Kent Junkert, Plant Industries Program Manager, ND Ag Dept.: (supports HB 1149)

Dave Nelson, the current entomologist will retire in 2009, possibly the fall. When looking for a replacement, removing the requirement for a state entomologist provides greater flexibility to the commissioner to utilize various persons with expertise in various pest disciplines.

(Written testimony attached #1)

Foreign countries tell us that in order for you to export ND commodities to our country you must meet these requirements. We conduct many inspections. In order to do this, we need qualified individuals on our staff. To give you an idea of the scope of the work, from 2005-2008 we conducted 10,290 phytosanitary certificates. We impacted over 10,000 imports to foreign countries. Five commodities make up 71% of our phytosanitary work. We are exporting 8 commodities to 80 countries.

Representative Belter: What type of training are you looking for?

Kent Junkert: Training in plant regulatory experience with a multidiscipline background.

A combination of experience in entomology, plant pathology and some experience as a

nematologist. We're looking for a broader experience set because we're dealing with a variety

of pests. In the 80's the program dealt with mostly grasshoppers. Now there is a broader threat of pests coming to North Dakota.

Representative Belter: You're looking for an individual that is highly experienced? There isn't a specific degree?

Kent Junkert: Yes. We're also looking for a large amount of experience in survey work.

They call it delimiting surveys. You find the source of the problem and then you work outwards to figure the scope of infestation and threats to other parts of the state.

Representative Mueller: Does this create for the dept. an FTE issue?

Kent Junkert: No. All this bill does is allow for the ability for the Ag. Commissioner to go out and find a qualified individual according to the job experience that we think would fit the program at the time. It doesn't eliminate the FTE. It just eliminates the description of the position in code and eliminates the specific entomology requirement for this position. Right now, I would have to hire a specific entomologist. To better serve North Dakota we need a broader experience set.

Representative Mueller: How many similar kinds of circumstances does the dept. have that might be better served by a broader title.

Kent Junkert: I think three sessions ago, the legislature eliminated the State Dairy Director.

Right now the last one we have is the State Apiary Director which would be Judy Carlson.

Representative Holman: Do you already use people with a specific responsibility in a broader range?

Kent Junkert: Yes. Because we have a large amount of work. ND is turning into a global export state. Each country has specific import requirements.

Representative Froelich: Do you have a list of what goes to each county?

Kent Junkert: I will get that to you

Representative Holman: Does the state entomologist depend on the extension service?

Kent Junkert: Yes. We sign survey agreements with the research arm to help us go out and

do some foot work. They employ NDSU students/grads to help with survey work.

Representative Schatz: When reading this bill, it doesn't look like there is any requirement for a degree. Could you hire someone without a degree?

Kent Junkert: We work under the State Personnel system, so I'll work with Human Resource Management services. They will classify this position and accurately describe it before I can release an ad.

Representative Schatz: If you can't find anyone, do you have to take someone without a degree.

Kent Junkert: I would expect the job description would require a degree and would probably have a preferred requirement for a graduate degree.

Representative Belter: I am uncomfortable removing the language that you must be from a credited college. Have you had any discussion as to leaving some of that language.

Kent Junkert: As a classified employee, we can put very specific requirements in the job description. We can set as to what is needed at the time.

Representative Belter: Is this now a classified position?

Kent Junkert: Yes

Vice Chairman Brandenburg: Why not hire another entomologist? I understand you need more flexibility. I'm trying to understand the people that set this up years ago probably had a good reason for it. Are we going forward or backward?

Kent Junkert: Back in the 60's this position used to be a research position. As it evolved, it turned into more of a survey, more of a regulatory position. I think we're going forward.

Representative Belter: "Other qualified employees" that's not acceptable to me.

Chairman Johnson: I felt that being a graduate in that area is addressing your concerns.

Representative Mueller: I'm not seeing a whole lot of difference between what Mr. Junkert is suggesting and the language of the law as it reads today.

Kent Junkert: As the bill is drafted right now, the individual must be a graduate in Ag Entomology specifically. We would like the opportunity to bring in an individual with the scientific background for the biggest issues that will come forward at the time.

Representative Rust: Are you going from one person in the current law which is "shall employ a qualified entomologist" to multiple people?

Kent Junkert: The suggested language you have in front of you would address all disciplines for all three FTEs that are currently in place. There is an Ag Entomologist and two Plant Pathologists in this area. This would provide qualification criteria for the future as we replace or if we replace those three people.

Representative Rust: If our current law says a qualified entomologist and we now have three people, how are the other two hired? Why hasn't it been a problem before?

Kent Junkert: The current law specified the State Agricultural Entomologist. One position. There's always been three positions in that area. This was law that was transferred over from when the position was given up from NDSU and provided to the department. For some reason they wrote in there that they wanted to have a recognized state entomologist—1 position. The law never specifically addressed the two other employees in that area. The suggested language now would make sure that we're going to hire people with the proper scientific credentials to do the job.

Representative Rust: I'm still wondering if we weren't concerned about it and now we are. How did we manage before?

Kent Junkert: We have three people in this division. One is the state agriculture entomologist who has an entomology degree. We have two plant pathologists. These are classified positions which are defined by human resource management from OMB. In order to obtain that classification, we write in minimum criteria. This is one of three remaining positions that are spelled out in Century Code what you must have to obtain the job. The State Veterinarian, the State Apiary Director, and the State Entomologist are the three defined in law.

Representative Rust: My problem is we've gone from one person to multiple people in the new law. I think you've grown the scope of the existing law.

Representative Belter: "Other related disciplines"? Maybe if we added "other related scientific disciplines." There should be no doubt that this person needs to be qualified in a scientific field relating to plant pathology.

Chairman Johnson and members of the House Agriculture Committee, I am Ken Junkert, the North Dakota Department of Agriculture Plant Industries Program manager. I am here today in support of HB 1149 which will amend North Dakota Century Code (NDCC) § 4-33-02 to remove the requirement that the agriculture commissioner employ a qualified entomologist to serve as state agricultural entomologist to carry out the survey, control and quarantine provisions of NDCC Chapter 4-33 which deals with plant pests.

The Plant Protection Division in the North Dakota Department of Agriculture seeks to safeguard agronomic field crops, horticultural crops and grasses used for livestock production from plant pests through survey, control, eradication and quarantine activities. The Plant Protection Division is also charged with providing export certification services that assist agricultural exporters to meet the plant pest quarantine requirements of foreign countries. Inspection of

agricultural commodities and plants for plant pests including insects, plant pathogens, and nematodes is necessary to fulfill this responsibility as is a survey program to demonstrate that North Dakota is free of pests considered to be quarantine pests by foreign governments.

Insects of relevance to our responsibilities include grasshoppers which periodically reach outbreak status where cooperative control programs are undertaken. Many exotic insects could threaten North Dakota with perhaps the most serious being Emerald ash borer which poses a huge threat to North Dakota ash trees. Finally, many of our agricultural products that are exported must be certified free of a wide variety of insect pests.

But there are many other pests of concern that are not insects. Karnal bunt is a fungus disease of wheat that threatened North Dakota wheat exports when it was discovered in Arizona in 1996. A statewide survey program was and is essential to allow North Dakota exports to continue. When potato cyst nematode was discovered in Idaho several years ago and subsequently found in parts of Canada, survey was again necessary to demonstrate that North Dakota was free of the pest as well as to provide the baseline data needed to justify federal restrictions on imports that could potentially introduce this serious pest. Also, many of our agricultural products that are exported must be certified free of a wide variety of plant diseases and nematodes. As a result, a strong background in plant pathology or other disciplines is important for this component of the work. We currently employ staff with both types of expertise – one entomologist and two plant

pathologists. The current law doesn't accurately reflect the work completed the by the Plant Protection Division.

NDCC Chapter 4-33 requires that the agriculture commissioner employ a qualified entomologist to serve as state agricultural entomologist to carry out the provisions of the chapter. Removing the specific requirement for a state entomologist provides greater flexibility to the commissioner to utilize various persons with expertise in various pest disciplines including entomology, plant pathology and nematology in carrying out the provisions of the law.

Chairman Flakoll and members of the Senate Agriculture Committee, I am Ken Junkert, the North Dakota Department of Agriculture Plant Industries Program manager. I am here today in support of HB 1149 which will amend North Dakota Century Code (NDCC) § 4-33-02 to expand the educational background hiring requirements for the individual currently employed as the state agricultural entomologist to carry out the survey, control and quarantine provisions of NDCC Chapter 4-33 which deals with plant pests.

The Plant Protection Division in the North Dakota Department of Agriculture seeks to safeguard agronomic field crops, horticultural crops and grasses used for livestock production from plant pests through survey, control, eradication and quarantine activities. The Plant Protection Division is also charged with providing export certification services that assist agricultural exporters to meet the plant pest quarantine requirements of foreign countries. Inspection of

agricultural commodities and plants for plant pests including insects, plant pathogens, and nematodes is necessary to fulfill this responsibility as is a survey program to demonstrate that North Dakota is free of pests considered to be quarantine pests by foreign governments.

Insects of relevance to our responsibilities include grasshoppers which periodically reach outbreak status where cooperative control programs are undertaken. Many exotic insects could threaten North Dakota with perhaps the most serious being Emerald ash borer which poses a huge threat to North Dakota ash trees. Finally, many of our agricultural products that are exported must be certified free of a wide variety of insect pests.

But there are many other pests of concern that are not insects. Karnal bunt is a fungus disease of wheat that threatened North Dakota wheat exports when it was discovered in Arizona in 1996. A statewide survey program was and is essential to allow North Dakota exports to continue. When potato cyst nematode was discovered in Idaho several years ago and subsequently found in parts of Canada, survey was again necessary to demonstrate that North Dakota was free of the pest as well as to provide the baseline data needed to justify federal restrictions on imports that could potentially introduce this serious pest. Also, many of our agricultural products that are exported must be certified free of a wide variety of plant diseases and nematodes. As a result, a strong background in plant pathology or other disciplines is important for this component of the work. We currently employ staff with both types of expertise — one entomologist and two plant

pathologists. The current law doesn't accurately reflect the work completed the by the Plant Protection Division.
