### Minutes:

**Senator Layton Freborg**, Chairman, opened the hearing on SB 1076, relating to the definition of resident student for tuition purposes. All members were present.

Pat Seaworth, general counsel North Dakota University System, testified in favor of the bill. (written testimony) (meter 130 - 500)

Senator Flakoll asked if John McCain's dependents would be eligible.

Mr. Seaworth said if Senator McCain was disabled, his dependents would be eligible.

**Senator G. Lee** asked if the bill limits a person by number of credits or degree or if it is a lifetime benefit, even if they go in a North Dakota out of school.

Mr. Seaworth said yes. There are a small number of folks right now who pay nonresident tuition and this bill would reduce their tuition rate.

SB2076 redefines resident student for tuition purposes to add all members of the state national guard, spouses and dependents of active duty military personnel (regardless of where the service member is stationed) and spouses and children of disabled vets or vets killed in action (regardless of legal residency of the vet). Only a few members of the National Guard do not now qualify for resident tuition status, or for reciprocity status under the Minnesota reciprocity agreements, but making all members automatically eligible for resident tuition may help recruiting efforts. As a result, there is no projected material fiscal impact to the NDUS based on the proposed changes.

Seaworth: I don't know what other states are doing or have done with respect tuition rates for members of nation guard units. I do know there is a push in states around the country to enact the first part of this bill that would permit family members who remain in the state when a soldier or airman is transferred out of state and permit those dependents to be at resident tuition. Those changes have been made in any states around the country.

Rep. Haas: Could you briefly go over 37.01-40 and tell us what that definition means.

Seaworth: That statute simply defines a veteran and under that definition. Chairman Freborg and members of the Senate Education committee:

SB 2076 revises the definition of resident student for tuition purposes to include all active duty members of the armed forces and all members of the North Dakota National Guard and their spouses and dependents. Currently, active duty members of the armed forces assigned to a military installation in the state and their spouses and dependents are resident students for tuition purposes, regardless of legal residency. On occasion, a spouse or child of a member of the armed forces serving in North Dakota may remain in the state temporarily when the service member is transferred out of the state. Now, the family members who remain behind lose their status as residents for tuition purposes, if they are not legal residents of the state (the state of legal residency of active duty members of the armed forces and their families is often other than the state in which they are located). SB 2076 will permit the spouse and children to remain eligible for resident tuition rates in these cases; in fact, the bill makes all active duty members of the armed forces and their spouses and dependents eligible for resident tuition regardless of where they are stationed.

All members of North Dakota National Guard units will also be considered residents for tuition purposes. Most state National Guard members are North Dakota residents and others qualify for reciprocity status under the Minnesota reciprocity agreement. However, a few members will benefit from this change and it may assist in recruitment and retention.

Finally, SB 2076 makes spouses and children of veterans killed in action and disabled veterans eligible for resident tuition, regardless of legal residency. Another statute establishes entitlement to a waiver of tuition and fees for spouses or children of North Dakota resident veterans killed in action or disabled. The bill does not affect that entitlement; rather, it is intended to benefit qualified spouses and children of nonresident veterans, making them eligible for resident tuition rates.

These changes are not expected to have a material fiscal impact. The number of students affected will be small. The changes may encourage some students, who might otherwise leave the state to remain or induce a few residents of other states, who might otherwise not consider doing so, to enroll at a state college or university.

Mr. Chairman, Members of the Committee,

The Office of the Adjutant General supports this bill and requests a <u>do pass</u> vote. This bill clarifies the definition of resident student for tuition and will allow any member of the armed forces and their dependents or any member of the North Dakota National Guard to be considered residents for tuition purposes. The bill also allows the spouse or child of a non-resident veteran killed in action or totally disabled as a result of service to receive resident tuition rates at state institutions of higher education

Under current law, active duty personnel assigned to Grand Forks or Minot who have children attending college in North Dakota typically qualify for in-state tuition, but only for so long as they are assigned in North Dakota. Often the soldier or airman will be reassigned while their dependent child was still in college. The child then has two options; finish their education in North Dakota paying out-of-state tuition rates or leave North Dakota and go to a college in another state. We believe that military dependents that begin college at resident tuition rates should be allowed to complete their education in North Dakota at those same rates, regardless their parent's reassignment.

A member of the North Dakota National Guard from Minnesota or South Dakota is currently required to pay non-resident tuition rates. Allowing <u>all</u> North Dakota Guard members resident tuition status encourages not only attendance at North Dakota colleges but is also an excellent recruiting and retention tool for the North Dakota National Guard.

We have had 7 members of the North Dakota National Guard killed in action in Operation Iraqi Freedom. If these soldiers were North Dakota residents, their dependents are eligible for free tuition to North Dakota states colleges in accordance with NDCC 15-10-18.3. The proposed change to this bill will allow the dependents of any non-resident soldier killed or totally disabled to attend North Dakota state supported colleges at

resident rates. Allowing resident tuition for dependents of non-resident military members killed or totally disabled is one more small thing we can do to recognize their incredible sacrifice.

In conclusion, the Adjutant General's Office strongly supports this bill and, on behalf of all our soldiers and airman, we request your favorable consideration.

# North Dakota Veteran's Coordinating Council

My name is John L. Jacobsen. I am the chairman of the Legislative Committee of the North Dakota Veterans Coordinating Council. I am a member of both the VFW and the American Legion. I am also a member of the VFW National Legislative Committee. We work directly with our Members of Congress on legislation at the national level.

I served 29 years in the ND National Guard and the US Army Reserve, retiring in 1995 with the rank of Colonel. I served on active duty in 1991 in the Persian Gulf stationed in the United Arab Emirates.

The NDVCC membership is comprised of 15 members representing the five (5) veterans' organizations in the state. (3 from each organization) They are:

- > American Legion
- > AMVETS
- > Disabled American Veterans (DAV)
- > Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW)
- > Vietnam Veterans of America (VVA)

These organizations represent approximately 60,000 veterans currently living in North Dakota.

I am a member of the Legislative Committee of the NDVCC. I am not a member of the NDVCC but report directly to them. In order for the Legislative Committee to support any bill brought up before our Legislature, concurrence must be unanimous, that is all 15 members must agree that we should support the bill. A single negative response will kill our support.

# House Education Committee Testimony on SB 2076

Chairman Kelsch and members of the House Education committee:

SB 2076, introduced at the request of the State Board of Higher Education, revises the definition of resident student for tuition purposes to include all active duty members of the armed forces. Now, armed forces members assigned to a military installation in the state and their spouses and dependents are resident students regardless of legal residency. Sometimes, family members remain in the state when an armed forces member is transferred out of the state. SB 2076 permits a spouse and children to remain eligible for resident tuition rates, even if they are not legal residents of North Dakota. In fact, the bill makes all active duty members of the armed forces and their spouses and dependents eligible for resident tuition regardless of where they are stationed.

All members of North Dakota National Guard units will also be residents for tuition purposes. Most state National Guard members are North Dakota residents. However, Minnesota residents in North Dakota units, who now pay tuition under the Minnesota reciprocity agreement at rates slightly higher than resident tuition rates, will pay at the resident rate, as will residents of Montana, South Dakota and other states. This amendment may assist in recruitment and retention.

Finally, SB 2076 makes spouses and children of veterans killed in action, disabled veterans or POWs eligible for resident tuition, regardless of legal residency. If the veteran was a North Dakota resident, spouses and children are entitled to a waiver of tuition and fees under a separate statute. This bill does not affect that entitlement; rather, it is intended to benefit qualified spouses and children of nonresident veterans, making them eligible for resident tuition rates.

These changes are not expected to have a material fiscal impact. The number of students affected will be small. The changes may encourage some students, who might otherwise leave the state, to remain or induce a few residents of other states, who might otherwise not consider doing so, to enroll at a state college or university.
