Testimony in Favor of the Bill:

Rep. Dan Ruby, Dist. #38, introduced the bill as an easy bill and on the behalf of the Attorney General's office. This is a simple word change dealing with breathalyzers. The new language is the verbiage that is currently used.

Marge Pearson, State Toxicologist (meter 2:01) stated the new term is a more accurate term. Alveolar air is the deafest lung air and is not always the sample we receive. Sometimes it is expiratory breath is really what we receive.

Sen. Lyson spoke (meter 2:51) of his training with the machine and the accuracy comes from the deeper breathing. The bill would more accurately describe the correct language of what is being done. Marge stated that the deepest air is the best but not always given. The committee spoke of the equipment, replaced in 2000, the 5000EM. Ms. Pearson spoke of (meter 4:20) the lungs process in breathing air.
