**Minutes for HB 1110**

**Attendance:** 12 members present 0 absent

**Chairman Price:** We will open the hearing on HB 1110.

**Don Snyder,** Administrator of the Foster Care Program, Dept. of Human Services. testifying in favor of HB 1110. (see attached)

**Representative Porter:** What is your current occupancy rates at this time?

**D. Snyder:** I am not sure, maybe 15-20 beds open state wide.

**Representative Porter:** Could you provide the committee with those figures, and how much is being paid for out of state placements.

**D. Snyder:** Currently 58 children out of state, each area has different rates that may range from \$160.00-\$180.00 per day.

**Representative Porter:** Is there an average cost for out of state?

**Chairman Price:** Out of the 58 children, how many can ND handle?

**D. Snyder:** 23% of out of state are in specialized sex offender programs.

**Chairman Price:** What will it take to meet the needs, with 23% being offenders out of 58.

Why are there empty beds?

**D. Snyder:** We have a level of step down care.

**Chairman Price:** Who makes custodial decisions?

**D. Snyder:** Custodians.

**Representative Kaldor:** Has there been a needs assessment that shows findings that there is adequate needs and do you have those figures.

**D. Snyder:** Yes

**Representative Nelson:** How is it now handled?

**D. Snyder:** Beds are used for temporary placement. Cass County has 54. Beds are used to supplement placement..

**Representative Nelson:** Out of the facilities with requests, how many are at capacity?

**Representative Kreidt:** At this point, have any reached capacity and has anyone been turned away?

**D. Snyder:** I don't think so.

**Chairman Price:** Mr. Snyder, if you have beds in Sentinel Butte and a child in Fargo, where does the child go?

**D. Snyder:** Sometimes a facility will have additional area's available unless it is at capacity, then they go the closet, most applicable for the safety of the child.

**Representative Porter:** Are you able to negotiate cost's with an out of state facility? Do we just pay what they ask?

**D. Snyder:** Most are at about the same rate.

**Representative Weisz:** Who makes that determinations and why are we sending children out of state anyway?

**D. Snyder:** Determination is always for the needs of the child, relocation, Federal requirements, close proximity and basic needs.

**Representative Weisz:** Do we need a shift in where there are beds and is it balanced?

**D. Snyder:** Basically it is where there is the greatest need.

**Chairman Price:** Is there any other testimony in favor or in opposition? If not, the hearing is closed.

**Chairman Price:** We will open discussion on HB 1110.

**Representative Kaldor:** In regards to placing children out of state, what are the charges for children that are transferred into our state?

**Chairman Price:** We do not have that information. I have questions concerning the contents of this bill. Is anyone interested in doing some research to assist us with this bill?

**Representative Porter:** I will do some research. I have questions also, if we pay more for out of state placements and we don't seem to have adequate facilities for sex offenders. Is there more need in Fargo? At this time there doesn't seem to be enough information.

**Chairman Price:** Thank you, Representative Porter, I ask that Representative Damschen work with you.

**Representative Damschen:** I will be glad to work with Representative Porter.

**Representative Devlin:** In regards to new members on our committee, I am sure they would appreciate that whenever possible, in written or verbal testimony, not to use acronyms.

**Chairman Price:** Is there any further discussion on HB 1110? If none, the discussion is closed on HB 1110.

Minutes:

**House Bill # 1110** brought back because of a oversight when amending the bill.

**Rep. Devlin:** This bill sent to the floor, and brought it back because the moratorium was supposed to include residential child care facilities and group home. That is two different sections of the law, one was covered and one wasn't.

**Chairman Price:** After the amendment, it shows a Fiscal Note.

**Christa Andrews, Attorney with the Dept. of Human Services.**

Rep. Devlin had a question regarding an amendment to HB 1110, it was oversight, they meant to amend the sub section on the moratorium on the residential child care facilities as well. We thought we could just add in the language, but further checking, found there was a separate section in the ND Century Code that dealt with the moratorium on residential child care facilities and group home beds. We couldn't add language, we needed to change Sec. 50-11. It will be the

same thing, the moratorium will continue for the residential treatment centers, child care facilities and group home beds.

**Chairman Price:** By doing this, does this mirror the bill of 2 years ago, except for the date changes?

**C. Andrews:** Yes, that is correct. If I can clarify one more thing, we did get a call from LC, as the effective date was June 30th. John Walsh suggested this continue it through July 31, for legislative purposes, we don't have to have a emergency clause every time it continues.

**Chairman Price:** The moratorium will have two different dates?

**C. Andrews:** Yes

**Rep Weisz:** Could Rep. Porter refresh us concerning the amendment?

**Rep. Porter:** Regarding section two, sub committee wanted less restrictive care options, in state placement if possible. We wanted to push the RFP to see if anyone was interested in building a facility for sex offenders. We had 20 some identified in the state. When we asked for the amendment, I was unaware that there was going to have a fiscal note attached to it. I was under the impression that if they would move them back into the state, that there would be no fiscal effect and they would save money due to the education component that went with it.

**Chairman Price:** Read the amendment and explanation with Fiscal Note.

**Brenda Weisz:** With regards to the proposed amendment, we were asked what effect would it have revenue/expenditures. Final line, appropriations/budget. In doing the RFP, bringing them back into the state, with sexual offending behaviors, to do that, there would be a cost for the kids, We estimated what we are currently paying for them out of state, compared if it would be effecting our appropriations, and we would not be paying out of state anymore, it would just be

the cost in state. After researching, this now seems to be budget neutral. Bottom line there is no effect, as we were identifying what costs are already there. We do feel that this is to be a zero balance.

**Rep. Weisz:** Doesn't reflect balance costs basically should zero each out.

**Chairman Price:** The first sentence should actually reduce it some.

**Rep. Weisz:** On the Federal portion. does the revenue currently go to the out of state provider, it doesn't go through the dept.?

**B. Weisz:** It is revenue that comes from the Fed. Govt. This fiscal note will come back zero. also including the counties.

**Chairman Price:** Education also?

**B. Weisz:** Yes.

**Rep. Weisz:** It will just be a wash, basically?

**B. Weisz:** Yes.

A portion of the revenue will include county funds as the counties are also responsible for match on foster care expenditures. The amount due from the counties for the 2005-2007 biennium is \$798,078 and \$835,056 in 2007-2009.

The expenditures amounts listed above includes the cost of twenty-four children receiving treatment services at an out of state facility for the 2005-2007 biennium at an average daily rate of \$230 and for the 2007-2009 biennium at an average daily rate of \$239.

The cost reflected for the counties is their share of the foster care grants.

Page 1, line 1, after "Act" insert "to create and enact a new section to chapter 50-06 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to duties of the department of human services with respect to least restrictive care options;"

Page 1, after line 12, insert:

**"SECTION 2.** A new section to chapter 50-06 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:

Placement of children - Least restrictive care. The department and county social service boards shall thoroughly explore the option of kinship care when a child is unable to return home due to safety concerns. Absent kinship options, the department and county social service boards shall provide permanency options that are in the least restrictive care and near the family's home as required by the federal Adoption and Safe Family Act of 1997 [Pub. L. 105-89; 111 Stat. 2115; 42 U.S.C. 6711]. Before January 1, 2006, the department of human services shall issue a request for proposal for the provision of residential treatment services to meet the needs of youth with a history of sexual offenses within the state and explore options of therapeutic foster care for those youth who would benefit from this service level."

Minutes:

**Chairman Judy Lee** opened the hearing on HB 1110, a bill relating to duties of the Department of Human Services with respect to least restrictive care options. All members were present.

**Paul Ronnigen**, Director, Children and Family Services, Department of Human Services, testified in favor of the bill. (written testimony)

**Senator Brown** said he understands changing the dates but what is this about kinship?

**Mr. Ronnigen** said he has been approached by several legislators in the past year regarding kinship care in the state of North Dakota and the feeling it needed to be thoroughly explored along with the other options in the care of children and so they included it in the bill in order to fully support the kinship care option and give direction to the child welfare agencies in the state to pursue kinship care and also to seek least restrictive care near the family's home if at all possible.

**Senator J. Lee** asked him to give a little review regarding the pilot project.

**Mr. Ronnigen** said the Department of Human Services, in collaboration with the Division of Children's Family Services and the Division of Economic Assistance has developed a pilot in Cass, Burleigh and Morton counties where we are using dollars to extend the same benefits that foster parents would get for kids like child care and extraordinary expenses they would incur by bringing kids into their homes. They will be providing statewide training within the next month and going statewide with that and aggressively pursuing kinship care whenever possible and reporting back to the legislature in the next session. They have seen some examples of how well it has worked. It requires a little more work on the county's part and a more thorough review of the extended family and is required by predator law.

**Senator Warner** asked what population is served by these programs and what circumstances would cause a child to be taken out of a home and put into a treatment center.

**Mr. Ronnigen** said he is testifying later this morning on HB 1486 and he will share some of that testimony now. He distributed a summary of the children who are currently placed in out of state care and explained the chart. (meter 367) (attachment 2)

**Senator Warner** asked if in general children placed out of state require a higher level of treatment than what is available in North Dakota?

**Mr. Ronnigen** said the youth who are being placed out of state for sexual offenders are typically at a higher level of care than what we provide in state and with the 24 or 26 kids we have out of state that is why this bill requires an RFP so we can bring the kids home along with the money. In some cases there are just no beds available, depending on the ebb and flow of the placement of children.

**Senator J. Lee** asked when it says not accepted on the code, does that mean the facility would not accept that child?

**Mr. Ronningen** said that is correct.

**Senator J. Lee** said some of these kids have been in several facilities so some are unable to return because of problems they have had at in state facilities.

**Mr. Ronnigen** said in most situations our resources have been exhausted in North Dakota prior to out of state placement.

**Senator J. Lee** said some rates are less than in state rates so money is not the issue.

**Mr. Ronnigen** said there is a variability, sometimes there is lower cost out of state and sometimes vice versa.

**Senator J. Lee** said this is interesting. As an example of the kinship care, someone she knows has called her about this. A woman was injured quite badly and had two small children. The family was very concerned about sending the children to stay with the father and grandfather due to a history of abuse. Cass county assisted the county where they were living because they had not yet implemented the program and the children were placed with a loving sister. The new program worked well. Her appreciation to the Department of Human Services for helping work through the problem.

**Senator Dever** asked the difference in level of care between a residential child care facility and a treatment center.

**Mr. Ronnigen** said the residential treatment centers have a psychiatric staff assigned to the children. The residential child care facilities are a lower level of care, they do not have the psychiatric staff.

**Senator Warner** asked what GAF stands for?

**Mr. Ronnigen** said it is Global Functioning Assessment. It is a numerical value that describes the day to day functioning level of that child.

**Senator Warner** asked if a low score would indicate lower functioning, what would a 100 be?

**Mr. Ronnigen** said he would defer to the representative from the mental health division.

Senator Dever asked who does the placements.

**Mr. Ronnigen** said they are completed by the county social service staff who are the custodian of the child or the division of juvenile services who would also have custody of the child.

**Senator Dever** asked if the division of juvenile services is function of corrections.

**Mr. Ronnigen** said yes. North Dakota is unique because we share the foster care system between child welfare and juvenile justice and we save quite a few dollars as opposed to other states that run separate and competing care systems. We are pleased with the provision of services and the cooperation.

**Vice Chairman Dever** closed the hearing on HB 1110.

**Chairman Judy Lee** opened the discussion on HB 1110 when the committee reconvened. (tape 2, side B, meter 2809) This is the moratorium on expansion of residential treatment centers for children, it looks like a slam dunker. There is a fiscal note but it has no fiscal impact.

**Senator Dever** said not to belabor the point but would Teen Challenge fit into this?

**Senator Warner** said this is for children. The Teen Challenge bill started out in the Department of Human Services budget?

**Senator J. Lee** said yes, it started in the Department of Human Services budget and it was moved to Corrections.

**Senator J. Lee** reviewed the wording of the bill.

**Senator Warner** asked for Senator J. Lee's definition of kinship care.

**Senator J. Lee** said kinship care means they are placed with family members, with a fast track, short track screening process, instead of going into a full foster care situation. There is still screening but not as extensive. They are urging social workers to place children in a relative's home, when available, rather than with a stranger.

**Senator Warner** referred to the example by Senator J. Lee this morning, the father was investigated and apparently found not to be appropriate.

**Senator J. Lee** said the problem was the judge was saying when the mother was arrested for a drug situation, she was going away for a long time. The father was in California, they weren't married, the father had been in prison and just let out so he is a felon. The paternal grandfather has a history of sexually abusing children and the father lived close to the grandfather and there was concern about sending the child to the father. An aunt, married and in a stable home, wanted the children and the kinship program worked very well. Once the Department of Human Services suggested to Richland County that they could fast track this, rather than going through the whole foster care approval process, there was an almost immediate transfer to the aunt's home which was less stressful for the child. Actually, the judge gave the children to the father, which was a poor ruling, but he never picked them up and the aunt that wanted the children called the judge after 4 days and told him about it and he reversed his decision.

**Senator Dever** asked if kinship is defined.

**Senator J. Lee** said she thinks it is in rule and Carlee will find out and we can act on this Monday.

Residential treatment center for children means a facility or a distinct part of a facility that provides to children and adolescents, a total, 24 hour, therapeutic environment integrating group living, educational, interdisciplinary clinical assessment and a individualized treatment plan that meets the needs of the child and family. The services are available to children in need of and able to respond to active psychotherapeutic intervention and who cannot be effectively treated in their own family, in another home, or in a less restrictive setting.

**DEFINITION:**

**RESIDENTIAL CHILD CARE FACILITY - NDCC 50-11-00**

Residential Child Care Facility for children means the provision of substitute parental child care for those children who are in need of care for which the child's parent, guardian , or custodian is unable, neglects, or refuses to provide, and includes the provision of food, shelter, security and safety, guidance, and comfort on a twenty-four-hour basis, to one or more children under twenty-one years of age to safeguard the child's growth and development and to minimize and counteract hazards to the child's emotional health inherent in the separation from the child's family.
