

Chairman Nething and Members of the Committee:

My name is Jonathan Byers and I appear on behalf of the Attorney General. I wish to testify in favor of House Bill 1311.

The simple purpose of this bill is to clarify that when a requester obtains a criminal history record from the Bureau of Criminal Investigation, there is nothing prohibiting that citizen (or business) from re-disclosing the criminal history record to other persons. The Bureau fields a lot of questions from citizens as to whether the record can be shared, and the added language in the bill answers that question.

I'd like my testimony to reflect that this only applies to the type of criminal history record that is available to the public. Criminal justice criminal history records contain information that is not available to the public, and this bill does not authorize those to re-disclosed to non-criminal justice agencies.

The Attorney General asks for a do pass. I would be happy to answer any questions.
