 4500 teachers from being covered by this bill. With the limited funding in SB 2421, 65 school districts will receive

less money the first year and 88 will receive less in the second year. When coupled with the top districts there doesn't leave much for the middle districts. That concerns us a great deal. We believe subsection 2 of Section 38 needs to be removed. Subsection 5 would allow school board by a two thirds vote to appeal to DPI to be exempted from the 70% provision if they can demonstrate a hardship. We think that should also be removed as it further limits the application of the 70% to school districts. We would like to see something more substantial than what is being proposed.

Rep. Mueller How many teachers will be effected in those districts?

Joe Westby I haven't totaled all the numbers, I was told by someone else those 24 districts would include about 4500 teachers.

Bev Nelson, School Board Association we are supportive of SB 2421 with the addition of subsection 5 we believe it now acknowledges the local elected school boards responsibility for the districts budgets.

Rep. Kelsch Do you see a potential problem with State Legislators setting state law and then say local school board if you don't want to comply with it, they can just take vote and not comply with it.

Bev Nelson if the amendments are adopted, that is the state law. You are saying, here's what you we say you should do, but with two-thirds a vote you can apply for a waiver. I have a problem with a collective bargaining law on the books, for two session now we have been interceding and corrupting that law too. You know our position on the state setting these types of salaries anyway.

Rep. Nelson what portion of a budget is paid toward teacher compensation?

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Bev Nelson we don't collect that type of data. Terry Coleman has done research, it shows it has been fairly steady at 62-68% of school budgets to salaries and benefits.

Rep. Nelson let's pick 65%, in the bill we are talking 70% of new dollars, Is that really doing to create a hardship for school districts.

Bev Nelson Our objection is a philosophical one. We have a collective bargaining process, school systems are accountable for developing their districts budgets and as the Governor and/or Legislature, each session, starts mandating pieces of that state funded FTE's now have to be sustained. We supported that, that took the first 15M of what might have been available for foundation aid. Then last session and this session the state is going to mandate minimum salaries. So, we have the FTE's, the mandated minimum salaries and now a step further which will mandate a percentage of foundation aid which will also go to teacher pay. Our point is, as long as the state continues their efforts to intercede in salary negotiations on behalf of the teachers union if diminished the school board position in local collective bargaining. The next step will be the desire of the state to dictate the entire school district budget and say what percent of the local budget should go to teacher pay, now your dictating local funds as well as state funds.

Rep. Mueller why are we doing section 38 at all, being the fact they have the opportunity to exempt.

Bev Nelson we don't want to do the 70% at all for all previous stated reasons. With this language you are acknowledging the school board authority and accountability to set school board budgets and assure the solvency of their district.

Rep. Herbel why do you suppose the state is interceding with these issues

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Bev Nelson I think 1. It's popular to say we believe in teachers salaries, and it sounds like school boards don't think teachers should be paid. By the large infusion of millions of dollars in the last biennium, that clearly put money in the pockets of teachers. We would submit if 35M of new money went into foundation aid you would have seen and increase in teachers salaries as well. Salaries are not the only expense school districts have.

Rep. Herbel I would like to comment school boards have not meet the obligation, that is part of the reason the state has had to intervene.

Rep. Nelson How many districts have exceeded the required amounts from last session? **Bev Nelson** I have the numbers available, as do you. I know some did. Those negotiations at the local level take into account their own district. Our position is, if the collective bargaining process doesn't work, then it seems to be to repeal the collective bargaining law and let the state pay teachers.

Sandy Clark, ND Farm Bureau spoke in support of Section 38 and commend the Senate for the local control provisions. We concur with several provisions, however we oppose the 140 mil level minimum and we oppose the hold harmless language on the FTE payments. We support the K-12 interim study.

Hearing no further testimony the hearing was closed by the chair.

Meeting recessed until after the floor session.

Rep. Williams introduced amendment 30807.0101. He commented we exempt the larger schools who don't get the new money, those in the middle can not opt out. This amendment deletes section 38 and changes language to what we wanted last time with the five hundred in compensation.

Anita, Legislative Council explained this amendment would offer reimbursement of \$500 the first year of the biennium and \$1000 in the second year.

Rep. Kelsch are you using foundation aid money?

Rep. Williams we are leaving foundation aid as is. This amendment would cost around 12M,

This is something I along with others would like to put on the table. Section 38 doesn't address
the concerns of the Governor nor the teachers.

Rep. Kelsch who does this fit with foundation aid money and FTE line item?

Rep. Williams Appropriations would have to find a line item, this would be addressed at a later time. This can't be rushed, this needs to be a joint effort.

Rep. Haas This doesn't fit with the current financial picture. We would be adding 12M to what we have aiready added.

Rep. Mueller that is the issue before us. This would take a tax increase of some kind, maybe a tobacco tax.

Rep. Herbel do you have a suggestion on where we will get the money?

Rep. Williams This will take some sort of tax increase, we don't have the money. That's a scary word for a lot of people. This is an alternative, we can vote for or against, knowing full well there are dollars involved. It would take a tax increase.

Rep. Herbel Specifically, what type of tax increase?

Rep. Williams there has been much discussion, I would like to see a 6% surtax on income tax, the ability pay concept. I don't think this legislature would like my concept.

Rep. Mueller introduced amendment .0102 this addresses the hold harmless language, this legislature has added school districts that ended up receiving less money than the previous year. Now we have several districts involved. This would take 5M in supplemental payment money to 3 M, it takes that money and puts it into hold harmless. So those who are receiving less will receive additional funds.

Rep. Herbel you realize if this is implemented we will be moving further away from equity. **Rep. Mueller** that would be correct, we have done a number of equity things, especially in this session. I think there is another side to the equity issue regarding the small schools, the ones losing money.

Rep. Johnson I will oppose this amendment, supplemental payment is the best solution for those property poor.

Rep. Mueller we have other equity issues we have a flawed funding formula with "property poor" and "income poor".

Rep. Kelsch do we address in our foundation aid formula when we give districts the option of using current school enrollment or the enrollment from the previous year?



It won't pass, we should have done this long time ago, not now. It is certainly not appropriate at this stage of the game. I will resist the amendment

Rep. Hanson What is the appropriated amount for foundation aid?

Rep. Kelsch new money is 10M, total 489M plus odd change

Rep. Hanson why can't we take the 12M from their? That may sell better than a tobacco increase.

Rep. Williams I would like to response to Rep. Nelson No one want a tax increase, this bill is basically under funded, with the new mil levy factor they are getting less money then the last biennium. The education study's haven't been chosen from the Legislative Council. The bottom line, Where are these districts going to be in 2 years unless we do something differently. Rep. Sitte This would have the school board notify DPI, but DPI would have no authority?

Rep. Nelson This is another facade, if this provision is included, teachers will have to attend school board meetings regularly. If we trust the school boards, existing language should stand clean. I don't know why we are trying to compromise this thing. We are going to have more words than dollars.

The superintendent of public instruction shall calculate the payment to which an eligible school district is entitled during the 2003-05 biennium under this Act, and if that amount is less than the amount received by the school district in state aid during the 2001-03 biennium, the superintendent shall forward the difference to the school district at the same time and in the same manner as other state aid payments under section 15.1-27-01.
- 3. If insufficient moneys exist to fully meet the requirements of this section, the superintendent of public instruction shall prorate the payments according to that percentage of the amount available to which each eligible school district is entitled.
- 4. For purposes of this section, an eligible school district is one that levies more than one hundred forty mills for general fund purposes plus high school transportation and high school tuition purposes and which had an unobligated general fund balance on the preceding June thirtieth that was less than fifty percent of its actual expenditures plus twenty thousand dollars."
